FERGUSON SENDS WALTON ADVICE

Former Texas Executive Warns Oklahoma Governor Not to Make Same Mistake He Did—"Don't Trust 'Em"

GRAND DRAGON RAPS WALTON

N. C. Jewett Says He is Being Flayed For Political Reasons—Grand Goblin From Houston Talks

TEMPLE, Sept. 21.—James E. Ferguson today went on record as being squarely behind Governor Walton in his fight against the Ku Klux Klan in Oklahoma.

Ferguson said in his letter: "I want to commend you upon your stand against the Ku Klux Klan. Let me urge you not to make the mistake that I did and stand firm to prevent the meeting of the legislature. Beware of any who might bring influence to bear upon you to permit the legislature to meet. I had 29 liars in my legislature who voted for my impeachment after they had promised me that they would stand by me if I permitted the legislature to meet."

TO PREVENT KLAN PARADE

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 21.—Approximately 500 extra policemen have been sworn in by the city authorities here to prevent the Ku Klux Klan from parading as an aftermath to a large initiation and ceremonial at the speedway.

The special officers were sworn in following the passage of an emergency ordinance at the last meeting of the city commission when it was reported that the Klan would stage a parade. Klan officials have denied that any parade would be staged or attempted in violation of the city ordinance.

IS BEING FLAYED

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 21.—Charging that he was being flayed without mercy for political purposes by Governor Walton, N. C. Jewett, Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in Oklahoma declared here today that his only recourse was to the Courts.

Terminating the finding of the military court as attempts at libel and character assassination, Jewett declared that he would welcome the fullest investigation through civil court channels.

Under the present system of martial law about which the less said the better, Jewett intimated that Go, Walton was making a supreme attempt to regain political favor in the state.

"It will all come out in the wash," Jewett said. "The governor has the limelight now but the question is how long can he hold it."

GRAND GOBLIN TALKS

HOUSTON, Sept. 21.—Geo. W. Kimbro, Jr., of Houston, Grand Goblin of the Klan in the Realm of the Mississippi Valley, today admitted that he was the Klan official who told Dr. A. Martin of the whipping of negroes in Texas by Klansmen.

Dr. Martin, testifying before the military court in Oklahoma City, stated that a Grand Goblin from the state of Texas had told him how they whipped a negro dentist in Galveston.

"So far as I can see, the doctor has got it pretty straight," Kimbro said referring to the Martin testimony. "There were a few typographical errors in the story but in substance it was true. I have nothing to hide."

ARREST IS MADE

Eugene McClung Arrested Here Charged With Blowing Katy Safe At Hamlin

An arrest that may aid in solving the numerous safe blowing incidents in the Sweetwater vicinity during the past few weeks was made in Sweetwater Thursday night when Eugene McClung was taken into custody by the authorities.

McClung was arrested here by City Marshal Britton of Hamlin, who had followed on the man's trail from Stamford via Abilene to this city.

The specific charge upon which McClung was arrested was for the blowing of the safe in the Katy depot at Hamlin Sunday night at which time \$79 in cash was obtained.

Finger prints of McClung have been forwarded to Dallas for comparison with those taken at Bronte and other points.

FRANCE OBSTINATE

GIVEN 25 YEARS

Jury in Case of Milt Good Returns Verdict After Four Hours Deliberation Thursday Night Late

ABILENE, Sept. 21.—After deliberating less than four hours the jury in the case of Milt Good at 7 o'clock last night returned a verdict of guilty and assessed his punishment at 25 years in the penitentiary.

Arguments in the case charged by indictment with the murder of H. L. Roberson, cattle inspector, at Seminole last April 1, got under way in district court Wednesday. W. J. Cunningham, special prosecutor, was the first speaker for the state in the case and spoke for sixty-one minutes.

Judge W. R. Ely read his charge to the jury. The document consumed twenty-five minutes in its presentation to the jury.

The charge followed along the same lines as the 16 page paper read to the jury in the case of Tom Ross who was on trial here last week on a charge of killing Roberson. The jury was charged concerning murder, manslaughter and self-defense, the law in each case being explained thoroughly.

Mrs. Milt Good, wife of the defendant, with their eight children were in the courtroom. Mrs. Good held the youngest child, apparently little more than a year old, in her arms, and the next youngest was held by Good.

Mrs. Roberson and Mrs. Allison, widows of the deceased cattle inspectors were also present.

INDICT 4 MORE

Four Officials of Dallas Oil Concern Run Afoul Postal Authorities at Birmingham, Alabama

BIRMINGHAM, Sept. 21.—Indictments were to be served today against four former officials of the Walker Consolidated Petroleum Co. of Dallas, Texas. The indictments were returned by a Federal Grand Jury following the investigation of an alleged fraudulent operation in which it is claimed that more than \$2,000,000 were lost by Alabamians.

Indictments were returned against A. W. Walker, president, Dallas; Harold W. Walker, director, Dallas; Sidney Meaco, Indianapolis and Hudson Hopson, vice-president, Birmingham. Each man was charged on 34 counts alleging fraudulent use of the mails. It was alleged that the company borrowed money to pay a three per cent dividend and later made out a false statement regarding its financial condition which was mailed from the Dallas office.

Sweetwater High School's Plunging Backfield Makes Long Gains—Many Attend Game

Local Team Displays Superiority Over Visitors in Every Department Of Game

A hot West Texas sun beat down on the enthusiasts of the King of Sports at Swatters Park when the Sweetwater High School eleven smothered the Midland High School team 44-0 Thursday afternoon.

From the kick off to the final whistle Sweetwater was the superior team in every department of the game. The Midland eleven was never within striking distance of Sweetwater's goal.

Sweetwater elected to defend the north goal and kicked off to Midland. Midland's ball on her own 20 yard line. Two line bucks netted 5 yards. On the third down Young fumbled, Sweetwater recovering. Two line bucks resulted in a 5 yard gain. On the next play, Fitzgerald passing, Sweetwater scored first blood. Trammell failed to kick goal.

The second touchdown in the first quarter came after Fitzgerald intercepted a Midland pass, enabling the locals to push over another touchdown.

In the first few minutes of play of the second quarter, Trammell reeled off twenty yards around left end. Mitchell added nine more. Time was taken out for Kelsey. Sweetwater penalized 15 yards for hurdling. Fitzgerald and Mitchell returned the ball 8 yards. Trammell crossed the line after a 20 yard run.

The fourth touchdown came just at the close of the second quarter.

Alken was substituted for Beall in the second half.

The Midland defense stiffened in the third quarter, holding the locals scoreless, but weakened under the hard smashes of the Sweetwater backfield. Trammell was replaced by Sam Crutcher late in the third quarter.

End runs, off tackle plays, passes and line bucks continuously forced the visitors to the shadow of their goal, with Sweetwater possessing the punch in each instance to put the ball across for a touchdown.

According to a statement made by the business manager of the Sweetwater team, the locals will play Ranger the latter part of this month.

ITALY IS ON TOP

League Completely Backs Down On Graeco-Italian Issue by Submitting Question of Jurisdiction

GENEVA, Sept. 21.—The Mussolini victory over the League of Nations was made complete today when the Council of the League voted to submit the question of the League's authority in the Graeco-Italian dispute to a council of International Jurists.

It was understood that some of the League Council members voted against the submission of the proposition but they were overruled.

So far as the League is concerned, the matter is a closed incident.

County Highway Program Broadened To Reach Maryneal, Dora, Nolan, Hylton, Champion With Gravel

HIGHWAY COMMISSION TO AID

Authorizes Use of Two For One On All State Highways in County—Limit Will Probably be Raised

A definite road building program which will not only include the 75 miles of designated state highways in the county but also the main laterals to Champion, Maryneal, Nolan, Dora and Hylton, has been adopted by the County Commissioners in consultation with the County Good Roads organization and with the aid of the State Highway Commission. The plan in brief involves the setting aside of \$100,000 of the proposed bond issue money which with the \$30,000 odd a year to be available from the county road and bridge fund and automobile licenses, will permit of completion of the lateral road building program as soon as the state highways can be completed. This program will materially hasten completion of the lateral system of highways.

When County Judge A. S. Mauzey, Commissioner W. H. Thompson and Secretary J. A. McCurdy visited the State Highway Commission at Austin the fore part of the week, they obtained this concession: that every time one dollar of the county bond issue money be spent on designated highways that two dollars of the state and federal aid money be spent. This proposition was originally made on the Bankhead or Highway No. 1 alone. Now it has been broadened to also include Highway No. 4 extending to Blackwell and No. 7 from Roscoe to Wastella. The present limit of \$800,000 in state and federal aid extended the county has not been raised, but the Commissioners assured the Nolan County delegation that the limit would in all probability be raised as soon as more funds became available from the gasoline tax and other sources, and that Nolan County would be in line for more aid.

The proposition works out something like this: \$100,000 of the county's money will be used to match \$300,000 from the State Highway Commission, leaving a balance of \$200,000 of the bond issue unexpended. This sum will be split in half, \$100,000 to be matched by another \$100,000 or more from the state and the other \$100,000 to be expended on the lateral roads of the county.

The lateral roads which the County Commissioners propose to build have a total mileage of about 50. The longest single strip is from Roscoe to Maryneal, which is about 16 miles. Another six miles will be used to bring Champion and neighborhood out to the Bankhead highway at a point west of Roscoe.

About 25 miles will be required to link up Dora, Nolan and Hylton. This is proposed by leaving Highway No. 4 along the present road to Nolan, thence to Hylton and back to Blackwell, with a spur extending from Hylton to Dora. The Commissioners plan a gravel construction on these roads. There is a natural road already existing on a part of the mileage, requiring grading only. Commissioners say that the laterals outlined above can be built with the \$100,000 set aside from the bond issue and from the money available from the county road and bridge fund, including bridges.

FLOOD IS FEARED

Gangs of Workmen Strengthen Levee As Rio Grande Reaches Flood Stage—Pecos Swollen Over Banks

EAGLE PASS, Sept. 21.—Fears of a most disastrous flood are being felt here as the Rio Grande, swollen by heavy rains in its upper reaches, rapidly approached the highest stage in recent years here.

The Pecos river, which is over its banks, is adding its flood waters to the already swollen Rio Grande.

Gangs of workmen are busy strengthening levees in an attempt to prevent threatened damage, especially in the lower valley.

REVOLUTION OVER

LONDON, Sept. 21.—The Bulgarian revolution against Premier Zankov, successor to the slain Stemboulisky, has been broken, according to dispatches from Belgrade. The Communist movement has been destroyed and further efforts are considered remote. The government is engaged in restoring order, according to the dispatch.

BOOZE IN COURT

District Court at Roby Passes Salty Sentences Upon Offenders Which Occupy Much of Calendar

A. E. Coulter, 23, was tried by the State and given two years in the penitentiary for the burglarizing of the Span Mercantile store at Sylvester the past June.

Hickey Brown, colored, of near Sylvester was given one year and a day for manufacturing of malted liquor.

Vanderbilt-Williams, (col.) of near Sylvester, was given 2 years and 6 months for manufacturing whiskey.

Sam Harris was given one year for selling whiskey.

City Commission Sets Date For Charter Amendment Election on Oct. 23—Bills Are Audited

Payment of bills, final passage of the ordinance calling for a special election on charter amendments and setting the date for the election were the principal items of business transacted at the regular session of the City Commission Thursday.

The date for the special election was fixed for October 23. T. L. Hughes was appointed judge of the election.

There was some discussion of the filtration plant project. The transcript of the proceedings has been sent to the attorney general for the approval of the bonds and the matter is now in his hands. Maj. John B. Hawley of Ft. Worth is preparing plans for the plant, which are expected to arrive in a few days. As soon as these arrive, the proposition will be advertised for contract.

There will be special songs and a Cradle ceremony. A unique present will be presented to each baby who is on the Cradle Roll and who attends the service. Mrs. R. B. Walker is Superintendent of this department of the Church work and it is meeting with pronounced success.

ROBED KLANSMEN STAGE A PARADE

One of Largest Crowds of Recent Months Throng Sweetwater Streets For View of Event

CRIMSON CROSS AT BALL PARK

Barbecue and Initiation Held at Swatter Park—Klansmen Here From Many West Texas Points

The long awaited and much discussed parade of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan was staged in Sweetwater Thursday night. What was probably the largest crowd that these streets have seen in recent months began gathering long before dark and waited with growing restlessness for the event which was delayed somewhat from the scheduled hour of 8:30. It was shortly after nine o'clock when the first of the white robed figures, mounted on horseback led the procession up Oak Street, around the square and back to the baseball park, which served as headquarters for the initiation and other ceremonies.

There was absolute silence as the parade moved, broken now and then by the nervous laugh of a woman or the exclamation of a child.

Three knights of the order were mounted and carried a large American flag at the head of the procession. Then followed a large group of members, clad in the Klan regalia, with a smaller group in civilian attire and a larger group of Klansmen in the rear. At the head of the rear group walked two men in Klan robes but with their faces unmasked.

Many points in West Texas were represented in the gathering, which headquarters at Swatter Park. A great crimson cross flamed above the Park, which in years gone by had echoed to Swatter victories in the historic West Texas League. Two Klansmen stood guard at the gate, admitting the members of the order, who were fed barbecue prepared at a local meat market. There were 1200 lbs. of meat in the barbecue order.

Several persons endeavored to count the number of persons in the parade. The count varied from 175 to 185. The Sweetwater Local of the National Guard aided local authorities in traffic control at the street intersections.

It is reported that the failure in arrival of some robes prevented several hundred Klansmen who were present from taking part in the parade. As it was some twenty or thirty who had come some distance insisted on joining the parade without robes.

Delegations were present from Big Spring, Roby, Snyder, Abilene, Merkel, Blackwell, San Angelo, Colorado, Hamlin, Sylvester, McCauley Stanton, Roscoe, Ft. Worth.

A barbecue was held at the ball park before the parade, and a large class of candidates initiated after the parade, it is said.

PAVING STREETS

QUANAH, Sept. 21.—Quanah's militant civic program is receiving added impetus from the past week's occurrences. The City is advertising for bids for 19 additional blocks of street paving, the new magnificent city hall is about completed and petitions are to be presented to the commissioners court of Hardeman County praying for the calling of a special road election to vote highway bonds in the sum of \$250,000 to be matched with \$500,000 state and federal aid.

Receiver Sought For House of David At Benton Harbor by Woman Who Charges Improper Relations

S. District Court here today by Mrs. Estella Madrin, a member of the cult for 22 years. Mrs. Madrin, according to her attorney, brought the action against the colony after being convinced that King Ben Purnell had been associated with other daughters during his alleged misconduct with women and girls at Shiloh.

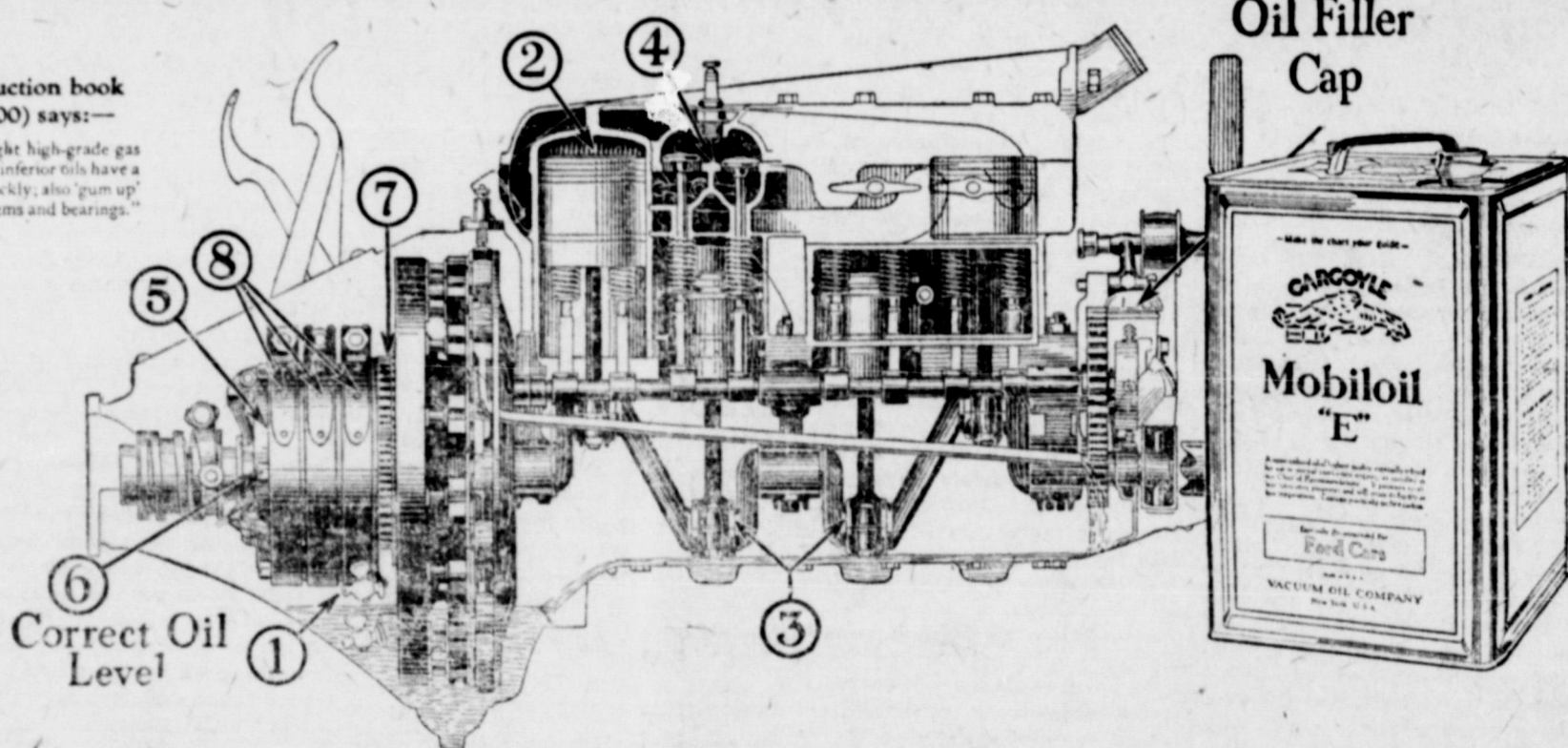

Your Ford instruction book (Answer No. 100) says:—

"We recommend only light high-grade gas engine oil... Heavy and inferior oils have a tendency to carbonize quickly, also 'gum up' the piston rings, valve stems and bearings."

Consequently, any oil carried up by the piston rings is forced into the valve chambers. A heavy oil does not burn up readily, but remains to gum the valves.

BALANCE RATION FOR HEN ACTION

The Hen Must Have Material to Make Each Part of Egg, Yolk, Shell And White

SHOULD CULL FLOCK NOW

Supply Oyster Shells, Charcoal, Grit, Fresh Green Feed and Water at All Times

My Miss Myrtle Murray, Poultry Specialist, Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas:

Regardless of how highly a flock of standard-bred birds have been bred for egg production there will be at least a few culls that should be eliminated each year. In the flocks where little or no culling has been done about a third of the flock can usually be culled without decrease of egg production.

However, the general care and feed

of the flock should be taken into consideration. A hen is simply a factory that manufactures raw material into eggs. We would not expect to send corn to a cotton gin have it made into bales and eventually into cotton cloth. Yet, occasionally we hear the remark, "I feed my hens all the corn they want. I do not understand why they do not lay." A hen must have material to make these parts of an egg, shell, yolk and white. She may have the material to make two parts, but if she does not have the material to make the third part of the egg she still cannot produce the egg. Therefore it is very necessary that a hen have a balanced ration, i. e., a ration that will give her the necessary nourishment for the up keep of her body. At the same time the right kind of material from which eggs may be manufactured. The following is a suggested formula:

1. SCRATCH FEED: 100 pounds corn, 100 pounds wheat.
2. DRY MASH: 20 pounds ground oats, 20 pounds wheat bran, 20 pounds shorts or middlings, 20 pounds corn meal, 20 pounds dried beef scraps, 1 pound salt.

(10 pounds dried beef scraps and 10 pounds of cotton seed meal may be used instead of 20 pounds beef scraps).

3. Keep dry mash before flock in a self feeding hopper all the time. Also furnish an abundant supply of oyster shell, charcoal, grit, fresh green feed and water all the time.

In case the above mentioned grains are not raised in your county, ask your county farm or home demonstration agent to help you work out a formula for dry mash in order to use as much of home grown products, therefore materially reducing the cost of feed.

Since green feed is as necessary in the winter as it is in the summer, A. & M. College is putting out blue print plans for grain sprouters. The blue

print plans for the grain sprouter, self feeder, hoppers, colony houses and 3 sizes of laying houses may be secured from this office through your county farm or home demonstration agent.

Taking it for granted that you are either feeding your hens a balanced ration or that you intend to begin immediately, we will briefly mention the main factor to be considered in culling. The fundamental factor to be considered is strength, health and vigor. Birds possessing these qualities usually have medium length backs that are not only broad through the shoulders but broad to the end; full breasts; full body and fluff, set well apart on the legs, clear, bright prominent eyes, broad head with medium length neck and a short stubby beak. The above are general characteristics. The following characteristics in addition to the above that should be rated in culling this season of the year.

They are named in the order of their importance. The shanks and beak should be pale in color, moult late, pelvis or lay bones thin and pliable, skin over the abdomen thin, soft and pliable, comb, large, warm moist and waxy. Broad width of the pelvic arch indicates how heavily the fowl is laying at present. The above applies to hens and not to pullets.

Right now is the time to weed out the loser that does not produce enough to pay for the pound of salt that seasons the 100 pounds of dry mash that the entire flock is eating. Not only shall we be reducing the feed bill (and not reducing the number of eggs) but we shall be saving our best for the next year's breeding pens. Giving these birds the best care and attention means money from high priced eggs at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

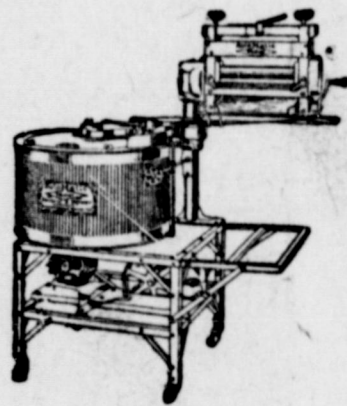

CONSTITUTION

Only in the days of Pericles and of Hadrian perhaps have there been brief interludes at all comparable.

The laws and the courts of this nation are not perfect—no human insti-

tution is. But they are so far ahead of any other species of proceedings known that there is practically no comparison. There is no known substitute and whenever one is attempted then is the structure that we are proud to call our country endangered.

THE TEXAS SCHOOL SURVEY
By Pheobe K. Warner

There are four great pillars upon which every state and every nation is built. These four pillars are the home, the school, the church and the government. Every state and every nation is just as strong and just as well balanced as these four pillars are strong and equally able to uphold their share of the state's total weight and burdens. Let either pillar crumble or decay and we have a distorted state or nation. Neglect the care of either of these great human props and we will immediately have a lopsided state. Let either deteriorate and you harm the value and efficiency of all the others. To have a perfect state we must make these four foundation pillars perfect.

Go anywhere you will. Study any state or nation you please and the

student of human affairs will soon discover which of these great props is the weak one. Throughout our nation experts in all these lines are constantly on guard looking for the weak places in these four props. And it is almost the universal conviction that the weakest of the four pillars in our nation is the SCHOOL. That it is the school that is not bearing its whole part of the national burden. That the school is not meeting its share of the responsibility of human affairs and that the weak places in our school system is the cause of much of the danger that seems to be lurking within the other three national pillars the home, the church and the government.

It is the most natural thing in the world. And why every state has not decided long ago to make an intense investigation of its schools no one but the God of Indifference knows. Why, even a firstclass ranchman pays some one every day to ride the fences to see if they are all in good condition and able to perform their particular function on the ranch. What would be the result if the ranchman neglected to look after the efficiency of his fences for a few days? And the railroads pay somebody to walk every mile of their track every day, to see that every rail is in its place and

ready to bear its share of the burden of the swift passing trainloads of human freight. How many of us would risk ourselves on a train if we knew no one was watching out for the weak places in the track? And what happens when a weak place is overlooked and neglected on a railroad track?

As we understand it, this is what the School Survey of Texas means. A general overhauling and investigation and examination of four entire school systems from the kindergarten to the graduation exercises of the State University and our kindred state educational institutions, it has been already decided that the weakest of these state pillars in Texas is the school. It is the school in Texas that is not holding up its part of the states

weight and responsibility. It is the school that is not performing its highest mission in Texas and for Texas. But until this year the most of us have just fussed about the school instead of trying to find out what ails the school and then working together to

relieve the trouble and build up our schools to as high a degree of efficiency as the other props in our state. And the condition of our schools is undermining the strength and the effi-

Lives they must live. And the rearranging of the schools to give every child in the state an equal opportunity to receive a useful education. Taking up their high school course of study for the entire state. Indiana will require English through the high school course and PHYSICAL EDUCATION. 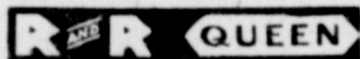
