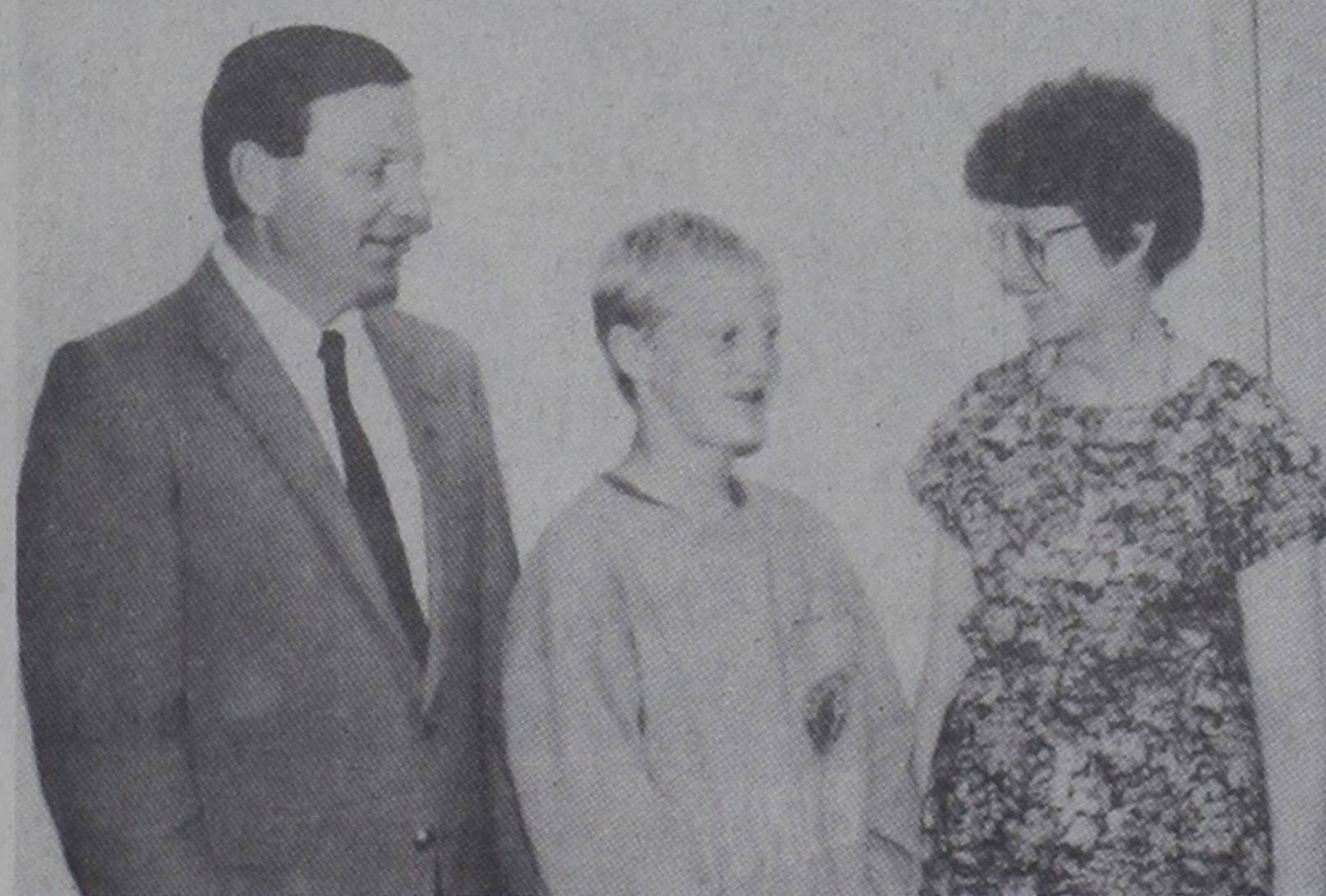
The meal, catered by K-Bob's of Hereford, will consist of burgers and floats in keeping with the 1950s theme. Only advance tickets will be sold.

Parts of Area Get Nice Rainfall Thurs.

The Friona area experienced a cool week during the past week, and received a light rain early Thursday morning, the first precipitation measured in almost a month.

The measurement in Friona was just .13 inch, although portions of the outlying areas were reported to have received considerably more.

It was reported that the Rhea vicinity got up to a half inch, and that Broadway, N.M., received an inch of rain.

The temperature had not dropped below the freezing mark in April until the morning of the tenth, when residents were greeted by a low temperature of 25 degrees. The low reading may have

The high reached only 49 degrees on Monday, and it was just 50 and 51 on Wednesday and Thursday, but a warmup was underway on Friday as the mercury was headed back toward the 70-degree mark.

FHS Scientists Win Honors

Friona High School students brought home some nice awards from the Regional Science Fair, held at Amarillo College on April 1.

Sophomore Rick Ellis won the lion's share of the awards, bringing home five different awards and missing by just four total points from being chosen to attend the International Science Fair with his project entitled "Growth Characteristics of Crystalline Solids."

James Warren won a second place in the computer science division with his project, "Computerized Interpolation for Unknown Values by Hermites Polynomial Interpolation Method," and also received the U.S. Army certificate for computer science.

Nathan Scott won a third place award in the computer science division with his project, entitled "Solving Mixture Problems by

Cramer's Rule."

Other high school students entering their work in the Regional Science Fair were Arturo Perez and Maria Davila.

Among his awards, Ellis received the U.S. Army medallion; the U.S. Marine Corps Certificate of Achievement in Science; the U.S. Army Certificate of Achievement in Science, and the N.A.S.A. Certificate of Achievement. He was invited to attend a special awards ceremony at the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

In addition, Ellis' project on crystals was given the first place ribbon in the show's chemistry division.

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

60 YEARS AGO--APRIL 12, 1929

Ground was broken Monday for the erection of another new business building on the east side of Main Street, between Fifth and Sixth. The new building will be fifty by eighty feet in size and will be constructed of brick and concrete. It is being built by the Turner-Parr Trading Company, and half of it will be used by them to house their office, machinery and implement business. The other half will be let to some individual or corporation for the installation of some line of business.

50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1939

Members of the Friona Post of

the American Legion and the Friona Legion Auxiliary dedicated their new Legion home with a program and a feast Tuesday night. D.K. Roberts, commander of the local post, served as toastmaster, and there were visiting Legionnaires from other Legion posts of the Panhandle territory.

40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1949

Friona can now boast of another business place, since Leonard Coffey, formerly of Clovis, N.M., has opened his Paint & Body Works in one of W.M. White's buildings on the south side of Highway 60.

35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1954

O.J. Beene was elected to the city council as a write-in candidate on Tuesday. With 130 votes cast, Beene, local druggist, received 67 votes to 57 for H.K. Kendrick. Incumbent Raymond White was returned, and Mayor Charles Allen, unopposed, was re-elected.

30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 9, 1959

Dillie M. Kelley formally resigned as superintendent of the Friona Independent Schools at the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School District on Monday night. The resignation is effective at the end of the present school term. Kelley came to Friona and served five years as high school principal five years prior to being elected superintendent.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 9, 1964

Friona High School's track team won a first place meet trophy for the first time in almost a decade last week when they took the team trophy at Springlake. David Carson won a 220-yard dash in a blistering 22.4 timing, and junior Danny Murphree had Friona's other first place, in the pole vault.

20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 3, 1969

Ray DeBord was named Monday night as the new boys basketball coach for Friona High School, at a special meeting of the board of trustees of Friona Independent School District.

Friona High School placed second in the District 3-AA Interscholastic League Literary Contests which the local school hosted Saturday and Monday.

15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1974

Tuesday's high wind, which produced gusts of up to 75 miles per hour, caused considerable damage to property in the area.

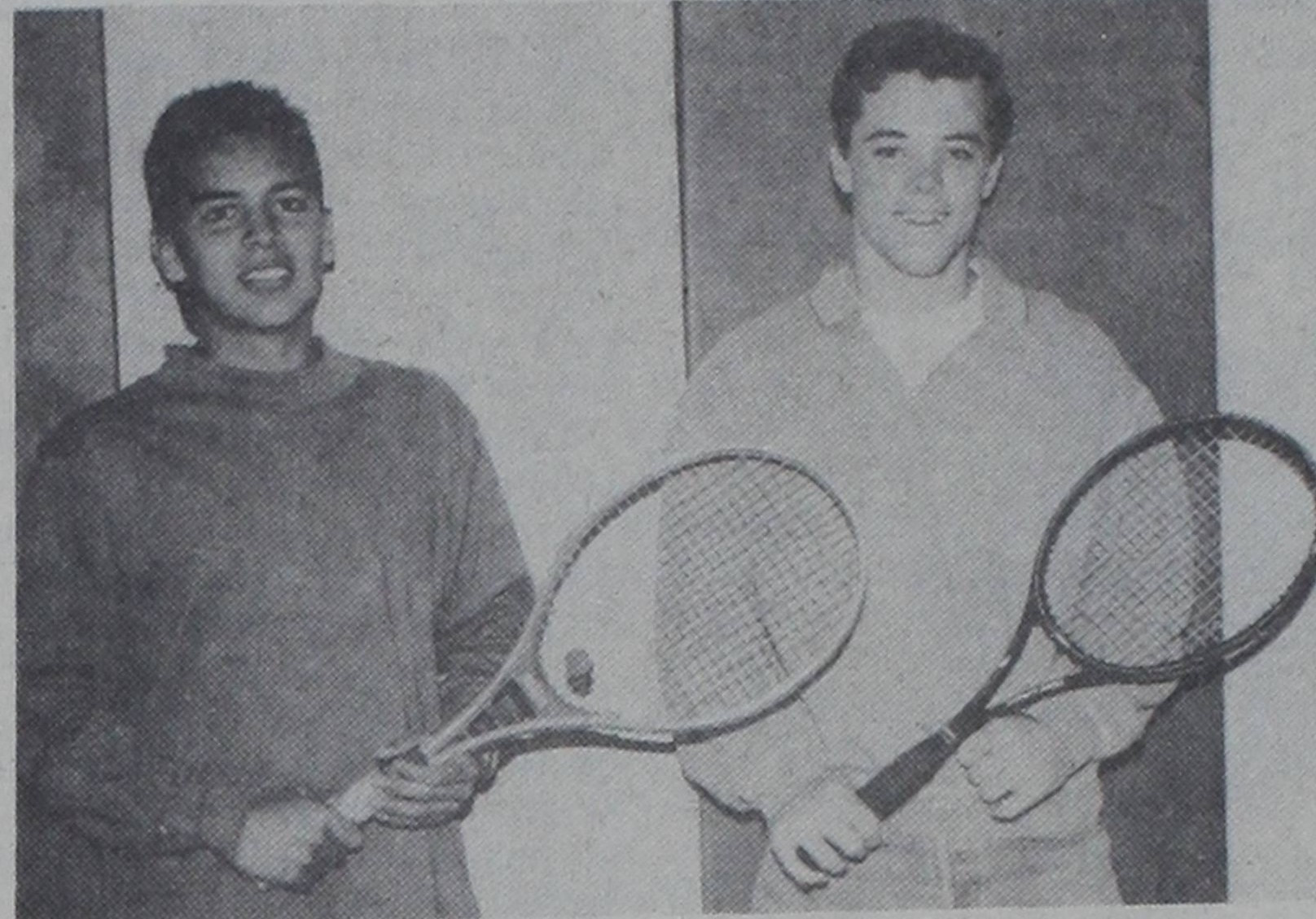

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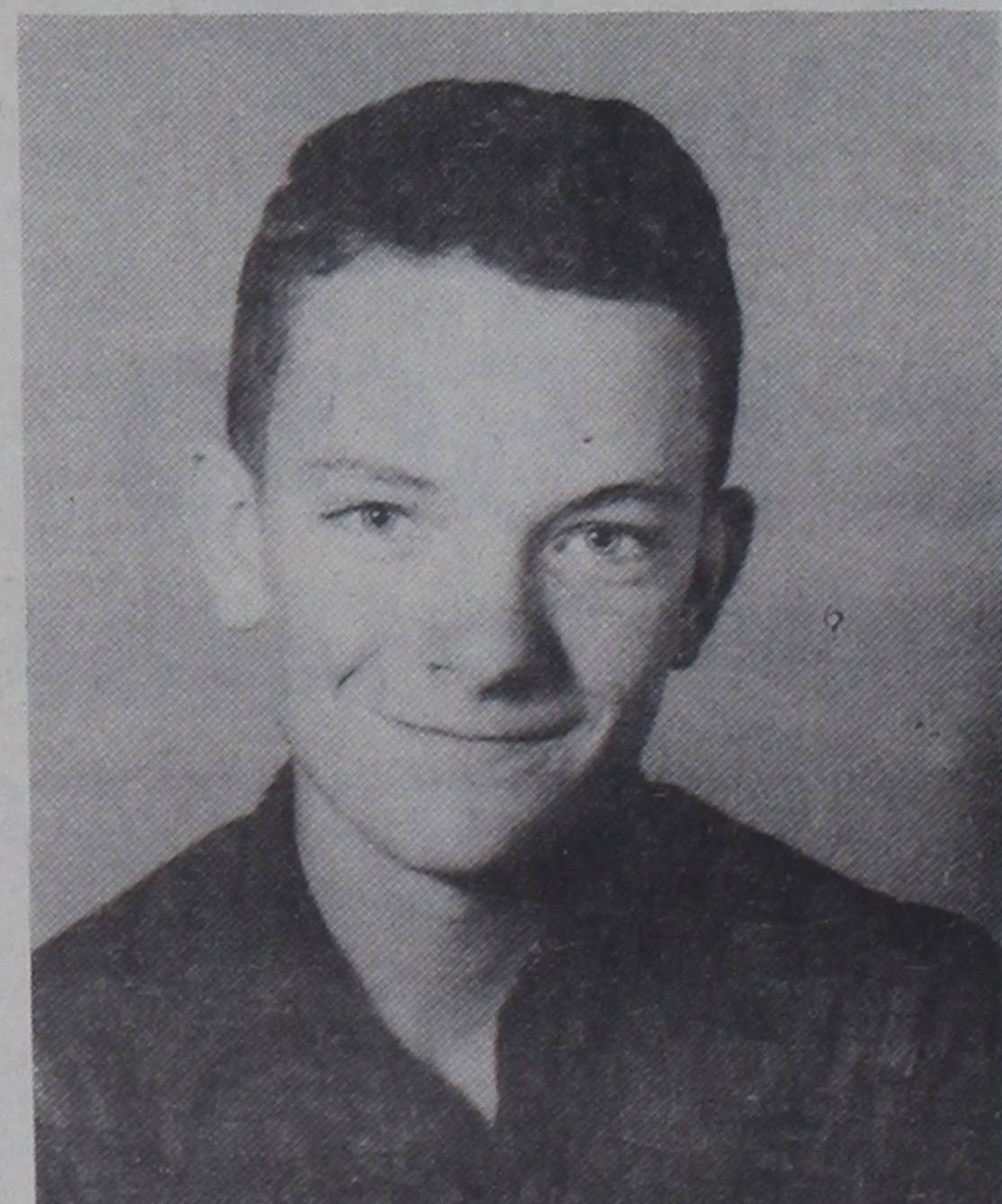

Beyond that, however, every person should uphold and participate in the Church because it tells the truth about man's life, death and destiny; the truth which alone will set him free to live as a child of God.
