Highlights From 1993 Friona Star

JANUARY

The City of Friona began its new trash pickup system, utilizing the B.F.I. Company of Canyon, during the first week of January.

County officials elected during the general election of 1992 were sworn in. They included District Attorney Johnny Atkinson, Sheriff Rex Williams, Tax Assessor-Collector Doris Herington, and commissioners John Mars and Robert White.

The fifth major snowfall of the season was received January 19. The area received ten inches in November, nine inches of snow in December and this latest snow measured four inches. Chesley Ray, 17, was injured while practicing pole vaulting at the high school track. He was airlifted to Lubbock for precautionary measures.

FEBRUARY

At least two couples in the Friona area attended the Super Bowl in Pasadena, California. Joe and Billie Tongate, and Jayson and Jyl Grimsley were among the 98,374 fans who watched the Dallas Cowboys manhandle the Buffalo Bills, 52-17.

Bill Wilshire, Southwestern Public Service Company manager in Friona, retired February 28, 1993, after more than 19 years of service to the Friona area and 41 years of service to the company.

Friona ISD had the highest percentage of students passing the TAAS tests during the 1991-92 school year of any class AAA single-city school district in the Panhandle-South Plains area.

Kyle Potts and Angela Belcher were recognized as "Basketball King and Queen" for 1992-93 between games at the final home basketball games of the season.

MARCH

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry was the featured speaker at the annual Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture banquet March 13.

Honored by the Chamber were David Goddard and Varla Wilcox, man and woman of the year; Pat Wright, employee of the year; Tana Stephens, teacher of the year, and Jessica Alvarado and Jon Parker, outstanding young people.

The State Department of Highways and Transportation awarded a contract for the widening of the final section of U.S. Highway 60, between Bovina and Farwell, to Amarillo Roads. Bid on the project is \$10,591,860.07. Charles Schmidt of Amarillo Roads picked Labor Day, 1994, as completion date on the final phase of the multi-million dollar project.

City of Friona received an \$82,873 grant from Texas Community Development Corp., with which it plans to pave five blocks in the eastern part of the city.

APRIL

Parmer County Sheriff's Department is investigating the mysterious death of Carlos Hernandez, 28. The Bovina resident was found in his car at about 1 p.m. April 3 about a half mile east of Bovina. He had been shot several times with an automatic pistol, found in the car.

Modern Study Club held its bi-annual dinner theatre April 16-17. Entitled "Friona City Limits." A history of the west was traced through cowboy poetry and songs. Eva Miller is director.

Tony Igo, Friona primary school principal for the past five years, has resigned to become elementary principal at Whiteface next school term, it was announced.

The Excel Corp. was saluted on the occasion of its 25th anniversary in Friona with a 32-page special edition of the Friona Star on April 30. Excel Corp., which is one of the nation's top three beef producers, held its Open House and dedication April 20, 1968, and began operation the first week of May.

MAY

Parmer County Voters favored Kay Bailey Hutchison in the special state senate election May 1. Democrat Bob Krueger, appointed by Governor Richards as interim senator, finished a distant fourth in Parmer County.

Kristin Holland, with a 4.66 grade-point average, is the valedictorian for the 1993 graduating class at Friona High School. Renee' Martin is the salutatorian, with a 4.56 average. Britt Conklin, with a 4.54 GPA, was the third-ranking student.

Former Friona Chief of Police Lloyd Niece was sentenced to a year in prison for a firearms violation, after pleading guilty before judge Mary Lou Robinson on May 7. Former Friona patrolman Bailey Roberts received a 14-month sentence on the same violation. Niece had served eight years in the Friona Police Department, including seven as chief.

The paving of U.S. Highway 60 through Friona was completed in mid-May. Local residents and businesses, as well as through-traffic, had been inconvenienced for about a year while the widening process was underway, cramped on a two-way, two lane detour.

The FHS baseball team qualified for the bi-district playoffs for the third consecutive year, after beating Littlefield, 14-3 in a special playoff game. In a rebuilding year, the Chiefs posted a 7-3 district record to tie the Wildcats for second behind Tulia's 10-0 first place.

Corrie Igo and Sheila Wiseman were the honor graduates for Friona's eighth grade graduating class of 1993. Miss Igo, valedictorian, had a 97.10 average for the year, and Miss Wiseman's average stood at 95.8.

JUNE

The Friona Independent School District and the City of Friona were hit with a lawsuit by the League of Latin American Citizens (LULAC), charging that the school and city's at-large method of electing board members dilutes the voting strength of minority residents.

The Board of Trustees of Friona I.S.D. will conduct a public hearing at 7 p.m. January 10, 1994, at the Administration Building at 909 East 11th Street, to consider the school's present at-large method of electing trustees.

The plan to be discussed would establish the election of trustees at-large through the process of "cumulative voting."

Through cumulative voting, when three members are to be elected, a voter may cast all three of their votes for the same candidate, if they wish.

This will give minorities a better opportunity to elect a member to the board.

Registered voters in the F.I.S.D., as well as the general public, are invited to attend the meeting.

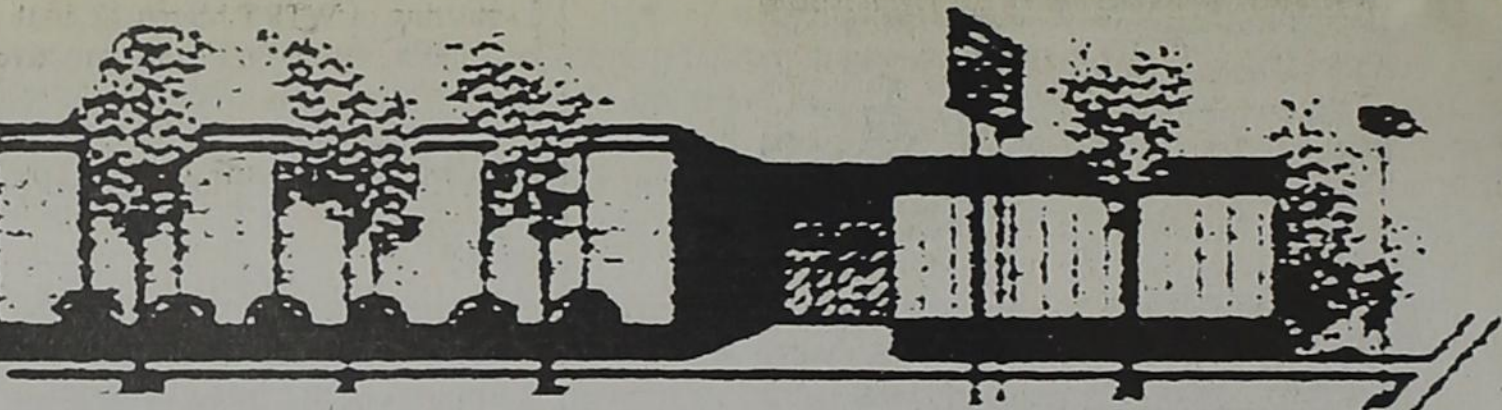

Farmers Reminded Of ASCS Deadlines

With the beginning of a new year, Parmer County farmers were reminded this week of information that the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will need, and about important dates, by Curt Miller, county executive director of the ASCS.

"As we begin to prepare our records for 1994, producers are reminded to notify this office of any change in addresses--owner's or operator's. Keep in mind that we will need the name, address and Social Security number of any new producers as well as their spouse's name and Social Security number," Miller said.

The final date to request 1994 loans are as follows: March 31, 1994--wheat, barley, oats; May 31, 1994--corn, grain sorghum, cotton and soybeans; May 31, 1994--cotton loan deficiency payments.

The 0/92 provisions will be replaced with 0/85, which means less payment. These provisions apply to producers who elect not to

harvest a particular crop in order to receive a guaranteed deficiency payment. For 1994, a producer choosing this option will receive payment on 85% of their maximum payment acres instead of 92%.

The ASCS office will have a Long Term Agreement (LTA) sign-up January 3 through January 7. The LTA program is designed to financially assist farmers and ranchers in installing a variety of conservation practices over a three to five year contract period. If you feel you may be interested in this program, please contact this office or the Soil Conservation Service for further details.

Jerry Don Glover was re-elected to the county committee as the representative for the "B" community. He was also elected to serve as the chairman for the committee. Floyd Reeve will serve as vice chairman and Mark Howard as member. The ASCS wants to thank the "B" community for taking the time to vote.

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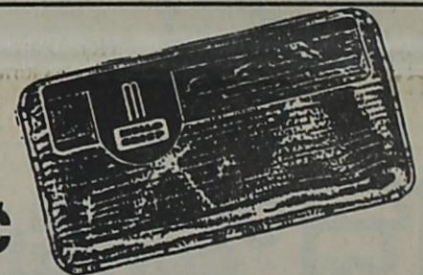

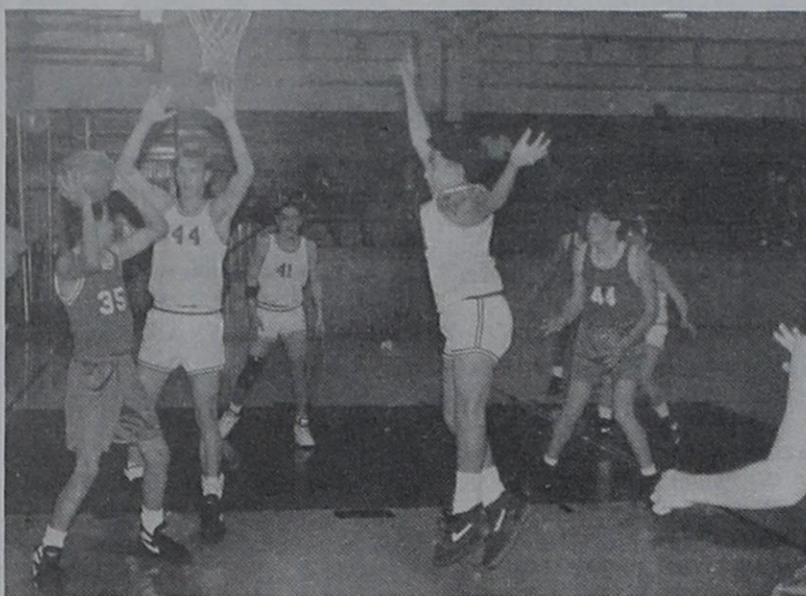

Contacts And Makeup: Here's How



Contact lenses to show off beautiful eyes and makeup to enhance them are not mutually exclusive; one can wear eye makeup successfully with contacts, as long as special precautions are taken. The cleaner lenses are kept, the more comfortable they will be.

- *Choose a water-base, hypoallergenic liquid makeup. Cream makeups may cause a film to form on the lenses, and powder may scratch them. Eye liners and eye shadow should be waterbase, too.
- *Avoid lash-lengthening mascaras. These contain fibers that are often irritating to the eyes and damaging to contact lenses.
- *Remove lenses before using makeup remover. Optimum choice is a brand of remover with a mineral oil base.
- *If you use hair spray or nail polish removers, use them before inserting lenses. Be sure to wash hands thoroughly, as the chemicals in these solutions can damage contacts.
- *Avoid cream soaps; they leave a film on hands that can dirty lenses.

Security Registration

Securities can be owned individually or jointly with another person or persons. If you're a joint owner, how the security is registered can significantly affect your estate and taxes.

Two types of joint accounts are available: joint tenancy with rights of survivorship and tenancy in common. Except in states that prohibit rights of survivorship, it's your option to choose how your joint ownership is registered. Before you make this decision, it's important to understand the differences between the two types of registration.

Joint tenancy with rights of survivorship: the most common type of joint ownership. It appears on your account and certificates with the full name of all owners followed by the abbreviation JTWROS (or sometimes JT TEN).

As the name implies, upon the death of one of the joint tenants, that person's entire interest in the account passes to the survivor or survivors who are registered as joint owners. The estate of the deceased has no interest in the account.

A similar type of joint tenancy is tenants of entirety. This is basically the same as joint tenants with rights of survivorship, except it exists only between spouses.

In certain states, known as community property states, the law does not immediately recognize joint tenancy with rights of survivorship. In these states, upon the death of one spouse, half of the assets in the account pass directly to the surviving spouse, and the other half is probated and taxable. Special joint tenancy agreements may apply in certain situations, but it's advisable not to assume this or act on the advice of anyone other than a competent attorney.

Tenancy in common: This designation appears on your account and certificates as the abbreviation TEN COM following the names of all owners. Certificates that do not bear a tenancy clause are assumed to be tenancy in common.

With tenancy in common, each registered tenant has a fractional interest in the account. In the event of the death of one tenant, the

deceased's interest in the account passes to his or her estate. It does not pass directly to the surviving joint tenant or tenants.

There is also a special registration for investors in Wisconsin called marital property and survivorship marital property.

Joint accounts can be created by two or more persons. If it is important to have your account registered with several joint tenants, you should clarify the rules before opening the account.

The choice you make regarding joint ownership of securities could have significant tax and estate implications. If you have any questions as to how either type of joint ownership will affect your heirs, estate or tax liability, a visit to your attorney or tax adviser could prove to be worthwhile.

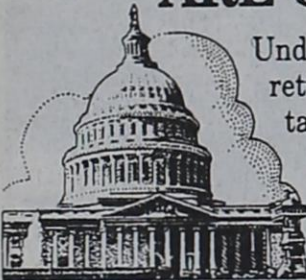
