



#### **Tracing Starter Troubles**

Before blaming the starting motor or witch when the starter refuses to operate and the battery is known to be in good shape and fully charged, or nearly so, examine all terminals carefully, taking them off, cleaning thoroughly with a file or sandpaper, and scraping the battery post clamps inside and out. Very often there is nothing wrong except dirty of corroded terminals, and cleaning will remove the trouble at once. Keep the battery posts and clamps clean and cov-ered with vaseline to prevent corrosion, and be especially careful about the ground connections, which in many cars collect dirt, and rust or corrode.
