When Abraham Lincoln was a young man he ran for the legislature of Illinois and was badly swamped. He next entered business—failed—and spent 17 years of his life paying up the debts of a worthless partner.

Entering politics again he ran for Congress and was badly defeated. He then tried for an appointment in the United States Land Office, but failed. After this he became a candidate for the United States Senate and was defeated.

In 1856 he became a candidate for the vice presidency, but lost the race. In 1858 he was once more defeated, this time by Douglas.

In the face of all this, he eventually became one of the country's greatest men, if not the greatest.

SCHOOL ADVERTISING

Paid advertising pays large dividends to Texas colleges and universities. That is the belief of the officers of the Texas State Teachers' association, who have made a survey of the question this year.

School advertising has hit a high mark in Texas this year, the underlying aim being to turn the tide of Texas students to Texas schools. Wary of advertising on a large scale for many years, Texas school leaders now recognize that they must present their wares to the home folks.

Prospects for the fall term enrollments are the best in the history of the Texas schools. Dormitories will be crowded; classrooms will be taxed to capacity; additions will be made to the number of every Texas faculty; new buildings are being rushed to completion.

It is estimated that students who will leave Texas for school this year will be fewer than ever before, and this number will be confined principal-

ly to graduate students who will do research work in other fields. A still smaller number, however, will flit away again to a fashionable girls school, or to a military academy in a distant state.

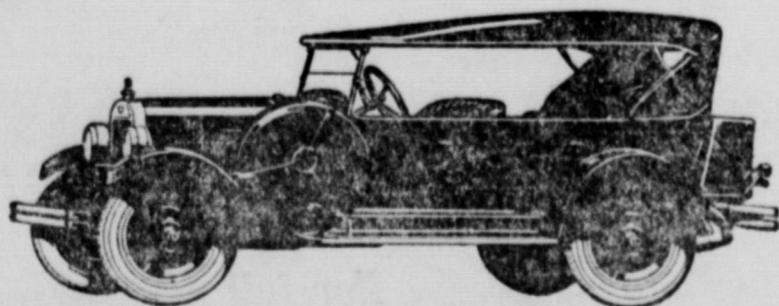
