WASHINGTON, Aug. 331,-The American and Mexican governments announced today at noon the resumptionof diplomatic relations between them. An identical note was issued at noon, stating that "the two governments had decided to resume diplo matic relations."

Serious political difficulties began to manifest themselves in Mexico dur- for some time. ing the year 1910. Francisco I. Ma the re-election of President Diaz, claiming that the policy of allowing a President to offer himself for ree-lection was detrimental to the best in terest of the country.

President Diaz imprisoned Madero, but the latter ,through the influence of his family, one of the largest and richest in the entire republic ,escaped to Texas. Later, Madero returned to Mexico and proclaimed an armed revolution, with himself as provisional president

Madero assaulted Jaurez and cap very pleasing. tured the city, whereupon emissaries from Diaz asked his terms. Madero demanded resignation of the Perisdent and his cabinet. Diaz finally accepted this ultimatum, resigned and left the country for France, where he died

COTTON ROCKETS ITALIANS ON CROP REPORTS FLEET TO

\$25 Hundred in New York with Buying Heavy

Crop Condition is 64.1 Percent As Compared Yith 67.2 On July 25 and 63.5 Aug. Last Year

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.-The condition of the cotton crop on August 255 was 64,1 per cent as compared with 67.22 on July 25 and 63:5 on Aug. 225 last year.

This forecasts a crop yield of 134.8 pounds per acre and a total production of 10,788,000 bales as compared with the yield last year of 999,761 bales.





"highway" as used herein shall include all streets. (e) The City shall have the power alleys, avenues, boulevards and pubcosts of constructing curbs and sidewalks, and fix a charge and personal liability shall be required in any court. against the owners of such property.




