Lack of Parental Care Contributed to Juvenile Delinquency, Nolan County Body Reports Say

CONDEMN SALE OF EXTRACTS

Merchants in Some Instances Lax Enforcing Law-Jail Reported in Bad Candition-No Heat

The use of flavoring extracts as intoxicating beverages, the tendency of witnesses in liquor cases to falsify and lack of parental care as a contributory factor in moral delinquency of children were scored in the report of the Grand Jury, filed with Judge W. P. Leslie Wednesday.

The County Jail was also reported to be in bad shape, with the heating plant out of commission, a leaky roof. and with windows not tightly fitting. so that prisoners are most uncomfortable.

100 witnesses were examined and 19 indictments returned, 3 misdemeanors and 16 felonies.

The report follows: Sweetwater, Texas, 10-31-23. Hon, W. P. Leshe, District Judge,

Sweetwater, Texas. We, the Grand Jury impaneled for

the October, 1923 term of District Court, beg to report as follows:

Having been in session for ten days and having made diligent and painstaking inquiry of all violatios of the law that have come to our notice, hav ing before us over 100 witnesses and having returned into court 19 indictments, 3 being misdemeanors and 16 felonies, and having finished our labors, we respectfully request that we be finally discharged. Also, we are glad to report that in our investigations we have usually found witnesses to be frank and trutrful except in a few liquor transactions in which there seems to be an alarming disposition port that we have found that many persons, some of whom are young boys have been able to purchase medicinal have been able to purchase medicinal preparations and playoring extracts, with a large per tent alcohol, which the state of the state o for medical and culinary purposes. We have made a thorough examina tion of the county jail, and find that it is kept in a clean and sanitary condition but find the heating plant to be out of commission and should be repaired and put into operation at the earliest possible moment, there being By The United Press. no way to protect the prisoners from the severe cold, the windows do not fit closely which makes it a very cold ploce. We also find that the roof to affidavits read today in the proceedthe fail is leaking in one place and recommend that it be repaired.

We wish to especially thank E. I. Hill our District Attorney and R. D. Cox, County Attorney, for their able assistance during our deliberations.

The sheriff's department, the city officials and other peace officers in the county have shown that they are their readiness in bringing before the grand jury information regarding violations of the law.

We wish to call the attention of the parents of the younger boys and girls of Sweetwater to their indifference and lack of parental care, which is contributing to the delinquency of some of the children. 'The result of this is nearly sure to bring sorrow to a number of families if such conditions continue to exist.

Local Wagonyards Filled Nearly Every Night With Transients Driven Out by Rain and Cold

SOME ARE DESTITUTE HERE

Man, Wife, Two Widows and 17 Children Arrive Penniless and With only Five Quilts in Party

Folks who are dissatisfied with what life has dealt them might find food for thought by visiting local wagon yards these days while the cotton pickers are enroute to their East and Central-Texas homes, driven out by the rains and cold weather.

Some nights as high as 100 persons park in the wagon yards, protecting themselves as best they can from the elements and in not a few cases there is real destitution.

One such instance came to light when a man, his wife, two widow ladies and 17 children came in to town one evening about dusk in two conveyances that were probably sold as flivvers many years ago. There were exactly five quilts in the entire party their gas tanks were empty-no grub and no money. Chief Johnson. after investigating the situation, rustled them some ham sandwiches, a pound of coffee and something to nake it in and other necessaries. A friendly truck driver who had rented himself a room, bedded down 11 of the children in his big truck for the night with his own bedding. According to advices received at the League of Nations headquarters, Amer Local merchants report interesting League control of these loans for finincreases in the sales of heavy under League control o fthese loans for finwear, overcoats, slickers, etc. as the ancial reconstruction of various Euro pean countries, and should the eventual international loan for the reconstruction of Germany call for some out side control of German finances, it is come to the League.

In the meantime, however, the Amer ican banking groups are steadily placing loans on guarantees negotiated solely by themselves. While these usually consist of the customs receipts or revenues from tobacco and other governmental monopolies, they also al most invariably carry with them big mining, railway, petroleum, forest or other concessions.

It is this passing into the hands of American financiers of the big industrial resources of Europe that Europe ans claim to view with alarm, more than the mere government guarantees that are given to cover loans.

It is precisely the nature of these concessions, they declare, that determine largely the sphere of influence of American banking houses in Europe

Control Utilities

For example, the \$150,000,000 loan of the Morgan group to Poland will, in addition to the usual guarantees of





110 DISASTERS IN YEAR **ENLIST RED CROSS AID**

Nearly \$400,000 Spent in United States - Greek Refugee Work Completed.

For its preparedness to render re lief through effective and generous aid to the sufferers from disaster the American Red Cross is universally regarded as the one organization from which response to appeal for help & immediate. In the last year, according to the annual report of the Red Cross, "its disaster relief operations were carried out in 110 localities in the United States. This work, with activities carried over from the previous year, required the expenditure is the United States of \$397,468.04 by the American Red Cross, its Chapters and Branches. In the emergency following the defeat of the Greek forces in Turkey and the burning of the city of Smyrna, which entailed the relief of mearly 900,000 men, wemen and children, Red Cress National Head quarters expended \$2,605,696.09. The food distributed in Greece aggregated 25,000 tons; garments, 809,000; blankets, 48,550; new shoes, 5,000 pairs; medical, hospital and sanitary supplies, 204 tons. In the feeding of the refugees there was listed upwards of \$2,000 children under three years of

The disasters in the United State during the past year reported 240 per sons killed, 991 injured, 12,691 rendered homeless. The total property less was estimated at \$20,710,000.

Relief of suffering caused by disas ters of such magnitude as to overwhelm the resources of the communities in which they occur is fundamental to the charter of the American Red Cross. In addition to making appropriations from its treasury and assigning trained personnel to relief work, the Red Cross in disaster centralizes and makes more effective relief funds and supplies contributed by the country at large.

Since 1881 the Red Cross has administered more than \$20,000,000 for the single purpose of disaster relief That it may continue to accept the responsibilities which grave emergencies place upon the American Red Cross appeal is made for a nationwide renewal of membership during the annual roll call, which opens on Armistice Day, November 11, and closes on Thanksgiving Day, November 29.

Life Saving Work Of Red Cross Corps Wars on Drownings

The insignia of the American Red Cross Life Saving Corps on the bathing apparel of men, women and youths is seen everywhere at favorite ers, lakes and ponds. In its unrelenting campaign to reduce loss of life by drowning the Red Cross is making constant headway. The demands for instruction from organizations in all parts of the country were so numerous the past year that it was neces sary to more than double the staff of Red Cross instructors. This work of training for water life-saving showed an enrollment of over 30,000 volun teers enlisted for duty on patrol, for rescue and resuscitation, all compe tent to instruct others in the standard water-safety methods. The Red Cross by request of the War Department gives water first aid training at the United States Military and Naval academies and in the military training camps for reserve officers and civil ians. The four cash prizes awarded by the Red Cross last year for heroic rescues were conferred upon two girls a boy and a man, indicating that the youths of the country stand well at the top in conserving life along our




