## OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE CALLS SPECIAL SESSION

Defies Governor Walton Who Had Threatened Jail Sentence In The Event of Attempted Investigation His Activities In Connection With Martial Law



Decision to Call Legislature Comes After a Meeting of Editors Leading Papers Oklahoma to Determine Course of Action-Inciting Class War, Charge

#### (BY THE UNITED PRESS.)

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 20 .- The House of Representatives is preparing today to meet in extraordinary session September 26th for the purpose of investigating charges relative to the misuse of executive power by Governor J. C. Walton.

The call for the extra session was issued early today.

Representatives are hurrying to Oklahoma City.

The call for the special session followed closely a meeting of the editors of the leading newspapers of the state held late yesterday wherein it was charged that Governor Walton was misusing the powers of his office, libel and defamation of the state and general condemnation of the use of the military.

In reply, Governor Walton declared war anew on the Ku Klux Klan, brand ing the flery cross, the emblem of the order, as a "pagan emblem of fear. hatred and rebellion."



DALLAS, Sept. 20,-Texas has 121 oil refineries with a total daily rated capacity of 450,000 barrels of "black gold," according to a survey recently conducted by the industrial department of the Texas Chamber of Commerce.

In the State-there are 756 different oil entities paying a production tax and royalties (paid by all companies in Texas) last year, totaling \$16,815,-000, the survey shows.

Fifty six thousand persons, the survey shows, are employed in the oil industry in Texas and the average pay of these employes is more than \$2,000 DEL RIO, Texas, Sept. 20 .- This a year.






