A Dark Horse Gets Broker Offers Bet Started In the Race

J. W. Davis, West Va., Comes To Front From Dark Horse Ranks With 129 1-2 on 23rd Ballot-Smith and McAdoo Losing.

FAVORITE SONS GO OVERBOARD

Governor Brown, New Hampshire, and Pat Harrison Dropped—Iowa Delegation Stormed by Floor Leaders.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, July 1 .- A real development was in the making at the balloting in the Democratic national convention continued this afternoon.

After polling 122 votes on the 20th ballot, thus dashing out from the general group of dark horses, J. W. Davis of West Virginia increased this by three votes on the 21st ballot, and became a real factor in the convention. He got 129 1-2 on the 23rd ballot.

Both McAdoo and Smith are losing ground. Despite the fact that Nebraska dropped Governor Charles Bryan and gave enough votes to McAdoo to make a gain of seven from this delegation, the Californian lost ground and polled only 439, Both the Smith and Davis floor workers sought a change in

the Iowa delegation. They failed to swing a majority however, and the Iowa chairman said that Iowa's vote would be cast as a unit for

The convention recessed shortly before 5 o'clock until 8 o'clock tomorrow Morning.

Two other sworn statements are re-

quired of the candidates, the second one to be filed not more than 12 days nor less than 8 days prior to the primary election, and the final one must be filed within 10 days after the election. Any candidate failing to comply with these rulings may be disqualified as a nominee by any citizen of the county bringing qua warranto proceedings in the district court.

The law provides the form of the oath that must be taken in swearing to the statements and also states that in the reports must be included the names of any persons to whom funds in excess of \$10 is paid and the purpose of the same with the total amount expended and liabilities incurred and unpaid and all money received in contributions and borrowed.

This statement, according to the law, in the case of a county candidate, is filed by the candidate or his campaign manager with the county clerk, In the case of state and district candidates, the sworn statement is filed by the candidate or his campaign man ager with the Secretary of State.

THE FIRST DAY

The first day of balloting has passed into history in the epochal 1924 convention of the Democratic party with the expected deadlock present in all of its glory.

With a total of 1098, the two thirds rule required that in order to be selected, a candidate must receive 732 votes. At this writing it begins to look like a long long session.

Just when the break will come no one can tell. It may come today, tomorrow, or one day next week The favorite sons, with the vote of a state delegation, or two at their command, For they are of the opinion that neiththe "dark horses."

Shrewd political observers are also of the opinion-an opinion strengthbearer of the party; both having strength enough to keep the other out. And from the standpoint of party harony, neither should be the nominee. For the bitter struggle over the Klan plank ,etc., has left things in such shape that it is entirely probable that a considerable portion of the party would bolt rather than vote for the candidate of the other.

President Calvin Coolidge is presumably maintaining his habitual silence but the presumption is that he is watching the New York pageant of Democracy with great joy, as he and his party stand ready to benefit by any internal strife that may survive the close of the Democratic Con-
