

East Room of White House Being Prepared for Body of Nation's President-Children Gather Flowers to Strew Path of Funeral Cortege-Special Train Hours Late In Arrival.

GOVERNMENT ACTIVITIES CEASE PENDING FUNERAL

All Stores And Offices Close And City Goes Into Mourning-Simple Ceremonies Arranged For Final Burial at Marion -The Wishes of Mrs. Harding To Be Carried Out.

(BY THE UNITED PRESS.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 7 .- Lowering clouds and weeping skies will greet the body of President Harding on arrival here, according to a forecast by the United States Weather Bureau here today.

Washington awoke today to one of the saddest dawns in the history of the Republic, the dawn of the day when the mortal shell of Its president is borne through its streets to the White House in preparation for the state funeral.

The transcontinental special train, which has blazed a trail of sorrow across the nation is reported several hours late. Neverthelsss, crowds started gathering at daylight in the atmosphere thick and oppressive after a week of intense heat.

Stores are draped in mourning and many are closed.

Government activities are at a standstill.

Flags droop at half mast in the heavy air.

Organized squads of school children are gathering wild flowers in fields near Washington to strew historic Pennsylvania Avenue the path of the funeral procession.

President Coolidge, Chief Justice, Taft, members of the cabinet and others high in government councils will participate in the ceremonies.

Upon its arrival here from San Francisco Tuesday, the funeral party will be met by Mr. Coolidge and other ranking officials, who will accompany the body to the White House behind the escort of a squadron of cavalry and a battalion of field artillery. It then will lie in the east room until Wednesday.

Membership Drive to Be Started In Nolan County-Farmers Receive \$25 More Per Bale Last Year.

Next Monday E. R. Cogden will speak at the Nolan County Court House in the interest of cooperative marketing. He will speak at 2 o'clock. Mr. Cogden is from Ennis and is one of the outstanding farm members of the Cotton Association. In addition to that he is a speaker of great ability.

A drive for members in the Farm Bureau Cotton Association will begin in Nolan County shortly, according to G. A. Lackey, of the Nolan County Farm Bureau.

The association already has over 409 members in the county.

> According to Mr. Orr, the association, last year, on warehousing and insurance alone, saved \$156,684,16, and between \$4 and \$6 per bale on country damage.

> The cost of marketing the cotion per bale through the bureau amounted to approximately \$3.50 per bale as compared to approximately \$12.40. it was costing them to market the same cotton without a system of marketing. and this \$9 per bale savings to the members was but another means of returning them a per bale profit of over \$25 as compared to street prices, said Mr. Orr.

Mr. Orr said that it was hoped that the association members this year will receive an even higher percentage of profit than the high figure of 1922.
