Over Thirty Thousand People Expect ed at Lubbock Tuesday For Tech College Jubilee.

It is estimated that over fifty Sweetwater people will attend the celebra tion of the Texas Tech College at Lubbock tomorrow, when approximately 30,000 people are expected to gather there from all parts of the state. The majority of people from here will go

DOAK SPEAKS ON

Highways of Life And Highways of County Are Subjects of Sermon Sunday.

MRS. JINKS MCGEE SINGS SOLO

Methodist Minister Opposed to Gravel Highways-Favors The Hard Surfaced Roads.

Quite a large crowd was present at the services at the First Methodist church Sunday evening when Rev. D. B. Doak, pastor, preached on "Highways," His text was taken from the 35th chapter of Issah and he delivered a very interesting and powerful ser-

In his talk, Rev. Doak compared the highways of the nation with the highways of life, and he also spoke briefly on the coming bond election gow of Plainview and Miss Barbark for the building of highways in Nolan County.

"All nations and people were always interested in highways." declared Rev. Doak. "And the kind of high ways on the mode of travel. It was the narrow paths back in the days when every one walked. Then came the roads for the ox-carts, later for the horse drawn vehicles and then for the automobile. The highways had to be adapted to the mode of travel. You can't run a wheel barrow on a rail road track

"And so it is with lives." he went on. "Some people try to but a sinwrecked life on a highway to heaven built of a pavement made of righteousness mixed with the blood of Jesus Christ."

Rev. Doak stated that on his recent trip to old Mexico, he did not find a road or street in Mexico that was better than those of Sweetwater and Nolan County.

In speaking of the bond issue, he declared he opposed any bonds issued for building a highway of gravel. The gravel, he declared, would soon wash out and leave a road that was worse than a dirt road. He said, however. that he always favored an issue that would make a hard, substantial road,


