### PEOPLE VISITING **NATIONAL PARKS**

Uncle Sam Broke All Records as Entertainer Past Season, Records Kept at Parks Show

COLORADO LED THE LIST

Rocky Mountain National Park First i Attendance With Yellowstone Park Second

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 .- Uncle Sam broke his own records as an entertainer during the past summer. Nearly one and one-half million persons visited his national parks and monuments according to the annual report of the Director of the National Park Service to the Secretary of the Interior. The exact total was 1,493,712, of whom 1. 280,856 went to the parks and 212,- Republican Speaker Gillette is Elect-\$26 to the monuments.

Among the nineteen national parks, the Rocky Mountain park in Colorado, was the most generously attended. Visitors there numbered 218,000, against 138,352 at Yellowstone,

There is a traditional rivalry for attendance between Yosemite and Yeilow stone, in which Yellowstone has this year taken the honors. Yosemite stood third among the parks with attendance of 130,046. Next in point of popularity were Mount Rainier park. in Washington, with 123,078 visitors; Platt park in Oklahoma, with 117,710; Hot Springs park in Arkansas, with 112,000; and the Grand Canyon in Arizona, with 102,166.

The least frequented of all the parks in the system was the Mount McKinley National Park, in Alaska, to which only thirty-four people found their

Among the national monuments, the Muir Woods near San Francisco, was the most popular 91,235 going there during the season. WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 .- Representative Gillete today was elected Speaker of the House of Representatives on the first ballot, the ninth to be taken since balloting began Monday. This ended the two-day deadlock and at the same time means liberalization of the house rules.

Representative Nelson this morning read a statement covering the proposals made late yesterday. The proposals provided that a full opportunity for debate and an amendment to house rules be provided after thirty days. During this period the rules prevailing in the last House will be in effect. Governor of Sao Paulo, Province of Brazil Likely Candidate for President at Next Election

> BUILDING ROADS

Is Making Exceptionally Progressive Governor For The State-Enacts Many Improvements

SAO PAULO, Brazil, Dec. 5 .- A 'near-Yankee" governor is boasted by this State, the world's foremost coffeeproducing district.

Dr. Washington Luis, chief executive of Sao Paulo and a likely successor for the Presidency of Brazil at the end of the present Federal Administration in 1926 not only has for 'his Christian name the surname of the Application For Charter Building And first American President, but through the progress of the State so far during his Administration is popularly known as the "Yankee Statesman of Brazil."

> No other name is more closely connected with the good roads movement in Brazil, particularly progressive in the State of Sao Paulo, than that of Washington Luis. The Governor was studying good roads for a considerable length of time before he became the State chief executive in 1920. He was the first to introduce the highway ques tion into the administration platform,

> As Mayor of the City of Sao Palo and president at the same time of the Permanent Good Roads Association, Washington Luis was able to arous interest in the State toward securing satisfactory roads. He began the good paying campaign in this city and subed as the basis for construction of roads throughout the State. Today nearly all the State is linked by ample and excelent roads.

> The building of these roads had already started when he became Goverfirst year of office, to complete and excellent highway, about 150 miles and Campinas, an important town of 200,000 inhabitants. This road has portant industrial town of Ribeirao Preto. It meaures about 217 miles in length so far,

> About 620 miles of highways have been built, penetrating in all directions from this city. One of the most impor tant of these is the Sao Paulo-Rio de Janeiro road which has been built so far to a distance of 66 miles. Another excellent highway now links this city with Santos, the world's greatest coffee export port a distance of 38 miles. A good roads congress held here re-

cently marked an expressive victory for Governor Washington Luis, its principal organizer. In connection with this congress the first automobile show in Brazil was held, at which all the latest models of leading American makes of automobiles and trucks were exhibited.


