Accepts Bids on 9 Blocks From West Texas Construction Company For Bitulithic Work.

Representatives Coming Here Next Week-More Paving Expected Soon.

Another forward step in Sweetwater's paving program was taken Tuesday afternoon when the City Commission awarded a contract for 5 blocks of resurfacing and 4 blocks of new work to the West Texas Construction Co., of Fort Worth. The contract was given this company after several days of consideration and study of their work, and the selection was made over six other concerns who entered bids Friday.

The commission feels, it is stated, that in the selection of the West Texas Construction it has made a wise step, in that this concern has been established in Texas for 17 years and is credited, it is reported, with 40 per cent of the paving in the State. Paving to be done by the company in Sweetwater will be the Bitulithic type, a patented paving that is done only by this company and other branches, in Texas.

The contract for the resurfacing work calls for a 2-inch Warrenite Bitulithic surface complete on the present Macadam base including scarifying and re-shaping same. The bid was \$1.98 per square yard. The new work will be 2-inch Warrenite Bitulithic pavement complete with a 5inch concrete base and the bid for this work was \$3.19 per square yard.

The resurfacing work for the present job will begin at the north-east corner of the square and run four blocks east to Crane street. New paying will then be laid from Crane street to Beall street, and the two connecting blocks on Elm and Beall street from E. N. 2nd street to E. N. 3rd street.



KILLERS DEATH BY NOOSE

Leopold and Loeb Given Life For Murder, 99 Years For Kidnapping in Franks Case.

CAVERLY HURRIES THROUGH

Renders Opinion and Sentence in 15 Minutes; Leopold's Father Weeps, Boys Order Steak and Onions.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM. CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 10 .- The Leopold-Loeb murder drama was concluded with startling suddeness within a space of 15 minutes this morning when Justice John R. Caverly sentenced the millionaire youth to life imprisonment for the murder of Bobby Franks and to 99 years each for kid-

napping their little victim. The state has no appeal from the

court's decision. The sentence constituted a complete victory for the defense, whose sole fear was sentence of death by hanging, as the offenses of murder and kidnapping are capital crimes in Illi-

Nathan and Richard, the youthful . slayers, walked into the court room with faint smiles on their faces, apparently confident of life, and walked out with strained expressions,

Tears of joy streamed down the grief lined face of Nathan Leopold Sr. For several minutes he sat slumped in his chair, unable to move. Foreman Leopold, brother of Nathan, and Allen Loeb, brother of Richard, rushed forward to shake the hands of the youths, but the guards rushed their charges from the room half a minute

after the sentence. Caverly made rapid work of his opinion and sentence. He pointed out that in his opinion he believed that it was within his province to decline to impose the death penalty on persons not of full age. He said he believed that had the boys been in their nor-

Waiving the formality of calling the youths before him, Caverly plunged hurriedly into the sentence. Both prisoners were balanced on the edge of their chairs. Nathan's fac was almost expressionless as he heard the

words that saved him from death. No motions were made by either side, and Nathan and Richard were


PERSONAL LIABILITY

A Greenburg, La., paper reports that in an endeavor to burn the carcass of a deer which they had shot illegally, two hunters started a brush fire in a national forest last fall which escaped their control. It was necessary for the government to call out a large crew of men in order to extinguish the fire. As it was, 2,000 acres of forest land was blackened before the fire was put out.

The two hunters were subsequently haled into court and ordered to pay the United States government the sum of \$2,500, the cost of controlling the fire which had been started by their own negligence.

This is a significent decision and adds strength to the legal precedent for personal liability for fire carelessly started. It will undoubtedly stimulate a wholesome public respect for forest protection, and the scope of the decision should be extended to include fire damage by carelessness to other

classes of property. The practice of teamwork, co-operation, concerted effort, or whatever it may aptly be called, cannot be emphasized too vigorously in fire prevention. At the same time, individual responsibility and the sinister shadow of personal liability will do much to "stay the careless hand."


