

At a meeting of the Directors of this Association, held in Sweetwater Monday, June 11, the issuance of \$10,000 in preferred stock was auuthorized. The proceeds of this stock will be used for the construction of a commercial cold storage plant, in which to care for the poultry business of the Association, and such other cold storage business as may come its way.

This stock has a par value of \$10.00 per share; will earn a guaranteed annual divident of 8 per cent, and one fifth of it will be retired each year, so that the entire out standing stock will be taken up in five years.

The Southwestern Farm Bureau Poultry Association now has a membership of over 850 men in Tom Green, Coke, Nolan, Mitchell, Scurry, Taylor and Fisher Counties with

175,000 Hens Under A Five Year Contract

A conservative estimate of the yearly business from that number of hens is \$300,000. Poultry is not affected by drouth. This Association will have direct representation on the New York market by J. H. Barber, head of the big California Merger Co-operative Egg Producing Associations with more than one million hens under con-

This \$10,000.00 stock issue is guaranteed by the entire membership of the Southwestern Farm Bureau Poultry Association. An assessment of less than one per cent among the members would be sufficient to retire it.

The Directors of the Association thought well enough of the project to subscribe \$1,000 of the stock at the meeting Monday.

Owing to its central location and rail facilities, Sweetwater is favored as Headquarters for Texas' first poultry pool. But the lack of cold storage facilities must be over come. Both San Angelo and Snyder want the Headquarters of this Association—and both cities no whave the cold storage facilities. If Sweetwater retains this enterprise, then a certain amount of this preferred stock should be subscribed by Sweetwater citizens.

Crane who has had seed oats in his barns since I first knew him. There are many farmers who have something to sell produced on their farms besides cotton. These are the successful men of the county. They are too numerous to mention.

"There are farmers all over this Divide who pay their household and incidental expences with the sale of chickens, eggs, butter fat, calves and pigs. Others could do the same if they would only try.

"All poultry authorities say a standard bred hen on a town lot will make her owner a profit of \$1 a year. On the farm she should make a profit

"Sheep will make a profit of at least 80 per cent on their cost and keep. and while they are at it will clean the pasture of weeds that are of no vieue to the owner of the farm and and not eaten by any other livestock. They will even kill out cockleburs.

"The time was when we shipped to the Fort Worth market one car of fat hogs once a month. The returns paid our bills. It is due to carelessness, and a lack of systematic planning that we are not shipping hogs now. We once had cream stations on the Divide. trucks that came for our cream, eggs, poultry, hides and other produce offered for sale. Those were our most prosperous days. We had a cash check coming every week. To do this, requires a little individual effort and a little cooperative effort by the community. Enough for this time.
