HEAT CLIMBS TO **106 HERE SUNDAY**

Scorching Wind Sweeps City With - Furnace-Like Blasts During Entire Day.

Aided by a scorching wind that kept Sweetwater sweltering with its WAKI furnace-like blasts all during the day, the thermometer attained new heights DC Sunday and set what is believed to have been a heat record for West Texas, when from 106 to 115 degrees Resignation Not Yet Received at rere registered by various instru ments in the city.

Despite the excessive heat, there were no cases of prostration, or any DENIES THAT HE HAS QUIT illness due to the effect of the wind and the sun, reported at the Sweetwater Sanitarium Monday.

Sweetwater residents, when they had some what recovered from the heat Monday | morning, tried to recall a day in recent years when the heat had become as unbearable as it was Sunday. Not since 1907, according to one resident, has a hot wind such as the one experienced here Sunday continued all day over the entire city.

Sweetwater lakes were crowded all day with swimmers who sought escape in the water from the heat. Sunburn and blister were very much in evidence Monday.

Insurance Man Ends Night of Reciting Death Poetry by Taking Own

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 16 .-After devoting the entire night to an impassioned recital of popular verses glorifying love and death, Leon Gilbert, 49, insurance salesman, ended his life by swallowing poison at his room in a local ho-

Gilbert, according to the other roomers, disturbed their sleep by his poetic phylosophy on the futility of life and the glory of death. A suicide letter to his daughter, Frances, and addressed to Houston, read:

"Dear Frances: I have just reached the last turn in the road. I do not care to live longer away from you children, so this is probably the last letter you will receive from me. "I feel bitter over your mother's sending me to Guthrie-there can never be a reconciliation-it just makes me worse, that's all. I am going to commit suicide, and very soon. I don't want to live any more."




