It's quite a testimony to the Texas native that he currently holds virtually all of the team pitching records for the Angels, and most of them for the Houston Astros. 247-2788. He currently holds the career strikeout record for both teams.

Now, at the tender age of 42, Ryan joined the Texas Rangers' team, and immediately began his assault on the Rangers' club records. Already he has broken the club's single-game strikeout record at 15, and in last Tuesday's game he also broke the single-season strikeout record for Texas. He also has had 13 games this season with ten or more strikeouts, and that's the most ever by a Texas Ranger pitcher.

I guess what attracts fans like myself to Ryan is the fact that he's almost in our age bracket--being an "old man playing a boy's game"--and beating the boys.

The aspect of his strikeout achievement that we find the most interesting is the number of fatherson combinations that Ryan has struck out. These include the Ken Griffeys, Bobby and Barry Bonds, the Sandy Alomars, the Dick Schofields, Maury and Bump Wills and Tito and Terry Francona.

The Ranger ace struck out Kansas City's Bo Jackson, one of the young "rising stars" of baseball, the first three times he faced him. Jackson is about half Ryan's age.

In fact, every time Ryan takes the mound, he faces a lineup full of young, muscular guys averaging in their 20s. You'd almost think that Ryan needs a handicap, but when you hear the opposing players talk, they don't think so.

The biggest drawback comes from the fact that even with his amazing accomplishments, Ryan has for the biggest part of his career pitched for teams that weren't exactly world-beaters, so he doesn't have a great won-loss record.

For example, most of the really great pitchers have won at least 300 games, and Ryan would have to pitch at age 43 to achieve this plateau.

He even lost the game in which he struck out batter number 5,000 due to the fact that the Rangers couldn't get him any runs. Ryan struck out 13 batters and allowed only one earned run in that one.

He holds over 40 major league records, a mind-boggling number. Here are a few:



> Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$2,757 per student, as compared to \$2,775 in Friona ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 14.6 students in Friona ISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 17.1 to one. Because of the existence of small classes, 20 after a lengthy illness. especially at the high school level, abbreviated schedules, many other classes have more than the average number of Mr. and Mrs. P.M. with a declining tax base, school trustees in most districts have raised tax rates. The average school district imposed a property tax at the rate of 91.2 cents per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 96.5% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was 88.1 cents (91.2 times 96.52%) statewide.

Locally, the Friona ISD imposed a rate of 77 cents while property was appraised at 93.0% of its market value making the true rate 71.6 cents per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value enables a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools. In 1988, the true tax rate exceeded \$1 in 336 school districts Ivy, 0.50 ac. tract out of the NE 1/4 in Texas.

> The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Friona ISD would have been \$510. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$472, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in this district would have averaged \$395, or less if subject to a tax freeze. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$723, \$638 and \$544 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year, Friona ISD's revenue from the property tax increased by stage? 3.7% for 1988-89 as compared to a 6.8% increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid was \$3,167 per student in Friona ISD as compared to \$3,211 statewide. The primary purpose of most appreciative manner? state aid is to equalize state and local tax resources among schools. In 1988-89 tax resources ranged from less than \$2,500 per student in 12 districts to more than \$10,000 in five districts.







The grid coach said that over 70 boys have been taking part in the workouts, and he was expecting to get a few more, particularly in the younger groups, when school starts Monday.



Grant To Benefit Women

Panhandle Community Services in Amarillo has been awarded a grant that could benefit women who are single heads of household with dependent children in the Texas Panhandle, concentrating in nine counties.

The objective of the grant establishing the "Demonstration Partnership Program" is to stimulate Community Action Agencies to develop new ideas for decreasing the dependency of economically disadvantaged on welfare programs, or persons who qualify by Department of Health and Human Service income guidelines. Targeted goals are to take low income, single heads of households and provide short-term training in non-traditional occupations. Participants will then be placed in employment.

N.E.W. equals S, the project's symbolized "Nonname, traditional Employment for Women equals Self-Sufficiency." Some non-traditional jobs could include police officer, correctional officer, truck driving, auto body repair, etc. Non-traditional fields were chosen because they usually pay higher than normal wages and provide a more open field of training than typically received in "female" professions.

According to Karen Zinser, program coordinator, "We are finding new positions everyday in the non-traditional fields. It is a new project that we feel can really benefit single heads of households to be able to become selfsupporting." The program is limited to 55 qualified participants who must be tested on vocational and motivational basis.

Selected applicants will be those who are the most motivated, trainable and employable according to testing, regardless of skills and education. In addition, Panhandle Community Services will draw upon every available resource under the agency umbrella for support and counseling.

Resource funds are available for GED or ABE if needed and will have supportive services during training. Options of the program are on-the-job training, classroom training and referral and placement.

The program is a one-year pilot project with the potential to serve as a model pilot project throughout the nation.

The application process will be through Panhandle Community Services office in Amarillo. For more information, applicants may call between 8:15 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. Monday through Friday, 372-2531, ext. 48, or come by 1605 W. 7th in Amarillo.
