District Judge Makes Injunction Against Oil And Gas Commission Permanent

DECISION ON OIL SUITS

Ruling of Commission Relative to Drilling Next to Property Lines . Nullified by Court Action

AUSTIN, Nov. 1.—District Judge Calhoun today held unconstitutional Rule 37 of the Oil and Gas Commission of the State Railroad Commission relative to drilling oil wells alongside

property lines. Under the Court's ruling, the Com mission is powerless if enforce its ruling relative to the drilling of wells ad-

jacent to property lines. In its opinion, the court held that the Commission could enforce legislation but could not enact it. The decis ion was rendered on the suit of J. C. Bass and others in the Navarre County






