## RECEIVERS WILL PAY ALL CLAIMS

Receivers of Estate Late Thomas Trammell Have Funds Sufficient For Second Dividend

## ESTATE FINALLY LIQUIDATED

Henry James and W. H. Fitzgerald Make Final Accounting to Judge W. P. Leslie District Court

The estate of Thomas Trammell has been finally closed and a fifty per cent dividend is available to all with claims against the estate, according to a final report made to Judge W. P. Leslie by the receivers, Henry James of Abilene and W. H. Fitzgerald of Sweetwater.

In connection with the closing of the estate, Judge Leslie issued the following statement:

In the District Court of Nolan County, Texas, October Term, A. D. 1923.

In the matter of closing the estate of Thos. Trammell & Company the undersigned desires to hereby express his appreciation and sincere thanks to the Receivers therein, to-wit: Messrs. Henry James of Abilene, Texas and W. H. Fitzgerald of Sweetwater, Texas for their patient and efficient work as such in converting said estate into cash and distributing the same to those entitled to it. This matter has been pending since about May 21, 1917 but not until this date have the assets of said estate been sufficiently reduced to cash to enable said Receivers to pay the same to the creditors entitled to it. A dividend of fifty per cent has heretofore been distributed to the various creditors and we are pleased to state that said Receivers are now in a position to pay another fifty per cent dividend on said claims. This is very gratifying indeed and we trust that those who are yet entitled to this balance will at once apply for the same although it is the purpose of said Receivers to make the same to them with out delay.

## BUY BIG INCUBATOR

## WOMAN IS INSANE

Murder Duan Chapel May Never Be Solved as His Invald Wife is Taken to Asylum

His wife, Millie Chapel, who sat by him while he was clubbed to death was sent to the state insane asylum today at Rochester. A commission pronounced her insane.

Her son, Guy, who returned home three hours after his father had been murdered, was released last night after he had been cleared.

By express, freight, and parcel post choice viands are arriving here. The states are vying with one another in furnishing the most prized products.

Among the turkeys is one from Dan McCull, a boyhood friend of Plymouth Notch, Vermont. The big bird will be flanked by choicest hams from old Virginia, pecans from Georgia, celery from Salt Lake City, apples from Oregon, potatoes from Idaho and the end is not yet in sight.

## ARREST TWO MEN

New York Police Believe They Have Men Responsible for Murder Two Bank Messengers

By The United Press. NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Police today believed that they had in custody at least two men who killed two bank messengers and robbed them of \$43,607 at the entrance to an Elevated Station Nov. 14.

Charges of murder were filed against Barlow M. Diamond and his brother Joseph at 1:30 a. m. this morning after they had been questioned for 12 hours in the office of District Attorney Dodd of Kings County.

Joseph Diamond surrendered in New York yesterday after his brother had been arrested in Cleveland Sunday and brought back here.

An unknown witness of the shooting identified Diamond as the man who shot W. S. Barlow, one of the messengers. The witness was taken before a group of 25 men and unhesitatingly placed his finger on the chest of Diamond, saying "That's the man."

## BABY DIES

Spinal Meningitis Claims Year Old Son Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Sartain

David Keith, one year old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Sartain died this morning at 4:20 o'clock at the family residence on Walnut Street (after an illness of ten days with meningitis).

Funeral services were held at the home at 4 o'clock by Rev. Vaughn and interment was made in the City Cemetery. The floral offerings sent by sympathetic friends were numerous and beautiful.

## O-BAR-O TO GO

Another Famous Ranch Passes Into History in Kent

CLAIREMONT, Nov. 27.—Another great ranch has passed into history. The O Bar O, familiar to cattlemen throughout West Texas, has at last succumbed to the encroachments of farm interests as they move ever westward.

The O Bar O ranch is located in Kent county and is comprised of around 135,000 acres, one of the largest ranches within a radius of several counties of Kent. It is the last of the larger blocks of land in that section and much of it is considered as the most fertile in the entire county.

Then ranch was sold by its present owner, N. V. Bilby, to Fort Worth interests, according to the report reaching here. The new owners plan to cut the land into smaller blocks and dispose of it to immigrant farmers. It is planned to induce four hundred families to move to Kent within the next twelve months and take charge of the smaller blocks.

## WHIP MINISTER COTON REACHES AS SERMON ENDS NEW HIGH MARK

Three Men Seize Rev. Thos. Hibbon at Close of Sermon in Delta Missionary Church Nashville

## ALLEGED PERSONAL REMARKS

One of Two Men Arrested Claimed Minister Made Remarks About His Wife During Sermon

By The United Press. NASHVILLE, Nov. 27.—As Rev. Thos. Hibbon, a missionary, finished his sermon at the Delta St. Mission last night, he was seized by three men, taken from the building and severely whipped.

One of the whippers said that remarks in Rev. Hibbon's sermon on "Sin" were directed at his wife. Two of the alleged whippers have been arrested while the third is being sought. One of those arrested is declared to have admitted his guilt.

Rev. Hibbon in a statement to the police, denied that any of his remarks were aimed at any particular person and said that he did not know the woman he was accused of insulting.

"I was merely arraigning sin as I saw it," he said.

Curtailment of freight service was attempted by the Katy some months ago, and Rotan business firms began getting their supplies by truck from Sweetwater. This immediately brought a solicitation from the Katy and the express company operating into this place. There is no desire of our people to start a boycott, they only want a reasonable service, and failing to get such service from one transportation system they naturally will try to find a better one.

## TO INVESTIGATE

Explosion Causing Death Two Miners And Injuries 13 Others To Be Thoroughly Probed

ORIENT, Nov. 27.—Investigation of the explosion which cost two lives and injured 13 miners in the No. 1 mine of the Chicago, Wilmington and Franklin Coal Co. here yesterday was started by Martin Bolt, State Director of Mines and Minerals.

The blast which drove 900 miners gasping for breath to the surface shortly after the shift opened was still unexplained. The 13 miners burned are also suffering from inhaling smoke but are not considered critically injured.

**HEALTHY LUNGS.**

Healthy lungs simply mean lungs that are unimpaired by disease germs and respond to the free elastic movements of the chest, ribs, intercostal muscles and the diaphragm in the process of breathing.

Strictly speaking, there are no healthy lungs. All are more or less impaired, through invading dust, inhaling smoke and disease during childhood. Germs and microbes of many kinds gain entrance to the lungs by mouth breathing.

The bronchi and trachea have air-like processes on the mucous membrane of their walls which do their best to expel minute foreign bodies and microbes from entering the lungs. But in spite of all ef-

orts, these germs go in and cause such diseases as influenza, bronchitis, pneumonia or tuberculosis.

The lungs in a pure healthy condition are a pearly white. Eskimos have the nearest approach to such lungs. The lungs of the city dweller are gray. The coal miners' lungs are much darker, sometimes nearly approaching black.

This does not mean that almost everybody has diseased lungs. The great majority are in fairly good condition, due principally to the fact that the lungs are great in recuperative powers. In fact they are almost as good in this respect as the overused and much-abused heart.

To help your lungs in the fight against germs and disease you must at all times carefully observe the correct rules of respiratory health. The chest will not work in first-class condition if bent out of shape and restricted through improper posture, in its muscular movement. By keeping up your gymnastics and deep breathing exercises you can aid your lungs to healthy old age.

Remember that the lungs are a great aid to the heart in keeping up a good blood circulation. Well-developed lungs, combined with good breathing exercises, are a wonderful aid to your heart in its work for a long life.

**WASHINGTON GOSSIP**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—The sun shines in the capital again! The White House social calendar has been made up, dispersing the clouds of doubt concerning the "official" functions for the coming winter.

Beginning with a "Cabinet dinner" on Dec. 6, President and Mrs. Coolidge will stage the full list of formal White House affairs during the "season."

Following the cabinet dinner will come the diplomatic reception on Dec. 13; Diplomatic dinner, Dec. 20; Judicial reception, Jan. 10; Supreme Court dinner, Jan. 24; Congressional reception, Feb. 7; Speakers' dinner, Feb. 21 and the army and navy reception, Feb. 28.

There will also be a sort of "open house" reception on New Year's Day, from 11 to 1:30.

Attorney General Daugherty has been so constantly pictured as about to resign from the cabinet on account of ill-health that he might readily be identified by the simple reference "the sick man of the cabinet."
