




When Count Passes 300 Mark, Wild Cheers Make Announcement of 314-127 Vote Inaudible.

BERLIN, Germany, Aug. 29 .--The Pact of London was ratified today by the Reichstag. After a long and bitter debate the government answered with 314 votes, more than the necessary twothirds majority, for the all-important railroad laws in the Dawes plan of reparations payments, and thereby accepted the whole scheme.
