NO INJUNCTIONS BOLL WEEVIL TO BE ELIMINATED IN THIS COUNTY

Nolan County Farm Bureau Check Up Situation And Find Most Farmer Members Shipping

SOME LETTERS ARE WRITTEN TO INVESTIGATE MACHINES

A Few Farmers Get in Line After Consulting Attorney Relative to Law Of Contracts

It is not believed that any Farm Bureau Cotton pool members will be served with injunction papers, members of the executive committee of the Nolan County Farm Bureau say after a close survey of the situation in Nolan County.

"While suits have been filed in Jones, Runnels, Mitchell and other counties, we are finding the situation a little different in Nolan with members in nearly every case shipping to the Farm Bureau," a member declared this week.

"In one community we checked the list of members of the Cotton Association against the list of those who were shipping. We found several that were not shipping or had moved away or were shipping from other points where the roads were better. Cases have occurred where it has been necessary for our attorney to write letters to farmers, telling them they had to ship or take the consequence. These farmers go and see their own attorney and then finding out that they have no defense, they get in line right away. And when a man is served with an injunction, he must ship his cotton to the Farm Bureau or be cited for contempt of court."

The decision of the state Supreme Court on the test case carried up from Waxahachie, and which held that the cotton contracts were valid in every way, it was pointed out, have simplified proceedings greatly. This coupled with the enhanced returns received by Farm Bureau members last year have resulted in much larger receipts by the Cotton Association headquarters at Dallas.

Up to October 15 of this year, a total of 214,000 bales had been received at Dallas, as compared with a total of 77,706 bales handled during the entire season of 1922.

WALTON IS OUT

Oklahoma Legislature Acts on Part of Charges of Impeachment—Lt. Gov. Trapp Now in Charge

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 24.—Gov. J. C. Walton was suspended from office late last night when the State Senate by a vote of 36 to 1 adopted a resolution temporarily relieving him of his official duties, following the submission by the lower house of a bill of impeachment against him.

The impeachment bill charged the executive with entering into "a corrupt agreement" with Dr. A. E. Davenport, State Health Commissioner, to place T. P. Edwards, the Governor's personal chauffeur, on the payroll of the Health Department at \$200 a month, and that thereby "certain moneys were diverted from the statutory object and purpose for which they were appropriated by law."

Trapp Acting Executive The Senate voted to receive the charge and Senator W. M. Gulager of Muskogee introduced the resolution which would suspend the Governor and make Lieut. Gov. M. E. Trapp acting executive until the former's trial.

The house has taken action on the following charges:

Charge No. 1.—Appointment of Charles H. Baskin as District Judge while a member of the lower house of the Legislature. (Not considered).

Charge No. 2.—Diversion of funds from the State Treasury to private use under the guise of placing his private chauffeur on the State Health Department payroll. (Submission to Senate approved).

Charge No. 3.—Preventing convening of an Oklahoma County grand jury (Submission to Senate approved). Action by the Senate followed the submission to that body of Charge No. 2.

TO INVESTIGATE MACHINES

Various Contrivances, Chemicals, Etc. Will be Thoroughly Examined at New Orleans Meet

By The United Press. NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 24.—War on the south's greatest crop menace—the boll weevil—was opened here today by government, finance and agriculture. In the cotton growing states, according to the New Orleans cotton Exchange, the boll weevil has caused a loss of one million dollars in the last few years.

Attended by delegates from all points, the fight to end the menace got under way here at 10 o'clock this morning for a three day session.

Harry D. Wilson, Louisiana Commissioner of Agriculture is presiding. Today's session was taken up with reports of committees and of individual's study of the weevil situation and plans that have been worked out to fight the pest.

The merits of these plans will be gone into and a committee appointed to shape the report that will be presented at tomorrow's session.

Machines, chemicals, etc. planned for destroying the boll weevil as worked out by individuals will be demonstrated before the convention. One of the machines is a contraption for picking up the fallen buds or bolls from the ground by a vacuum system. The buds containing the weevils are then dropped into the furnace carried by the machine.

ROTAN MAN HIT

J. B. Hayter of Rotan or Witness Stand at Trial of Dr. Frederick A. Cook at Ft. Worth

By The United Press. FT. WORTH, Oct. 24.—J. B. Hayter of Rotan was among the witnesses called by the government in the case of Dr. Frederick A. Cook and 21 other defendants charged with the use of the mails to defraud in connection with the sale of oil stock in federal court here.

Visions of untold wealth that failed to materialize were told by witnesses on the stand today as scores of additional letters and circulars which it is alleged were sent out by Cook were read to the jury.

The letters offering stock for sale in the Petroleum Producers Association were introduced along with testimony of the recipients that the promises of profits contained therein induced them to part with their money. Among the witnesses who testified today were Miss Alice Wood of Chicago; J. B. Hayter, Rotan; Martin Jankens, disabled war veteran of Melrose Park, Ill.

They said they purchased stock in an oil company organized by S. E. J. Cox of Houston and later were persuaded to exchange it for that of Cook.

AMENDMENTS TO LINDSEY TELLS CHARTER VOTED OF OPERATIONS

Five of Six Charter Amendments Carried by Majorities Ranging From 221 to 22 Votes

CITY TAX RATE TO BE \$1.90

Rate Last Year Was \$1.60 With Deficiency Made up From Water Works Surplus Fund

In a special election Tuesday, five of six charter amendments submitted to the voters of the city carried by pluralities ranging from 221 votes to 22. A total of 636 votes were cast in the election.

The first amendment to the charter reduces the legal rate of interest on paving from 10 to 8 per cent and will give property owners five years time in which to pay for paving. It does not give the city commission any more actual power with reference to the ordering of paving than it already had, but it does make the paving notes more saleable. The changes were recommended by attorneys for bonding companies and are in line with changes of other cities. This amendment carried by 95 votes.

Amendment No. 2 provides for the extension of city water lines outside of the city limits when it shall be to the interest of the tax payers to do so and its purpose is to enable the city to take over the Suburban Water Co. This amendment received the largest plurality of any, carrying by a majority of 221, more than 2 to 1.

Amendment No. 3 makes possible the transfer of any surplus funds from the water works to the general fund of the city, after all interest and fixed charges, maintenance, etc. shall have been met. This carried by 101 votes.

Amendment No. 4 raising the limit on the general tax rate from 80c to \$1.30. This carried by 43 votes.

Amendment No. 5 provided for the raising of the salary of the street commissioner from \$25 per month to \$100 per month. This failed to carry by a margin of 43 votes.

Amendment No. 6 permits the City Commission to hire an auditor in place of the Citizen's Committee to audit the books of the City, as formerly provided in the charter. This carried by 22 votes.

Rate Increased 30c The city tax rate has been left up fixed, pending the result of the election. (Continued on Page 2)

AMENDMENTS TO LINDSEY TELLS CHARTER VOTED OF OPERATIONS

More Than 1,000 Denver Girls Illegally Operated Upon During Past Year, He Tells Grand Jury

BIRTH RATES ARE REDUCED

Denver Judge Says Reduction Fifty Per Cent in Births is Result—Advocates Teaching Sex Knowledge

By The United Press. DENVER, Colo., Oct. 24.—More than 1,000 girls under 17 years of age were illegally operated on in Denver last year to prevent child birth, Judge Ben B. Lindsey told a grand jury here today.

Judge Lindsey said he had personal knowledge of that many cases and told the grand jury that the city birth rate was reduced at least 50 per cent by such operations.

Lindsey refused to give any special details regarding any certain cases but gave general information regarding the situation without mentioning the names of the girls or of the physicians who had been connected in him regarding them.

Prosecuting Attorney Phillip S. Van Cise summoned Judge Lindsey before the grand jury at 10 o'clock this morning. He told them of instances after instance in which victims of illegal operations had confided in him, omitting the names of the principals. He told of a leading Denver churchman who had asked him about having an illegal operation performed upon his daughter.

"He wanted me to give him the name of a surgeon who could perform such an operation," Judge Lindsey said, continuing, "I asked him if as a churchman he did not believe in such law breaking practice. He told me that he did not until it came home to him."

Lindsey recommended to the jury the dissemination of proper sex knowledge through schools and churches.

CANNOT PAY, SAY SECOND DISTRICT GERMAN LEADERS CONCLAVE OPENS

Note to Reparations Counsel Say Will Break With France if Latest Note is Abruptly Repulsed

REPUBLIC IS SPREADING OUT

Total of 16 Towns Are Now Included in Rhineland Republic According To Reports Reaching Paris

By The United Press. BERLIN, Oct. 24.—The German government is prepared to break with France if its note to the Reparation Counsel pleading its inability to pay under the present conditions is abruptly repulsed.

The note pointed out the inability to pay reparations in kind such as coal at this time. The French attitude is blamed for its failure to attempt an agreement looking toward the resumption of deliveries. The note asserted Germany was willing to pay reparations under proper conditions.

CONTROL 16 TOWNS

By The United Press. PARIS, Oct. 24.—The Separatists officially claim control of 16 towns in the Rhineland, according to dispatches from Aix-La-Chapelle.

Leo Deckers, Separatist leader at Aix, is quoted by Le Matin, of Paris, as declaring the struggle is extremely hard and that it is impossible to complete a revolution in a day.

He said, "I believe our success will be final within a week. We have won places where we expected fierce resistance, such as Duisberg and Bonn, the latter an important Prussian military post."

TO TRY HICKOX

Hickox Received a 99 Year Sentence At San Angelo in Connection Killing Schreier at Rankin

With most of the calendar cleared up or continued, this week's session of the district court mostly isn't. Judge Leslie spent Tuesday and most of Wednesday at his home in Colorado for lack of cases.

The Grand Jury will reconvene Monday and there will be one case of automobile theft for it to consider, having been sent up from Justice Court the past week—the theft of McIntyre's car.

The Ceph Gray damage suit, brought by the widow of Tomlin, both of Roscoe will likely come up for a hearing next Wednesday. Mrs. Tomlin is suing Gray for \$20,000 damages. Tomlin was killed at Roscoe a year ago September during an altercation with Gray. Gray, it will be recalled, was given a two year sentence by a jury in District Court here during the March term of court.

A second murder trial has been brought to Sweetwater on a change of venue and has been set for the March term of court. It is the T. F. Hickox case. Hickox is charged with the murder of Lamar Schreier at Rankin in July 1921. The case was tried at San Angelo in July 1922 and Hickox received a 99 year sentence at the hands of a jury. The case was appealed, reversed and remanded for trial.

The Meador case has also been brought here on a change of venue to be tried at the March term of court.

WELK GETS DEATH

Jury Assesses Extreme Penalty For Death of Dallas Jailor

By The United Press. DALLAS, Oct. 24.—Ray Welk, indicted for murder in connection with the killing of W. B. Champion, a jailor, when Welk and Charles Gaines attempted a jail break here last month, in which Gaines was killed and Welk wounded, was given the death penalty by a jury here today.

Welk was already under sentence for 40 years in connection with the killing of Tom Woods during a prohibition raid. He and Gaines, a postal bandit under sentence of death at the time, attempted to gain their freedom with guns smuggled into the jail.

Champion and Gaines were killed and Welk wounded in the fight which followed.

ELECTION

As predicted in this column Monday afternoon, the amendments to the city charter with one exception, were voted by the progressive people of this city Tuesday with pluralities sufficient to end all argument with reference thereto.

The amendment which failed was the one providing for raising the salary of the street commissioner from \$25 to \$100 per month. There was some criticism as to the wording of this amendment which is believed to be responsible for its failure to carry, rather than any criticism of the present street commissioner, who is admittedly among the best this city has ever had.

The questions which this election raised have been settled in the good American way at the polls. And the citizens who are loyal to their town, proud of its achievements and of their American citizenship, will let the matter end there and work for the further progress of Sweetwater.

NEW INVENTIONS

WEST TEXAS' ROADS

A Christmas gift of more than 100 miles of all-weather covering is provided for the Bankhead Highway by the action recently of three West Texa counties which voted bonds for construction of hard surfaced roads along the designated route. Nolan County guaranteed the 100-mile stretch Saturday when its citizens adopted a \$600,000 bond issue. Taylor's \$350,000 contribution was authorized at the polls last Tuesday, and Callahan's \$200,000 share was voted a few weeks ago. To this total of \$1,500,000 will be added State and Federal funds sufficient to complete the best type of road for the Bankhead Highway which passes completely through these adjoining counties.

West Texas is thoroughly awake to the necessity of good roads and few opportunities to take advantage of State and Federal aid are being neglected. The rapid transformation of the Bankhead Highway into a continuous stretch of hard-surfaced permanent road is especially important to the interests of the great territory contiguous to its route between Fort Worth and the New Mexico line. West Texas' trade route lies to the east, and anything that contributes to the ease and certainty of transportation is an economic gain.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

MULE BECOMES A MOTHER

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 24.—Attention of the whole scientific world has been attracted to the A. & M. College of Texas by the act of a real East Texas mule foaling a colt from the mating of one of the college show stallions while under the observations of the animal husbandmen of the college. While claims have been made of such occurrences in other sections of the country, and in fact, the college mule was brought here for observation after her former owner had claimed maternal merit for her, yet veterinarians and geneticists have not generally accorded fertility to the hybrid known as the mule. The fact that this mule has foaled twice, once on a mating to a stallion and once from a mating to a jack, producing progeny three-fourths horse and one-fourth ass, and the first time three-fourths ass and one-fourth horse places her in a new class for study by veterinarians.

tion Tuesday. In a message to the City Commission some weeks ago, however, Mayor Joe H. Boothe recommended a tax rate of \$1.90 in the event the special election carried. Mayor Boothe left for Dallas Tuesday night, but indicated before he left that that rate he had recommended would be in all probability be the one that would be in force the coming year.

This rate, as apportioned among the various city expense accounts follows:
\$10,000 City Hall Bonds, tax rate .02
\$20,000 Street bonds, tax rate .04
\$25,000 Street bonds, tax rate .05
\$55,000 Sewer bonds, (in addition to revenues from the sewers) .05
\$320,000 Water Works bonds, and \$5,000 old waterworks bonds, tax rate .25
(Balance to be made up from revenues of water works)
\$35,000 Filtration Plant bonds (new) rate .07
Fire Department upkeep .20
Park fund (upkeep city park) .03
General Street fund .20
General fund, for all general expenses, salaries, stationery, fuel, light, and Board of City Development .59

Total on the \$100 valuation...\$1.90
Deficiency \$10,000

There is at the present time a deficiency in the general fund of \$10,000 which represents the difference between what the city took in under the old tax rate and what it paid out, with the surplus revenues from the water works shut off by injunction. The above rate will permit the city to become self sustaining without resorting to the use of funds from the water works, and according to Mayor Boothe it is not planned to use any money from the water works in the general fund, regardless of charter changes permitting this.

total tax rate of 30c from the rate in effect last year, which totaled \$1.60.

The \$1.60 was apportioned as follows:

Fire Department.....20c
Street Fund.....20c
1st \$95,000 Bonds.....20c
\$320,000 Water works bonds.....60c
General fund.....40c

By comparing the table above with the rates recommended by Mayor Boothe, there was a 60c tax levied on the \$320,000 water works bonds as compared with 25c levied this year and only 40c in the General Fund, the limit in the charter. The 40c rate did not pay the running expenses of the city, but surplus funds from the operation thereof were transferred to the general fund. Then there is a 7c increase made necessary by the voting of the filtration plant bonds and an additional levy of 3c for park purposes.
