## CALLAHAN VOTES FOR GOOD ROADS

Bond Issue To Improve Bankhead Highway Through County Carried By 6 to 1 Majority Saturday

**TAYLOR COUNTY TO VOTE SOON**  
If Bond Issues Carry in Taylor And Nolan Counties, Nearly 100 Miles Hard Surface Road Added

BAIRD, Texas, Sept. 17.—The vote on the good roads bond issue in Callahan today in the four precincts was over six to one in the affirmative.

A total of 1,017 votes were cast, 876 for and 141 against the measure, as follows:

The bond issue was for \$200,000. To this sum the state and federal highway departments have agreed to add \$400,000 giving the northern portion of Callahan County a total of \$600,000 with which to pave the Bankhead Highway (State Highway No. 1) clear across the county from the vicinity of Putman on the east to the vicinity of Clyde on the west.

The state and federal highway departments made a "two for one" proposition to only three counties—Callahan, Taylor and Nolan. For every dollar raised by bond issue the departments will give two dollars.

Taylor county will vote on its bond issue of \$250,000 on Oct. 16, 1923, which the departments will add \$500,000. With the proceeds two state highways will be paved across Taylor county. No. 1 from east to west and No. 30 from north to south.

The Callahan County folk voted the bonds in Road District No. 1, comprising a portion of the northern half of the county. The issue in Taylor county will cover the entire county and will likewise benefit every section.

Nolan county will vote on its bond issue for a similar purpose on Oct. 20. "In less than two years you can climb in your hoopie and drive to Ft. Worth and Dallas in five hours on a hard-surfaced highway," said a good roads enthusiast. "That is to say if the people make the most of their opportunity. The splendid citizenry of Callahan County has set an example to follow."

One of the strong arguments made in behalf of the bond issue in Callahan county was the vast number of tourists the building of the road would bring through there and also the employment it would give to citizens in that section for months to come.

## MURDER SOLVED

Chance Remark by Woman of Streets, Overheard by Patrolman, Gives Clue To Murder Mystery

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 17.—The murder of Wallace Green, wealthy attorney and state Senator, which occurred the night of the 30, has been solved, police say, by the confession of Ross Robert Richardson and Ed Ryan.

The murder was committed during an attempted holdup, it was said. A chance remark by a woman of the streets, overheard by a patrolman gave the clue to the slayers, that "Richardson would get the rope if Ryan were arrested." Richardson was formerly a Kansas City policeman.

## COTTON ADVANCE REFUGEES FROM IS SENSATION JAPAN ARRIVING

New York Spot Market Hits 30c Forsteamer Lands 150 at Seattle Destitute First Time This Year—Gains All Of All Save Clothing Upon Their Backs From Disaster

**INCREASE OF 135 TO 115 POINTS BABY HAD NARROW ESCAPE**  
Market Closed Strong Only few Points Off From Day's High Mark—Seed Prices Remain Firm

Staging one of the most sensational rises recorded recently, the cotton market closed with net gains of from 11 to 135 points.

October futures in New York opened 30 points up from Saturday's close shot up to 29.42 and closed at 29.25, an increase of 135 points.

Thirty cent cotton was reached on the New York spot market with a figure of 30.05 marked up. The spot market in Sweetwater was up to 27.75. The seed market did not follow the cotton figures, the price remaining at \$42 to \$44 per ton. Keen rivalries among ginner have in some instances forced prices upward, notably in Winters where prices as high as \$56 have been paid.

## TELLS OF BIBLE MAIL IS HEAVY

Rev. D. B. Doak States Bible is Four-fold—Revealing God, Revealing Man And Their Relationship

"To my mind the Bible is divided into four divisions," said Rev. D. B. Doak at the First Methodist Church Sunday morning in a sermon devoted to an exposition of the Bible's place in the church.

"These four divisions 'Reveal God,' 'Reveal Man,' 'The Relationship God Sustains With Man,' and 'The Relationship Man Sustains with God.'"

"The Old Testament is an integral part of the Bible, the perfect whole. The ancients deified the winds, the sea, the moon, the stars, the forces of nature in their attempts to explain and to answer the questions of the human heart."

"And if you take away the Bible what have you left? Never, never, will the Bible be taken away as long as there is grief and sorrow in the human heart."

### DISSOLVE PARLIAMENT

## TIME FOR ACTION

Rev. D. E. Hestir Preaches Stirring Sermon at Presbyterian Church—Action Needed Now He States

"In the financial world," Reverend Hestir said, in opening his sermon at the Presbyterian Church, Sunday morning, "there is a reserve fund maintained, thus they prepare for the crucial moment; they have prepared themselves for any event."

"The athlete refers to getting his second wind. That is his reserve force. In Kentucky there is a little college, and its football team went east to play the great Harvard eleven. Centre lost because she failed to possess the reserve force on the sidelines. Harvard was able to send in fresh men and she won."

"The great generals always have reserve forces to throw into the battle at the proper moment."

"I find that the church needs to call upon its reserve force. The trouble with the church is, there are too many people on the reserve. The church needs today to call upon all its forces to fight against wrong and sin."

"There is China, the sleeping giant with her doors open to us; there is that little country near her, the land of canyons and cherry blossoms, the land of earthquakes and fears today. There is South America, Africa and India, all at them looking to the people of the new world for the word and gospel."

"Yes, the call has come," Reverend Hestir concluded.

## MARTIAL LAW IS MODIFIED TODAY

Arrival Adjutant General Markham From Tulsa Signal For Reinstatement Police Officials

**MACHINE GUNS ARE WITHDRAWN**  
Doors of City and County Offices No Longer Menaced—Walton Attends Labor Meeting

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 17.—Rigid martial law in Oklahoma City was suddenly modified here today following the arrival of Adjutant General Markham from Tulsa by airplane.

Chief of Police Ray Frazier, ousted from office when Governor Walton first announced military rule was reinstated as was also his assistant.

Machine guns which had pointed menacingly toward the doorways of city and county offices for the past 24 hours were suddenly withdrawn.

The State Supreme Court is reported contemplating action with respect to the military rule.

Governor Walton is in Henryetta, where he is attending a session of the State Federation of Labor.

### MILITARY COURT

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 17.—A military court of inquiry has been established here by Governor Walton to aid in the enforcement of state wide martial law, which went into effect Saturday night at midnight.

Grand jurors who came here to investigate charges of governmental misuse of public funds were forbidden to meet. The military court will handle all investigations, they were told.

This action was expected to forestall any attempt on the part of the legislature to meet in special session and investigate Governor Walton's activities.

In the event legislators gather and attempt a meeting, they would be arrested by guardsmen and brought before the military court, it was stated.

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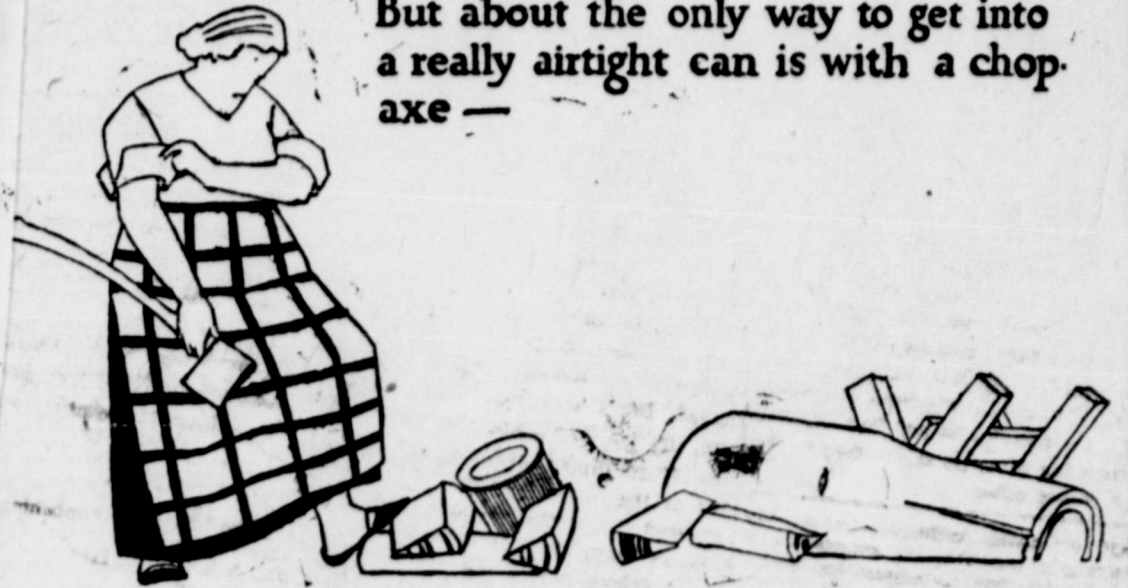

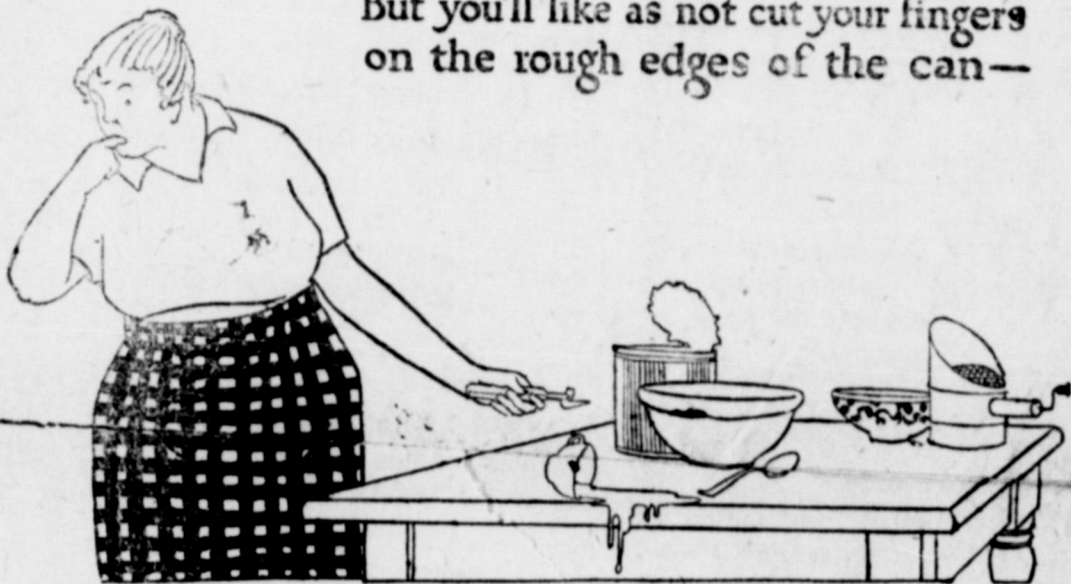
