THE ENTIRE NATION has watched spellbound this week as the television networks have reported on the devastating earthquake that struck the Bay Area of California.

It has been of particular interest to those of us who had lived in that area. Carol and I lived for a couple of years in the San Francisco area shortly after we were married.

Many of the scenes that we have watched this week on the TV reports have been very familiar.

Ye editor began his newspaper career as a sports reporter for the San Mateo Times. San Mateo is the city and county just to the south of San Francisco, on the Peninsula.

As a young reporter, one of my volunteered tasks was attending the games of the San Francisco Giants, the 49ers, and the (then brand new) Oakland Raiders. It was a tough assignment, but someone had to do it.

We made the comment this week that if we had remained in Northern California, and had not become homesick for our area of Texas (which we did), then ye editor would most likely have been among those in the press box on Tuesday evening at Candlestick Park, awaiting the third game of the World Series.

We had had the opportunity of seeing a number of the Giants' games at Candlestick Park in 1960 and 1961. The summer of 1960 was the park's first year to be open for baseball, so we recall it as a brand new facility.

In fact, this old country boy covered the 1961 Major League All-Star Game for his newspaper, and watched the likes of Willie Mays, Stan Musial, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris perform on a windy day at "The Stick."

A lot has been written and said about Candlestick Park in the years since it opened. Most critics assail the fact that its location is bad because of the winds which often blow in from the ocean. At the 1961 all-star game, for example, Giants' pitcher Stu Miller, a small player, was blown off the mound by a gust of wind. This may sound strange, but it's recorded in the game story, and this reporter was a witness.

It is very sad that some of the old Victorian homes, and other buildings which had survived the San Francisco Earthquake of 1906 were destroyed in this week quake.

But it also is quite a testimony to the planning by the city that the new buildings, which have been constructed since the Ellises lived in the Bay area, stood the test.

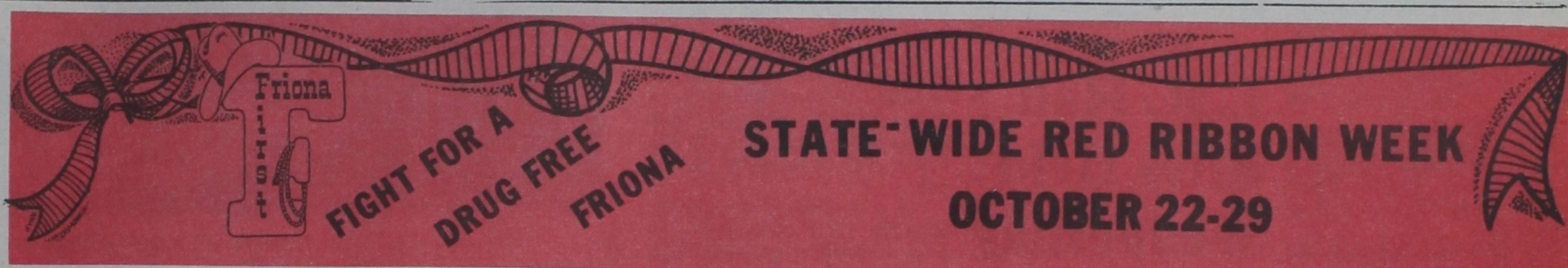
Can you imagine how frightening it must have been, especially for those folks from Oakland, who had to find an alternate route back to their homes Tuesday, after the Bay Bridge had to be closed due to the damage?

To have had their main route already damaged, and travelling in the dark on an alternate route must have been a terrifying experience. I think most of those people used the Golden Gate Bridge, which turned out not to be hurt by the earthquake.

We had been across the Bay Bridge on a number of occasions, and just crossing one of those bridges on normal occasions was enough excitement for a flatlander from the Panhandle of Texas.

Going into San Francisco from San Mateo, you had to watch carefully for the right exit, and if you missed the last one, you would find yourself on the bridge to Oakland. This happened to ye editor on one occasion. Nothing to do but cross the bridge, find a place to turn around, pay your toll, and come back across.

We're glad for our memories that we have of the Bay Area, and are heartened by the attitudes of those who live there, who vow to overcome this latest tragedy, and we know they will.

Red-Ribbon Observance Is Anti-Drugs

The Friona Schools, businesses and members of the community plan to participate this next week in a drug-awareness program which is to be observed all over Texas during the week of October 22-29.

The schools are planning to have various activities during the week.

In addition, the Friona Noon Lions will put out the American Flags on Monday as a kickoff for the week. Special red ribbons are to be attached to the flags.

On Monday, October 23, the pre-kindergarten through eighth grade students will take part in a "Join Me--I'm Drug Free" program. High School students will be given brochures encouraging the students to remain drug-free, and they also will be given wallet cards with the drug hotline telephone number.

Then on Thursday, October 26, the reigning Miss New Mexico, Angela DeLosSantos, will speak at an assembly at Friona High School at 2 p.m. and at the junior high at 3 p.m.

Miss DeLosSantos will also be feted at a reception sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce from 4-5 p.m. at Friona State Bank's Community Room.

On Friday, October 27 at 12:15, grades pre-kindergarten through the eighth grade will participate in a red balloon release on the playground west of the grade school complex.

The Student-Faculty Congress at Friona High School is expected to have some sort of special emphasis for the week, but their plans were not definite at the Star's press time this week.

Businesses have been contacted and urged to participate in some way. Some are considering holding "Red Ribbon" sales.

In addition, the Parent-Teachers Assn is planning a program, which will feature Mike Whitecotton, speaking on "Parenting for Prevention" and DPS Patrolman Trey Ellis giving an update on the drug problem in Friona. Date and time of this meeting had not been set at the time of this writing.

Band Competes In UIL Marching Sat.

All of the high school bands in the Texas Panhandle area are making final preparations for the annual UIL Marching Contest to be held in the Borger Stadium October 21 from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. A charge of \$1.00 each will be charged to defray the contest expense.

Competing in class AAA will be bands from Canyon, Tulia, Dalhart, Friona, River Road, Sanford-Fritch, Dimmitt and Perryton. The Chieftain Marching

Band is scheduled to perform in competition at 4:18 p.m.

The FHS twirlers will compete between 3:30 and 4 p.m.

This is the only UIL competition for marching bands at the district level. Two bands from each class will be selected to compete on the area level scheduled for Wichita Fall Stadium, November 4.

At the area level, the three districts represented will then select two bands from each class to compete at the State Contest in Austin, November 13.

The presentation in Borger is one of the most exciting displays of high school marching bands in the fall semester. Each will be at their best for the judges and consequently, for the audience.

Judges for the competition were selected from a list of qualified professionals by the District I directors. They are: Mr. Phil Anthony, Coronado High School, Lubbock; Mr. Dan Norris, Frenship High School, Lubbock; and Mr. O.T. Ryan, Plainview High School. The Twirling Contest will be held during the day, also. Chris Jones of Lubbock will judge the twirling entries.

Parents are invited to come to see the best band kids on earth do their marching routines. It will be the greatest show in the area on October 21.

Alesia Tucker Wins Weekly Grid Event

A total of 20 contestants had scores of 14 for the week; another 25 correctly picked 13 of the contest games, and 19 more had scores of 12.

In the race for grand prize, Koby Rogers moved into first place with a score of 81. Rick Carr is next at 80. Patricia Carr, Charlie Morgan, Tommy Moss and Ron Smiley are next at 79.

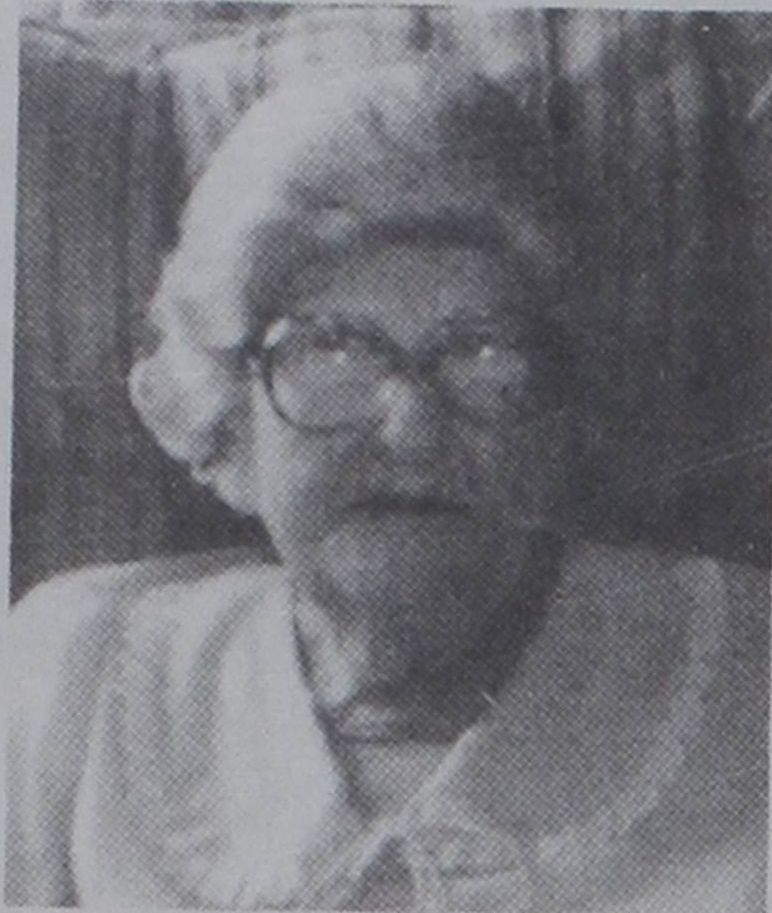

That perhaps if you could put a little ad in your paper, she might

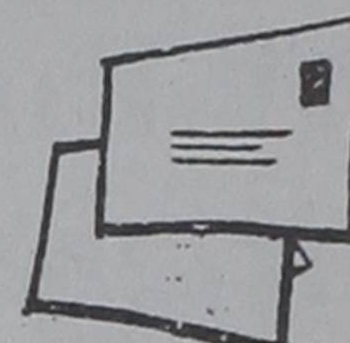
see it and respond. It's been 40 years. I will be happy to send you a check for the ad.

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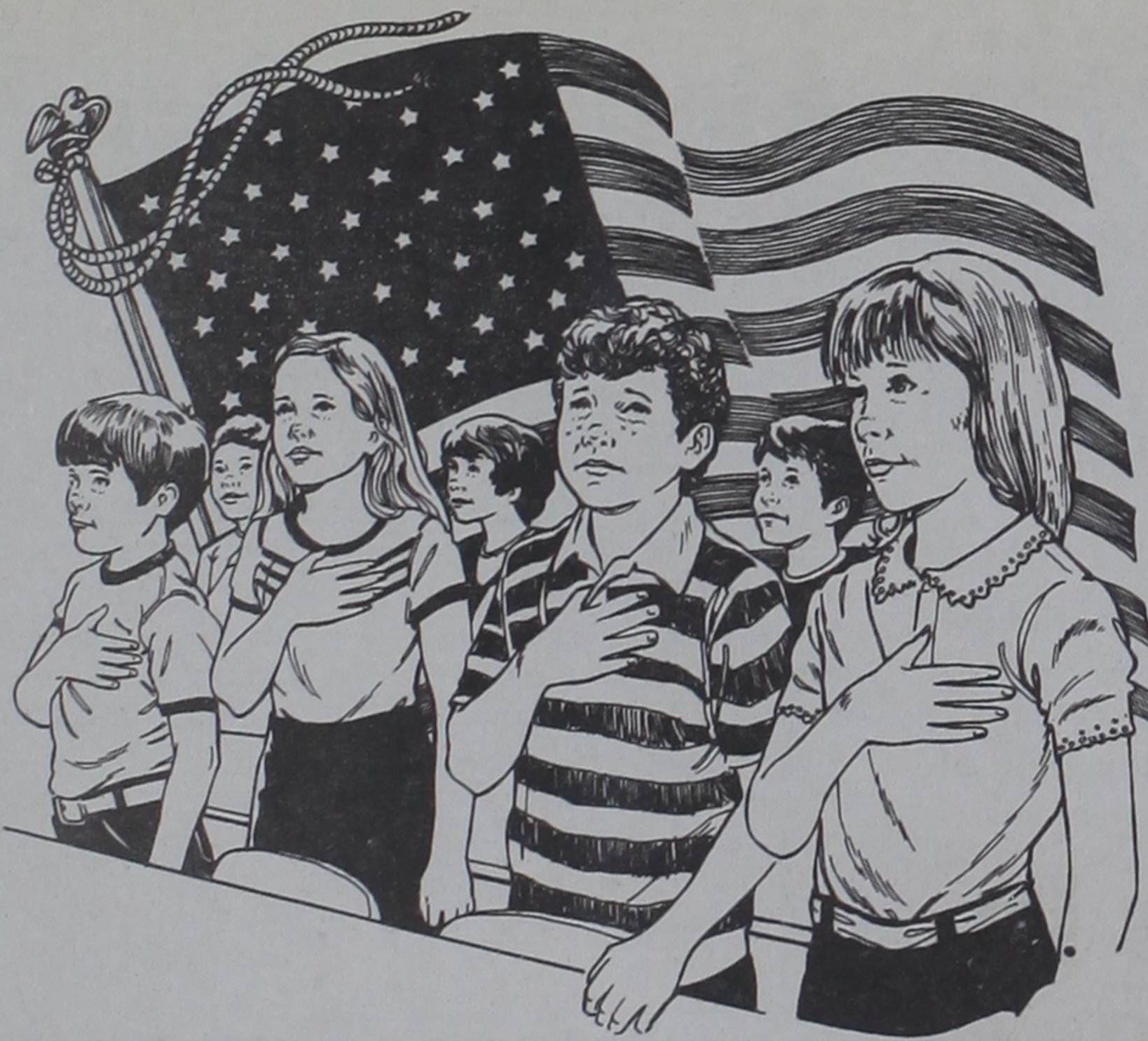

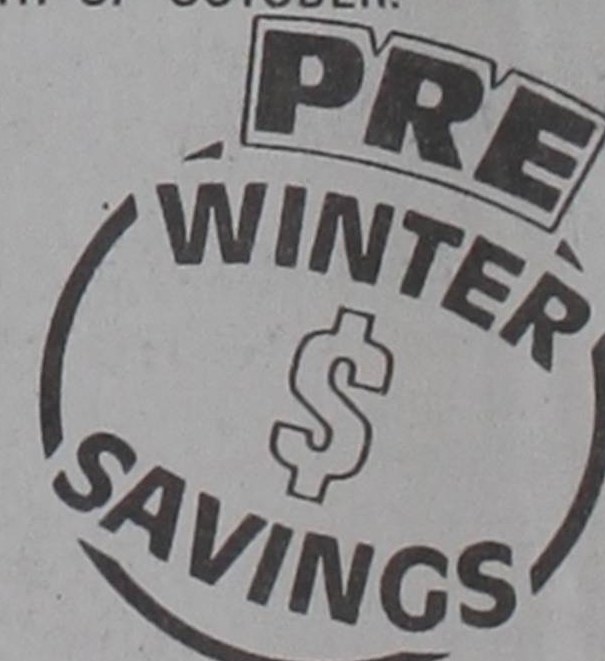

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

60 YEARS AGO--OCT. 4, 1929

Judge I.R. Kelso, of St. Louis, president of the Texas Utilities Company, and J.B. Scott of Plainview, general manager of the company, were business visitors here one day last week. The chief object of the visit was that they might inform the people of Friona who are patrons of the company that another rate cut had been made to users of light for domestic purposes.

A deal was consummated here the latter part of last week whereby W.F. Bays of Vaughn, New Mexico, becomes the proprietor of the Friona Motor Company, having purchased the entire interest of J.H. Elder in these two promising business concerns.

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1934

The city's new well has been completed at a depth of 192 feet with 55 feet of water in it and the new pump has been received and installed. The well has been tested out and found to throw a stream of clear water, from an apparently unfailing supply.

The West Texas Gas Company, which serves Friona with natural gas for fuel, has arranged a new schedule which is estimated to be quite a savings for its patrons over the rate that has been in effect here and still is for that matter, since the acceptance of the new rate is optional with the patron.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1939

The Star is authorized to announce that the people of the local Methodist church will hold their first worship services in their new church on Sunday, October 8.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1944

G.E. and Nelson Welch, who are arranging to open an auto supply store here sometime about the first of November were in town Monday morning, when G.E. was seeking a suitable residence for he and Mrs. Welch to live in while fitting out the store building. Nelson Welch, the junior member of this firm, is a Friona boy and well known by all our people. The other member is an uncle of Nelson's. They have secured the O.G. Turner building on Main Street and remodeled the building for their business.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 7, 1954

Parmer County gins have all been placed in operation this week in plenty of time to serve the current harvest. Two new gins in the central section of the county, the L&H Gin, just west of Friona, operated by John Davis, and the Tri-County Gin at Summerfield, operated by S.W. Peterson. Both these gins are owned by Floyd Linsey and Fred Huls.

Parmer County Farm Bureau's sixth annual convention will be held at the Friona High School Auditorium, beginning Saturday morning at 10 a.m., according to A.J. Ellison, president.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 8, 1959

Lee Thompson, veteran Parmer County politician who is now serving as county tax assessor-collector, has officially announced his candidacy to succeed himself, subject to action of the Democratic primary in May of next year. Thompson has served eight years as county judge and six years as county commissioner.

Hollis Horton, Jr. nosed out Thelma Watkins for top honors in this week's Cotton Bowl Football Contest by guessing the closest in the tie-breaking Friona vs. Sunray football game.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 8, 1964

Contract for the \$1.25 million school construction program was awarded at a special meeting of the Friona Independent School Board last Saturday morning. General contractor for the job will be the firm of Knox, Gailey and Meador of Lubbock, on a bid of \$839,927. Hodges Electric Company of Plainview was awarded the electrical contract on a bid of \$87,564. Gray Plumbing of Midland was given the plumbing contract on a bid of \$141,245.

The Friona City Council this week passed a resolution placing the city's population at 3,149 as of October 1, 1964, and at the same time requested the State Highway Department to change the figure on the city limit signs.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 9, 1969

The Friona City Council postponed action annexing Hillside Addition to the city at its regular meeting Monday night.

Four girls are candidates for Homecoming Queen. They are Gwyn Moore, Susan Vestal, Carleen Greeson and Gay Welch. The Hale Center Owls will provide the opposition for Friona's Homecoming contest.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1974

Amal Malouf, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hanna Malouf, was crowned as Maize Queen for 1974-75 here Thursday night as a highlight of the 1974 Maize Days celebration.

A.W. Anthony, Jr. of Friona, president of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, joined other GSPA executives in Lubbock recently to play host to a group of agricultural leaders from Czechoslovakia.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 14, 1979

The Friona 4-H Club had both the Gold Star Girl and Gold Star Boy at the annual awards banquet this week. Dawn Gibson and Shain Rhodes were recognized at the banquet. They were presented the County 4-H plaque signifying Friona as the high point club from the recent project fair held during Maize Days.

The Friona Women's Club will observe their 70th anniversary with an open house Sunday, October 14 at the Federated Club House. The club was started at a meeting on the "front porch" of the drug store in September of 1909.

"Emotions"

Your Mind's Healing Powers

According to a compilation from the September, 1989, *Reader's Digest*, a new field of research called psychoneuro-immunology (PNI) reveals a link between the brain and the immune system. Studies at the National Institute of Mental Health shows that T-cell lymphocytes and monocytes--immune cells that help heal wounds, repair tissue, and ingest bacteria--are sensitive to chemicals produced in the brain called neuropeptides. Interestingly, the brain's limbic system which controls emotions is a particularly strong concentrator of neuropeptide-producing cells. Neuropeptides released from the limbic area of the brain quickly attach to the neuroreceptors on the lymphocytes in the peripheral blood resulting in a back and forth conversation between the immune system and the brain, using these neurotransmitters.

Messages that flow between the brain and the neuroreceptor sites on the lymphocytes are transported instantaneously so that when you experience joy or feel enthusiastic, the white blood cells receive that message immediately. Conversely, when you are unhappy, a negative message is transmitted directly to the white blood cells. Thus, your emotional reaction influences physical health. A chronic state of depression, for example, makes you vulnerable to many diseases. Likewise, if you're able to manage emotional stress, you can have a healthier body.

Susan Smith Jones, Ph.D., in an article, "Choose To Be Healed" found in *Unity Magazine*, 1989, reports that "what we think, believe and expect in life largely influences our well-being, our immune systems and our lives." Dr. Jones offers the following suggestions for managing stress and helping keep our immune systems healthy.

***KEEP FIT.** Regular exercise, sound sleep and wholesome foods contribute to a beneficial immune system. Caffeine, nicotine, alcohol interfere with the proper immune system functioning.

***PRACTICE RELAXATION TECHNIQUES.** Deep relaxation techniques, such as meditation, yoga and breathing exercises improve the body's response to stress.

***VISUALIZE POSITIVE OUTCOMES.** Practice expecting good things to happen to you. Since 1937, a number of Harvard graduates have been filling out questionnaires about their emotional and physical health. According to the *Reader's Digest* article, those grads who had been most pessimistic at age 25 had more severe illnesses in their 40's, 50's and 60's. Optimists tended to be much healthier.

***SIMPLIFY YOUR LIFE.** Our country's drug problem is due, in part, to the complexity of our lives. We try to push faster and harder and then often turn to drugs to help keep going. Slowing down, simplifying our lives and seeking time for solitude will allow us to be more concerned with God and His work, rather than trying to impress others with how well we are doing.

***CULTIVATE A SENSE OF HUMOR.** Don't take yourself so seriously and learn to laugh at yourself. I recently saw a man in my office who was profoundly depressed and asked him who else he had seen about his problem. When he replied, "A pharmacist," I asked, "And what idiotic advice did he give you?" My patient replied, "He sent me to you." He laughed heartily and got well and I have had a runny nose for three weeks.

Our bodies are temples of God's spirit. By maintaining healthy, loving attitudes we can be fulfilled, joyful examples of the power of God's life-force.

Turnovers Devastate Chiefs Vs. Wildcats

Turnovers proved extremely costly to the Friona Chieftains in their district opening game against Littlefield here last Friday.

The Wildcats accepted Friona's gifts of six turnovers and turned them into a 35-0 win.

Littlefield turned what was a close game for the first half (the Wildcats led, 7-0 at halftime) into an easy win, as nothing could ever jell for the Chieftains.

Friona's defense turned in an excellent performance in the first half, especially on the Wildcats' first drive, when the Chieftains held the bold 'Cats on a fourth down attempt from the Friona 40 and took over on downs.

Berny Trevino made the defensive play on Littlefield tailback Michael Willard, holding him to just a yard when the Wildcats needed two, and Friona took over.

However, three plays gained only six yards for the Chiefs, and Friona had to punt the ball back.

Twice more the Chieftain defense held, and it appeared that Friona would get another chance to get something started when Friona held the visitors on their own 40 early in the second quarter and forced a punt.

But punt receiver Andre Duran took his eye off the ball, and it bounced off his chest, with Littlefield recovering at the Friona 20.

Even then, the Chieftains dug in, and it took Littlefield six plays to cover the 20 yards. Larry Campbell's TD run enabled the

Wildcats to carry a 7-0 lead into the dressing room at the half.

Friona received the second half kickoff, but on their first play from scrimmage a fumble handed the ball over to Littlefield once again at the Friona 20.

Five plays later Willard went over from the six, and Littlefield's lead became 14-0.

Brian Brogden hit Jeff Stowers for an 11-yard gain to give the home fans something to cheer about, but on the very next play, a third fumble was pounced on by the Wildcats at the Friona 43.

This scoring drive took eight plays, with Willard's run making the score 21-0.

On the second play following the touchdown, Brogden was intercepted. Michael Smith ran 44 yards on Littlefield's first play, and LHS suddenly had a 28-0 lead with 2:34 left in the quarter. Thanks to three turnovers, the Wildcats had a 21-point quarter.

The Chiefs forced a punt to begin the final quarter. Scott Houston made a great catch on a pass from Brogden, extending himself fully for a 34-yard gain to the Littlefield 20. But on the very next play Duran fumbled, and Littlefield recovered.

Three plays later Chad Merrifield, Wildcat quarterback, faked into the line and rolled out. Eighty-one yards later, he puffed across the goal-line, and the game had become 35-0.

Five turnovers by Friona had resulted in five touchdowns by the Wildcats. Eddie Robison was five for five in kicking PATs for the

visitors. The loss left the Chieftains with an 0-6 season record, and 0-1 in district play.

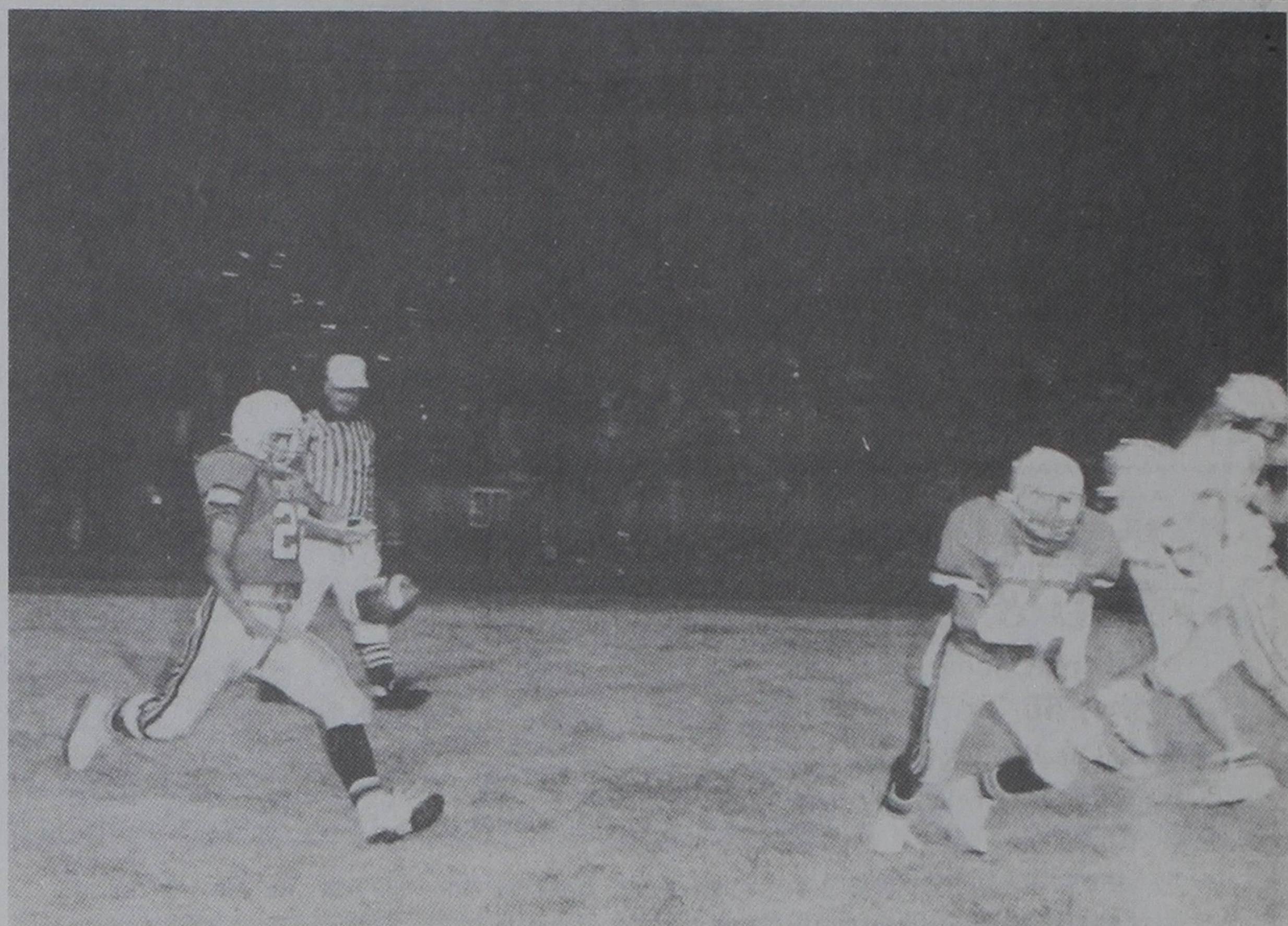

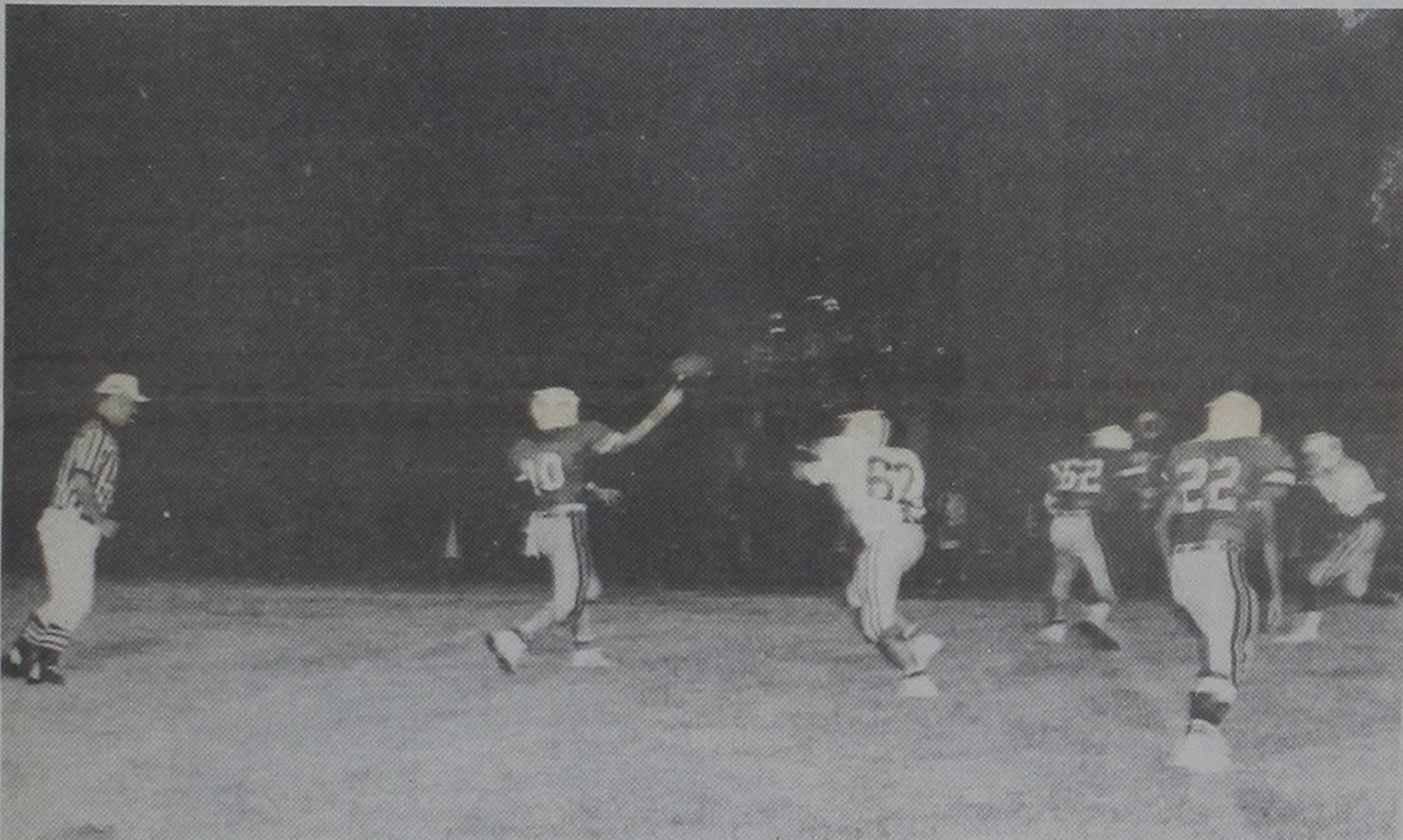

Next Friday the team hosts Dimmitt in another district game.

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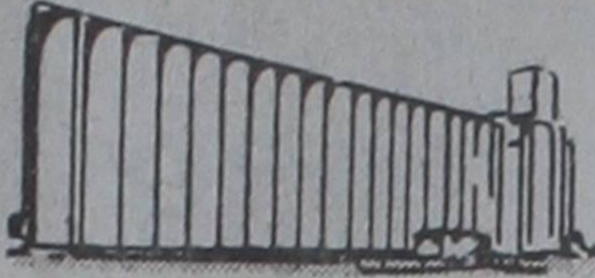

The new ministry is an intercessory prayer ministry. The church has provided a special room, equipped with a telephone for people to call for their special




Module XII: Bonds—Registered Bonds Offer Convenience

At one time, all interest on tax-exempt municipal bonds was collected by clipping a coupon and mailing it to the paying agent. In a few days, you received your interest payment.

Unless you own or can buy, on the secondary market, some of these old bearer-coupon bonds, those days are gone. Several years ago, Congress decreed all new tax-exempt bonds be issued in registered form and that the paying agent, usually a bank, mail the interest checks directly to the bondholder.

On the surface, this may appear to be simply another Congressional invasion of the way we do business. In practice, however, it has made investing in tax-exempt bonds much easier for thousands of investors.

Under the old bearer-bond system, the certificate you received had no name on it. It was in "bearer" form, which meant anyone who held it owned it.

It was no simple matter to replace a lost, stolen or destroyed bearer certificate. First, there was a waiting period, often up to one year, to make certain the bond had not been sold or redeemed. After this, your request for a replacement certificate began. This required the deposit of a substantial cash bond, which was determined by the face value of the lost certificate plus any remaining interest coupons. In the meantime, as your interest became due, you couldn't collect it because you had no coupons to submit for payment.

There were other problems. Because bonds pay interest in different months, investors with several bearer bond holdings had

to set up a system of bookkeeping to know when to clip which coupons. Those investors with small bearer-bond holdings often forgot to clip their coupons, so they didn't receive interest when it was due.

Add to this the inconvenience of a bond being called, or redeemed before the maturity date. The bondholder had no way of knowing until he or she mailed the next coupon for interest payment. At that time, the paying agent generally returned the principal amount of the bond with a letter explaining the bond had been called after the last interest payment and that payment of interest had stopped at that time. The bottom line was that the investor could lose up to six months interest.

Of course, investors often complained, but since their bond was in bearer form and there was no registered owner, the paying agent had no way to inform the bondholder when the bond was called. That was the issuer's defense, and it held.

With all new bonds now in registered form, these inconveniences no longer exist. If a registered certificate is lost or destroyed, a replacement must still be made, but the process is much simpler. Usually, no cash bond is required. When due, interest checks are mailed promptly to the registered bondholder. If a bond should be redeemed, the registered holder is notified in time to present the bond for payment without loss of interest.

If you've avoided tax-exempt bonds because of the inconvenience of clipping coupons and the risk of a lost certificate, consider the advantages of registered bonds.

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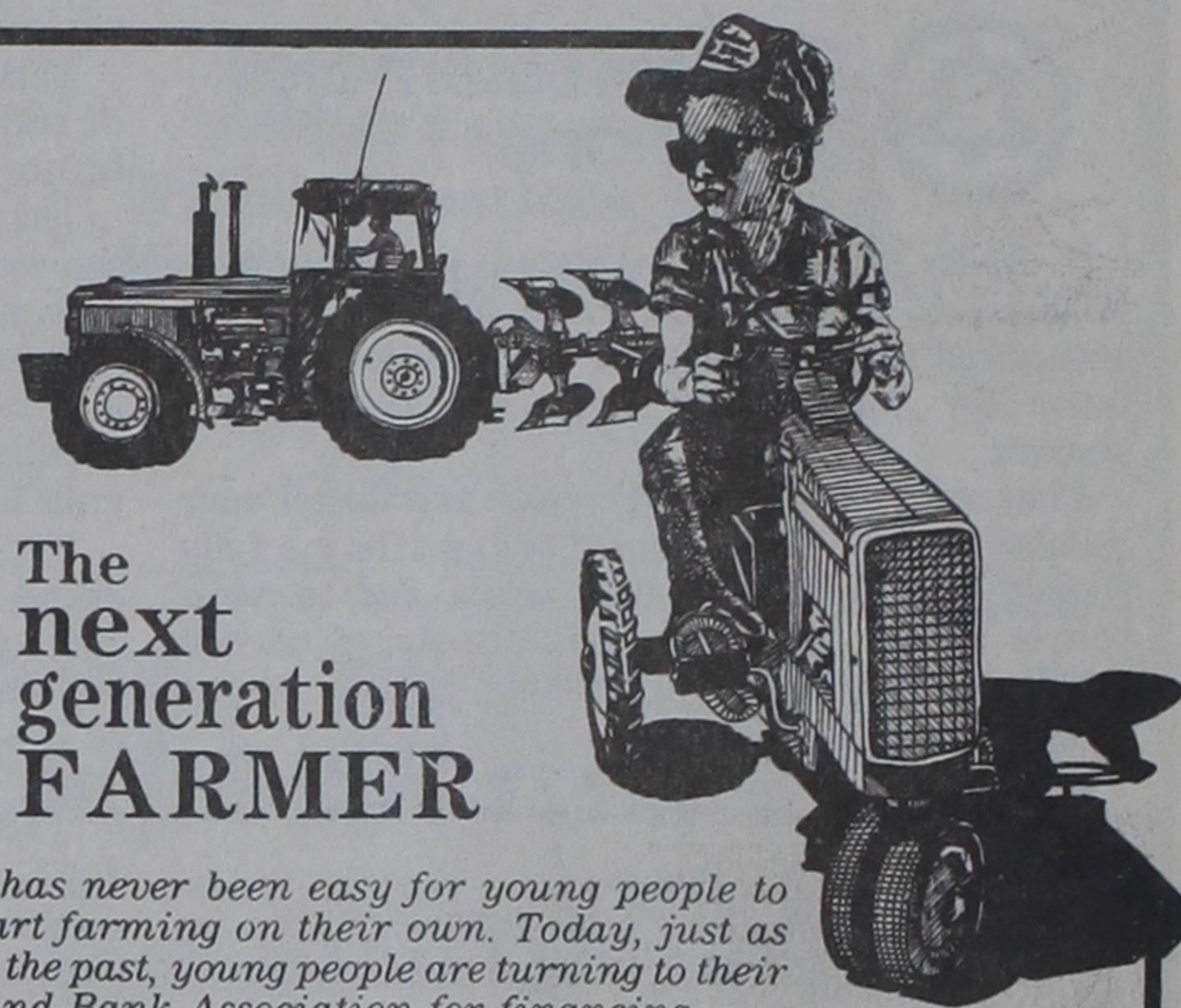
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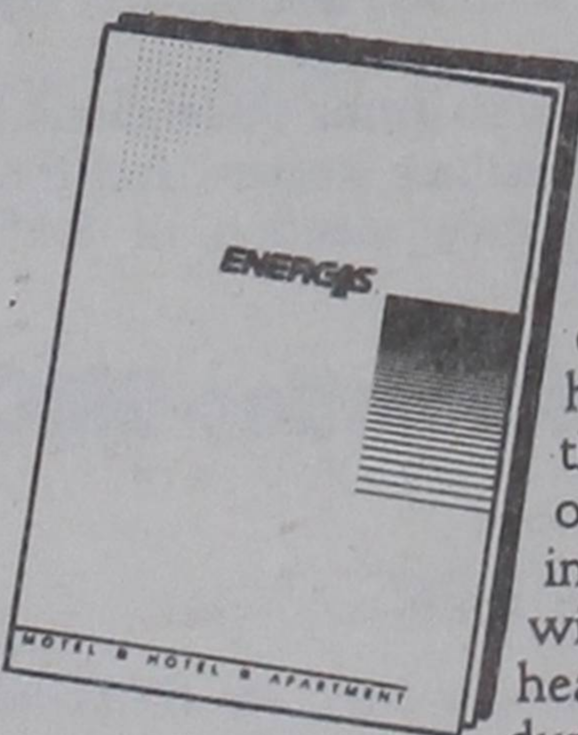
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Your furnace needs an annual check-up.

If you smell gas.

We hope that you will never have to deal with a gas leak. If you do smell gas, day or night, exit the building then call your local Energas office immediately. Do not flip light switches or use any other electrical equipment. Do not light a match or a candle. Do not try to find the leak yourself.
