## Mrs. Miriam Ferguson Has 70,000 Majority

Returns From 220 Counties Early Sunday Give Mrs. Ferguson 293,460, Robertson 221,735 In August Run-off.

### FIRST WOMAN GOVERNOR IN U. S.

Race Lieutenant Governor Close—Moody Leads Two to One For Attorney General—Cureton Chief Justice.

#### By Texas Election Bureau.

DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 23.—With 455,851 votes tabulated at midnight, Mrs. Miriam Ferguson had a lead of 71,725, with the probability that she will have a final majority of between eighty and ninety thousand. The total vote will probably be about 700,000. At midnight only one race was in doubt, that of Lieutenant Governor. The total vote at 12:30 from 220 counties on governor, including 40 complete, was Mrs. Ferguson 293,460, Robertson 221,735. For Lieutenant Governor, Edwards 225,153, Miller 229,779.

Dan Moody was well on the way toward a sweeping victory having a two to one edge over Ward in the Attorney General's race. The vote was 247,799, Ward 112,180.

For Comptroller, Baker's vote was 119,709, Terrell 222,184.

For State Railroad Commissioner, six year term, Clarence E. Gilmore received 205,950 votes, Weaver 130,641.

For the four years term in the State Railroad Commission, Lon A. Smith led W. A. Nabors, 186,765, to 151,794.

C. M. Cureton was apparently elected Chief Justice of the Supreme Court over Wear, the vote being 195,715 to 140,511.

#### Taylor County.

Twenty-five out of 26 boxes in Taylor County gave Robertson 2550, Ferguson 2295. The box missing is one in Abilene that normally polls 800 votes and is believed will be carried by Robertson.

#### Carries Mitchell.

Special to The Reporter. COLORADO, Texas, Aug. 23.—Early indications are that Mrs. Miriam Ferguson will carry Mitchell County by 350 votes.

## TEXAS EDUCATOR DIES IN DALLAS

Dr. J. M. Bralley, President of C. I. A., Denton, Succumbs to Pneumonia Saturday.

### WIFE IN SERIOUS CONDITION

Head of Denton School 10 Years—Flag in Austin Half Mast in Memory.

By The United Press. DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 23.—Dr. F. M. Bralley, 59, president of the College of Industrial Arts at Denton, died suddenly here early today after a short illness.

Dr. Bralley came here a week ago for treatment of a bronchial affliction and was apparently recovering. Late Friday he suffered a relapse and sank rapidly, dying at 5 a. m. Mrs. Bralley, who is also in the hospital for treatment, was in a serious condition today.

Dr. Bralley was appointed State Superintendent of Public Instruction, effective January 1, 1910. He was elected to succeed himself at the expiration of the appointment. He was later made a faculty member of the State University and served in that capacity until he became head of the Denton school in 1914.

## MRS FERGUSON CARRIES COUNTY

With Exception of Mulberry Canyon Nolan County Votes 1391 to 1333 In Favor of Ferguson.

### WILL SCOTT IS ELECTED

Defeats Miss Minnie Fowler For County Superintendent of Schools In Close Race.

Mrs. Miriam Ferguson carried Nolan County by less than 100 votes and Will H. Scott defeated Miss Minnie Fowler for County Superintendent of Schools. These were the outstanding features of the August primary in Nolan County.

The vote on Governor was very close. Mrs. Ferguson carried Sweetwater 660 to 628, Bitter Creek 25 to 0, White Flat 41 to 38, Dora, 48 to 34, Barnett 8 to 2, Roscoe, 266 to 259, Section House 48 to 20, Maryneal 73 to 18, and Bridges 24 to 11. Felix D. Robertson carried Dora 48 to 37, Nolan 46 to 40, Hylton 57 to 27, Decker 22 to 36, Blackwell 144 to 75 and Champion 40 to 34. Rocky Crossing voted at Blackwell and Wastella at Roscoe. Mulberry Canyon was not in at an early hour Sunday morning. The totals were 1391 for Ferguson to 1333 for Robertson, without Mulberry Canyon.

The race for County School Superintendent was also close, Will Scott winning by a vote of 1442 to 1332. Miss Fowler carried Sweetwater 700 to 606, Dora 47 to 30, Maryneal 49 to 42. Scott carried every other box in the county.

In the race for Lieutenant Governor Will C. Edwards defeated Barry Miller in the county, 1398 to 1191.

For Chief Justice Supreme Court, C. M. Cureton 1399, W. C. Wear 1012. For Attorney General, Dan Moody led John C. Ward heavily, the vote standing 1688 to 766.

C. E. Gilmore led E. E. Weaver for State Railroad Commissioner, 6-year term, 1472 to 904.

For the 4-year term, State Railroad Commissioner, Lon A. Smith led W. A. Nabors 1425 to 967.

For Comptroller S. H. Terrell carried the county 867 to 1332.

## IDENTIFY VICTIM

Body of American Killed in Honduras That of Kentuckian Who Recently Left U. S.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 23.—The American citizen killed near Puerto Castilla, Honduras, on the morning of August 21, has been identified by the State Department as George Hamilton, Mt. Sterling, Ky., who left this country for Central America a short time ago.

Marines sent to La Cieba, have not yet landed, according to the State Department.

## DAWES AND DAVIS AGREE ON K K K

G. O. P. Vice Presidential Nominee Declares Opposition to Order in Address.

### NO PLACE IN CAMPAIGN

Organization Might Lead Civilization Back Into Savagery, "Hell and Maria" Says.

AUGUSTA, Me., Aug. 23.—Accepting the challenge to define his position on the Ku Klux Klan, General Charles G. Dawes declared today that he was "opposed" to the organization as one whose activities might "lead civilization back into the savagery from which it had evolved."

Speaking at a huge gathering of Maine Republicans, Dawes departed from his set speech at the very outset and launched into the Klan subject.

He branded the order as "contrary to the spirit and letter of the constitution," took cognizance of "those adventurous people who become Klansmen to take the law into their own hands when cowardly office holders and voters fail to do their duty," and added, "I agree with Mr. Davis that the Klan has no part in this or any other campaign."

## DUG BABY GRAVE TO HIDE SHAME

Father, 19, and Bride of Three Months Frustrated in Attempt to Bury Child Alive.

### HELD FOR GRAND JURY

Rather Bury Child Than Face Disgrace, Young Couple Declare in Their Confession.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 23.—Loren Person, and his bride of three months, chose to bury their baby, Donald, 13 days old, alive, "rather than face disgrace and condemnation."

This was the substance of Loren's confession to police today after three men thwarted the attempt to bury the child alive in a lonely pasture last night.

Indiscretion led to the near tragic denouement, the couple admitted. "We decided to kill the baby to save our families and ourselves," they confessed. The young couple were arraigned this afternoon and held for the grand jury on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

## PLEADS FOR PACT

Chancellor Marx in Reichstag Opens Debate to Decide Fate of London Agreements.

BERLIN, Germany, Aug. 23.—Chancellor Marx in an impassioned address before the Reichstag today appealed for ratification of the Pact of London. His speech is the prelude to the debate and vote that will decide the fate of the London accords.

As he defended the policies of the German delegates who agreed to the pact he was loudly cheered by the government representatives in the chamber, while the Communists booted. Marx described the delegates and their tactics in London, paid tribute to the non-partisan leadership of Ramsay MacDonald, British Premier, and declared that while the pact imposes heavy burdens, the German delegation succeeded in mitigating them somewhat.

Failure to secure quick evacuation of the occupied zones in the Ruhr was due, he said, to "insurmountable forces." That some should be skeptical about evacuation was natural, Marx said, in view of the Germans' infelicitious experiences with the Allies promises since peace was declared.

## Fear Fog Baffled Italian Aviator Lost In Greenland

HALIFAX, Nova Scotia, Aug. 23.—Lt. Locatelli, the Italian aviator, never passed Cape Farewell, natives of Greenland said on returning from a search of the west coast of the island for the missing aviator.

This was learned in an intercepted radio message tonight from the cruiser Milwaukee to the Chief of the Army Air Service, Major General Patrick. The message, intercepted at 7:45, read:

## NAME DICTATOR IN REPARATIONS

Owen B. Young Expected to Accept Post Offered By London Conference Soon.

### RUFUS DAWES TO HELP

Agent General of Reparations Most Powerful Office in Working Out Dawes Plan.

PARIS, France, Aug. 23.—Owen B. Young probably will announce his acceptance of the post of "reparations dictator" next week according to reliable reports in official quarters here. He has summoned Rufus Dawes to Paris to be his assistant.

Dawes is the brother of General Dawes. The conference in London to put the Dawes plan in effect asked Young to be "Agent of Reparations" the most powerful position under the regulations for applying the scheme.

Young has refused to announce his decision but reparations circles expect his acceptance.

Mean time, after adjourning at 2 a. m., the Chamber of Deputies reconvened at 10 o'clock to resume the debate on the Pact of London.

## Bare Foot Bet On Ma and Felix May Not Materialize

After the election returns have been tallied and the winner in the race between "Ma" and Felix declared, Sweetwater may witness the parade of a sober and dignified citizen through the streets, without the customary covering for the feet. For a "bare foot bet" was made between a woman supporting the Ku Klux Klan and a man who voted for Mrs. Ferguson Saturday.

According to the terms of the bet, the loser was to walk bare footed from the 500 block on Locust street to the T-P tracks, go a block south, and then walk to the Hotel Wright. It was understood that the "big middle of the main drag" was to be reserved for the parade.

It was reported late Saturday by the Anti that his woman opponent had backed out. He said that he offered to pay her fine if local custodians of the peace objected to her barefooted pilgrimage. The report was not confirmed by the woman, however, and Sweetwater may yet be treated to the unusual promenade by one of the betters.

## CHARGE FORGERY

Former Assistant Treasurer of Department of Education Said to Have Altered Records.

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 23.—R. M. Minger, former assistant treasurer in the Department of Education, was sought tonight on a warrant charging forgery and alteration of the departmental records.

The complaint was sworn out by S. M. N. Marrs, State Superintendent of Public Instruction today as the result of an investigation into reports of trafficking in school teachers' examination questions.

## CAR MAY BE WON IN FINAL WEEK

**U S AT PARLEY**

Inter-Parliamentary Union 22nd Session—Twenty-Nine Countries Represented.

By HENRY WOOD

(United Press Staff Correspondent) BERNE, Aug. 23.—The twenty-second annual conference of the Inter-Parliamentary Union, which has been officially invited to hold its next annual session in the United States, convened yesterday.

In spite of the fact that the United States Senate, which extended the official invitation to the Union to meet next year in some American city and which also voted a heavy subsidy for meeting the expenses of the conference, is on record as not loving the League of Nations, the Interparliamentary Union will dedicate its conference this year largely to establishing a basis of collaboration with the League.

Following a six days' session here, the entire conference will adjourn to Geneva for the purpose of visiting the secretariat of the League of Nations, the International Labor Bureau, and for sitting in for the first few days on the fifth annual assembly of the League of Nations, which will convene on September 1. The delegates will also take personal cognizance of the work of the League council, which is summoned also at Geneva for August 29.

**29 States Represented.**

With the opening of the conference this morning delegations were present from virtually all of the 30 countries that are members of the Union. These states are as follows: United States, Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Canada, Chili, Czecho-Slovakia, Denmark, Dutch East Indies, Estonia, France, Finland, Germany, England, Greece, Holland, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Poland, Roumania, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Yugo-Slavia.

The program includes such subjects as Parliamentary Control of Foreign Policy; Colonial Mandates and the League of Nations; Economics and Financial questions; Immigration, Reduction of Armaments and the problem of reparations.

The American delegation includes Senators Weller of Maryland, Curtis of Kansas, McKinley of Illinois, Spencer of Missouri, and Caraway of Arkansas, and Representative Burton of Ohio, Connally of Texas, McSwain of South Carolina, and Montague of Virginia.

**BRAZIL IS CALM**

**Visitors Surprised at Unconcern of Natives as Revolution Rages Near By.**

By U. G. KEENER

(United Press Staff Correspondent)

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 23.—Americans in Brazil, and other foreigners, who spent the days of the Sao Paulo revolution in Rio de Janeiro were unanimous in branding the Brazilian the most apathetic person in the world.

During the reign of wild rumors, of the rebels, marching upon Rio, of gutters running with blood in Sao Paulo, and of the butchery of over 500 marines in a battle between the towns of Santos and Sao Paulo, just to mention a few of the wildest which were accepted with some credence here, the native resident of the Brazilian capital refused to become worried and continued his business as though the widely heralded revolutionary movement were in Mexico, Rumania, Russia, or perhaps Germany, instead of being within only a few hours by railway from this city.

The population of no capital of the world could possibly have displayed less concern over the outcome of a movement which threatened to have such grave consequences as did the people of Rio de Janeiro during the rebellion which broke out in Sao Paulo on July fifth.

"Don't you realize the condition your country is in?" would be asked the Brazilian by the astonished foreigner.

"Certainly, Senor," would be the re-

ply nine times out of ten, "but it makes no great difference who wins—its a domestic affair. The rebels are Brazilians."

"But, my friend, aren't you afraid that some of your states will secede in event the rebels win?" asks the now doubly astonished non-Brazilian.

"We'll make 'em come back and join us again," replies the native, "and, besides, this thing been threatening us for some time now, delaying our progress considerably. It's a good thing its come about at last. However it ends, we'll get down to business soon afterwards and start bringing our money back to normal."

The solidest proof of the general unconcern among the people over the consequence the revolution might have was the infinitesimal attendance at an extensively advertised mass-meeting, here on Saturday afternoon, July 19, in favor of President Arthur Bernardes, Rio boasts, a population of more than a million and a quarter people. Only a group of about 500 persons attended that extensively advertised mass-meeting, and despite the fact that it was held on the principal thoroughfare—the Avenida Rio Branco—and at an hour when hundreds of thousands of people were promanaging up and down that very avenue.

**CHURCH REPORTS**

**Baptists of Texas Have Extensive Holdings, Report of General Secretary Shows.**

Baptist property in Texas is valued at \$34,675,297, including sixteen schools and colleges, six hospitals, one orphanage, 2,150 church houses and 550 homes for pastors, Dr. F. S. Groner, General Secretary of the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas reports. Texas schools and colleges are valued at \$9,466,742, including endowment, the hospitals at \$5,919,460 and Buckner Orphans' Home at \$1,000,000. Church houses and homes for pastors in the State have an aggregate value of \$18,289,095.

No other Southern State has a greater valuation of Baptists property than does Texas. There are more white Baptists in Texas than in any other Southern State, the number being 471,140, this membership being served by 2,809, ordained ministers serving 3,636 churches.

Last year the number of baptisms in Texas reached 33,780 and the total number of additions to Texas Baptist churches numbered 51,000. Contributions to local purposes in the churches of this State totaled \$3,908,889 and the amount given to Christian Education, missions and benevolences was \$1,609,903, while the total amount of the contributions was \$5,518,792.

**HE KNOWS, BUT WILL HE?**

"It is a wise man who knows when to stop work," says Rev. James Anderson of Syracuse.

The grindstone will go 'round and 'round as usual and some bright young lieutenant will be sharpening his wits on it, for the good of the business.

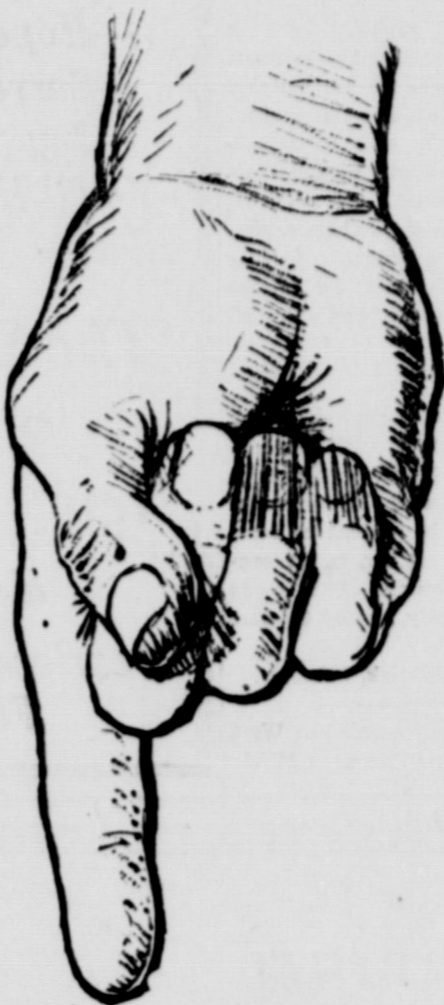

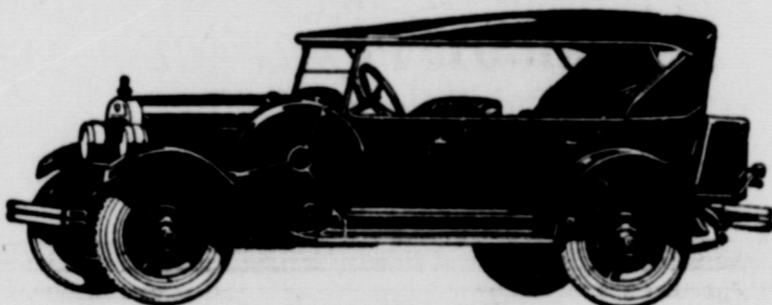

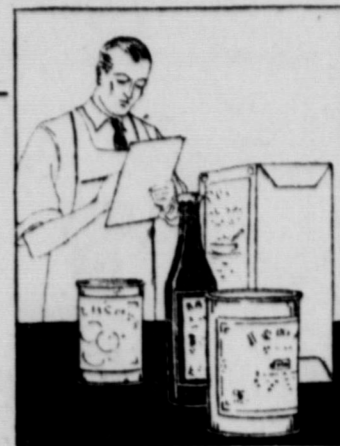

## STRUCK BY CAR SEEK KILLERS

Jeff McKee Run Down by Negro Driver Who Abandons Car After Accident—No Serious Injuries.

The only election night accident in Sweetwater reported to police occurred at about 10 o'clock Saturday night when Jeff McKee was run down by an automobile driven by a negro, at the corner of Oak and W. N. 3rd streets.

McKee, who was crossing from the Texas Bank and Trust building corner to the First National Bank, was knocked to the pavement and suffered skin abrasions. Dr. C. D. Lindley, who attended McKee, stated that no internal injuries were thought likely.

Witnesses disagree as to who was to blame for the accident. Ford Phillips, who was with McKee, stated that the negro was driving at a speed of between 25 and 30 miles an hour, and that McKee was not "jay walking."

Charles Hennen, who also witnessed the accident, said that McKee was "angling" in his course across the street, and that he dodged a car driven by E. E. Harrington and stepped in front of the machine the negro was driving. In his opinion, the negro was driving less than 10 miles an hour.

The negro, who is known to police, became frightened and abandoned the car as quickly as he could get out. He was pursued up an alley, but not overtaken. Police notified him to appear in Corporation Court Sunday.

McKee is the proprietor of a dairy in south Sweetwater.

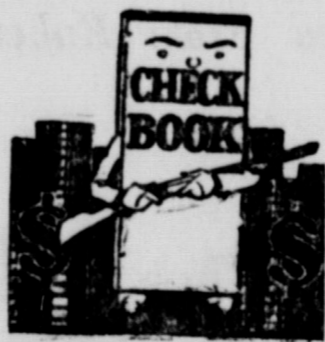
