THE THIRD WEEK of 1994 has definitely distinguished itself for severe acts of nature, from the deadly earthquake in California to the devastating storm that has stretched from the Midwest to the East Coast, and left a vast area reeling in its wake.

Scores of people are dead from both of the catastrophes of this week, and the tally goes up every time you turn to your news source.

And to think: we thought we were in bad shape in Parmer County just because it's been a couple of months since we received any moisture, which is about to do a number on the area's wheat crop.

But at least our farmers will still have their farms. We haven't had our homes and businesses shaken to their very foundations. And we haven't seen motorists stranded in their vehicles, while a blizzard raged. Maybe just being in the midst of one of our semi-annual droughts isn't so bad after all.

Residents of Southern California used to consider that they were living in Paradise, but the events of the past two-plus years have somewhat changed the definition of that area.

The riots of 1992 following the Rodney King verdict produced some of the worst examples of human nature that we had seen in our nation's entire history.

Then, this past summer and fall, the fires in Southern California laid waste to hundreds of people's homes, most of which were very expensive. Again, charges of arsonists' work made you wonder what type of person would be capable of committing this sort of act.

Someone said this week that Mother Nature has been acting like one of those women who goes around losing her hairpins all over the place.

Where were the seismologists who are supposed to know when one of these big earthquakes is going to hit? All we ever hear from these guys is after the quake is over, and they can say "Yep, that was a 6.6 on the Richter Scale."

At least with tornadoes, we get a warning, and can take precautions.

Carol and I lived in California for the first year and one-half of our marriage. At that time, when people learned that we had moved there from Texas, we would hear remarks like "One of these days they're going to have to build a fence around California to keep us from becoming overcrowded." (That really made us feel welcome.)

We have never regretted the fact that we moved back to our roots to settle and raise our family. And with the way things are going in California these days, the fence may be required to keep all of the California folks from bolting and running.

Trouble in Paradise: could it be that God is venting his wrath on an area that hasn't exactly lived up to His standards? Is Los Angeles becoming a modern-day Sodom or Gomorra?

OUR CHANCES for an all-Texas Super Bowl in 1994 went up in smoke last Sunday at the Astrodome in Houston, when Joe Montana led the Kansas City Chiefs to their come-from-behind win over the Oilers.

Poor Oilers! Last year they set an NFL record by blowing the biggest lead in history (35-3 in the third quarter) and then losing, in their playoff game at Buffalo.

They had set out to avenge that faux-pas, but missed out, one more time. We have stated before that it would be frustrating to be a regular Houston Oilers fan. These folks must really feel "burned."

Meantime, the Cowboys have got to get their act together this weekend, or they'll be watching the Super Bowl on television, like most of the rest of us!

School Will Play Host To Astronaut

The students and faculty of Friona Independent School District will be hosting Astronaut Bernard A. Harris, Jr., on Friday, January 28. He will present aeronautics and space topics to all students.

The following schedule will be followed: 9:45 a.m.-10:30 a.m. Elementary Students; 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. High School Students; 1:30-2 p.m. Primary Students; and 2:45-3:45 p.m.--Junior High Students.

Primary, elementary, and junior high students will meet in the Junior High Auditorium. High school students will meet at the High School Auditorium.

Dr. Harris also serves on the Texas Tech University Board of Regents. The Friona Tech Ex-Students will host a community reception for Astronaut Harris in the Community Room of Friona State Bank from 4:15-5:15 p.m.

"Please share this day with our students and the Friona Tech Ex-Students. Also, please extend an invitation to other community members so that they can participate in the activities of this special day," said Tonya Gober, Curriculum Director of the FISD.

Harris was born June 26, 1956, in Temple. He received a BS degree in biology from the University of Houston, a doctorate in medicine from Texas Tech University School of Medicine. Dr. Harris completed a residency in internal medicine at the Mayo Clinic in 1985.

He completed a National Research Fellowship at NASA's Ames Research Center, California, and trained as a flight surgeon at the Aerospace School of Medicine, Brooks Air Force Base, San Antonio, 1988.

Dr. Harris has been in group medical practice in internal medicine with both the South Texas Primary Care of San Antonio and with the San Jose Medical Group in San Jose, California. He is also a licensed pilot.

He was selected by NASA in January of 1990, and became an astronaut in July, 1991. He is qualified for assignment as a mission specialist on future Space Shuttle flight crews. He served as a crew representative for Shuttle Software in the Astronaut Office Operations Development branch.

Temps Do Yo-Yo Act Locally

All of the retiring board

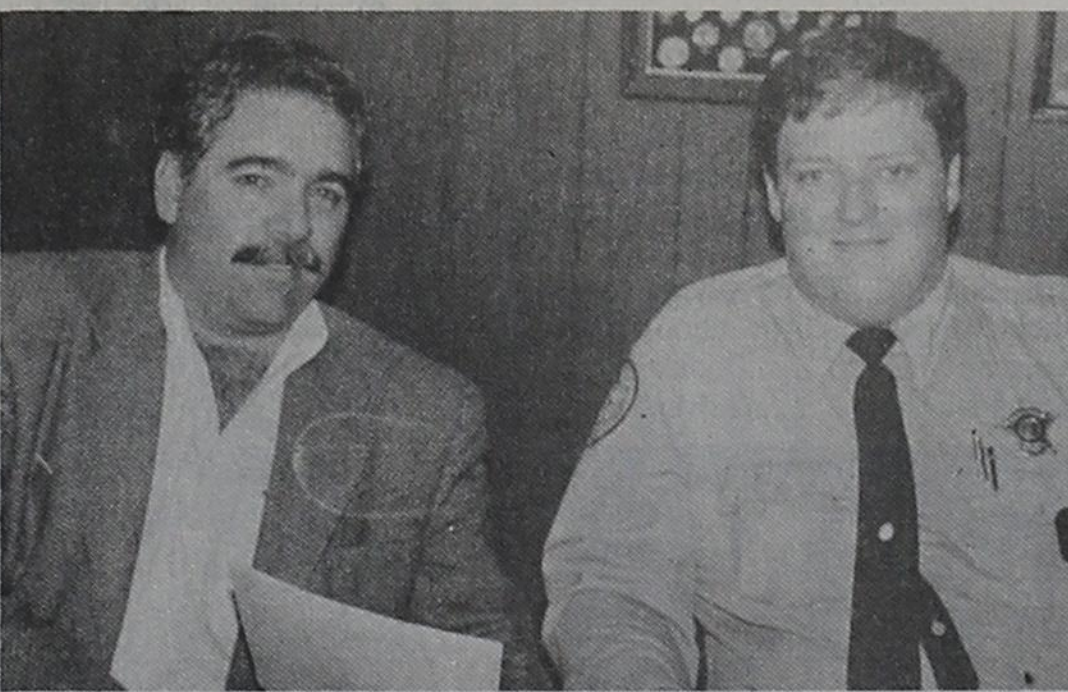
members expressed that they would be willing to continue to be of service to Prairie Acres if the need should arise.

Jr. Livestock Show Set This Weekend

The 47th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 21-24 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

Judging will be held on Saturday, as in recent years, with the premium auction sale on Monday.

Weigh-in and classification for barrows will be held from 1-5 p.m. Friday, January 21. Sheep will be weighed and classified from 7-8:30 a.m. Saturday, January 22. Steers will be classified beginning at 7 a.m. Saturday.

The steer show will kick off the judging Saturday at 9 a.m., followed by the heifers. The lamb show begins at 11 a.m., and barrows will be judged starting at 2 p.m. Saturday.

Judges for the County Show will be Bert Williams for steers and heifers; Dirk Aaron for barrows; Jerry Franklin for lambs and Carl Wheeler for showmanship.

Sheriff's Department Organizes "KidCare" Identification Program

The Parmer County Sheriff's Department is organizing a "KidCare" photo identification event, expected to be held in April.

Tracy Bridges, sheriff's deputy, says that the event is part of the national campaign by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, to increase awareness about missing children and to educate parents about the steps they can take to help protect their children.

Attorney Byron Boyd is assisting Bridges with the event in Friona. The project needs to raise a minimum of \$1,000 in order to pay for the program for all children in Friona, grades pre-kindergarten through fifth grade.

Bridges has first-hand knowledge of missing children problems, as he helped investigate the disappearance of Shawn Lee Perry at Earth.

"The cost of searching for missing children is tremendous, especially when you figure in an air search. A head start, through the KidCare program, would be a big help to law officials," Bridges said.

A fund has been established at Friona State Bank, as "Parmer County KidCareFund," and the public may donate to the fund at any time.

The purpose of the KidCare Photo ID is to provide parents with a standardized, high-quality photograph of their child which includes current vital statistics. The KidCare Photo ID gives parents peace of mind, to know that they will have all the appropriate information available if their child is lost or abducted.

"No one likes to think it can happen to them, but over one million children are reported

missing each year," Bridges says. "Authorities say the single most important tool in helping to find a missing child is a good quality photograph. In fact, one in seven missing children featured in a NCMEC photo distribution program are recovered because of that photo."

Although most parents have photographs of their children, most do not have suitable photos for release to law enforcement officials and the press, should the child become missing.

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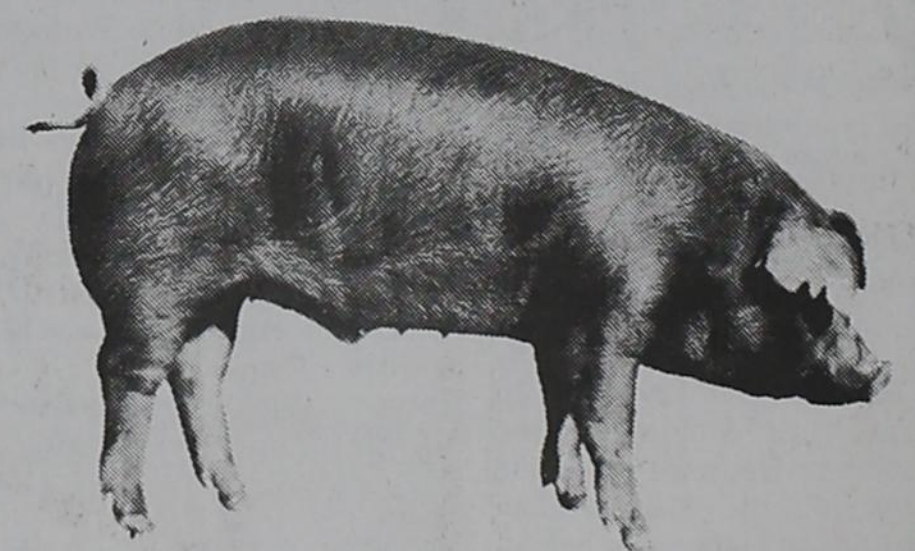

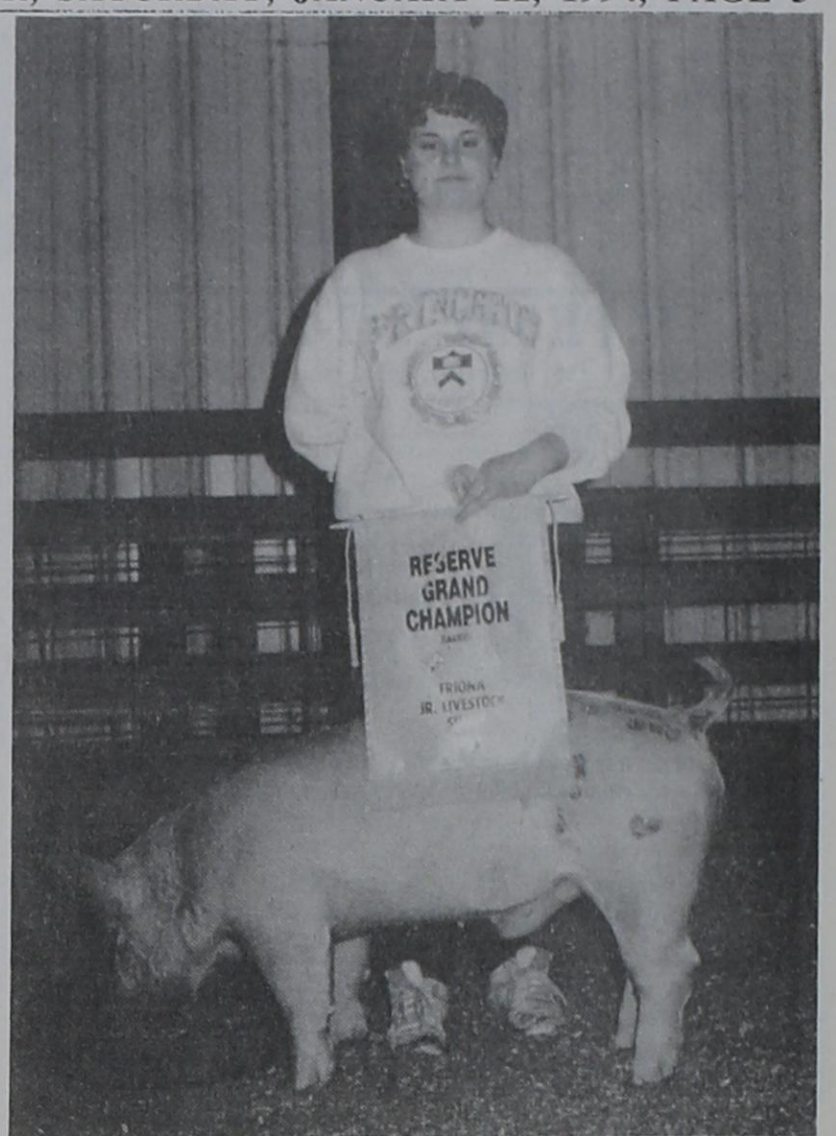

Did You Know?

Jewish Immigrants had been moving into Palestine since the late 1800's. Hoping for a Jewish nation of their own, to escape the persecution they often faced in other lands. On November 29, 1947, the United Nations voted to end British control of Palestine and divide the country into a Jewish State and an Arab State.

Israel came into existence on May 14, 1948, under the leadership of David Ben Gurion. British control officially ended that night. The next day, Israel was attacked by five Arab nations. The Israelis were greatly outnumbered and poorly armed but had defeated the Arabs by the end of 1948.

In the mid 50's trouble broke out again. Israel invaded Egypt on October 29, 1956. Great Britain and France joined the attack two days later. By November 5, the Israelis occupied the Gaza Strip and the Sinai Peninsula, and the British and France controlled the Northern entrance to the Suez Canal.

In May 1967, Israel hit the air fields of Egypt, Jordan, and Syria. By the 10th of June they occupied the Gaza Strip, Sinai Peninsula, Jordanian territory west of the river Jordan, and Syria's Golan Heights. The war was over in six days.

Genesis 13:14-15 "And the Lord said unto Abram, after that Lot was separated from him, Lift up now thine eyes, and look from the place where thou art northward, and southward, and eastward, and westward: For all the land which

thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed forever."

Many Christian leaders see the Jewish Nation as fulfillment of Prophecy. There is also scripture that indicates that they will never be driven from their land again.

Jesus said in Luke 21:20 "And when ye shall see Jerusalem compassed with armies, then know that the desolation thereof is nigh."

In A.D. 70 Jerusalem was defeated by the Romans and the Temple and most of Jerusalem lay in ruins. In Luke 21:24 Jesus said, "And they shall fall by the edge of the sword, and shall be led away captive into all nations; and Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles, until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled."

Could the time of the Gentile's be fulfilled? I don't know. I do know if we have a war to fight, hire the Israelis.

We live in very disturbing times and yet in very exciting times. I tell my children that I believe it is a very real possibility that they will see the return of Christ. I also share with them Luke 21:34-35, "And take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting, and drunkenness, and cares of this life, and so that day come upon you unawares. For as a snare shall it come on all them that dwell on the face of the whole earth."

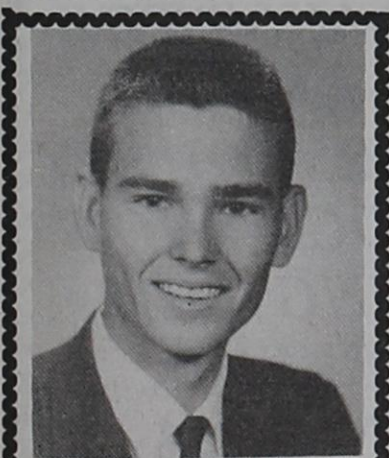


A. Belcher Makes List At ENMU

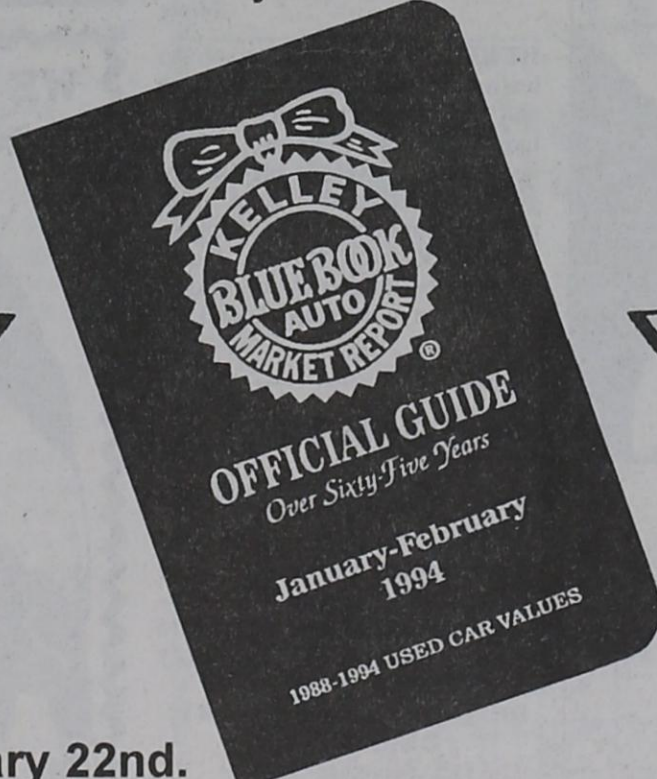

The 47th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 21-24 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona. Judging will be held on Saturday, as in recent years, with the premium auction sale on Monday.

Weigh-in and classification for barrows will be held from 1-5 p.m. Friday, January 21. Sheep will be weighed and classified from 7-8:30 a.m. Saturday, January 22. Steers will be classified beginning at 7 a.m. Saturday.

The steer show will kick off the judging Saturday at 9 a.m., followed by the heifers. The lamb show begins at 11 a.m., and barrows will be judged starting at 2 p.m. Saturday.

Judges for the County Show will be Bert Williams for steers and heifers; Dirk Aaron for barrows; Jerry Franklin for lambs and Carl Wheeler for showmanship.

Exhibitors of grand champion animals in the 1993 show were Clay Hurst of Lazbuddie, steer; Jarah Redwine of Lazbuddie, heifer; Monty Schueler, Friona, lamb; and Dawn Weir of Lazbuddie, barrow.

Showmanship winners in the 1993 show were: beef, Clay Hurst, senior, and Jason Thomas, junior; lambs: Cody Simmons, senior, and Cade Morris, junior; and barrows: Jeremy Hardin, senior and Tyson Kerby, junior.

Miss Wier's winning barrow in 1993 was a cross-breed, which made the ninth time for a crossbred animal to win the county title. Hampshire breeds hold a wide lead in the overall history of the show with 16 titles. Durocs have won eight times; Polands have been tapped six times, Chester Whites four and Yorkshire once.

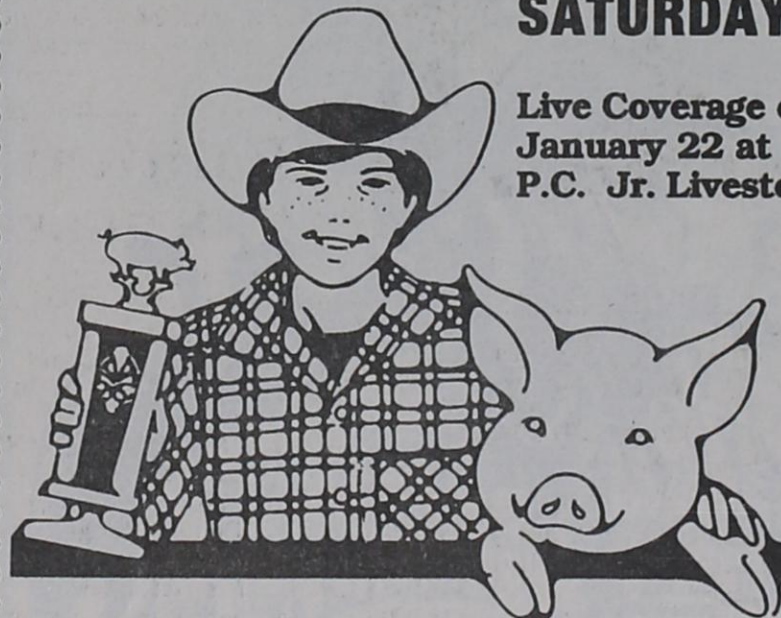

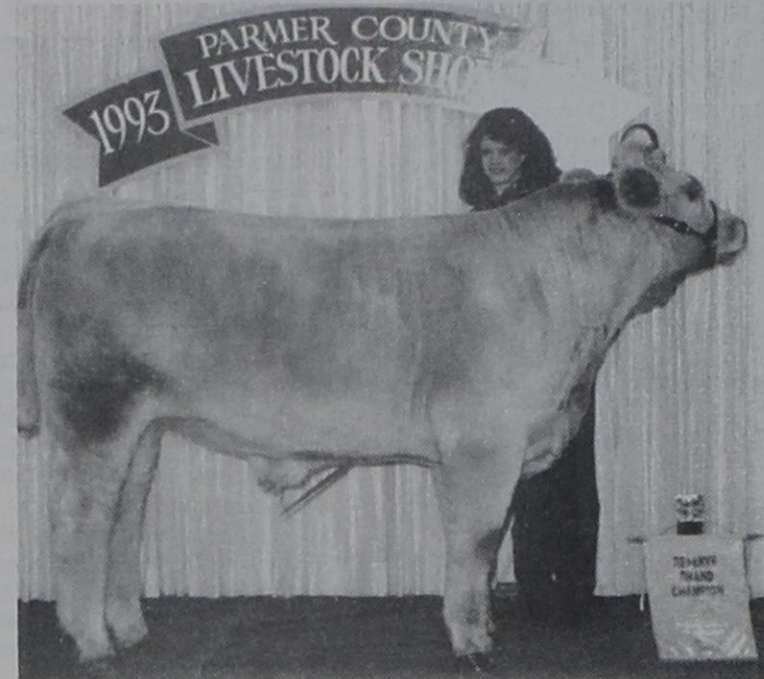

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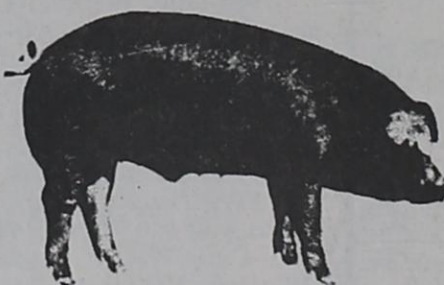

Technology Helps Irrigation Records

Day by dry weather day, the Edwards Aquifer continues to supply the water demands of municipal, industrial and farm users.

With new state legislation to manage the aquifer still under federal review, it's uncertain exactly when, how or by whom actual management may begin.

But armed with new technology from Texas A&M University, some area irrigation farmers may be able to build a better case for their share of water.

One aspect of aquifer management involves irrigators' historical water use. Without a water meter to refer to, one way to document usage is through energy consumption used to pump the water.

However, the Edwards Aquifer being the unique resource it is, there can be some complications in proving up water usage that way.

One factor is the aquifer's volatility, and the prospect that the same pump may draw water from different depths--and consequently at different fuel-efficiency levels--in different years or even in different seasons of the same year.

Another problem (and only to a bookkeeper would this be a problem) is that some Edwards wells are artesian; that is, those wells sometimes flow even without the pump being turned on.

A pump and engine-efficiency test program underway in Bexar and several other area counties helps farmers gain data that may help compensate for some of the Edwards' unique qualities.

The two-year project, carried out by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, has been used not just over the Edwards Aquifer but in other irrigation regions, Guy Fipps, extension agricultural engineer and project director, said last week in a telephone interview from College Station.

The tests measure fuel efficiency by comparing pump engine horsepower to fuel consumption while pumping. Meanwhile, a portable ultrasound instrument determines the volume and pressure of water being pumped from the well. With the resulting data, a technician

can calculate fuel efficiency for the pump and engine working as a unit. And with that, a farmer may calculate a relationship between fuel usage and water usage.

The tests can address the effect on pump performance from changes in aquifer levels, he said.

For artesian wells, Fipps said the equipment can read the volume and pressure of well flow.

During a test last week on one Bexar County well, Byron Neal, an agricultural engineer involved with the project, determined that artesian flow was 2,000 gallons per minute with the valve open but the pump turned off. With the pump engine running, the well produced 3,200

gallons per minute, at a fuel flow of 6.6 gallons of diesel per hour.

As might be expected, it appears that the Edwards Aquifer may prove to be more complicated than the planners were expecting.

Sooner or later, whatever regional, state or federal agency ends up in charge, they're going to discover that.

Neal is the son of Tony and Dottie Neal of Bovina. He is now living at College Station and graduated a year ago in December from Texas Tech University, Lubbock, with a degree in agricultural engineering.

Pantex Tours Are Available

When the U.S. Department of Energy's Pantex Plant began offering public tours last year, the overwhelming response caused such a backlog of participants that some people had to wait months before they could be accommodated. This is no longer true.

To help eliminate the problem, Mason & Hanger-Silas Mason Co., which operates and manages the Pantex Plant for the DOE, began running two tours each Wednesday instead of just one. Now, a year later, over 3,000 area citizens have visited the plant and the backlog is clearing up.

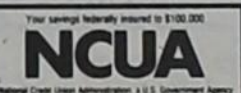
Tour participants can now be scheduled in a reasonable amount of time and, unless there is a major influx of visitors, the second tour each week is not necessary. There is no cost for the tour, but reservations must be made in advance to secure available openings. 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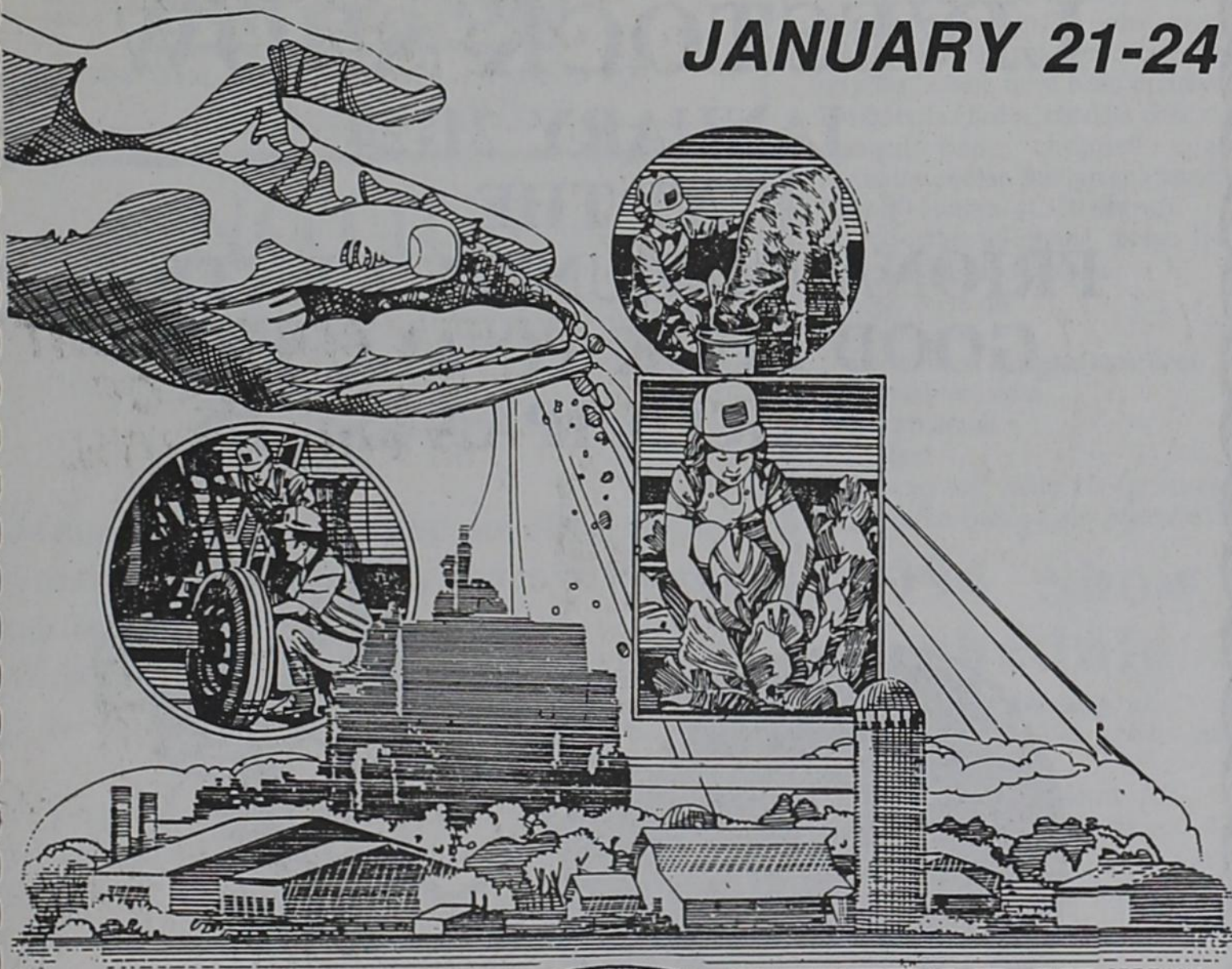
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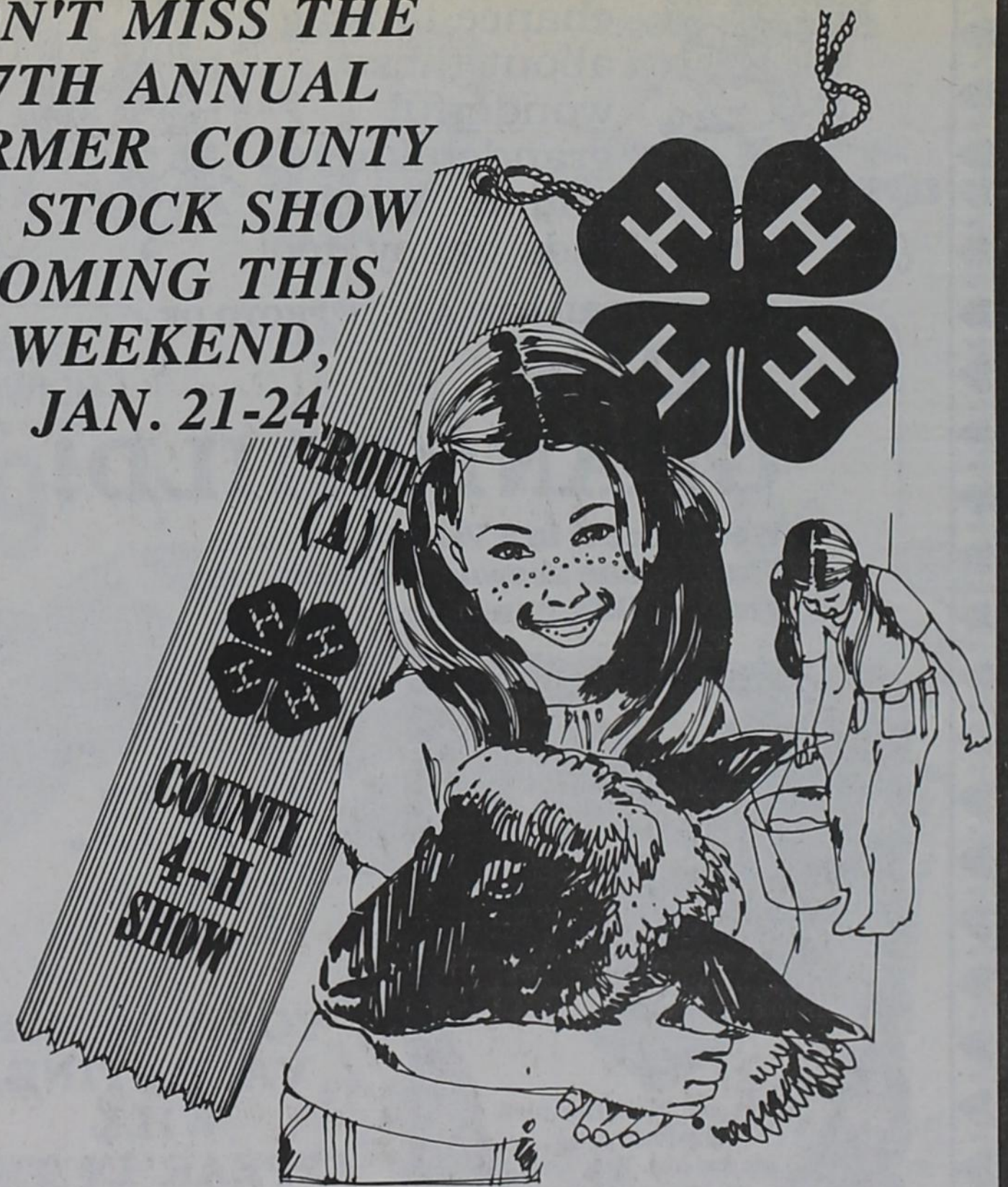

WTRT Is Installing New Cable In Parmer County

When an ongoing project to install some 40 miles of underground cable is wrapped up soon, West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative will have completed an ambitious project linking its central offices in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties via fiber-optic cable.

The latest round of fiber installation projects for the cooperative began with a route from the Frio central office to the Summerfield central office in Castro County.

Laying of cable along routes from the Oklahoma Lane central office to the Sharp central office, and the Parmer central office to the Sharp central office in Parmer

County is currently in progress.

Brooks Construction Company of Shawnee, Oklahoma, a firm which specializes in cable installation for utilities, and which has performed extensive work for WTRT, is the contractor burying the 40 miles of eight-fiber cable to a depth of five feet.

The Brooks Construction crew will face the daunting task of installing cable along a route passing through the City of Bovina. That portion of the project is expected to be slow work. Brooks Construction has extensive experience in laying cable in urban surroundings, having done work in downtown Lubbock and El Paso.

WTRT began installing fiber-optic cable in 1987-88 at a time when several of its central offices were being converted to digital switching.

Central offices at Westway, Milo Center and Dawn, in Deaf Smith County, Summerfield in Castro County, and Hub and Tharp in Parmer County, have been connected via fiber-optic cable for some years. WTRT management planned from the start to complete a total fiber link of central offices as resources allowed.

Tom Hyer, WTRT general manager, says that completing the fiber link will mean greatly expanded carrying capacity for the telephone network serving WTRT customer/members.

Fiber-optic technology sends signals streaking at the speed of light via glass filaments that are the size of a human hair. One pair of fibers can carry 32,256 messages simultaneously, without overloading the system. Traditional copper telephone wire, carrying digital signals in radio waves, handles a maximum of only 24 conversations on a pair of copper lines.

Signals carried via fiber have

greatly reduced interference from outside noise and static, providing much clearer sound and expanded ability for sending information.

The technology allows making use of two-way interactive video for educational and medical applications, and could also open the way for delivery of cable television programming to rural residents via telephone cables. The technology works with data, alarm and monitoring systems.

"Completing this fiber link will mean more and better service to our members. Improved service could even include video, if the time comes," says Hyer.

Thousands Of Cattle Sold On Television

Bob Bradley, Clovis, New Mexico, and Ronnie Mahaley and Royce Collins of Amarillo, were extremely busy during 1993. In fact, their hard work resulted in more than 228,133 head of cattle from New Mexico and Texico appearing on television.

They are local representatives for Superior Livestock Auction, the nation's leading satellite video auction company headquartered in Fort Worth, Texas and Brush, Colorado. Superior representatives work with local cattle producers at marketing time to offer their cattle to a nationwide buyer base via satellite.

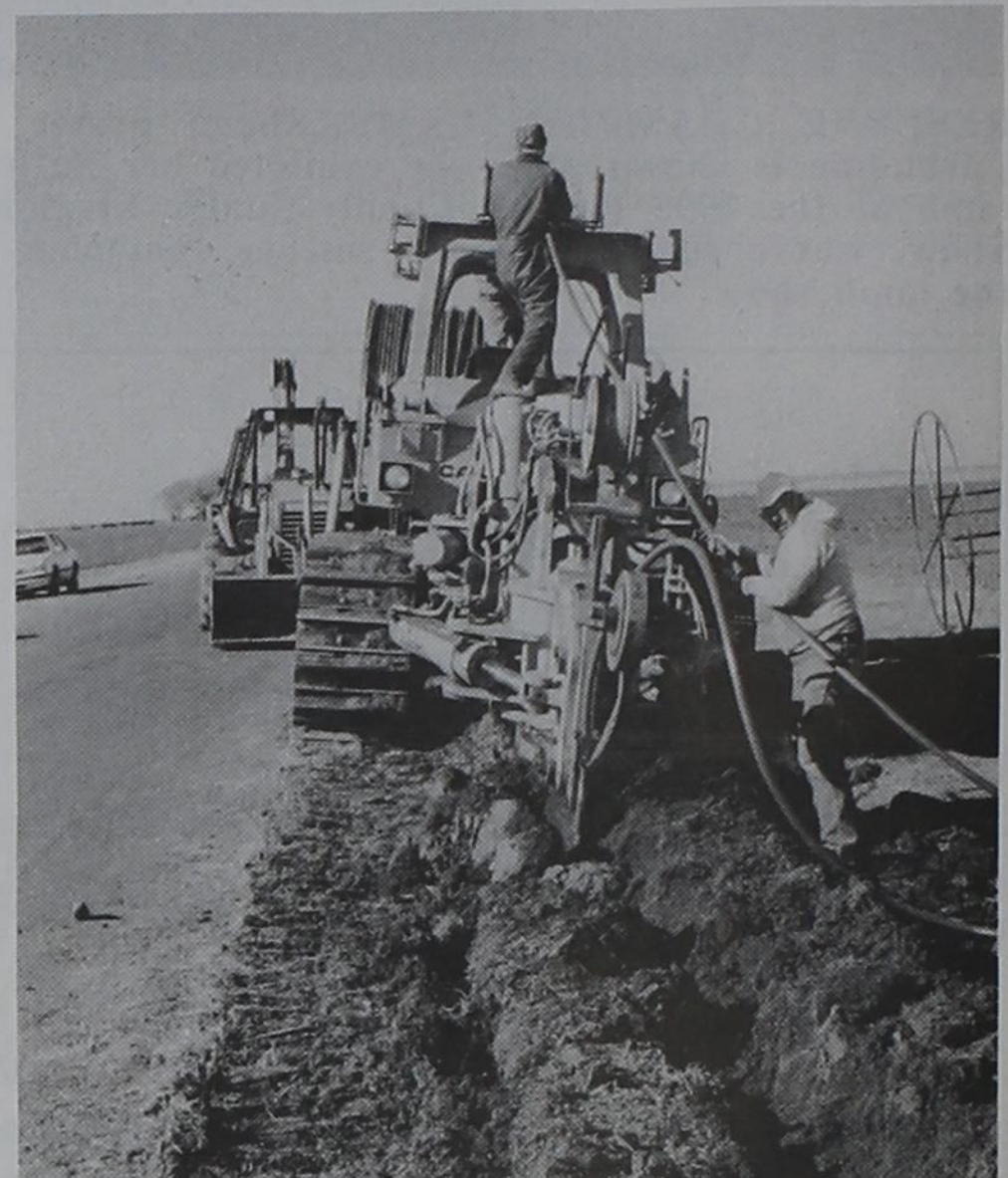
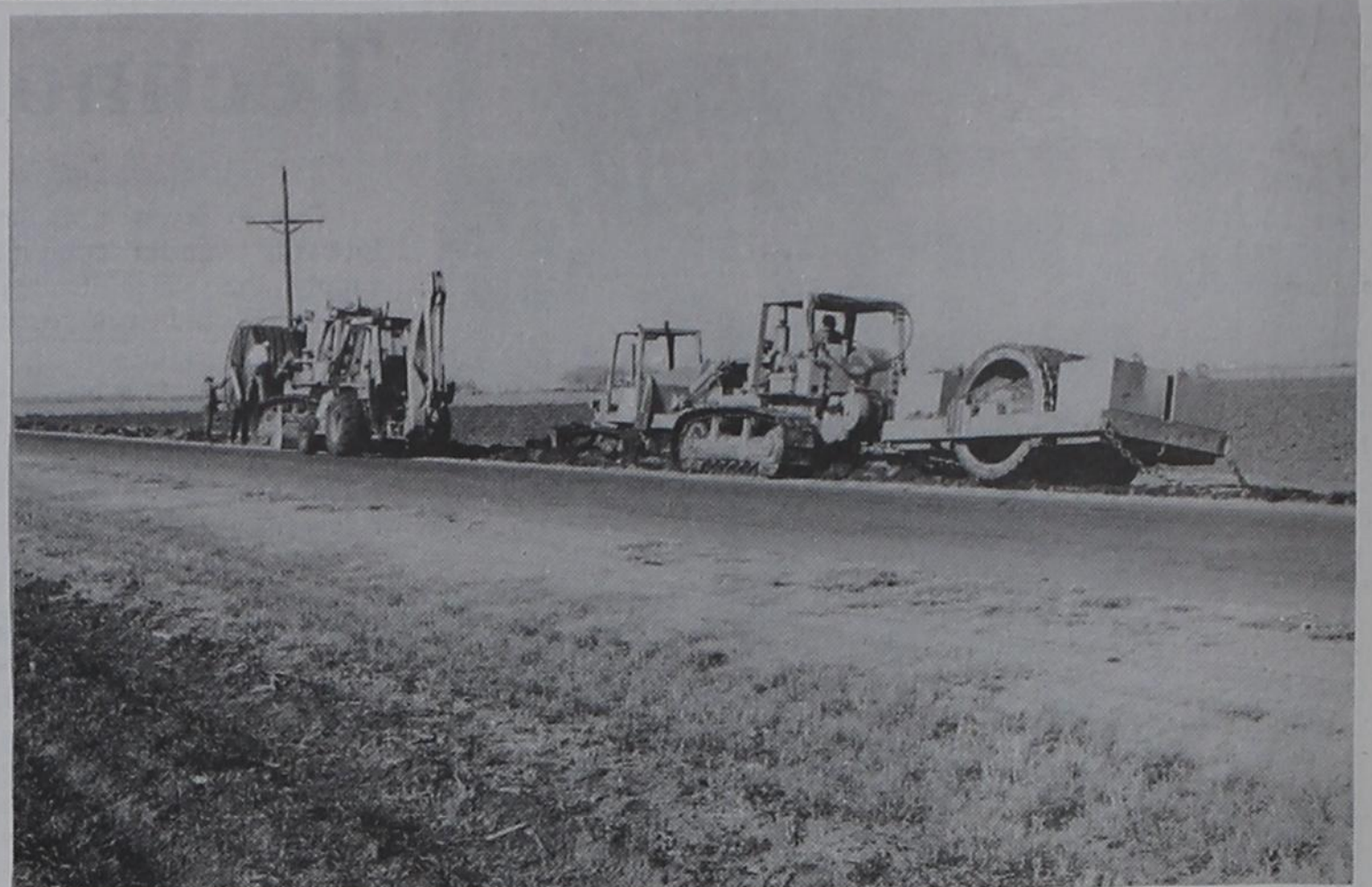
These individuals, plus 300 other representatives across the United States and Canada, worked with producers to offer more than 900,000 head of cattle by satellite video auction during 1993. These numbers make Superior Livestock Auction the largest cattle auction in the United States.

While selling cattle by satellite auction is not exactly new technology anymore (Superior held

its first sale in 1987), it's still new to a lot of folks. However, these representatives are convinced that for the producer who can sell in load lots or several producers who can pool their cattle, Superior's the way to sell. The main reasons for this conviction are numerous—the buyers get to see the cattle in their natural environment; there's less stress and shrink on the cattle because they are videotaped at home; they are not rounded up, loaded and unloaded before a buyer gets to see them; and the seller's cattle are seen by buyers from coast to coast and from Canada to Mexico creating more potential bidders.

Last year, Superior held a satellite video auction every two weeks on the average. However, due to demand, the every other Saturday sale schedule has been expanded to include every Wednesday as well.

According to Jim Odle, Superior Livestock Auction's general manager, "Our local representatives are the sole source of our success. They represent the seller's cattle all the way through the marketing process from videotaping and describing the cattle, to delivery to the new owners, and writing the check for payment in full."

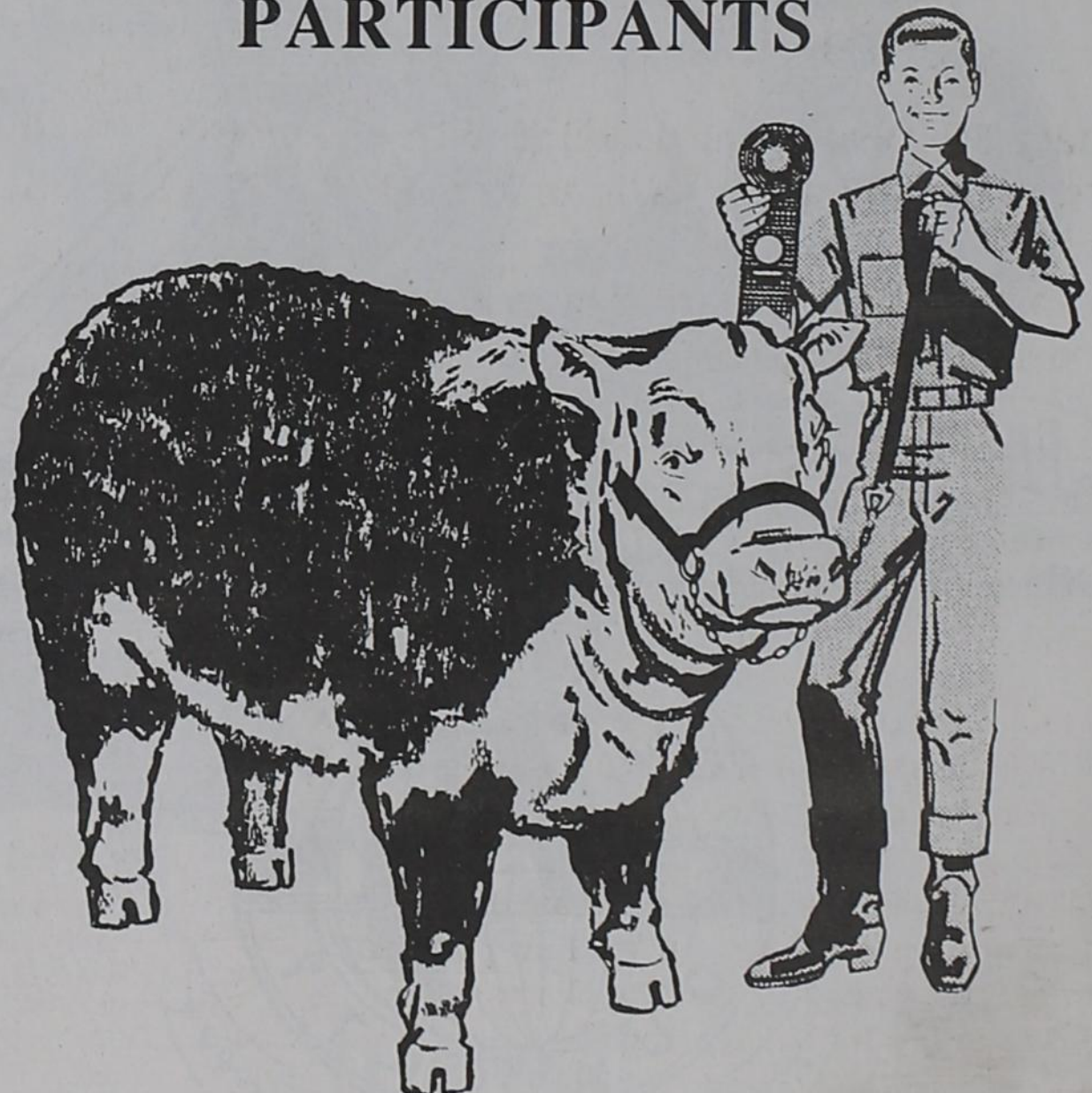

Happy Homemaker

What comes to your mind when you hear the word "Casserole"?

My Webster's Dictionary defines the word as follows: (a) a saucepan; (b) a deep round porcelain dish with a handle, used for heating substances; and (c) a mold of boiled rice, mashed potatoes or paste baked and filled with vegetables and meat.

One of my brothers defined it this way: "any combination of meat and vegetables a woman can think of."

When I first became acquainted with the word, it was used to describe the utensil in which something was cooked, but at the present time, it is rarely used that way.

Regardless of the meaning, hearing the word always brings to my mind a tasty combination of meat and vegetables which our grandmothers would have served as "hash" or "goulash."

Our first casserole recipe this week comes from the collection of Karen Kirkpatrick, who was named Bovina's "Woman of the Year" in

1977. Here's the recipe:
MEXICAN CASSEROLE

- 2 pounds hamburger
- 1 can pinto beans
- 1 onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 3 small cans tomato sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 can chopped green chilies
- 1 bag Doritos
- 6 slices American cheese

Brown meat in skillet and drain. Saute onion in skillet. Add browned meat and all other ingredients except Doritos and cheese. Simmer for one hour. Pour mixture over crushed Doritos and top with the cheese. Heat in oven until cheese is melted.

Another of Karen's recipes which any cook would be fortunate to have in her collection is:

SEVEN-UP POUND CAKE

- 1/2 cup Crisco
- 3 cups sugar
- 3 cups flour
- 2 sticks oleo
- 5 eggs

Dash of salt
1-10 oz. bottle of 7-Up
1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla
2 teaspoons lemon flavoring
Cream Crisco, sugar and oleo.
Add eggs one at a time; sift and measure flour and salt. Add flour and salt mixture alternately with 7-Up. Bake 1/2 hour at 350 degrees.

A casserole recipe Lorene Outland shared with friends and neighbors a few years ago that is very tasty is:

RICE CASSEROLE

- 1 cup raw rice (not pre-cooked)
- 2 cans beef consomme
- 1 medium onion-chopped
- 1 stick oleo

Place raw rice in casserole. Pour undiluted consomme over rice. Add chopped onion. Slice oleo over mixture. Place in preheated 350 degree oven. Bake about 40 minutes. Do not let get too dry.

Jacquelyn Magness Franklin, who grew up here and is now living in Tulsa, Oklahoma, makes a delicious squash casserole.

- 2-1/2 cups chopped yellow squash
- 1 cup diced celery
- 1 cup diced onion
- 2/3 cup oleo margarine
- 1-1/2 cups water

Combine ingredients and boil 5 minutes. Then mix:

- 2 cups cracker crumbs
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1 can mushroom soup
- Salt and pepper to taste

Stir two mixtures together and bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Kay Hinton's recipe for Lasagna Casserole is one most cooks will want to use when they need to prepare food for a large number ahead of serving time.

Fry 1 pound ground beef in 3 tablespoons olive oil and cool. Boil 2 eggs, then chop fine. Bring large lot of water to boil.

- Add:
- 2 tablespoons salt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- Large bag of white egg noodles

Boil about 15 minutes. Set out:
2 packages shredded Mozzarella cheese
1 package shredded mild cheddar cheese

- 1 cup Ricotta cheese
- Mix in small dish:
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon pepper

In two large baking dishes, place ingredients in this order: cover bottom with lasagna sauce, layer of noodles, which have been drained, Mozzarella cheese, cheddar cheese, ground beef, chopped egg, Parmesan cheese and lasagna sauce. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Use the following recipe for Lasagna Sauce. Combine:

- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/2 cup onion
- 1 pound cubed browned roast beef
- 56 ounces tomatoes
- Tablespoon salt
- 1 bay leaf

Cover and simmer 2-1/2 hours. Add one six ounce can tomato paste

This salad recipe is from the collection of the late Tommie Parker, who ran a boarding house for men in Friona many years. It was sure to be eaten every time it was served.

CHINESE MARINATED VEGETABLE SALAD

- 2-1/2 cups white vinegar
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1-17 ounce can peas (drained)
- 1-15 1/2 ounce can French style green beans
- 1 small cauliflower, broken in flowerettes and cooked
- 1 cup chopped green peppers
- 1 purple onion, thinly sliced, separated
- 1-12 ounce can shoe peg corn
- 1 can bean sprouts, drained
- 2 cups cooked carrots, sliced thinly, rinsed and cooled

Combine vinegar, sugar, salt, pepper and blend well. Combine remaining ingredients in large bowl. Pour marinade over vegetables, refrigerate at least 2 days before serving. Drain and serve.

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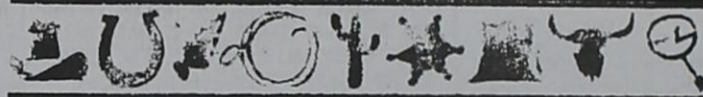
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NOTICE to Parmer County Taxpayers

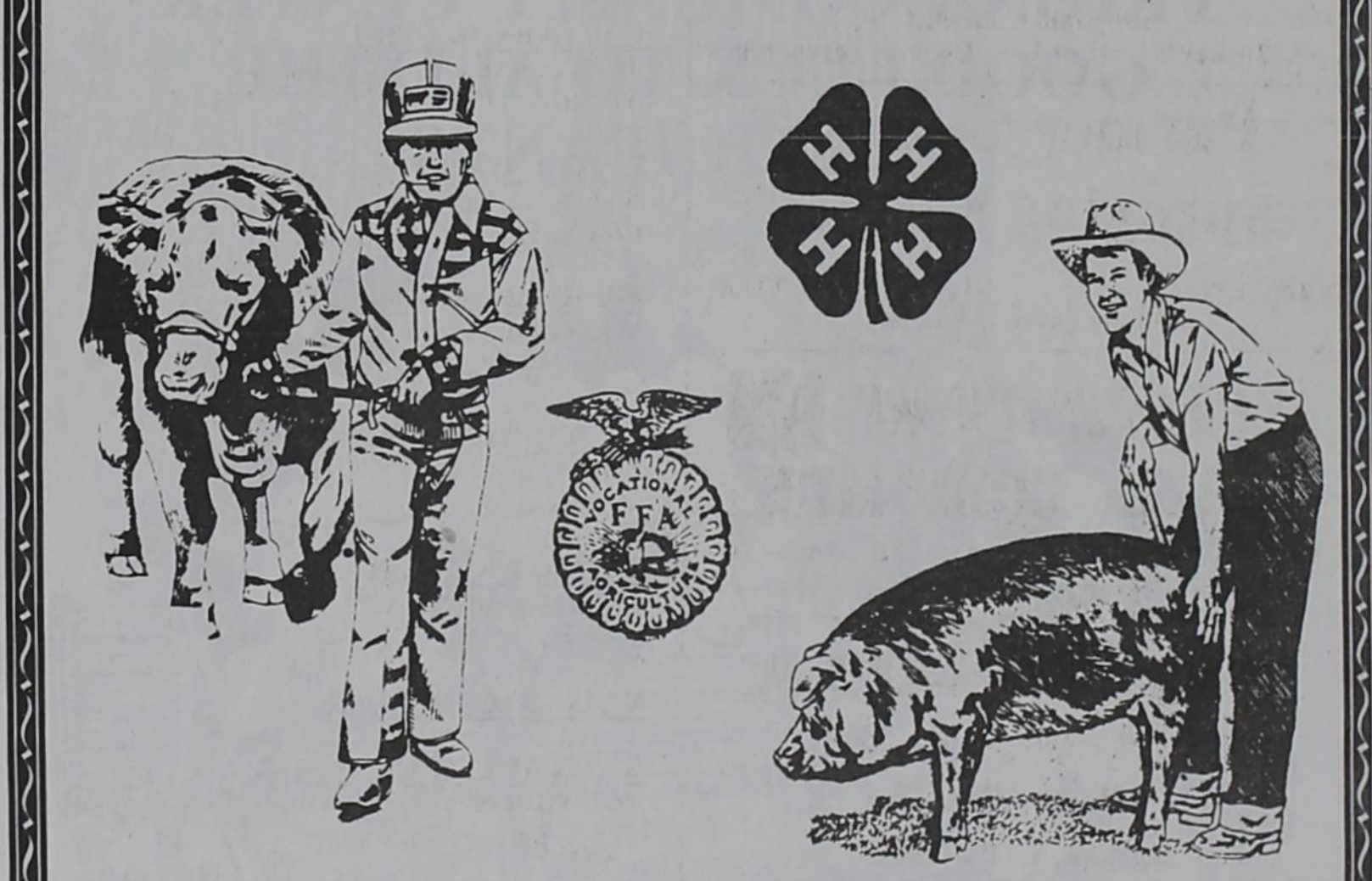

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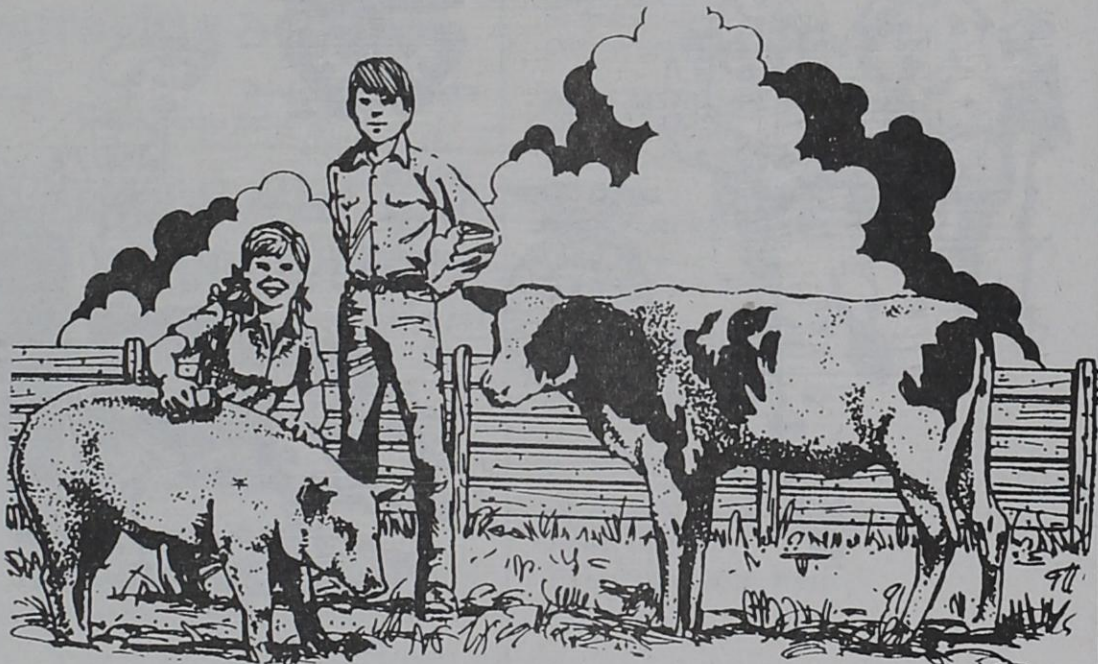

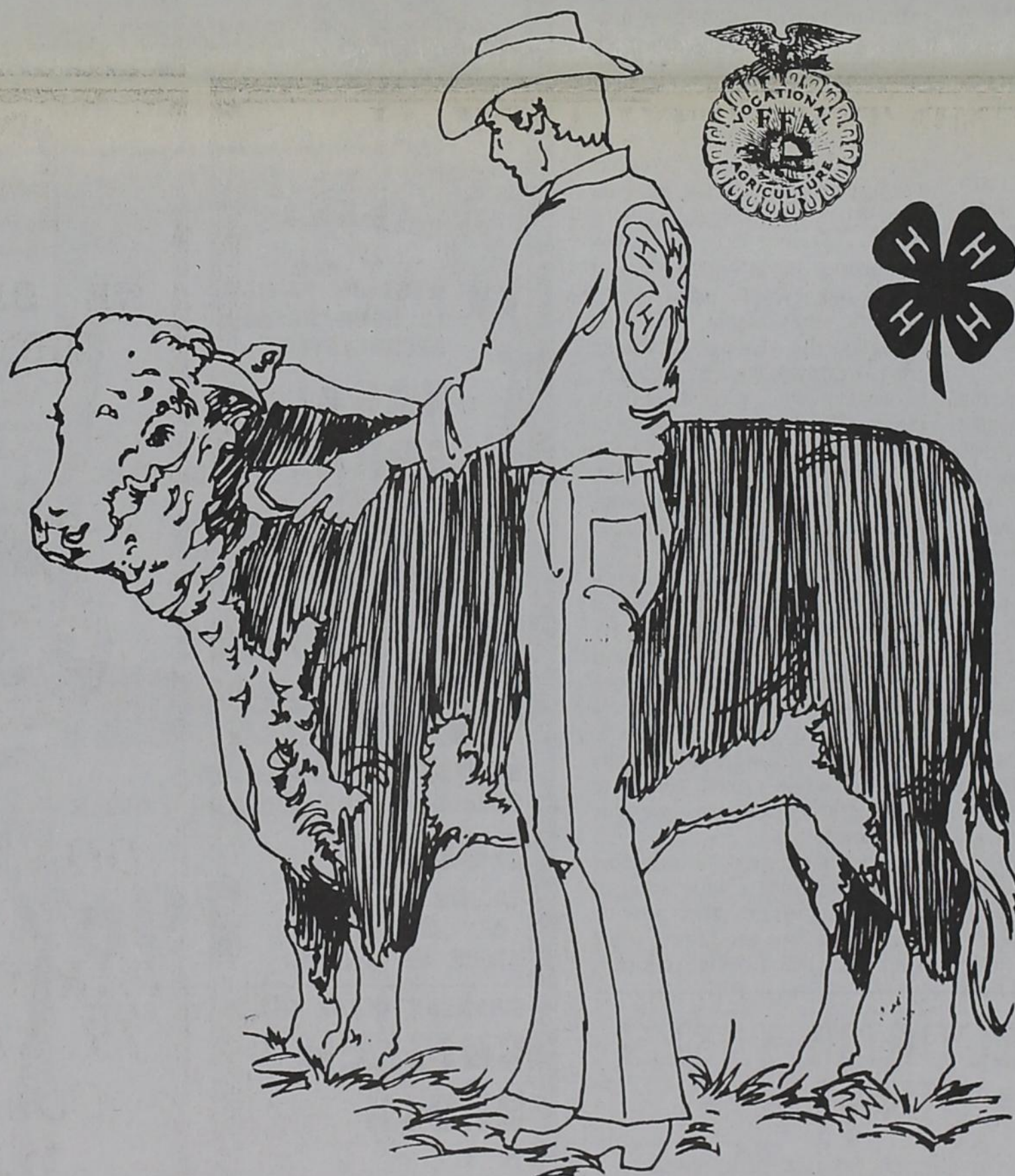

Pet Tips

*Make sure that your pets have a warm place to sleep with dry bedding--preferably a dog or cat house that is just slightly larger than the animal so their body heat can help keep them warm.

*Make sure the opening faces south--opposite the cold north wind and use carpet or some heavy waterproof material for a door.

*All outside pets need fresh, unfrozen water and lots of dry, unfrozen food to help generate body heat.

*When it is unusually cold or wet, take your pets inside your home. Remember they depend on you for love and care!

Watering Eyes

Tears clean our eyes, but excessive tearing sometimes develops as we get older. Depending on the amount of fluid involved and its cause, it can be mildly annoying or more serious.

Watering eyes most often result from excessive tear production or, conversely, poor tear drainage in the corner of the eye. The base cause, though, may be as widely varied as an eye infection, a foreign body in the eye, nasal or dental problems, uncorrected vision that is causing continual eye strain, a blocked tear gland or other general health problems.

It's not something for do-it-yourself treatment. See your optometrist, armed with information about your general health. With your input and a complete eye examination, the eye doctor may be able to determine the cause of watering eyes and offer some comfort.

If the cause of the excessive watering is eye- or health-related, both examination and treatment should be covered by Medicare.

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Safety of Principal vs. Increasing Income

Until recently, many people thought a "safe" investment had to have insured principal. Income was not a major concern, because interest rates on insured investments were generally acceptable, though not always generous.

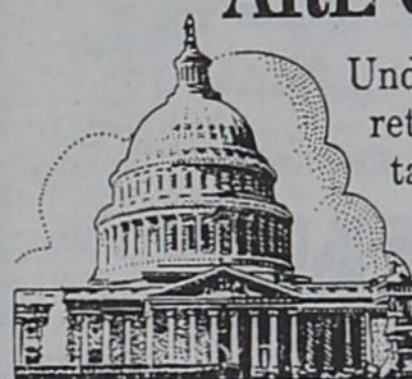
