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LEAGUE REFUSES TO TAKE ACTION

Refutes Mussolini Charge That it is Incompetent and Then Adjuvans Without Action in Case

COUNCIL TO INVESTIGATE

Smaller Council of League to Determine Whether Occupation of Corfu is Violation of Article 10

By The United Press.

GENEVA, Sept. 6.—The League of Nations Council avoided a break with Italy and sidestepped the Graeco-Italian issue altogether.

After deciding at a private session to reaffirm the competency of the League, the only action taken was to reprimand the Council of Ambassadors at Paris for taking action looking to a settlement of the Italian demand for reparations.

The League Council, despite pressure from a majority of its member nations has adjourned pending a decision by the smaller council as to whether the occupation of Corfu is a violation of the famous Article 10 of the League.

The right to act is reserved but no action was taken.

JUGO-SLAVIA RESTLESS

PARIS, Sept. 6.—Refusal to accede to the demands of Italy with regards to Fiume will be the position taken by the Jugo-Slavs, the foreign minister of that country told Premier Poincare today. The Serbs are not belligerent, it was added, if Mussolini would permit a peaceful settlement.

HESITATES

GENEVA, Sept. 6.—The peace of the Balkan states and the alternative of another war involving all Europe hung in the balance here today as the League of Nations hesitated over the Italian-Greek situation.

To ignore the claim of Italy and adjudicate the dispute as requested by Greece will develop into an issue of strength between Italy and the League of Nations.

If the League declines to answer the request of Greece here is what will happen according to a statement by the leaders of various nations.

The whole structure of the league will be undermined and the Society of Nations will collapse.

Four treaties signed at the end of the World War will be imperilled for they contain clauses similar to the League Covenant for binding.

Several smaller nations now abiding by the decision of the League against their will would have these decisions nullified.

WITHDRAWS FLEET

ATHENS, Sept. 6.—To avoid the risk of a clash the Greek government has ordered all of its navy to retire to the Bay of Volos.

LUBBOCK, Sept. 6.—When Tom Ross and Milt Goode were taken from the Lubbock County Jail Sunday night to be taken to Abilene for trial for the killing of H. L. Roberson, the Lubbock County Jail was absolutely vacated for the first time in several years.

This is looked upon by local peace officers as a coincidence, however, as there have been several arrests made recently, the parties to which were able to make bond and are now out awaiting the action of the court. The trial of Ross and Goode will open September 10th at Abilene.

AID IS REQUESTED

Postmaster Howard Gets Letter From Dresden Telling of Conditions There; Grub is Scarce

Aid for the postal employees of Germany was requested in a letter received by postmaster Howard in a letter from Frau Post Inspector Jurgel from Dresden, Germany. Enclosed were some rare German stamps which it was thought might appeal to stamp collectors in this country. The letter is self explanatory and follows in part in quaint English:

I beg your pardon, Sir, please permit a request. Will you be so kind as to take the stamps enclosed for you for a postoffice or another collector. All stamps are different and very seldom.

The hard time after the terrible war is heavy to bear for all post-office families. We must also assist our old parents who have been poor men after the war and who have not any income. I oblige myself to give of this business net proceeds only our parents and other poor old men who are hunger-sufferers.

Now the times are being more insufferable every day. We have a workmen reign and therefore no flesh and no potatoes during some weeks, because the other states, Prussia, Bavaria, do not give anything of their abundance to the industrial land of Saxony. There are only a few employees who could buy a new dress since 1914 and now, presently, a dress costs 80 million mares.

Dear Sir, be so kind as to return the stamps, if you cannot sell them or be so kind as to send me the most little amount in paper money of your country in a registered letter, if you did the good work for charity to sell them.

ANNIHILATION IS FATE YOKOHAMA

Official Death List in Tokio Placed at 30,000 With 10,000 Injured and 350,000 Houses Destroyed

RED CROSS RAISING FUNDS

Monday is Time Limit to Raise \$5,250,000 Fund For Relief—Army and Navy Closely Cooperate

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—30,000 killed, 10,000 injured and 35,000 buildings destroyed in Tokio is the latest estimate of the toll of earthquake and fire Saturday. The message is from the Japanese Home Ministry to the Radio Corporation of America here today. The radiogram was forwarded from the government station at Tomoka, Japan.

"Yokohama annihilated" the message said. Measures are being taken to safeguard foreigners, it was said.

SET TIME LIMIT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—The American Red Cross set Monday as the time limit for raising the \$5,250,000 for Japanese relief. While the amount set is the minimum needed, the committee hopes it will be greatly exceeded.

The War and Navy Departments will make every effort to cooperate in the Japanese Relief. Every transport will be used and if need be every medical officer in the service not needed elsewhere will be sent.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 6.—The steamer Johnson is in port today after being forced to wait outside the harbor for 40 hours by rough water. A continual succession of huge breakers made it impossible to take the vessel over the bar into the harbor. The violence of the waves is attributed to the Japanese earthquake.

FINED ANYWAY

RANGER, Sept. 6.—Arguing that a hotel room is a "private" and not a public place, four defendants charged with gambling demanded trial here. The men were arrested while playing poker in a hotel.

However they were fined \$10 each. The complaint charged the men with "indulging unlawfully in a game of cards in a hotel room not occupied by a family as a private residence."

NEW EXPRESS BUILDING

RANGER, Sept. 6.—Work on the new home for the American Railway Express company, on the Texas & Pacific right of way just south of the railroad station, is to be begun just as soon as material can be brought here, according to a message received this morning by C. E. Shields, local agent, from headquarters telling him the contract for the building had been awarded to Irving J. Shapley of Houston.

TEXANS WELCOME

Abe Levy Tells of Style Trends Noted in Recent Trip to New York—Ornamentation Proving Popular

"The Texas buyers are the most welcome men and women in New York," said Abe Levy in discussing his recent trip to New York.

The styles this fall will be in black, cocoa brown and blue, with black the favorite. Ornamentation is proving popular. The length of the skirt this fall will be the same as last year. There will be no change in the men's styles.

Mr. Levy stated that there had been a slight advance in the prices of ready-to-wear, which is due to increased wages and the recent advance in materials. He said that this year the wholesalers had done away with their floor stock and all the orders were made specially on the contract basis.

The manufacturers of ready-to-wear predict a big season for dresses and coats, while suits will be sold to a certain extent. Merchandise this year is scarcer than last year, Mr. Levy concluded.

HAUL MATERIAL FOR NEW PLANT

Gravel From Colorado, Portland Cement and Steel Reinforcing Being Delivered in Car Lot Now

GETTING READY FOR WATER LINE

Assembling Materials to Rush When Water Turned on—Pipe for Water Line is Rolling This Way

"I never expected to see a train running over that cotton patch" said Jack Rogers as he watched a Texas & Pacific locomotive shifting a string of cars into the property of the United States Gypsum Co.

The spur from the T.P. to the plant site has been completed and the foundations for the plant are being dug. Gravel in carload lots from Colorado is being received as well as cars of cement and steel for reinforcing concrete.

The T.P. has the frog in place for the switch further east for the spur up into Fisher County for the gypsite quarry and the dump has been graded up to Sweetwater Creek at this point. There has been a delay in the arrival of materials for this bridge however and the bridge itself has been delayed on that account.

G. W. Rathjens, field engineer in charge of construction is in Chicago this week in consultation with headquarters on the project.

There will not be a great amount of further activity at the plant until water is delivered. Local officials of the Gypsum Co. say. Water is necessary for the concrete foundation work. Materials are being assembled, however so as to have them ready for a rush job as soon as the water is turned on.

Pipe for the water line from the city is expected to arrive momentarily now, according to W. E. Henderson who has the contract for the city's portion of the work. Mr. Henderson and John Myers, who has the contract for the balance of the work, purchased from a Birmingham concern and the consignment has been on the road for nearly 10 days. The shipment is routed via the Southern, L. & N. Cotton Belt and to be delivered to the T.P. at Texarkana. The company specified delivery here in a specified time it is declared.

RAID STILL AND ARREST NEGROES

Two Negroes Arrested in Sweetwater After Lively Chase and Four Pints of Liquor Confiscated

FISHER COUNTY STILL LOCATED

Local Officers With Sheriff of Fisher County Make Midnight Raid and Get Two More

One more still passed out of existence and four more negroes joined the ranks of jail inmates as the result of activities of local authorities and later with the co-operation of Sheriff Baxter of Fisher county.

The excitement began late yesterday afternoon when two negroes driving a Ford ran afoul of Buck Johnson. After a very lively chase, one of the negroes jumped out of the flivver and was captured by the "law" and a little later the other was rounded up with the co-operation of the sheriff's department. There was liquor in the car, officers say.

Questioned apart, the location of a still in Fisher County was revealed and Sheriff Lambert called in consultation. Local authorities took one of the negroes, loaded him in the official flivver and met the Fisher County Sheriff at Sylvester. The still was located on Fanch about 15 miles east of Sylvester, in the middle of nowhere. It was abig one but only about 4 pints of liquor was found.

The two negroes with the one arrested in Sweetwater and used as a guide were turned over to the Fisher County authorities and were to appear before the grand jury which is in session there today.

The two negroes arrested in Sweetwater are said to be from Colorado.

While attempting to elude Chief Johnson, one of the negroes tried to get rid of some of the "evidence" by hiding four pints in the grass by R. A. Carter's residence. Mr. Carter discovered it and phoned authorities to come and get the rest of the "negro." In the final check up, two more quarts of the "evidence" seemed to be missing. Mr. Carter said he mowed his lawn until dark but failed to find any more. Since the discovery by Mr. Carter there is said to have been unusual lawn mowing activity in town, as these search for the other two quarts of "evidence" continued.

"If any of the people who drink boot leg liquor could have seen the conditions—the dirt and filth around that still they would swear off forever," said Chief Johnson. He and deputy sheriff Butler got in at 4:30 a. m. from Roby.

C. B. Robertson, new agent for the Santa Fe railroad arrived in Sweetwater Thursday to take over the duties that devolve upon the agent in a railroad center like Sweetwater.

The new agent is from Bay City in Matagorda County, which borders the Gulf in South Texas and also served at Rosenberg for a time. He has been with the Santa Fe railroad 22 years.
