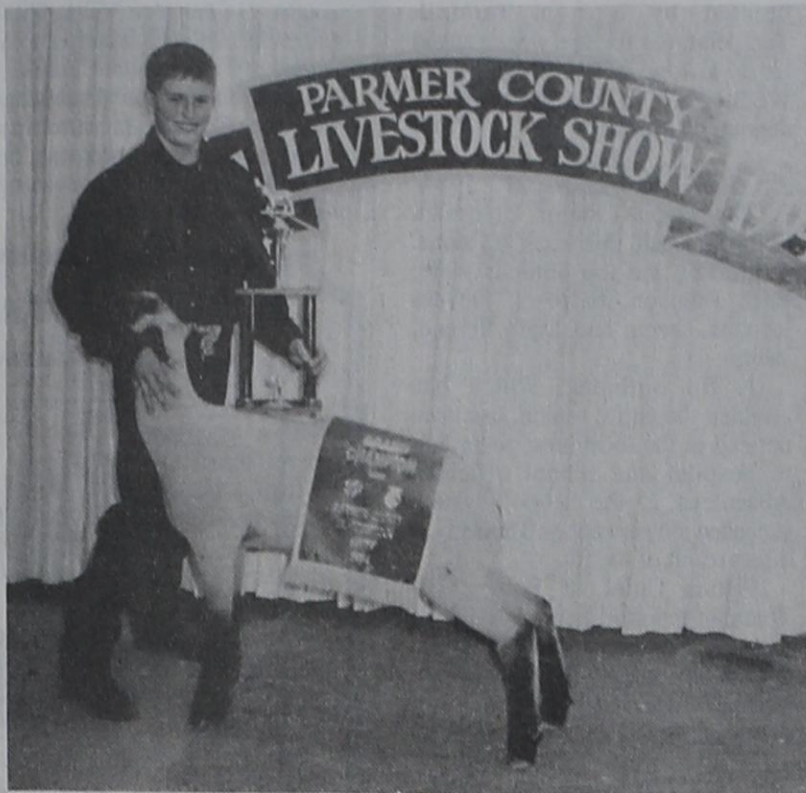

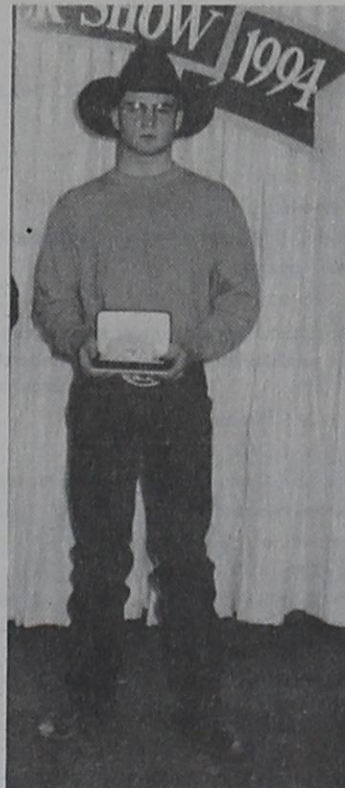
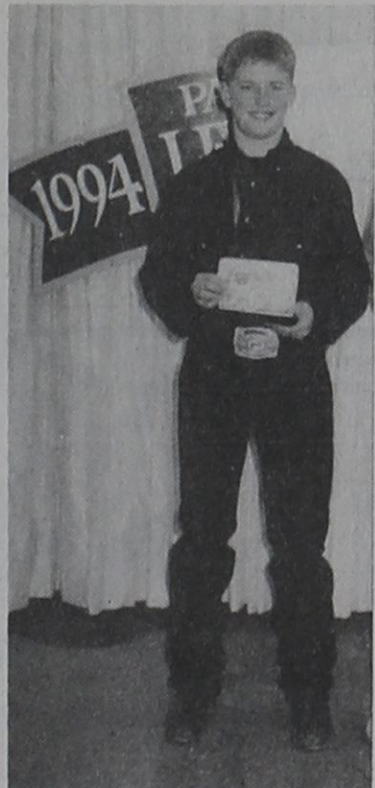

Friona Chief of Police Bill Thieman reported that a number of weather-related accidents were recorded in the city January 14-20. No one was seriously injured in any of the accidents.

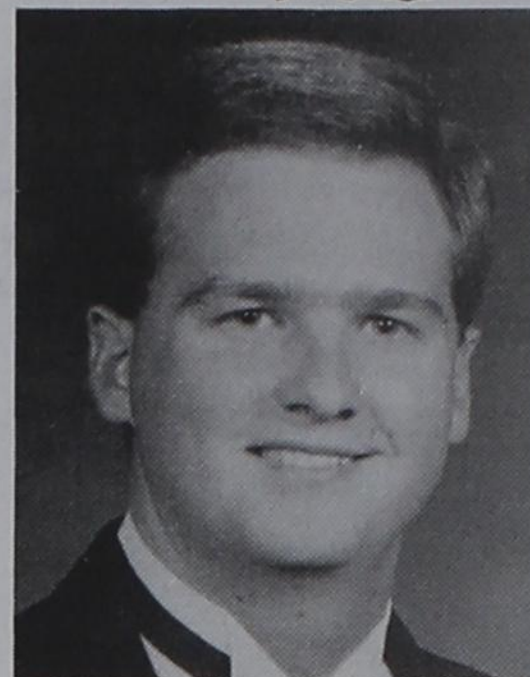
## 5 Yrs. Ago--Jan. 28, 1989

# Squaws Hand Mules First District Loss

Friona High School's Squaws rocked the previously unbeaten (in district) Lady Mules, 49-42, last Friday on Muleshoe's home court, to thrust themselves back into the thick of the battle for the district title.

The loss left Muleshoe with a 4-1 district record. Friona, Tulia and Littlefield stand at 3-2 apiece; Dimmitt is at 2-3, and Floydada 0-5, following the completion of the first half of district play.

However, the 1994 district champion and second playoff representative will be determined on the overall record, as the district is not being competed on a "first and second half basis," as in the past.

Thus, Friona is shooting for an 8-2 district record overall, getting to host both Muleshoe and Tulia in the second half. Those with a poorer first-half record, such as Dimmitt and Floydada, find themselves really "under the gun."

But the team pulled together, and held on for the big win. Miss Goddard scored four points, and Britny White six (all of her points), in the final quarter.

Miss Downey led all scorers with 17 points. Miss Davenport scored 12 and Donna Puckett 11 to lead Muleshoe.

On Tuesday at home, the Squaws downed Floydada, 48-23, to make their record 16-8 and 3-2.

Friona held leads of 10-2, 20-6 and 34-19.

Miss Downey scored 23 points to pace Friona.

"We just need to stay focused and take each game as it comes. If we can do that, we can win district," Belcher said.

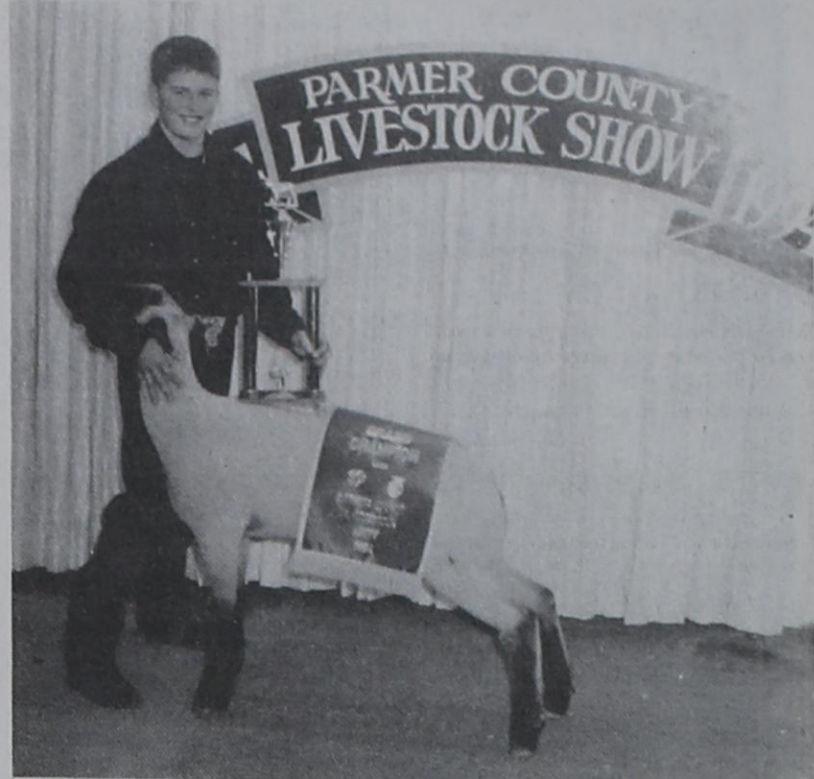

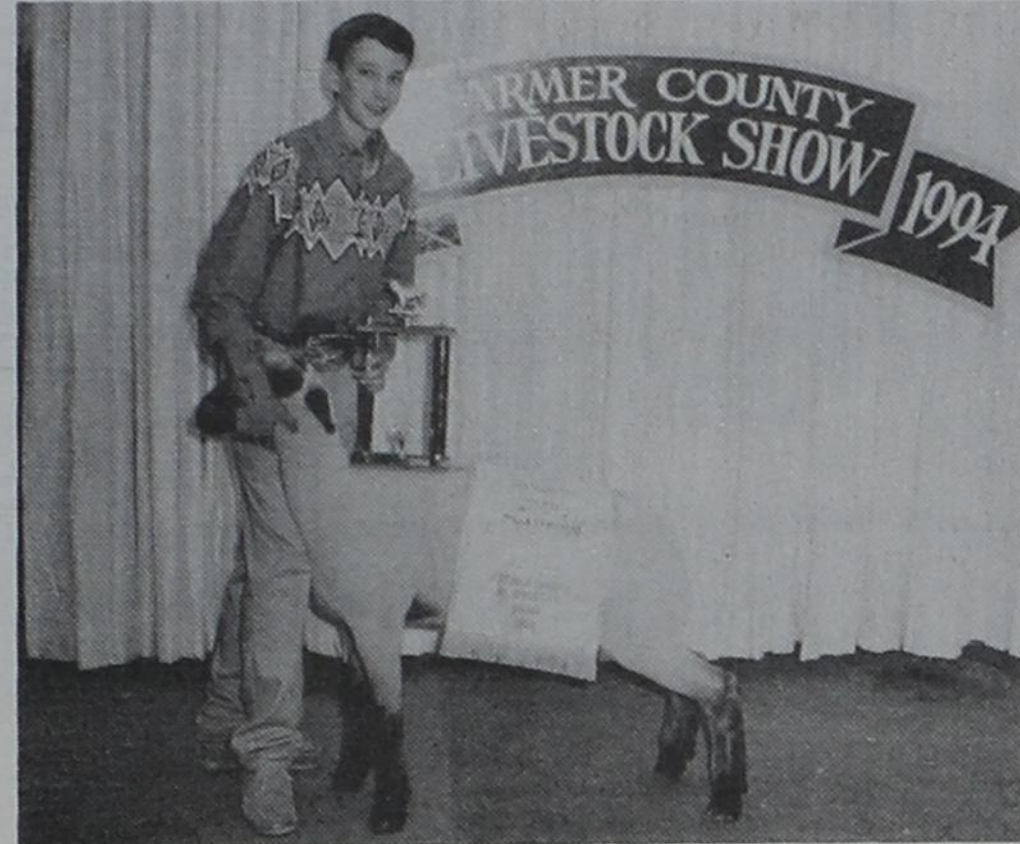

## Comptroller Applauds St. Treasurer

State Comptroller John Sharp has congratulated State Treasurer Martha Whitehead for contracting with the Comptroller's Office to collect, audit and enforce the state tobacco tax.

"Critics of this plan are just blowing smoke," Sharp said. "We have consulted with the Attorney General regarding this interagency contract. It's a very routine procedure for state agencies to contract with one another to provide services, and in this instance, it's the cheapest way to get the job done."

"By providing tobacco tax collection and enforcement services for the State Treasury, we can cut the number of workers required to perform those duties in half and save Texas taxpayers more than a half million dollars during this biennium."

Sharp says his office will be able to collect the tobacco tax more efficiently than the Treasury, making the most of a revenue source which has declined steadily as tobacco sales have declined.

"I don't mind if we collect less tax because people are kicking the tobacco habit. But if anybody has a habit of not paying taxes on tobacco products, I'll cure them of it," Sharp said.

He was a farmer/rancher in the Friona area, was a past member of the Friona American Legion Post 206, was named "Man of the Year" by the Friona Chamber of Commerce in 1962, was an Army veteran of World War II, a member of Calvary Baptist Church and Friona Lions Club.

His survivors include a daughter, Kathy Lester, and son-in-law, Wade Lester of Del Norte, Colorado; two brothers, Horace Jones of Los Angeles, California and Albert Jones of Vernon, Texas; three sisters, Jessie Crowover of Santa Rosa, California, Daisy Billings of Lubbock, Texas and Margie Petty of Vallicent, Oklahoma.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Ollie Jones, in 1950 and Ed Jones in 1923, and a brother, Bob, in 1978.

## FmHA Farm Borrowers Restructure Debts

"Farmers with loans from the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) may be able to put flood-damaged land under conservation easements in exchange for a reduction in their debt," George Ellis, FmHA State Director, said today.

Use of the easements is not limited to flood areas, but it may be particularly helpful in such areas.

"Eligible lands may include wetlands, marginal farmland, highly erodible land, woodland, wildlife area, and several other," Ellis said. "In certain areas, there may be instances where farmland was damaged so severely by the recent flooding that restoring it may cost more than its agricultural value."

"In those cases, a conservation easement may be a solution. Under this program, a voluntary easement can be placed on a portion of the land in return for a reduction in the

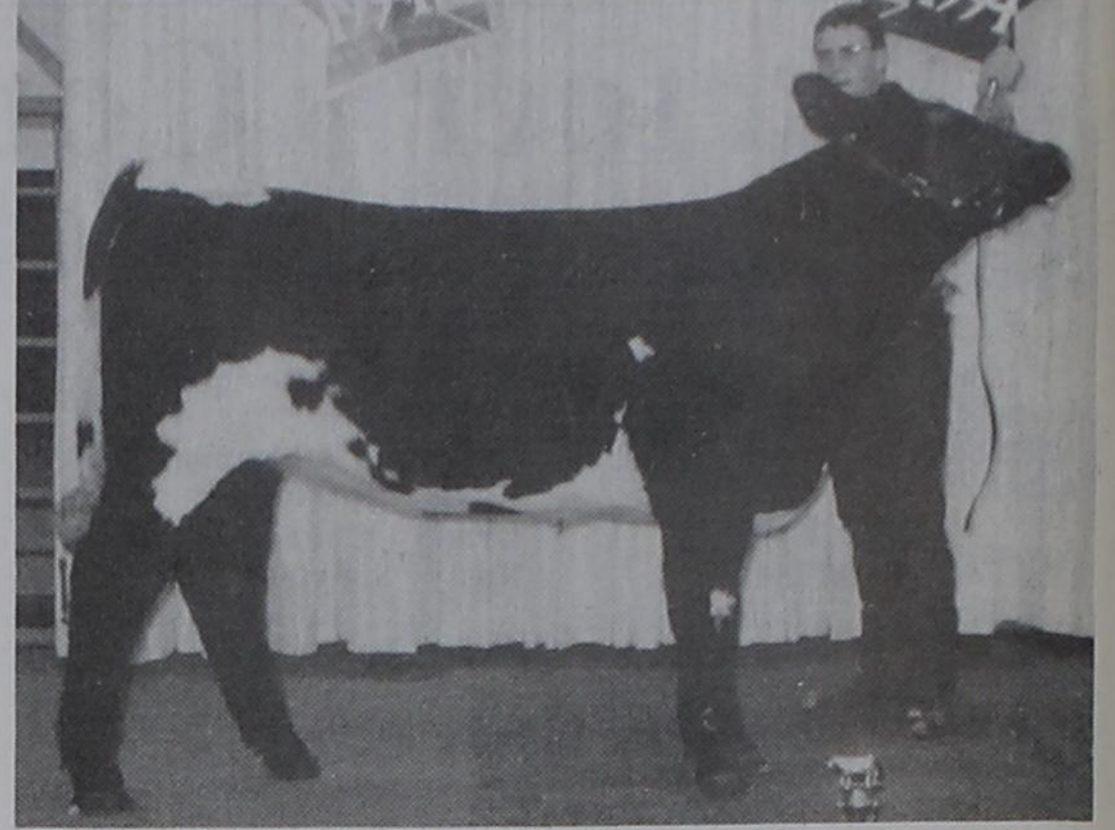

# Happy Homemaker

By JUNE FLOYD

This week we are borrowing these recipes from Donna Mitchell of Bovina. Donna and her husband, Larry, are long time residents of Bovina and have been active in that city's Volunteer Ambulance Service for at least fifteen years.

She's the daughter of Martha and the late Wendell Garner and a 1971 graduate of Friona High School.

Some of her favorite recipes are:

## CARROT CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1-1/4 cups Crisco oil
- 3 eggs
- Flat can crushed pineapple, drained well
- 1 cup angel flake coconut
- 2 cups finely grated carrots
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat the oil into sugar until it dissolves. Add the eggs, beating well after each addition. Add the remaining ingredients.

Sift together:

- 2 cups plus 1 tablespoon flour
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Add 1 cup chopped pecans dredged in a little flour. Bake in an 8x16 or 8x8x2 loaf pan at 350 degrees. Test the cake at 30 minutes.

## ICING

- 8 ounce package Philadelphia cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup lemon juice or less
- 1 pound sifted confectioners sugar and a little grated lemon rind

## WHOLE WHEAT POUND CAKE

- 2 sticks butter, soft
- 2 cups sugar
- 5 eggs
- 2 tablespoons vanilla
- 2 tablespoons honey
- Dash salt
- 1-3/4 cup whole wheat flour
- 1/2 cup white flour

Beat butter well, add sugar beating at medium speed. Add

eggs, one at a time, then remaining ingredients, flour last. Beat well. Pour into a greased and floured 10" tube pan. Bake at 300 degrees for one hour and then at 325-350 degrees until brown. Cool five minutes. Turn out on rack.

## KAROB FUDGE BROWNIES

- 3/4 cup sifted whole wheat flour
- 1/2 teaspoon low, sodium baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt substitute
- 4 tablespoons Karob powder
- 1/3 cup melted butter
- 1/2 cup honey
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts or sunflower seeds
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine flour, salt and baking powder and sift. Add Karob to melted butter, add honey to eggs, and Karob mixture to egg mixture, then add to flour mixture. Spread in oiled 9x9x2 pan. Bake 25-30 minutes at 350 degrees.

- 2 teaspoons paprika
- 2 teaspoons A-1 Sauce
- 2 teaspoons onion juice

Let butter and cheese soften. Mix with hands. Mix all ingredients except nuts. Put on waxed paper and shape into log or balls. Chill until firm. Press toasted nuts all over log or ball. Keep refrigerated.

- 1-1/2 cups white sugar
- 1-1/2 cups brown sugar
- 1 cup oleo

## Screening Date Is Set At Hospital

On Tuesday, February 15, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital

Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Friona, at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland.

Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment, call 1-800-377-HOPE, (4673), or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the X-ray, physical breast exam and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

Breast screening guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination every month; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age: age 40, one baseline mammogram; 40-49, a mammogram every 1-2 years; 50 and over, yearly mammograms.

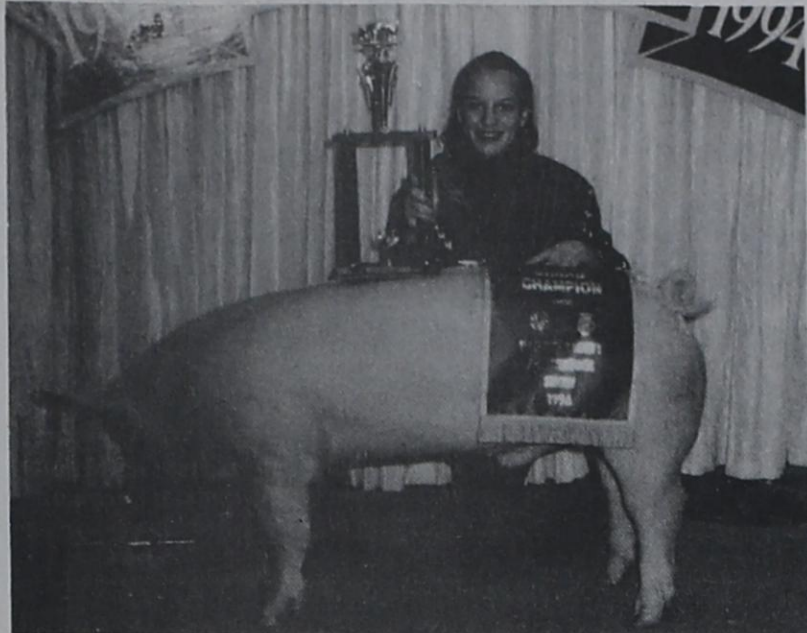

### Through Rose-Colored Glasses

Seeing the world "through rose-colored glasses" once meant having an unrealistically optimistic view. Today, rose-colored glasses--and other tints, too--do more than beautify the world and, often, the complexion of the eye-

glass wearer. They also offer a degree of visual comfort. They can ease the harshness of fluorescent lighting and make hours at a video display terminal more comfortable.

The tints range in color from beige and gray to pink, blue, green and brown, often covering the entire lens. Another option is the gradient lens, with the darkest shade at the top of the lens, fading down to a light tint at the bottom. Some wearers have found they make a high prescription--strong lenses--look softer and less obvious.

Early tinted lenses could only enhance the natural color of the eye, but newer types can actually change the apparent color of the eye--even to make brown eyes blue--without jeopardizing vision or comfort.

### The Don'ts of Investing

Successful investors often are credited with having a sixth sense of knowing where to be at the right time. The truth is that much of their success comes from not only what they do, but also from what they don't do.

Here are some common investment mistakes you may want to avoid.

1. Don't invest from your rear-view mirror. Some investors rely on magazine ratings that show the past year's top-performing investments. A recent 20-year study showed that the top-performing mutual fund in any given year almost invariably performed worse the following year. In fact, six of the 20 winning funds surveyed--nearly one in three--actually lost money in the year after their big performance records.

2. Don't invest only in quick, double-your-money deals. Investments offer some risks, but losing all your money shouldn't be one of them. Home runs are nice, but they generally come with a lot of strikeouts. A good financial plan should aim for consistency rather than a possible home run now and then.

3. Don't procrastinate. The best time to invest is when you have the money. Waiting for the perfect time to invest is futile. Regardless of the economy, you can always find an investment that offers opportunity.

4. Don't invest without considering inflation. Today's retirees can reasonably plan to live for another 20 years. Investing with the sole purpose of protecting principal can lead to a systematic decline in income. In recent years, retirees have seen the income from insured savings drop from as much as 16 per cent to record lows of 3 per cent and less.

5. Don't invest for the highest income. Looking for the most income can be as dangerous as accepting too little. Investments that promise considerably higher-than-average returns generally offer more risk. For example, when long-term investment-grade corporate bonds were yielding 8 per

cent, it was possible to find non-rated bonds yielding twice that amount. The problem was that some people who invested in these bonds lost not only their high income, but also their precious principal.

6. Don't invest only to avoid taxes. Millions of dollars have been sacrificed for tax write-offs. There was a time when losing money to save taxes was fashionable. Top-bracket investors seemed to ignore the fact that, to beat the Internal Revenue Service out of 31 cents, they had to lose 69 cents for every dollar invested.

But what about the strategy of holding on to stock to avoid paying capital gains? The only way to avoid a capital gains tax is to give the stock away or wait until it goes to its original cost and eliminate the gain altogether--hardly a sound investment decision.

7. Don't invest on the advice of "experts." You need only to turn on your television or pick up any financial publication to find enough financial "experts" selling their formulas for getting rich. If you want financial advice, select someone you trust, with a proven reputation, who will be there when you need him or her.

Following these investment "don'ts" may not be exciting, but it's the common-sense way to protect yourself from making costly mistakes.

### It's A Girl For Joneses

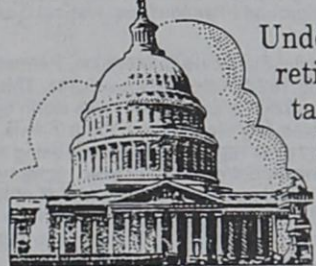
Robert and Becky Jones of Friona became the parents of a baby girl at 12:25 p.m. on January 15 in Lubbock Methodist Hospital.
