TOURIST RECORD **BROKEN AT PARK**

Mr. Laney Keeper Says Fifty-Three Travellers Registered Recently at Tourist Camp In One Night.

HAYNES SAYS TOWN HAS GROWN

Recently The Reporter published a list of long-distance travellers who had registered at the local Tourist Camp. In this list the names of a large number of people from all points of the continent were included. Some were from the Canadian border enroute to the Gulf of Mexico. Others were from as far off as Indianapolis. Memphis, Tenn. and other distant points enroute to Los Angeles and the Pacific Coast. legislative initiative has invited him to make a survey and take over the State's entire water power development. Aside from individual power projects such as that at his \$10,000. 000 St. Paul factory, Ford has mapped plans for development for the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers and has seouts in every part of the coun try looking for dam sites.



Ore-Ford is in control of a company which owns 32,000 acres of timber and ore land in the upper peninsula of Michigan, including a mine credited with the production of 1,000,000 tons of ore, averaging 52 per cent fron.


