Great Britain, France, and Italy Make Formal Complaint to America.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Formal complaint against the ruling of the United States Supreme Court that foreign vessels could not bring liquor inside the 3-mile limit of the United States has been made.

Great Britain and France have made their protest in written form to the United States government and Italy has made oral protest through their ambassador to the State Department at Washington.

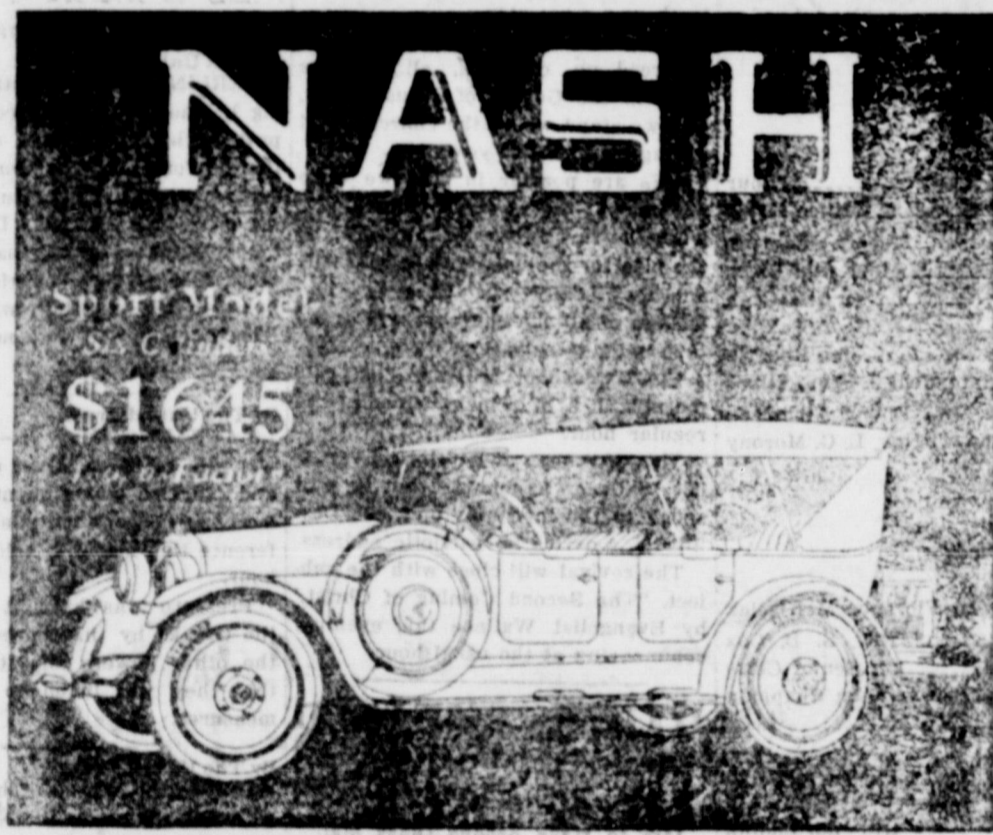

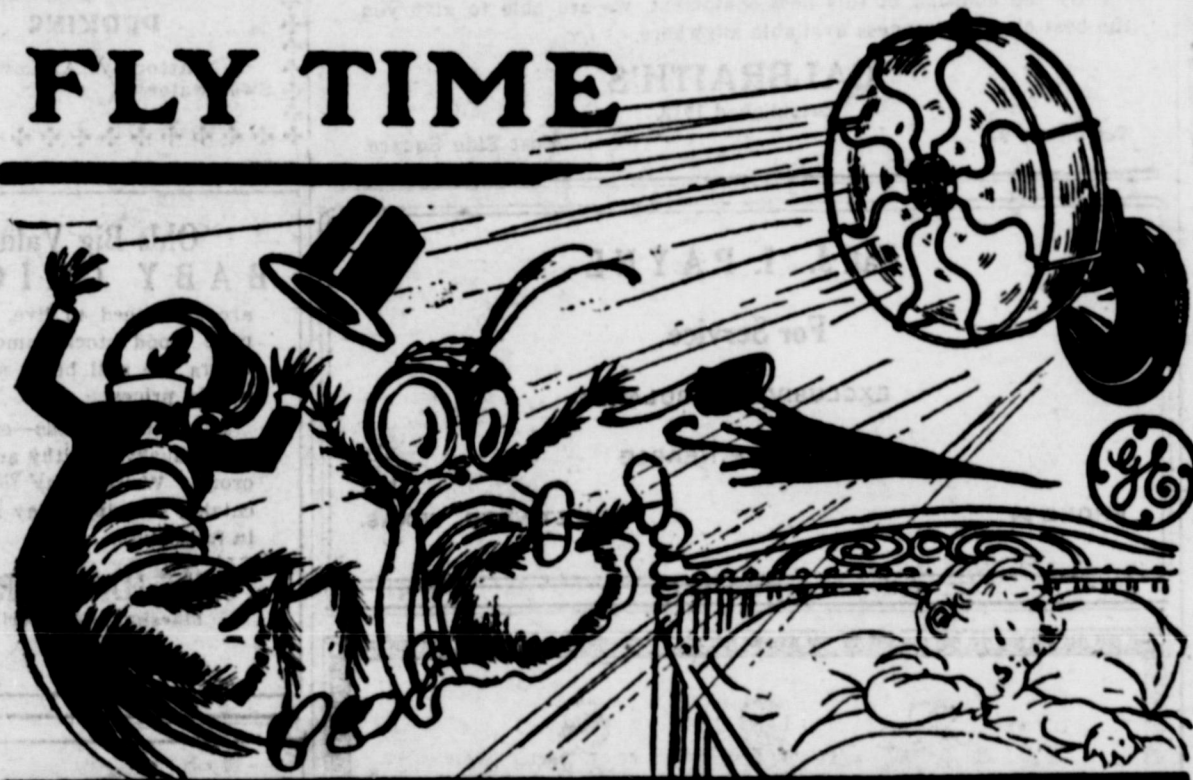

SETS NEW RECORD

Aviator Makes Non-Stop Flight From Gulf to Canadian Border—Flew 1,400 Miles in 12 Hours.

SELFDRIDGE FIELD, Mt. Clemons, Mich., May 26.—Lieutenant Harrison G. Crocker established a new non-stop airplane record today when he flew from the Gulf of Mexico to the Canadian border, 1,400 miles in 12 hours.

He left Houston at 5:15 a. m., Central time and landed here at 6:14 p. m., passing over Detroit at 6 p. m. His official time from the Gulf to the Canadian line was 11 hours and 59 minutes. He flew over Toledo then on the Canadian side to Detroit, crossing the St. Clair River there and landing at Selfridge Field.

The aviator had about 500 miles of cloudy, rainy flying before reaching

clear air in the upper part of the Mississippi Valley. He did not fly above the 500 foot level at any time. The trip was without motor trouble or mishap of any kind. Crocker went without food or drink for the entire 1,400 miles.
