





thorities to believe he had committed suicide. His footprints leading into he water led searchers to believe that Crick had drowned himself.


The Sheriff's force, which has conducted a 24-hour search for the alleged slayer, made arrangements to dynamite the river, it was stated.







This decrease is due in part, according to officials of the department to the fact that the sleuths are getting more and more proficient in the gentle are of "sniffing." They are now able to ascertain the alcoholic content by smelling the liquor.

"In most cases" one of the officials remarked, "the agents can, by merely smelling the liquid tell whether or not it contains an illegal amount of alcohol. Another test used is the burning test where a match is applied to the liquid, which, if its burns, is usually of large alcoholic content. For these reasons the number of tests to be made have decreased remarkably."

At present the samples sent into the department to be tested consist largely of sour mash and similar materials which can not be smelled accurately and which do not burn upon application of the flame test.

The pure food and drug department is also conducting tests as to the concentration of the flavor in the various flavoring extracts which are on the market. Under the law, the flavoring shall be double strength in order to prevent it being drunk its a beverage. In some of the recent tests it has been found that certain "tinctures of ginger" were not highly enough concentrated to prevent the use of the liquid in an anti-Volstead way.
