FARM FIRE PROTECTION

In a booklet just published entitled "Safeguarding the Farm Against fire," the National Board of Fire Underwriters says:

"The farmer, above all others, needs to give special attention to the reduction of fire hazards and the adoption of protective methods. This is true for several reasons. In the first place his house, barn and outbuildings usuailly are constructed of combustible materials; being more or less isolated, they are peculiarly subject to lightning stroke; kerosene and gasoline are likely to be stored about the premises and used for light and power; the farmer crams his barn with hav, straw and feed all of which are subject to spontaneous combustion; and last, but by no means least, he is nearly always beyond the reach of organized fire protection.

"Fire precautions ought to be integral part of the original plan of a farmstead. Its various buildings should be separated that if a fire occurs, in one, the rest will not inevitabely be doomed. 




