The Baptists and Methodists trace their beginning to the year 1914, which was three years before the United States entered World War I, and the Congregationalists were organized locally in 1908, when the city itself was still in its "infancy."

These churches, along with all of the other local congregations that we have not mentioned, have been a vital part of the growth and development of the Friona area. 

Police Report

MONTH OF AUGUST, 1989

The Friona Police Department received 226 calls during the month of August, 1989.

Twenty-nine citations were issued. Fifteen arrests were made: five were held for extradition of America; one out-of-state warrant; one out-of-town warrant; one assault; two for public intoxication; two for trespass; one disorderly and criminal mischief; one hindering secure creditor; and one failure to appear.

Fifteen man nights were spent in jail.

Twenty-three offenses were reported: one sex offense; one child abuse; one runaway; one criminal trespass; one hindering secured creditor; one dog bite; four criminal mischief; five burglaries; two assaults; and six thefts.

Twenty-two vacation requests were made and 100 security checks. There were two accidents investigated with no injuries. All units of the Police Department drove a total of 6,403.2 miles, using 551.1 gallons of fuel.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 102 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the salary of members of the legislature to onefourth of the Governor's salary and increase the salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives to one-half of the Governor's salary. The annual salary of members of the legislature, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives is currently \$7,200. Under this provision, the annual salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker would be \$46,716, and the annual salary of members of the legislature would be \$23,358, based on the Governor's current annual salary of \$93,432. The increase for the Speaker and the members of the legislature would take effect when the legislature convenes for its regular session in January 1991. The increase for the Lieutenant Governor would take effect when the term of that office begins in 1991. The salary increase for the Lieutenant Governor would not make members of the legislature ineligible to run for the office of Lieutenant Governor.

If the office of county surveyor is abolished in any of these counties, the powers, duties, and functions of the office are transferred to a county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court of the county in which the office is abolished.

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county surveyor in Cass. Ector, Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris, and Webb Counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 21 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 74 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to enact laws authorizing the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to provide for, issue, and sell an additional \$75 million in general obligation bonds as college savings bonds. The form, terms, and denominations of the bonds would be prescribed by law. The interest rate and installments would be prescribed by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor. The maximum net effective interest rate would be set by law. Proceeds from the sale of the bonds would be credited to the Texas opportunity plan fund, which is used to make loans to students to attend institutions of higher education in Texas. The bonds and interest on the bonds would be payable from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not already appropriated by the constitution, less the amount remaining in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.
