## TWO CONVERTED BY METHODISTS

Revival Gets Under Way at Tabernacle On South Pike With Rev. Meador and Scoggins in Charge.

### "WAGES OF SIN IS DEATH"

Rev. Meador Delivers Powerful Sermon Sunday Night Address to Parents of Children.

"The Devil will promise you more and do less for you than anyone," said Rev. C. B. Meador at the Methodist revival services Sunday night.

The revival got well under way yesterday with two conversions at the morning service. The open sides of the Tabernacle extend a cordial invitation to any itinerant breeze that may be blowing and the large crowds present at the services were very comfortable.

Rev. Meador, who is in charge of the preaching, is not very large physically and there were several lively tilts between him and Rev. Doak on that point and also between him and Rev. H. G. Scoggins, who is in charge of the singing. Whatever Rev. Meador lacks in size is made up by Rev. Scoggins, however.

Services are being held for the children each morning. At 9 o'clock, Singer Scoggins has charge of them for one hour of play, and then at 10 o'clock Evangelist Meador conducts a short service.

Dr. Meador's sermon Sunday night was directed at parents, especially fathers. It was taken from Romans 6:23, "The Wages of Sin is Death." He emphasized the necessity of taking proper care of the young people. "We look to the coming generation to provide our lawyers, teachers, merchants. The coming generation is also the one that will furnish the thieves, drunkards and other criminals. The training that a boy or girl receives up to the time that they are 12 years of age is the most vital influence that they have on their future lives. Character is moulded easier and more permanently before the child is 12 years old."

At the play hour Monday morning, there was a large number of kiddies who enjoyed very much the games under the direction of Rev. Scoggins, which was followed by an interesting little talk on "Knots" by Rev. Meador.

Rev. Meador took a crooked stick and compared it to a sinful life, with the knots as illustrations.

Tuesday morning the subject will be "Fishing." A children's choir was organized this morning and will be a feature of the services each night. The subject tonight is "Player."

## TO CALIFORNIA.

Santa Fe Announces New Pullman Service With Stop at Grand Canyon.

Additional through sleeper service to Los Angeles, California, is announced by the Santa Fe railroad, beginning Saturday September 8th and continuing until further notice.

The new sleeper is in addition to the regular California car and will be operated through Sweetwater Wednesday and Sunday mornings. It stops over one day at Grand Canyon, Arizona, thus permitting a visit to that famous scenic wonder without change of cars and retaining the same berth all the way. The regular sleeper does not operate to Grand Canyon.

A twelve section Pullman with drawing room will be used. It will leave Houston Tuesdays and Saturdays. The present Pullman operates between New Orleans and Los Angeles, via. Clovis, while the Pullman that is set out at Sweetwater each day operates between Sweetwater and Kansas City, via. Amarillo.

## TO SEIZE SHIPS.

Customs Officials Notified to Get Ships Inside 3-Mile Limit.

By The United Press. WASHINGTON, June 4.—Foreign or American vessels which with deliberate intent bring liquor inside the 3-mile limit of the United States will be seized by the Federal Custom authorities, treasury officials announced today.

Custom officials have been notified of the order.

Under the terms of the order, vessels whose captains deliberately broke the law or whose owners conspire to break the liquor laws will be impounded and sold by the government.

## THEFT CHARGED

Unless Governor Pardons Ex-Soldier, Death From Tuberculosis is Certain—Got Two Years.

By The United Press. HOUSTON, Texas, June 4.—T. T. Barton, 26, veteran of the world war and for nine months a patient of the Camp Logan Tubercular Hospital here must go to what physicians claim will be his death cell at the Texas penitentiary unless Governor Neff grants executive clemency before June 29.

Barton was found guilty of stealing an automobile and given a five year suspended sentence by a jury here. The evidence was circumstantial and Barton protested his innocence.

Because his lawyer failed to place him on the stand, the judge ruled that the suspended sentence could not be granted. The sentence was reduced to two years.

The jury has made written affidavit that it would not have given Barton such a heavy penalty had it known a suspended sentence could not have been granted.

The former service man was discharged from the tubercular hospital several days ago and is now on a ninety day furlough granted by the governor. The furlough expires midnight June 29 and unless a pardon is granted by the Governor before that time the man will have to go to the penitentiary where physicians say the "white plague" will kill him within three months.

Barton was a non-com missioned officer in charge of gas instruction during the war. He served overseas and was given an honorable discharge when he returned to this country. The effect of the gas on his lungs caused him to fall victim to tuberculosis, according to physicians.

## ROUND UP REDS IN RUHR VALLEY

German Police Reorganized and Make House to House Canvass, Arresting 300 And Many Guns.

## STRIKE IS STILL CONTINUING

Communists Plans Apparently Carefully Worked Out And More Mines Closed.

BERLIN, June 4.—While hundreds of Communists were being rounded up last night and today, the strike continues to spread in the Ruhr Valley.

Apparently the strike had been very carefully prepared and planned in advance and it is being carried out in spite of interference.

While police were arresting hundreds of Communists in Bochum and Dortmund, fresh strikes were breaking out elsewhere, causing many shops and mines to close.

German police have been reorganized and are attempting to stamp out the flames of Communism. Blocks of dwellings believed to shelter "reds" are surrounded by police and a house to house search made. In Dortmund, over 500 Reds have been arrested. Practically every one of them was armed and some of the houses were veritable arsenals with cellars filled with arms and ammunition.

## BRIDE DIES.

Honor Graduate of Bronte High School This Year Buried Sunday.

Graduated from the Bronte High School May 1, with highest honors, and a bride of but two weeks, Mrs. Retha Haley was buried at Bronte Sunday afternoon, following her death Saturday after a few days' illness.

She was the bride of Hubert Haley, who is in the dry goods business there the son of Postmaster Haley, and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Hensley of Bronte.

The members of the Bronte High School graduating class attended the funeral in a body. Mr. Haley is a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. H. McMullen of Sweetwater, who attended the funeral Sunday, accompanied by Mrs. Ed Sinnott.

## IS RUSHING WORK

Outside of East Ward Building Nearly Completed—Brick Work in Progress On Others.

Work on the East Ward School Building on East 3rd street is going along steadily and the building will be ready for use at the opening of the school term this fall.

This building, when completed, will be a credit to the city and will greatly add to its educational facilities.

The building is built of brick and is practically fire-proof. Heat is furnished by steam from boiler in a basement behind the building.

There are eleven class rooms down stairs, ranging from twenty-one to twenty-seven to twenty-four by thirty two feet in size. There is also an office and a library room downstairs, while the auditorium and one class room are up-stairs. All the rooms are cool and are well supplied with light and air.

The total cost of the building when completed, will be about \$45,000.

The brick work on the additions to the South and West Ward buildings will be completed within ten days.

## TEXT BOOKS ARE AGAIN IN COURTS

American Book Company File Application for Writ of Mandamus in Supreme Court Against Marra.

## SLICE APPROPRIATIONS MORE

Total of Three Millions Pared From Education—Other Bills Reported By Legislative Committee.

AUSTIN, June 4.—Application for permission to file a writ of mandamus compelling State Superintendent of Schools S. M. N. Marra to comply with the provisions of the contract held by the American Book Company of New York executed by the State Text Book Commission last December was filed in the State Supreme Court today.

Notice of the appeal was served on Prof. Marra.

A committee appointed by the legislature to look into the text book wards has retained an attorney.

Attorney General Keeling intimates that it is not his duty to take steps in the controversy. The legislature has passed a bill which annulled all awards made last December.

## BILLS REPORTED.

The House Appropriation Committee today reported the Educational and Departmental bills out of committee with a cut of over two million dollars from the bills as they were passed at the second called session.

With the report of these bills, the committee has completed work on four bills, the Judicial and Elementary bills having been previously reported and favorably.

The total cut is three million dollars.

Denton Residential Blocks Threatened With Destruction.

## JONES HOME DAMAGED.

Oak Street Residence Is Scene of An Early Morning Fire.

Fire believed to have been caused by defective wiring partially destroyed the home of C. E. Jones, at 903 Oak street Monday morning at 2:30 o'clock. Mr. Jones, a car foreman for the T. & P. railroad, and his son were alone in the house at the time and the roof was in flames when they aroused.

Prompt work by the fire department aided in saving about half the house. The damage was estimated at \$1,300 and about half the furniture was destroyed. The loss was covered by insurance. The house is owned by Mrs. Agnes Quast and her brother, Joe Jenkins.

## WAY NOW OPENED

Rum Runners Gather On Canadian Border Ready to Flood New York State Following Law Repeal.

By The United Press. OTTAWA, Canada, June 4.—Large cargoes of Canadian beer and liquors are moving toward the International boundary line on its way to New York State, following the repeal of the state prohibition enforcement laws there.

According to Canadian officers, rumrunners are about that active plans to flood the entire state with Canadian "hardstuff" are nearing culmination.

The coming of summer weather may have something to do with the situation, causing the trade to grow after the difficulties of transportation incident to a severe winter.

But there is no question but what the repeal of the enforcement in New York has brought new blood into the game and encouraged those already in, and according to the present outlook, there will be an unprecedented flood of liquor into the state.

## DEAD ON TRACKS

Body of Wealthy Kansas City Broker Ground Under Wheels—Murder Suspected—Money Missing

By The United Press. KANSAS CITY, June 4.—Police here are investigating the death of Guy A. Moore, wealthy broker and former president of the Kansas City Board of Trade.

Moore's mutilated body was found on the railroad tracks near the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul bridge. According to authorities the lack of blood on the spot is an indication that the body was placed there after death, where it was discovered by the crew of a freight train after being mangled by other trains.

A large sum of money known to have been in Moore's possession prior to his death leads his partner T. W. Lawless, to declare that Moore had been attacked, robbed and his body placed on the tracks to cover the crime.

## MEMORIAL GIVEN TO CONFEDERACY

Anniversary of Jefferson Davis Birth-day Observed in Services at Methodist Church Sunday Afternoon.

## HERO GRAVES ARE DECORATED

At Conclusion of Services Graves of 25 Veterans Dressed With Flowers—U. D. C. in Charge

In observance of Confederate Memorial Day and the anniversary of Jefferson Davis, the only president of the Confederacy, a program was held at the Methodist church Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock, after which the graves of the Confederate and Federal war veterans at the City Cemetery were decorated.

Mrs. R. C. Crane acted as chairman of the proceedings, and after the opening song at the church, the scripture reading, a passage from Eleven, Hebrews, was read by Rev. D. B. Doak, followed by the benediction by Rev. Scoggins.

Judge A. S. Mauzey then gave an address on Jefferson Davis, with a brief account of the early life of the famous statesman-soldier, his ideals and principles and his steadfastness in the times of trials and troubles. Lincoln and Davis, who were raised together, were compared and Judge Mauzey said: "We are just as proud of Jefferson Davis as any man in this republic is of Abraham Lincoln."

The American Legion address was given by James Henry Beall, Jr., who paid tribute to the Confederate veterans and the Daughters of the Confederacy. Mr. Beall declared that the American Legion owed a debt to the Confederate veterans for the great example they set in the Civil War and for the fine spirit they showed after the defeat of the Southern army. He lamented the necessity of future wars and declared that the wrong kind of propaganda was being spread.

"People always talk of the next war," said Mr. Beall. "It appears to me that we should talk of peace instead of war. We should eternally strive for future peace and eternally talk peace."

After a duet by Miss Ruby Hemby and John A. McCurdy, the United Daughters of the Confederacy address was made by Mrs. R. C. Ledford. Mrs. Ledford gave a brief history of the U. D. C., giving the five purposes of the organization as being memorial, benevolent, educational, historical and social, and with the first privilege and duty being to serve the Confederates and members of their family.

At the conclusion of the program, the Confederate veterans, American Legion, Legion Auxiliary, Daughters of the Confederacy and friends drove to the City Cemetery, where, after a song and prayer at the grave of John R. Lewis, the graves of about twenty-five Civil War veterans were decorated with flowers.

## AVIATORS LAND HERE.

Lieut. Beverly and Sgt. Giles On Way to Kelly Field Take on Gas And Oil.

Lieutenant G. H. Beverly and Sergeant Giles, of Kelly Field, arrived at the local landing field from Tulsa, where they have been visiting relatives, at noon today.

Lieutenant Beverly said that Sweetwater had an unusually good landing field and paid a compliment to the gas and oil service. He said that many of the towns in West Texas were sadly in need of distinctly marked fields.

The plane is a De Havelland Four, equipped with a Liberty motor, and is the same type that was used in the recent Porto Rican flight by Kelly Field aviators.

Lieutenant Beverly was member of the squadron which recently returned from New York with Martin Bombers.

How he barbers his own soul to save theirs cannot fail to be a reproof which will burn deep into the hearts of all those who harbor aversions and antipathies.

In an uprising climax the tale gains

a tremendous dramatic force wherein the soul of the heathen shines forth as a symbol of Goodness and Truth to enlighten those who have hated and reviled him.

In addition to the remarkable story the production is notable for a cast of renowned artists headed by Lon Chaney in the role of Yen Sin, the outstanding characterization of the play.

#### NEED MORE FACTORIES.

Texas Has 5,000—Needs Five Times That Many.

By The United Press. DALLAS, June 4.—Texas has about five thousand manufacturing establishments and should have five times that many," Burt C. Blanton, manager of the Texas Chamber of Commerce declared at a meeting of the Technical Club of Dallas.

"It has about twenty cotton mills operating approximately 170,000 spindles and should have at least three hundred cotton mills operating more than a million spindles. At present less than two per cent of the cotton raised here is manufactured in the state," he declared.

M. H. Merrill of Denison made a brief talk on the advantages Texas offers to a location for cotton textile mills.

"There will never be another chance so good as the present to start building mills in Texas," said Merrill. "The mills of the east are old and the labor situation is bad. Native labor is hard to control and inefficient. The building of new mills in New England is over and from now on they will be built in the South. Texas has a large amount of unemployed labor and is the logical place to locate cotton mills," he said.
