FOR A COUNTRY that has always taken pride in the fact that in its history no foreign nation has ever successfully invaded its boundaries, the United States is in vast danger of being taken over by outside interests.

Which is worse: being defeated in a military combat, and then having to submit to the conquering nation's wishes, or slowly allowing our property, assets and industries to be purchased by foreign investors, who eventually can in a more subtle way, dictate American policy.

The most recent statistics available indicated that 39 per cent of the real estate in downtown Houston is foreign-owned. That is mild, compared to the 64 per cent of real estate in Los Angeles, which is also foreign-controlled.

Foreign investors have bought everything from farmland to automobile factories. In many cases, the foreign businessmen have come in and established factories in our country.

At a time when congress is having to devise new ways to come up with taxes to run the government, we are losing millions, perhaps even billions of dollars in taxes to these outside interests.

It's the old "shop at home" theory on a national scale. Although many of these foreign-owned industries help local coffers through property taxes, their profits are siphoned off to another country. Income taxes that might have been used to fuel our nation's government are more likely helping pay for services in London or Tokyo.

Latest figures from the U.S. Department of Commerce indicated that the total amount of investments by foreigners in America exceeded \$1.5 trillion. This was for the latest year available, which was 1987--and the foreign investing has continued at full pace during the interim.

An article by conservative journalist Jack Anderson in a recent edition of *Parade Magazine* asked the burning question: Who Owns America?

The answer, according to Anderson, is becoming more and more evident, that it isn't Americans who are owning the very things that supply the life-blood to our country.

The *Parade* article published a list of state-by-state assets, including plants, property and equipment, which were foreign-owned, as of 1986. The list had the state of Texas in first place, with a whopping \$40.3 billion worth of property that was foreign-owned.

The irony of all this, as Anderson pointed out, is the fact that while the U.S. market is wide open to foreign investment, some of the same countries that are investing heavily in America have raised barriers to U.S. investment in their own countries.

Mercury Hits 93° Thursday

Sugar Beets Pump \$4 Million In Area

The benefits of the sugar beet industry to the regional economy were apparent again last week when a \$4.7 million payment was made to area sugar beet growers from Holly Sugar Corp.

Holly, which has a major sugar beet processing plant in Hereford, contracts with some 300 growers nationwide. When beets are harvested in the fall, the first of four payments is made to growers. It amounts to approximately 65% of the total amount due to growers and is based on the projected net

selling price of sugar the following year. A second payment is made in April, and a third in July. Holly makes the final settlement with farmers on November 1.

"We are partners with Holly Sugar," said Bill Cleavinger of Wildorado, president of the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association. Cleavinger, also president of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association, added that the merger of Holly with Imperial Sugar last year is benefitting growers in the Panhandle-South Plains

"The merger is helping bring about a marked improvement in our marketing nets," he said. "We are extremely pleased with the results the marketing department is producing. These results benefit everyone involved, and the \$4.7 million payment is proof that this industry is helping the regional economy."

Conservation Plan Needed By Farmers

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District would like to remind everyone that time to develop a Food Security Act plan is running out.

The Food Security Act of 1985 (FSA) requires that highly erodible fields in each ASCS farm number have an approved conservation plan by December 31, 1989, in order to participate in USDA programs. The Soil Conservation Service office in Friona has already received 2,003 highly erodible land (HEL) determination requests. So far, 1,860 requests have been determined with 510 needing conservation plans.

Once a determination has been made, one of two actions will be taken. If there is no HEL, the producer will receive a letter stating this fact. If there is HEL, the producer will receive a letter inviting him to make an appointment to develop a conservation plan.

What is HEL? HEL stands for Highly Erodible Land that has a high potential for wind and/or water erosion. An HEL determination does not mean that it is "bad" land. Under FSA, an HEL determination is made for each field, and is based on the soil type and number of acres of highly erodible soil. Highly erodible soils in Parmer County are Amarillo, Arvana, Berda, Bippus, Estacado, Friona, Kimbrough, Likes, Lipan, Mobeetie, Posey, Potter, Tulia and Zita.

All technical assistance is free of charge and available to all landowners and operators regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or national origin.

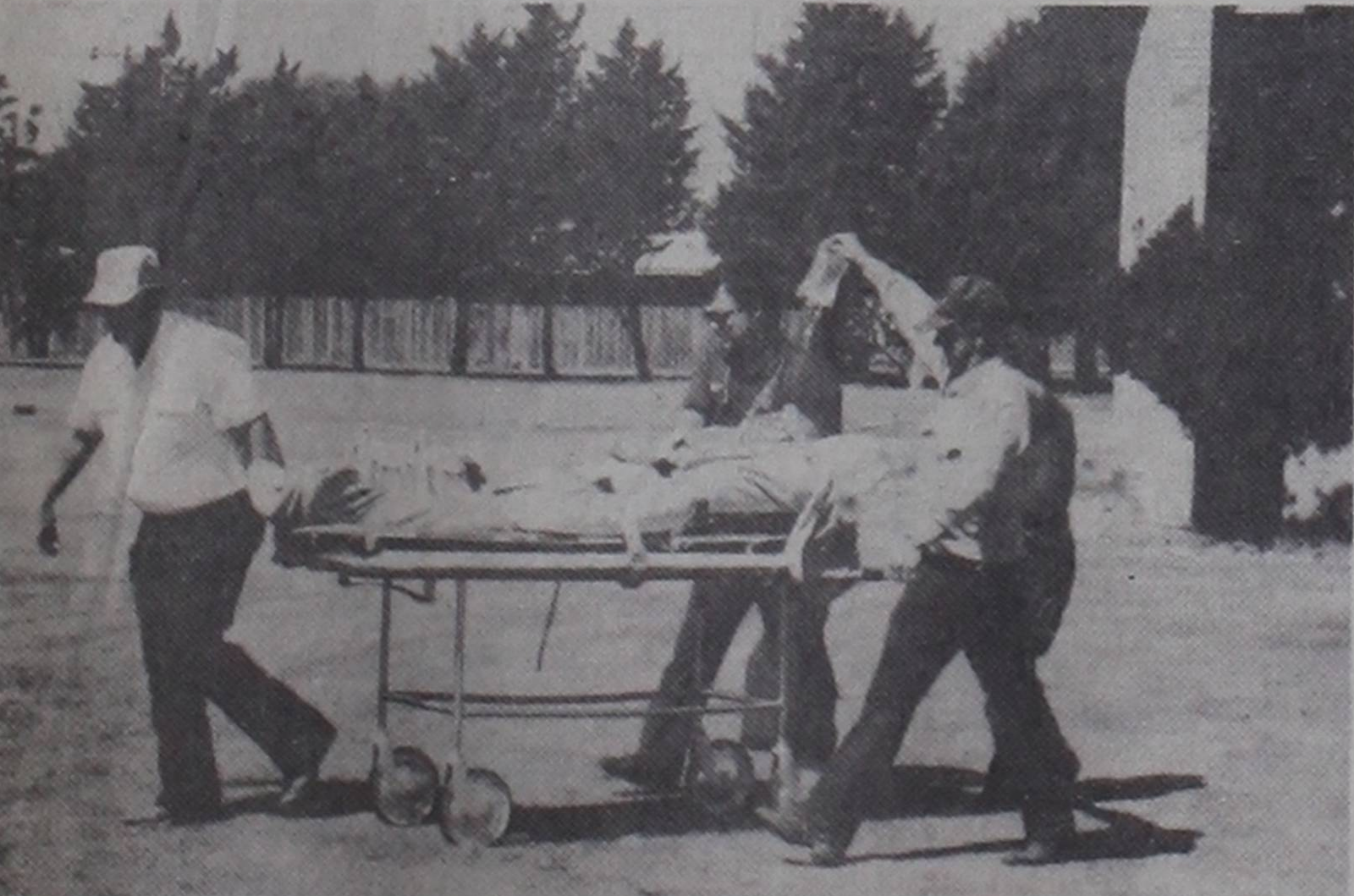
Winners in the "Best All-Around" balloting were Burney and Julie Brown.

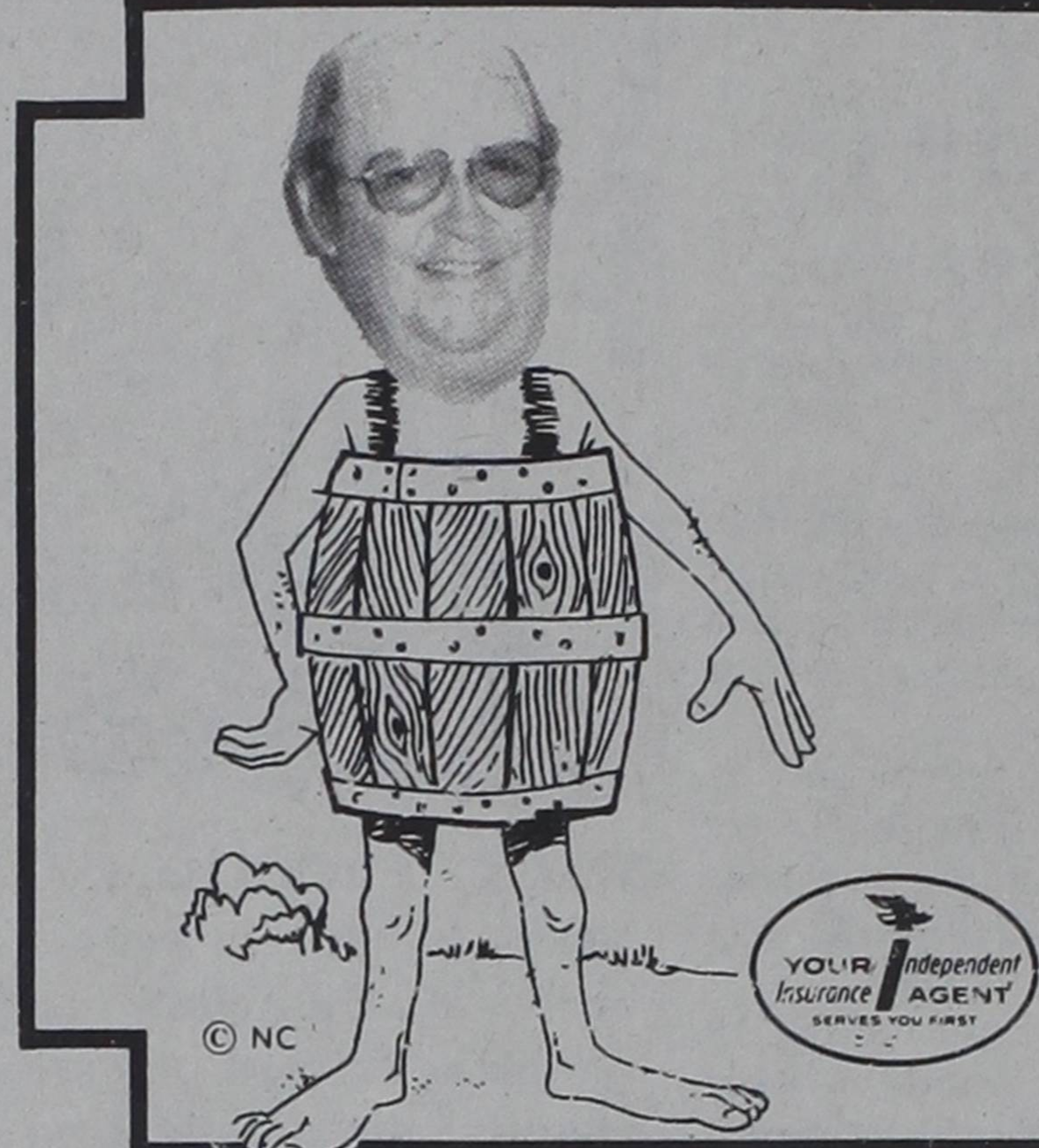

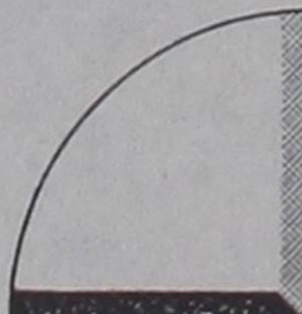

Breakfast-Skipping Scored By Experts

A breakfast-skipper is somewhat like a car running on empty.

A well-nourished person, like a well lubricated engine, works more efficiently.

Proper choices from the basic food groups of meat, milk, fruits/vegetables and cereals/grains should provide an individual with about one-fourth of the recommended daily amounts of protein, calories, vitamins and minerals.

These nutrients are essential for energy, maintenance and body repair.

Persons who regularly eat a well-balanced breakfast can perform more efficiently, concentrate on the day's schedule and are less tired after a busy day.

Other benefits include:

*Breakfast participants have more nutritionally balanced diets than breakfast skippers.

*Kids who eat breakfast are better nourished than students who skip breakfast.

*Breakfast participants have higher intakes of calcium that is derived from milk, as well as phosphorus and riboflavin, all nutrients essential for strong bones and teeth.

*Breakfast participants tend to maintain normal weight levels and are less likely to be overweight or underweight.

*Breakfast participants are energetic and can concentrate on school-related tasks, while

breakfast skippers often tend to be irritable, restless and listless.

*Breakfast eaters have a better late-morning problem-solving ability.

*People who eat breakfast regularly have more energy at the mid-part of the day than breakfast skippers.

*The habit of eating breakfast on a regular basis often is associated with a vigorous older age.

Miss Morton is a member of the Church of Christ.

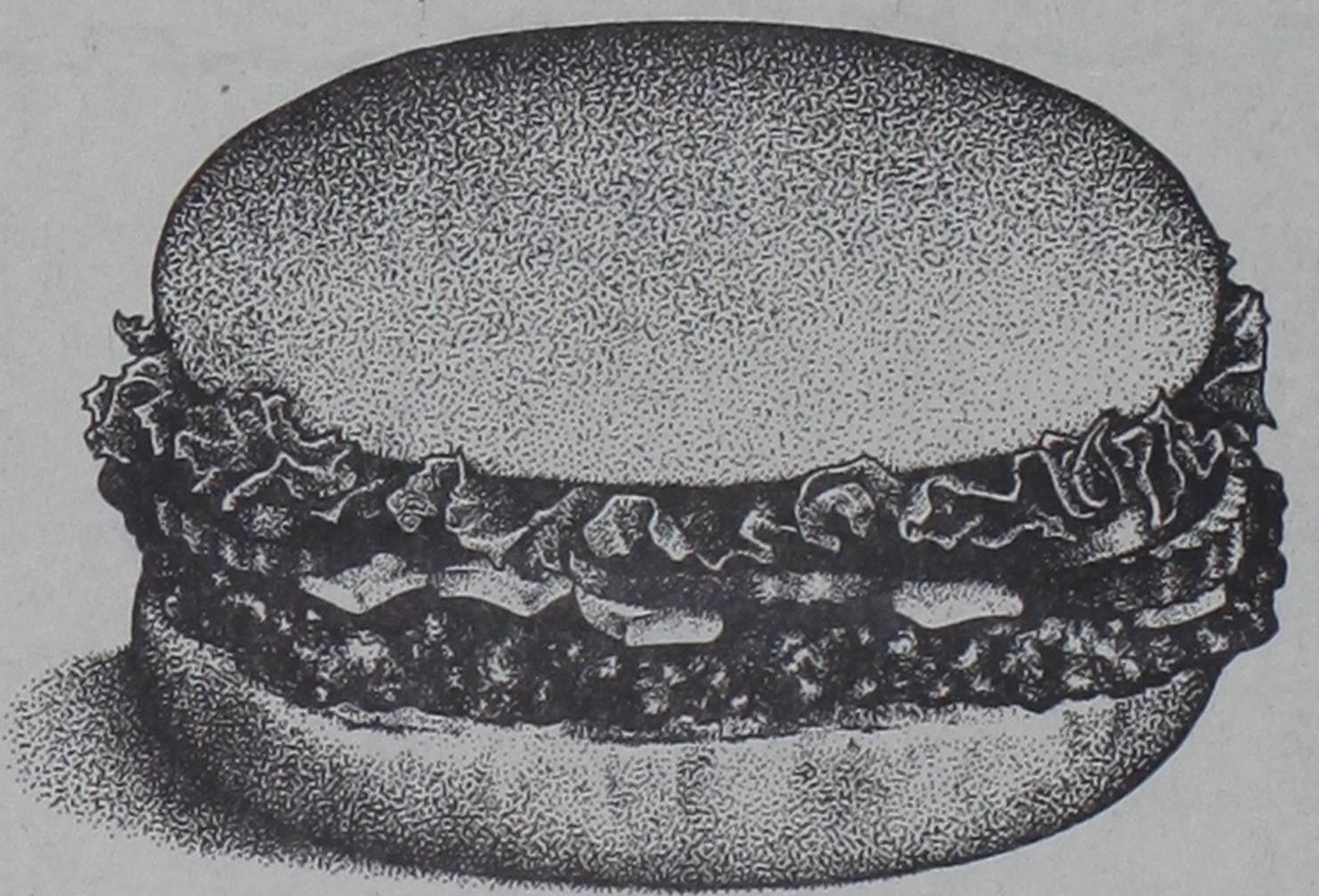
She enjoys tennis, basketball, rhetoric and philosophy.

Although British and German investors were the early leaders in purchasing American assets, the Japanese have become the most visible in recent years.

This is a bitter pill for most Americans to swallow, especially those old enough to remember that Japan's shattered economy was rebuilt after World War II with American dollars. Today the Japanese are threatening not only to surpass the U.S. as the world's economic leader, but as the top technological power as well.

When we visited Hawaii a few years ago, it was pointed out to us that the Japanese are rapidly taking over ownership of everything in Hawaii.

Here again, where that nation was repulsed for their sneak attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, they have come back to "claim" the islands as far as property ownership goes.

Representative John Bryant, a Texas Democrat, puts it this way: "Americans are selling the family jewels to pay for a night out on the town."

Perhaps it's not too late to stem the tide of turning everything over to foreigners. But we have to draw a line someplace--and quickly.

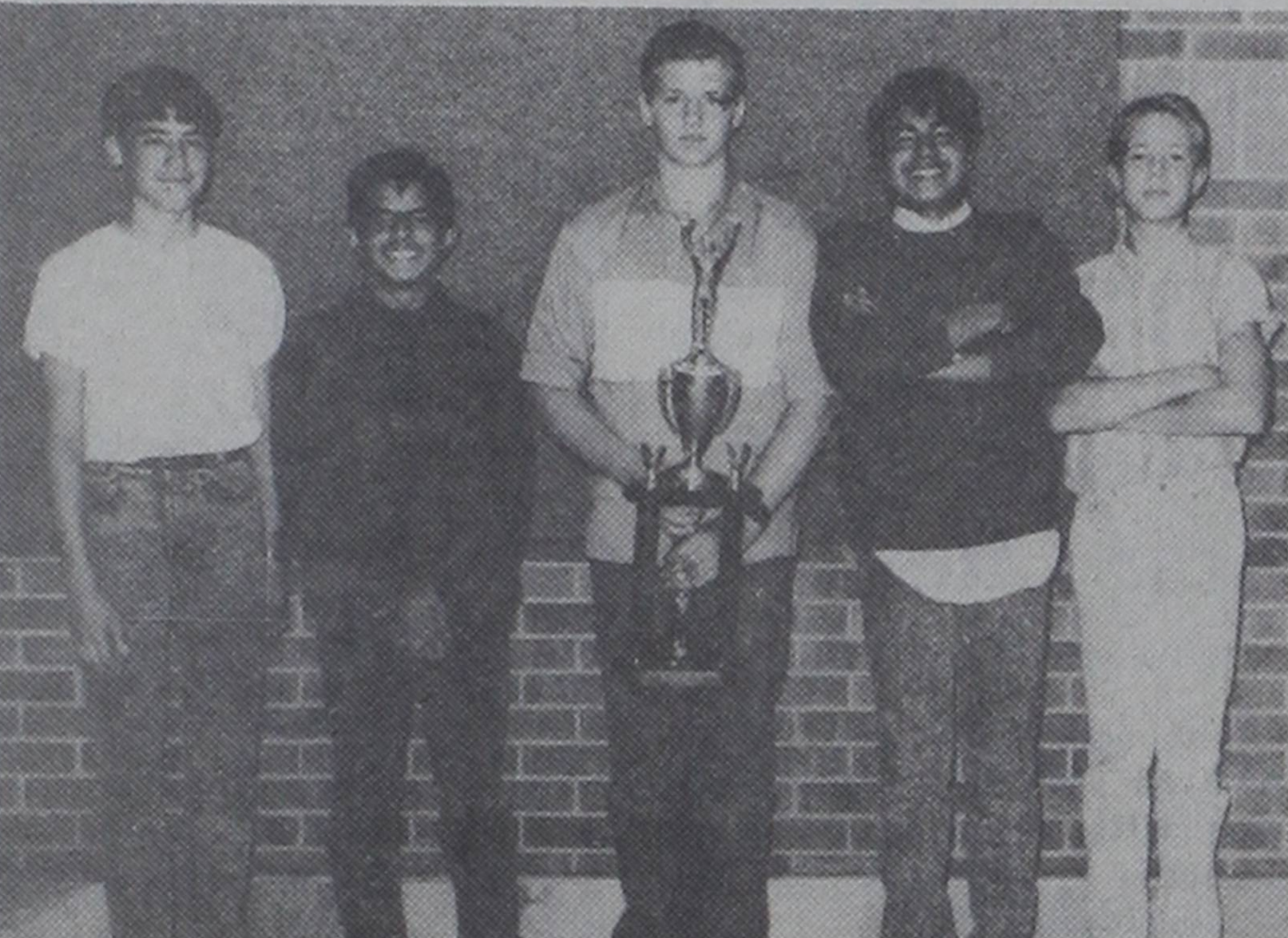

Madrid says his favorite movies have been "Diehard" and "The Color Purple." His favorite book is "A Separate Peace" and his favorite subject is math.

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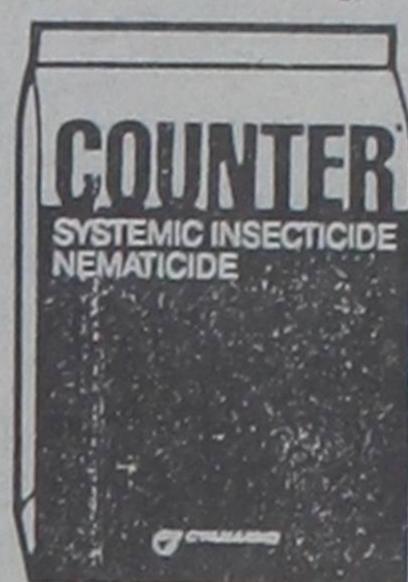
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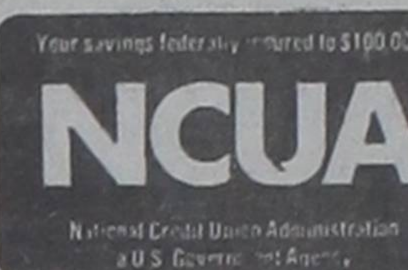

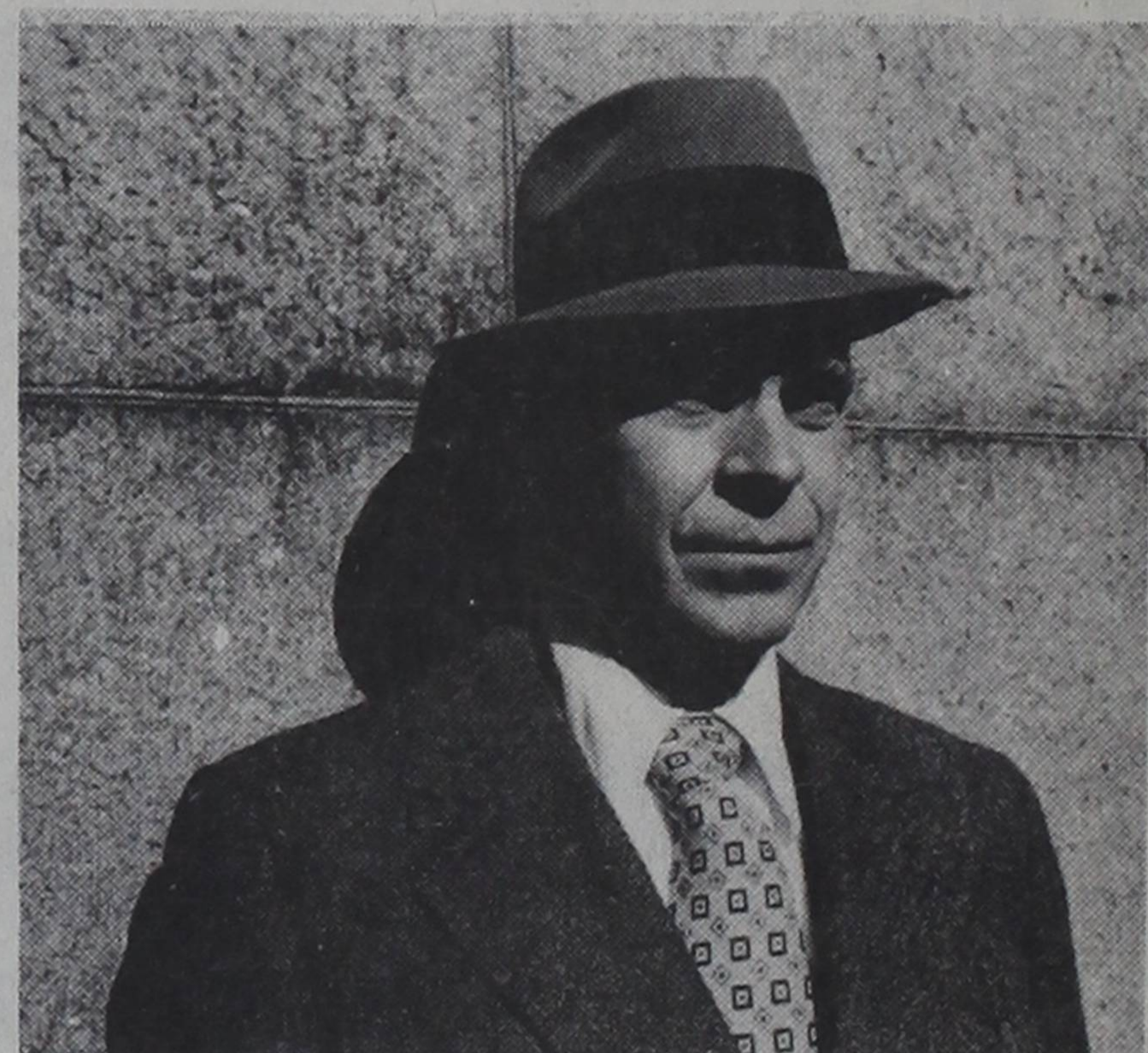
Salesman Confesses

Claims newspaper is best salesman

On Monday, Jules Wintner, owner of a local retail establishment, confessed his job as a salesman was obsolete due to the impact of newspaper advertising. Wintner, in an exclusive interview, said sales were made in the local paper instead of in the store.

"Sure, we get a chance for additional sales," Wintner commented, "but the newspaper has become our best salesman." Wintner reported that consumers name the local newspaper as their usual source of "Best Buy" information, 10 times more than radio or television. This conforms with a recent Consumer Data Service report that indicated 60% of the consumers seek "Best Buy" information from the newspaper versus only 6% for radio and 7% for television.

Wintner later remarked that because the newspaper is read by all Texans, regardless of income, his business was able to sell both upper end products as well as value priced items. "No matter what we're selling, we get good response in the newspaper," he said. "In fact, the more expensive the product, the better our response seems to be." This fact is substantiated in a survey by the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau that documented readership of the newspaper increases as income increases. In the survey, almost 75% of Texans with incomes exceeding \$50,000 a year read

"My job has become redundant," Wintner admitted. "Used to be I had to really sell each customer, but now I'm just an order taker." Asked what he intended to do now that the newspaper was doing most of the selling, he replied, "Spend more in newspaper advertising than last year."
