

Suicide Ruled In Man's Death Here

The death of Dale Cooper, 34, was ruled a suicide by County Judge Porter Roberts Wednesday, October 25.

Cooper was discovered dead Wednesday morning in his pickup-truck about six and onehalf miles southeast of Friona. dead.

said that Cooper had apparently N.M. consumed some powdered farm pesticide which was extremely toxic.

Williams also said that authorities found what appeared to be a suicide note with the body, but that the note had gotten wet and the writing smeared, and that they were still trying to decipher its contents.

Cooper's body was discovered about 1.5 miles south of FM 2397 on a dirt road.

Funeral services were conducted Friday, October 27 at the First Baptist Church of Muleshoe with Rev. Barry Bradley officiating.

Burial was in Muleshoe Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Summer Lingers

The Friona area enjoyed another week of pretty, Indian Summer weather during the past week, with high temperatures reaching at least 80 degrees on five days.

For the month of October, the mercury has now climbed to 80 degrees or above on 16 days through October 27, including three days of 90 degrees or more. This compares to 1988, when the temperature reached into the 80s only seven times, and no days above 90.









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
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Hallowe'en is a very old holiday, dating back hundreds of years. It began in the Church and to the Church it really belongs, for it is



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
