NATION PAUSES IN TRIBUTE TO HARDING

ALL TRAFFIC STOPS FOR FUNERAL AT MARION, O.

Every Railroad Wheel, Every Wire, All Ordinary Activities Suspend For Few Moments While Nation Bows Its Head In Reverence For Departed Chief—Marion Crowded.

SERVICES ARE HELD HERE AT METHODIST CHURCH

County Judge A. S. Mauzey, Mayor Joe H. Boothe, Rev. D. B. Doak, Rev. L. G. Morony, Rev. J. C. Moore And Postmaster Howard Participate In Formal Memorial Observance.

As a single mourner, the nation stood with bowed head today for a brief moment in reverent respect for its departed leader.

Simultaneously in great cities and in small hamlets the rush and bustle of daily life were stilled for a short span while men, women, and children bowed their heads.

By proclamation of President Coolidge, all federal buildings, including postoffices, were closed for the day. Factories, stores, banks and offices, were closed the entire day in some cities and for part of the day in others.

The stock exchange in New York closed for the day. All the railroads of the West and many throughout the east stopped every wheel from 2 to 2:05 o'clock. The Santa Fe, Orient and Texas & Pacific railroads observed this in Sweetwater.

Street car, auto and all other traffic was suspended for one minute to one hour in Washington, Kansas City, Portland, Madison, Wis., St. Louis, St. Paul, Oklahoma City, Pittsburgh, Wilkabarre, New York, Chicago, and many others.

Sport paid its tribute likewise. All ball games in all major and minor leagues suspended for the day. One of the most outstanding tributes was when the Jockey Club at Saratoga closed their track. This is vernal seldom done.

Tennis tournaments were canceled. Golf was suspended throughout the nation at the request of J. S. Byers, president of the United States Golf Association, which was an honorary member.

FUNERAL AT MARION.

By The United Press. MARION, Ohio, Aug. 10.—The largest crowd known in the history of Marion jammed its streets today while the last tribute to the memory of Warren G. Harding, late president was being paid.

The ceremonies were devoid of the pomp and pageantry that characterize the official funeral at Washington and while President Coolidge and other high dignitaries from all over the United States were in attendance, it was more the funeral of a great man, borne lovingly from the home of his aged father to the little Marion cemetery, than of a great official.

President Coolidge arrived in a special train at 12:30 p. m. to attend the funeral. He remained on the train until near the hour of the ceremony. There was a large crowd at the station to see his special arrive, but there were no demonstrations or ceremonies.

IN TEXAS.

By The United Press. DALLAS, Aug. 10.—In practically every city, village and community of Texas observances were held for the late president.

At Austin, the state and county offices closed at noon, the people joined in a general memorial service.

At Camp Mabry, 2,400 Texas National Guardsmen held memorial services Friday morning. All drill and labor was suspended for the day.

FINAL TRIBUTE TO HARDING.

By The United Press. PARIS, Aug. 10.—France joined hands in final tribute to Warren G. Harding here today. American soldiers in Paris marched to the Place de la Concord and stood stiffly at attention with their faces turned toward Marion while a bugler blew "taps."

Hundreds of American and French civilians stood with bowed heads.

Services were held in the American church here and was attended by representatives of the French government and diplomats from the South American Republics. All American business on the continent was halted today.

AT WESTMINSTER ABBEY.

By The United Press. LONDON, Aug. 10.—Impressive memorial services were held in history of the Chief Executive, Warren G. Harding, said Mayor Boothe. The Duke and Duchess of York rep-

resented the King and Queen who remained at Cowes. All other members of the royal family were present. Hundreds of Americans and English people attended.

The yacht races at Cowes were cancelled today and flags were at half mast throughout the United Kingdom.

SERVICES AT BERLIN.

By The United Press. BERLIN, Aug. 10.—President Emeritus of Germany, Ambassador Haughton and members of the diplomatic corps and other notables attended the memorial services here in honor of President Harding.

CONSTANTINOPLE MOURNS.

By The United Press. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 10.—Memorial services were held here in the American Embassy in the presence of Allied generals and the American Colony. Major Davis, head of the American Red Cross was in charge of the services. Dr. Ryan, a missionary, delivered the memorial sermon, honoring the late president Harding.

OBSERVANCE HERE.

Sweetwater people paid a last respect to the memory of Warren G. Harding when the National Day of Mourning was observed with memorial services at the Methodist church this morning at 10:30 o'clock. While thousands of towns and cities throughout the nation paused to mourn the death of the president of the United States, all Sweetwater activity came to a standstill and hundreds gathered at the Methodist church where a simple memorial service was held.

Joe H. Boothe, mayor of Sweetwater, presided over the affair. The building was comfortably filled. It was beautifully decorated with vases and baskets of flowers and a large United States flag to which was attached a crepe draped picture of the late president hung over the pulpit.

After a prelude by Prof. DeMaire, preacher, the song "America" was sung by the congregation, followed by a prayer by Rev. Morony, pastor of the Baptist church. Rev. Doak, pastor of the Methodist church, read a scripture consisting of 8 verses of the 12th chapter of Paul's letter to the Romans.

"We are assembled here today in memorial services were held in history of the Chief Executive, Warren G. Harding," said Mayor Boothe. "It is inspiring to know that similar

services are being held throughout the United States."

County Judge Mauzey read the proclamation of President Coolidge for the National Memorial services.

Postmaster M. B. Howard made the memorial address.

"It is fitting that we gather this morning," said Mr. Howard, "to honor the people of this city, but also to do honor for the late President Harding."

Mr. Howard gave a brief sketch of the early life and boyhood days of Harding. He told of the hardships as a young school teacher, insurance salesman and print shop workman that Mr. Harding suffered, and of his later life as editor of the Marion Star. He reviewed Mr. Harding's success when after years of hardships and work, he was elected to state senate, then to lieutenant governor and then as a United States Senator from where he went to the White House. He told of Mr. Harding's close touch with the people, of his Christian life and unselfish ideals.

Mr. Harding's fight for peace among nations was reviewed, and Mr. Howard stated that the late president dedicated his life and position that there shall be no more wars. He gave a brief sketch of the Harding tour over the nation and of the speeches he made and of the breakdown and death of the president at San Francisco.

"Harding died for the things he stood for, peace, everlasting peace," concluded Mr. Harding.

A local quartette composed of Mrs. Perkins, Miss Ruby Hemby, F. W. Ater and Lester Turner sang "Lead Kindly Light," the favorite hymn of the nation's dead chief, and a song that will be sung at the funeral at the request of Mrs. Harding.

After the benediction by Rev. Moore the services were dismissed.

Among the large crowd present at the services, were the Masons, who attended in a body, also the local post of the American Legion and the Elks Club. All business houses, offices and Court House and City Hall, were closed from 10 to 12 o'clock.

REICHBANK CLOSES.

Large German Financial Institution Is Unable to Bear Pressure. BERLIN, Aug. 10.—The Reichsbank closed this afternoon, unable to make further payments on the depreciated German currency which has sunk to 1,800,000 for the American dollar and 7,000,000 for the pound sterling. Holders of the fallen currency have thrown a heavy pressure on the market.

CROPS GOOD HERE.

Returning Travelers Report Conditions Bad in Other Sections. Two returning travelers report conditions in this vicinity as being a long ways ahead of those in other sections visited.

S. B. Cox has returned from points across the Mississippi. Floods and too copious rains ruined much of Arkansas while from Texarkana on west rain had been a very scarce article from the appearance of things.

CONFERENCE CLOSES.

Official Minutes Will Be Signed by Mexican and American Delegates. MEXICO CITY, Aug. 10.—The conference between Mexican and American delegates who have been discussing the possibility of recognition of the Oregon government by the United States will conclude their session Saturday.

The minutes of the meeting will be signed by both parties Saturday. C. B. Warren and John Barton Payne will leave Sunday traveling to a Mexican government car to the border enroute to Washington where they will make their formal reports to the American government.

WINNERS FROM NOLAN NUMEROUS

Records At Austin Show Intercollegiate Events Won By Nolan County Over State Wide Competition.

DEBATING RECORDS HELD HERE. Of Roscoe, Won Events During Current Season At Austin.

Special to The Reporter. AUSTIN, Aug. 10.—In making a compilation of contestants participating in the State meets of the University Interscholastic League for the past 13 years of its existence, it is discovered that Nolan County schools have won a fair share of the awards.

In 1916 Ted Myers, and Owen Barker won the State Contest in boys' debate, representing the Sweetwater High School.

In 1918 Inez Russell, representing the Decker school, postoffice at Maryneal, in Nolan County, won second place in the Essay Writing contest, Rural School division.

In 1921 Sweetwater High School again won the state championship in boys' debate, being represented by Edwin Ramsey and George Overton.

In the last state meet, the Roscoe school, represented by Johnson, won fourth place in the High Jump at the State track and field meet. His record was 5 feet, 8 and one-half inches.

These honors have been won in competition with nearly four thousand other schools in Texas which are members of the League. County winners of the various events were:

These County winners then participate in a district meet where district winners are selected for competition at the state meet which is held at the University of Texas each year on the first Thursday, Friday and Saturday in May. The League thus maintains the 22 county organizations and 22 district organizations. The constitution and rules of the League, containing the appendix all of the records made at the thirty-third state meet, will be issued from the press the latter part of this month.

CHITWOOD THERE

Attends First Meeting State Educational Survey Committee Under Call Of Governor Neff, Chairman.

IN MEMORIAM.

Perhaps no man in all history has received the reverent respect that has been accorded Warren G. Harding. Money is powerful in these United States, but it cannot buy respect, nor the spontaneous tributes that have been paid in every nook and cranny of the United States as well as in the foreign capitals of Europe.

Only character and good work can arouse such emotions in this republic. While it is natural to compare him to his predecessor, Woodrow Wilson, the comparison is hardly fair to either. Both had terrific burdens, but of an entirely different nature.

To Woodrow Wilson was given the task of piloting the nation through one of the greatest crises of its history, with a whole world aflame with the insanity of war.

Warren G. Harding's was the task of piloting the nation back to a stable peace time basis, and the world as well, insofar as it lies within his power. He found a people with the glow of war time sacrifice burned out, with millions of men and women, taken from their customary vocations, seeking a place back again in the economic fabric. Avarice, suspicion, greed, hatred, restrained by the necessities of war, burst out with renewed fury both at home and abroad. Mightily did Harding strive to restore the nation and the world, not as it was before, but as a better place wherein to live. World peace was his topic on his last trip across the nation and now, he himself,

has found peace in the eternal rest, a sacrifice to his nation. Where is there a greater?

ASSASSIN CAUGHT.

One of Bandits Who Slew Villa Believed Captured.

The suspect reported to have been captured is Jesus Salas Bof of the Durango State Legislature who is said to have based the assassination on motives of vengeance from calls beyond the grave by the many victims of Villa.

AN ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF WHOOPINGCOUGH WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF SWEETWATER.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of Sweetwater, Texas, that it shall be unlawful for anyone having the whooping cough, to go into or about any place of business, or into

any public gathering inside the city limits of Sweetwater, while such disease can be communicated to others; or for anyone to take any child or other person with them, while afflicted with whooping cough in a communicable state, to any public gathering in Sweetwater, or into any public place in said city. Anyone violating this ordinance, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed twenty-five dollars.



Orient Man Hated To See Tech College Located On Plains.

DRIVES MAXWELL 116 HOURS.

Had To Be Lifted From the Car—Bleeds At Nose—Eyes Swollen.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 10.—A new record for non-stop driving was established here recently when H. L. (Daredevil) Lockwood piloted a Maxwell touring car for 116 consecutive hours without stopping at any time.

Lockwood, the selfsame Lockwood who gained fame by his drops from one moving aeroplane to another while in mid-air, by his human fly stunts performed on various of the country's most famous skyscrapers, and by his many brilliant feats as a race driver, broke his own record for continuous driving by four hours. He had previously driven for 112 consecutive hours to a record in Indianapolis.

At the conclusion of his Detroit run it was plainly evident that his physical endurance had been taxed to the utmost and he collapsed as the motor

was stopped. His left arm, which had been handcuffed to the steering wheel was semi-paralyzed, and he was unable to lift himself from the driver's position without aid. His eyes were puffed and swollen and his nose was bleeding as the attending physician administered to him. Through the last twenty-five hours of the run it was necessary to keep a physician in constant attendance and Lockwood was forced to undergo severe pain when two bolts which had developed were lanced while the car was in motion and under Lockwood's control.

Unlike most nonstop runs which are staged on a track or without interference from traffic, Lockwood faced a big problem in negotiating traffic in and about Detroit for five night and six days. Traffic officers, however, were all pulling for the daredevil driver to complete his run and aided him wherever possible by turning traffic signals for him. Once in a while,

though, Lockwood did cross traffic against the signal. And in one case in Sunday traffic on a much used road leading out of Detroit, he had to drive in the ditch to keep from stopping his mount.

After the run, Lockwood stated that he gave much credit to the good Maxwell for the manner in which it performed during the long grind, and said that he could never have set a new record were it not for the steady performance which the Maxwell displayed in the test.

The marathon drive made the successful pilot \$2,000 richer, as he had

laid a wager of that amount that he could drive for 115 hours without a stop.—(Adv.)

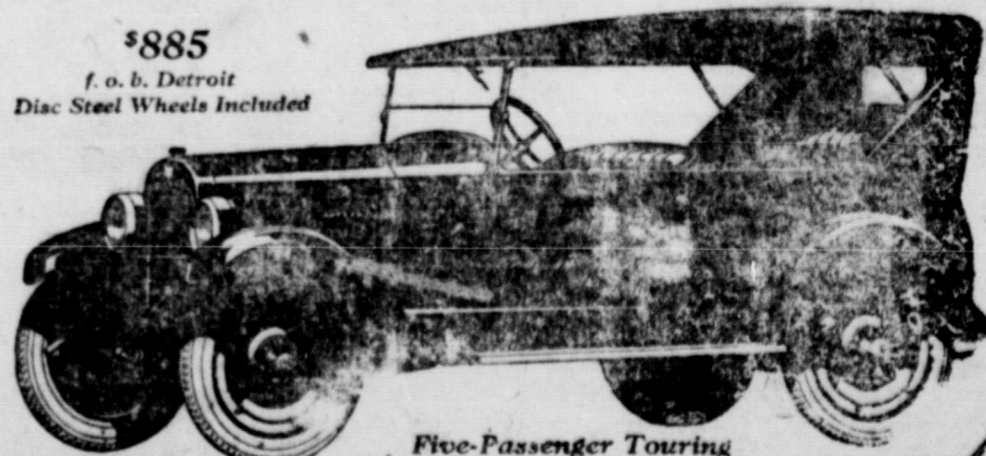

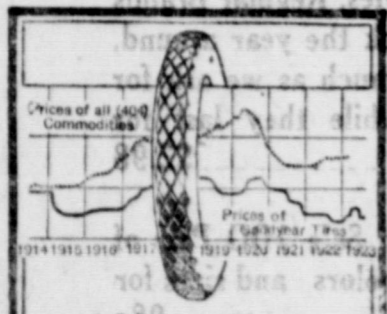

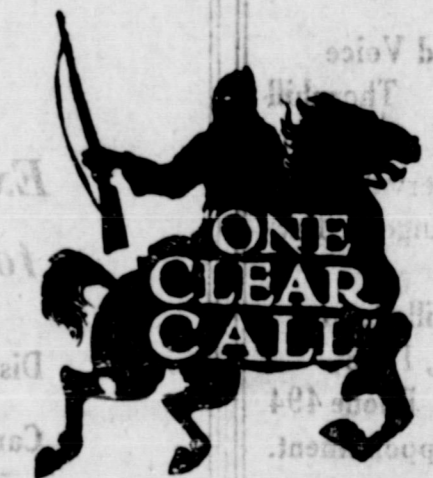
