WALL STREET

A stock market slump generally means that business conditions will stagnate about six months later. The market anticipates the industrial situation, rising in advance of booms and slipping ahead of a period of depression.

This year, however, the stock market cannot be depended on, as much as usual, in "doping" the business outlook, because the drop in the market has been to considerable extent due to loss of public confidence in Wall Street.

In less than two years, more than 160 brokerage firms have failed. About 100 of them were not associated with any stock exchange, but their failure nevertheless has caused to withdraw from the market a considerable fraction of the plungers whose operations caused the market to rise or fall.

The stock market having lost some of its reliability as a weather-vane of general business conditions, you turn to the next weather-vane—movement of freight by the railroads.

For three weeks in June, latest reported, the roads hauled over a million cars of freight a week. It's a record, for this time of year, never before equaled.

It seems logical that business is not ordering the stuff moved by freight unless it is reasonably sure of a market for it. If correct, the winter outlook is good. Spring business, like spring weather, is too far away to predict.

Grade 10-A, Sweetwater High School. "Why The Texas College of Technology Should Be Located At Sweetwater."

In February, 1923, a bill was passed by the Texas Legislature providing for the establishment of the Texas College of Technology to be located west of the 98th Meridian by a committee composed of the presidents of the Texas University, the Agricultural and Mechanical College, and the College of Industrial Arts with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and Senator S. B. Cowell, chairman of the State Board of Control. This committee will choose in their opinion, as the college location the best fitted town in West Texas. The college will teach the courses by the Texas University, the Agricultural and Mechanical College, the College of Industrial Arts with courses in Technology in addition.

There are five reasons the College of Technology should be located at Sweetwater:

- 1.—Accessibility.
- 2.—Location of Sweetwater.
- 3.—Local conditions.
- 4.—The Site.
- 5.—Public sentiment.

Since this college is the only one of its kind in the west and will likely be attended by students from all of the Southwest, the first reason that Sweetwater is accessible is important. Sweetwater is more easily reached from all points than any other West Texas city. Three interstate trunk line railroads pass through Sweetwater. The Santa Fe passes through the entire southwestern portion of the United States, coming through Sweetwater from a northwestern and out a southeastern direction. The Texas & Pacific passes through Sweetwater in an eastern

and western direction, connecting with the Southern Pacific, a transcontinental railway. The Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway passes through Sweetwater north and south. These are the most important railways of West Texas.

If the college should be located in any other city, 75 per cent of the students would have to pass through Sweetwater. The three state highways the Bankhead, Del Rio Canadian and Gulf and Colorado which pass through Sweetwater in opposite directions give direct automobile routes to Sweetwater.

The second reason for the location of the college at Sweetwater is that Sweetwater has central location. Sweetwater is approximately the geographical center of West Texas, lacking only a few miles from any direction from being the center. The city is practically in the center of the territory not served now by any state college. It is as near the center of West Texas industry as possible, having agriculture north and east, ranching south and west with mining in the extreme west and oil production in the extreme east. Sweetwater is near the center of the population of West Texas, having to the north 536,220 people, to the east, 824,331, to the south 786,941 and to the west 496,021.

The third reason why the college should be located at Sweetwater is that this city has favorable local conditions. Sweetwater has a bountiful water supply which is free from disease germs and mineral matter. The supply which comes from the Lake of three billion capacity is enough to accommodate a population of 20,000 people for two years without rain. A \$35,000 filtration plant is being erected which will completely purify the water. The average rainfall per year is 25 inches. There are few crop failures but agriculture of arid lands can be demonstrated. The altitude is 2,200 feet, giving a high healthful climate.

The land formation around Sweetwater is excellent for the teaching of

geology and as it is a new field, it would afford interesting study. According to the report of a well informed geologist as respects geology, Sweetwater is the best place for the college. Sweetwater with modern churches for all the leading Christian denominations, with modern school buildings, many paved streets, and a perfect sewer system, makes a modern and progressive city.

The fourth reason that the site offered is the best possible is important. The site, which adjoins the city limits, has a beautiful building location. A strong supply of water can be piped anywhere in the 2,000 acres which comprise the location. The site also has running water. Within the limits of the site, practically every kind of West Texas soil is represented, valley land, heavy black land, rich loam, deep blow sand, gradually rolling upland, steep hillside, gravelly soil and washed hills. Diversified farming may be successfully taught on this site. Nothing could be better for agricultural inspection.

The fifth reason why the college should be located at Sweetwater is that Sweetwater is strongly supported

by public sentiment. By reliable information Sweetwater has the favor of 75 per cent of the disinterested people, which indicates its good reputation.

In conclusion the Texas College of Technology should be located at Sweetwater for five reasons, first general accessibility, central location, third local conditions, fourth suitable site, and fifth, the favoritism of public sentiment. No other city can offer

so well supported and as important reasons for the location of the college as Sweetwater.

AN ORDINANCE.

A motion was made by Joe H. Boothe, Mayor, and seconded by W. T. Trammell, Commissioner No. 2, that paragraph No. two (2) of Section three (3) of "an ordinance pertaining to electric wiring and electric apparatus" adopted and approved by the City Council of Sweetwater, August 16th, 1916, be amended so that paragraph No. 2 (2) of Section three (3) thereof shall read as follows:

The City electrician may inspect or cause to be inspected any old wiring or electrical apparatus in any building within the corporate limits of the City of Sweetwater, and shall thereupon issue a certificate if the work is in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. In case the work does not comply with this ordinance, the city electrician shall issue a written statement as to the changes necessary to bring the work up to standard.

Under no consideration shall a certificate be issued on work that is concealed in such manner that it cannot be examined.

The motion was declared to have been carried, Mayor Joe H. Boothe voting aye, Commissioner W. T. Trammell voting aye and Commissioner L. E. Musgrove voting aye.

AN ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING AN ELECTION IN THE CITY OF SWEETWATER FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING WHETHER OR NOT THE CITY OF SWEETWATER, TEXAS, SHALL BE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUE BONDS OF SAID CITY IN THE SUM OF THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF A FILTRATION PLANT TO BE USED IN CONNECTION WITH SAID CITY'S WATER SYSTEM, AND WHETHER OR NOT SAID CITY SHALL BE AUTHORIZED TO LEVY A TAX OF TEN CENTS ON THE HUNDRED DOLLARS' VALUATION OF PROPERTY IN SAID CITY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE INTEREST ON SAID BONDS, AND CREATING A FUND FOR THE REDEMPTION OF SAID BONDS AT THEIR MATURITY.

On this 22nd day of June, 1923, the City Commission of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, being in regular session, and all the members thereof being present, and there coming before the said Commission for its consideration the question whether or not an election shall be ordered by said Commission to determine whether or not it is the desire of the property tax paying voters of said city to issue the coupon bonds of said city for the purpose of the construction and installation of a filtration plant to be used in connection with said city's water system, and whether or not said city shall be authorized to levy a tax of ten cents on the One Hundred Dollars' valuation of property in said City for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and creating a sinking fund for the redemption of said bonds at their maturity.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SWEETWATER TEXAS, that an election be held on the

5th day of August, 1923, said date being not less than thirty days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property tax paying voters of said City, to-wit:

Shall the City Commission of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars, payable in forty years from their date with such options of redemption as the said City Commission may designate in said bonds, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and also whether or not said City Commission shall be authorized to levy a tax of ten cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation of property in said city, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay the interest on said bonds and creating a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds at their maturity; said bonds to be issued for the purpose of the construction and installation of a filtration plant to be used in connection with the water system of said City of Sweetwater.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall in said City of Sweetwater, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit: L. S. Polk, Presiding Judge, T. E. Crutcher, Judge, and T. L. Hughes and Gerald Fitzgerald, Clerks. Only qualified property tax paying voters shall be allowed to vote in said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue said bonds and levy a tax as here provided, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the issuance of bonds in the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars for the construction and installation of a filtration plant to be used in connection with the water system of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, and the levying of a tax of ten cents on the one Hundred Dollars' valuation of property in the said City of Sweetwater, or so much thereof as may be necessary to provide for paying the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for the redemption of said bonds at their ma-

turity."

Those opposed, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the issuance of bonds in the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars for the construction and installation of a filtration plant to be used in connection with the water system of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, and the levying of a tax of ten cents on the One Hundred Dollars' valuation of property in the said City of Sweetwater, or so much thereof as may be necessary to provide for paying the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for the redemption of said bonds at their maturity." A copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor shall serve as proper notice of said election.

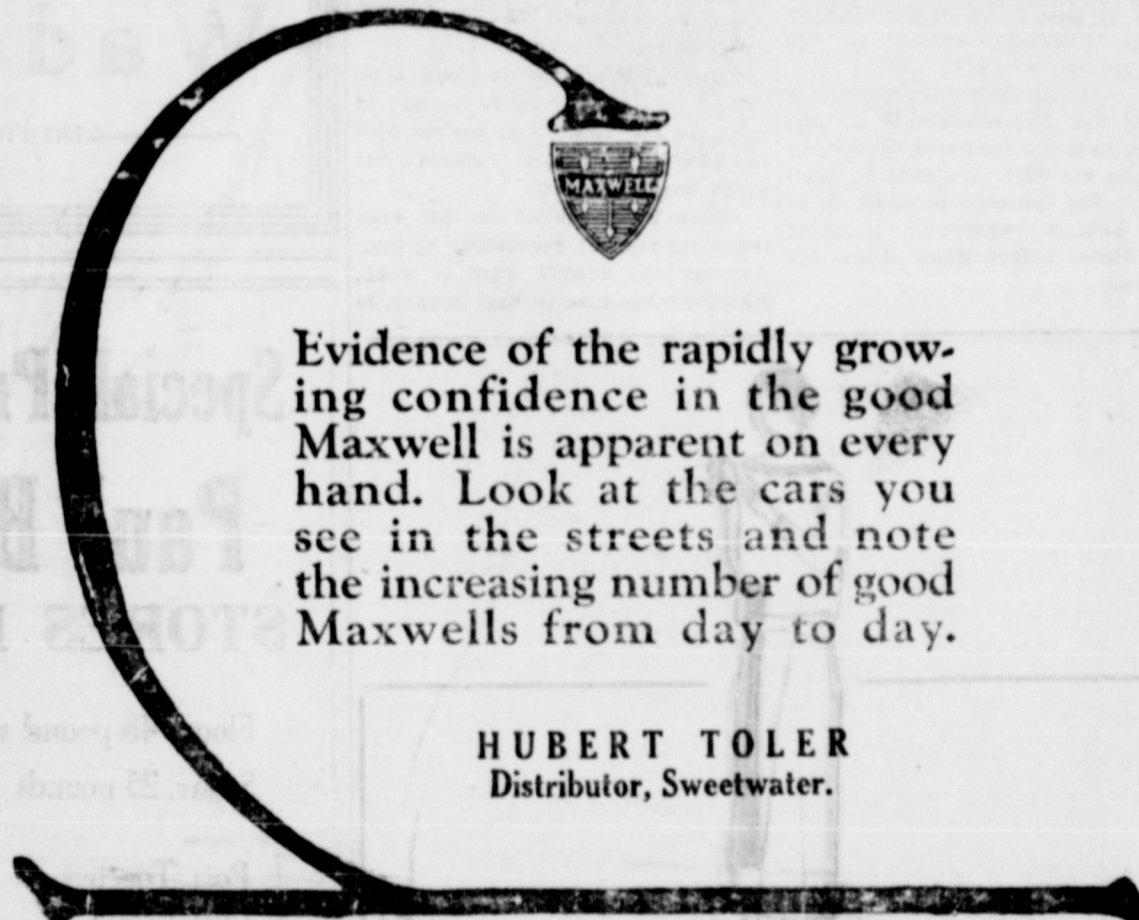

Bogus Money Easy to Detect, States Counterfeit Expert

CHICAGO, July 27.—Take a close look at the paper money in your roll.

Is there a suspicious thickness in the corners of the bill where the amount is printed?

Are the fine lines in the decorative scroll work blurred?

Does the bill seem a bit off color in its shading?

Yes? Well, it's probably counterfeit or raised, and you ought to blame yourself for taking it.

Captain Thomas I. Porter, in charge of the U. S. Secret Service here, who still in on the trail of the money makers in spite of his 77 years, will give you small consolation if you accept bad bills.

"Counterfeiters make their money to pass only once," he warns.

"They're satisfied as soon as the bill leaves their hands and they get value for it. So they don't have to make them either permanent or fit for the closest inspection. Their game, you know, is to pass their money in rush hours on outlying storekeepers."

Captain Porter doesn't give the counterfeit credit for either technical skill or romance.

"He's a dub," the captain says. "He hasn't the nerve to go out in the open and rob. And anyone with the skill to operate a camera can make bogus bills."

"There's no reason for his existence, no type or psychology to him. Anyone who doesn't want to work, who feels the lure of easy money, is

a potential counterfeiter. Most fake money is easy to detect, even by the inexperienced. Be vigilant and you won't take it."
"But it used to be that we ran across skilled workmen in the counterfeit game," he said. "They were harder to detect in the old days."
Captain Porter is on "his job every day. That's the way he keeps young.
