Preliminary Plans For Crusade Against Disease Carried to School by Doctor J. E. Steele

WARNS AGAINST TYPHOID

NUMBER 68

Twenty Thousand Die Annually From Dreaded Disease-Typhoid Reflection Sanitary Intelligence

Dr. J. E. Steele, of the Public Health Department at Austin, who has been in this city several days consulting, with City Health Officer A: H. Fortner concerning local sanitary conditions, returned to Austin Friday

While here Dr. Steel investigated local health conditions thoroughly and with Dr. Fortner, laid preliminary plans for a concerted drive on all diseases, particularly typhoid fever.

Several specimen of milk and water taken from local dairies, were sent oon as these specimens are returned Dr. Fortner will be in a position to scientifically combat the dreaded typhoid germ.


Dr. Steele Friday visited each of the ward schools and the high school where pupils, following an address on health conditions, stood and pledged the fullest co-operation. Dr. Steele aid in part:


"Typhoid fever is a preventable disase; yet it is responsible in the United States alone for 200,000 cases of sickness and 20,000 deaths. For the year 1923 Texas had 900 deaths alone, mortality of typhoid fever ranges from 5 to 35 per cent in a verulant form, averaging for the last 10 years. about 10 per cent, or one death out ARRESTED of ten cases-causing death of 900 persons in Texas last year.

Senator Wheeler Makes Personal Bond of \$1,000 on Charge Illegally Accepting Retainer Fee







Smith's Bible Dictionary says that the occurrance of this word is chiefly noticeable as an example of the want of consistency in the translations. In the earlier English version "Easter" had been frequently used as the translation of "Pasca." At the last revision "Passover" was substituted in all passages by this.

"Easter" is from Ostara" and not from "Pasca" and signifies "Goddess of the Morning Light, or of the return of the sun and the spring time." Of the word "Easter" Webster "Originally a festival in honor says: of the Goddess of Spring." So far as many of the churches are now concerned, "Easter" is a festival observed annually in commoration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. If "Easter" originally was observed in honor of the Goddess of Spring and of the return of the sun in the spring, why not observe the day now, for the same reason contrary with the original? In fact we find no reason in all the Bible for professed Christians to observe the Lord's resurrection at all.



AN ORDINANCE Prohibiting, within certain territory. the use of privies, cess pools, closets, or other things used for the disposal of sewrage matter when not connected with the sanitary sewerage sys em of the City o Swefetwater, and requiring the same to be removed or abated

Requiring property owners to con nect such privies, cess pools, closets or other things used for the disposal of sewrage matter with the said sewrage system, fixing charges for service, and fixing penalties for violation of this ordinance and fixing fees. Be it ordained by the Commission of the City of Sweetwater: That Orlinance No. 51 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Sweetwater, l'exas, adopted and passed on the 15th day of December, 1915, be and the ame is hereby amended as follows to-wit

(1). It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm, association or corporation owning property within 200 feet of any line of sewerage within and belonging to said City of Sweetwater, to construct, use or maintain, or permit to be constructed, used or maintained on or about their said property, any privy, cess pool, water closet, urinal, slop sink, slop drain, bath tub, or waist drain from a laundry or livery stable or wagon yard, or any other apparatus, appliance or thing of whatever kind used or to be used for the purpose of receiving or removing sewrage matter or slop of any kind, unless the same shall be connected with the Sanitary Sewerage System of the City of Sweetwater, if uch connection is reasonably practi-

(2). All privies, privy pits, closets, ess pools and all other things used for the disposal of sewerage matter, f not already connected with the Sewer System of the City of Sweetwater and if within a distance of 200 feet of Sweetwater's sewer line, and if reasonably practical, must be connected with said sewer line, or the ame shall be removed or abated. (3). All persons, firms, associations or corporations owning property within the limits of the City of Sweet-water and within a distance of 200 feet of any of Sweetwater's sewer lines, shall be and they are hereby required to connect any and all privies. cess pools, water closets, urinal basins, slop sinks, slop drains, bath tubs or waste drains with one of said sewer lines; and if any of said parties owning improved property within 200 feet of one of said sewer lines shall fail or refuse to make such connections, the City of Sweetwater shall have the right to make such connections and charge the costs of same, inluding labor and material necessarily sed, as well as any other necessary es therewith against such own er, who shall be personally liable for the payment thereof, and the City of Sweetwater shall be entitled to fix a lien against said property of such owner to secure the payment of such sta of installing or making such connections. (4). It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to install or cause to be installed any plumbing fixtures upon their premises in connection with any cess pool, privy, toilet, urinal basin, slop sink, slop drain, or bath tub, without having such installation inspected and approved by the plumbing inspector. (5). Hereafter, the following monthly charges are hereby fixed, and are to be paid by all user's of Sweetwater's Sewer System, in advance, on the first day of each and every month. viz. For all fixtures, a charge of seventy-five cents per month shall be made for the first fixtures, and for each additional fixture, a charge of twenty-five cents per month shall be made to and including twenty fixtures, and for all fixtures above twenty in number, a charge of twenty cents per month shall be charged and the plumbing inspector shall be entitled to and receive, as fees, one dollar for the first fixture, and fifty cents for each additional fixture for inspecting the installation of any work mentioned in paragraph No 4 above; and shall receive the sum of five dollars for the installation of any and all connections with said sewer system. (6). A fixture, within the meaning of this ordinance, is any single opening, such as closet, sink, urinal, toilet, or other thing used to drain sewerage into the shid sewer line. (7). Any person, firm, association, or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars ofense, andf each and every day that any personfi firm, association or corporation shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall constitute and be a separate offense. 


