It was the word she intended to use, and was spelled correctly. She was very indignant that I would change up her copy.

With that in mind, here's a piece published recently by the Associated Press and written by Max Rizley, Jr. of the *Texas City Sun*:

SPELL CHECKER KNOT TWO BEE TRUSTED!

Believe it or knot, awl the words in this column are spelled wright.

Butt there knot necessarily the write words.

Maybe you've bin noticing moor and moor errors like these in you're newspapers and magazines lately; I no Aye have.

And Eye blame it on that wonder of technology that was supposed two streamline communications in these modern thymes, too make the righting process infinitely more efficient than it used two bee in the passed: The computer.

Oar, moor specifically, the computer spell-checking program. Call it "computer illiteracy," if yew will.

Now, their's nothing inherently wrong with a newspaper's copy editor letting a computer czech a story four misspelled words.

Fore a human, chasing spelling errors is a mundane task witch eats up valuable thyme that cud be better used in improving the flow and stile of the story, rewriting a phrase hear, shortening a paragraph they're, cutting out the excess verbiage wile preserving the meet of the story-the reel "art" of editing. The same, but even worse, goes for neighbor letters "d" and "t," if they get crossed up in a story about waterfowl. (Oh, come on, think about it!)

Computers have no morals...or is it morels? No matter, they care knot. Be they dirty words or fancy mushrooms, if their spelled rite, the computer is happy.

Sew take fare warning, all ewe lazy people out they're blissfully letting you're computer due the work YEW should be doing-ewe mite just spell-Czech yourself into illiteracy.

Pay attention, otherwise, you may actually write a wrong, even as you try to right one.

Activities Target Young Americans

Cardiovascular disease is this country's No. 1 cause of death. But few Americans know what puts them at risk for CVD. And even fewer know that the risk factors for heart disease, such as smoking, lack of exercise and obesity, can actually be decreased with lifestyle changes.

The American Heart Association believes that one of the best ways to reduce the more than 900,000 deaths each year from heart disease is to focus educational efforts on children; to reach them before behaviors such as smoking and lack of exercise become hard-to-break habits. The AHA hopes that early education will help children live healthier lives as adults and decrease their risks for heart disease.

Every year, the American Heart Association launches a nationwide education campaign throughout February known as American Heart Month. This year's American Heart Month message--"Make Exercise a Family Affair"--emphasizes the importance of reaching children and families and educating them to take care of their hearts by engaging in regular physical activity. Consider these facts:

Studies show that at least half of today's youth do not get enough regular exercise. Less than 36 per cent of elementary and secondary

schools offer daily physical education classes, which means that many children are not receiving the training to nurture life-long fitness patterns.

Some 25 per cent of all children are obese, and obese children are at an increased risk for obesity as adults. A recent study indicates that U.S. children now spend as much time watching television as they do in school! In addition, watching television enhances the likelihood of weight gain by encouraging snacking and by substituting TV for active, energy-burning activities.

The AHA has a number of education programs for children and families on the issues of exercise, nutrition and smoking. Many schools in this area use these programs as they provide teachers with materials to help them incorporate AHA messages into their classroom activities.

"This month, American Heart Association volunteers in Friona and Bovina are raising money to support these school programs as well as many other AHA programs. Please join me and these volunteers in supporting the work of the American Heart Association this February," chairman Bob Owen said.

Last Friday the Squaws finished out their regular season with a 41-33 win at Floydada, to go 19-10 and 6-4.

Friona held leads of 7-2, 19-17 and 28-22.

Miss Downey started it off with a three-point basket. She added four more goals and four free throws during the game, for 15 points. Miss Reeb was an able back-up scorer with 11 points.

65 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 15, 1929

In some instances, families were cut off entirely from their water supply for a few days but without any serious expense, while in other cases considerable damage was done and expense incurred by the bursting of pipes.

60 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 16, 1934

The corn and hog meeting held at the school building Tuesday night was well attended, under the supervision of county agent A.R. Bateman. Contracts were made available, providing hog raisers a sum of ready money on the number of hogs produced during 1932 and 1933.

be among 350 young leaders from across the nation in attendance.

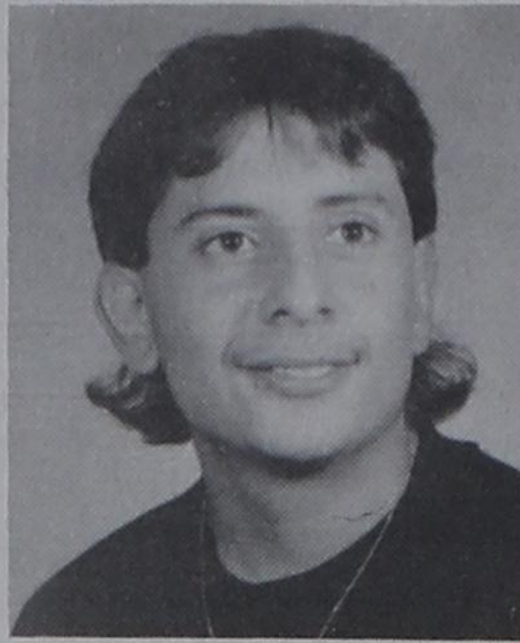
The theme of the National Young Leaders Conference is "The Leaders of Tomorrow Meeting the Leaders of Today." Ronda will interact with key leaders and newsmakers from the three branches of government, the media and the diplomatic corps.

Highlights of the leadership conference include welcoming remarks from a Member of Congress on the Floor of the House of Representatives. Students participate in a panel discussion with distinguished journalists at the national Press Club and visit a foreign embassy for an international policy briefing. Students may also meet with their elected senators and representatives or designated congressional staff.

In addition to the Washington briefings, Ronda will participate in activities designed to enhance each student's individual leadership style. In one activity, Foreign Policy and the President, students role-play the President and members of the Cabinet who must respond to an international crisis in the Balkans. The culminating activity of the conference is the Mock Congress on National Service, in which students role-play members of the United States House of Representatives by debating, amending and voting on proposed youth service legislation.

More than 7,000 outstanding young leaders nationwide participate in one of 20 sessions of the National Young Leaders Conference held each year. The conference is sponsored by the Congressional Youth Leadership Council, a nonprofit, nonpartisan educational organization located in Washington, D.C. Founded in 1985, the Council is dedicated to "fostering and inspiring young people to achieve their full leadership potential." Over 300 Members of the United States Congress join this commitment as members of the Council's Honorary congressional Board of Advisors.

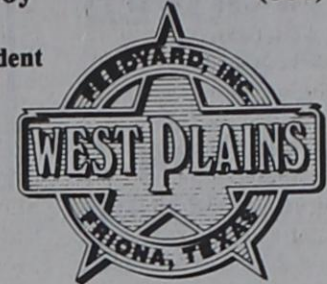

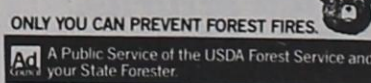
Free Trees Available

A few years ago, one of Eva Miller's granddaughters, Maridale Glass, volunteered to put her grandmother's recipes into her computer and make copies for other family members.

This idea evolved after several of the granddaughters had started asking for Eva's method of combining buttermilk and flour mixture to make biscuits, making dressing for the Thanksgiving turkey and other advice that had to do with meal preparation.

About the same time, Eva's daughter, Donna Mears, had gotten a new computer with a genealogy program and started compiling the family history.

These two ideas developed into full blown projects before someone came up with the idea of combining it together and coming up with the "Miller-Roysden Cookbook-Generology."

Before its completion, Maridale and her mother, Mary Lou, collected and sorted recipes while another daughter, Linda, used her artistic talent for illustrations.

Before the book was finished, just about everyone in this large family had been asked for assistance in proof reading or giving advice in one form or another.

One of Eva's grandsons, Clint Mears, printed the book at Intheden Graphics in Friona in November of 1993. It is in a looseleaf binder and contains many memories as well as recipes and genealogy.

Incidentally, it was dedicated to John David and Ross Kent Miller, Roy's and Eva's two sons, who are deceased.

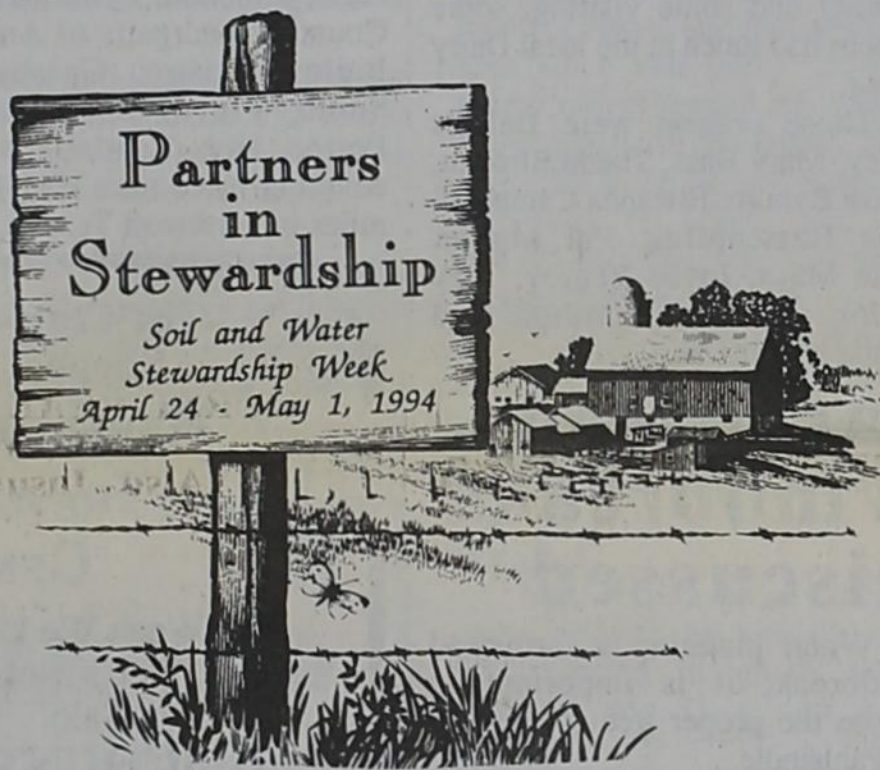

Board OKs Nice Loan For HPWCD

In January, the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) approved a \$4,000,000 Agricultural Water Conservation loan to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District in Lubbock.

The district will use the funds to

make loans to area farmers and ranchers to purchase and install more efficient water conservation equipment. The district's loans will carry an interest rate of 4.8% with a 5 to 8-year term. The district will lend up to 75% of equipment value.

The low interest rate resulted from the TWDB securing \$2 million in U.S. Department of Energy Oil Overcharge Funds provided through a grant from the state's General Services Commission. The funds were used to buy down the interest rate by 2% on a \$7 million block of Agriculture Water Conservation bonds sold by the TWDB on Feb. 2 for loans to this and other underground water conservation districts.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District includes 15 counties (all of Cochran, Hale, Lubbock, Lynn and Parmer Counties; and parts of Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hockley, Lamb, Potter and Randall counties) covering more than 10,490 square miles in northwest Texas.

Farmstead Windbreaks Discussed

When planning a farmstead windbreak, it is important to choose the proper tree species for the Panhandle.

The tree species should be cold tolerant. Some species are adapted to the Panhandle, while others are better suited to the warmer climates south of the Panhandle.

The species should be drought tolerant. Species native to arid regions perform better in West Texas. In order to perform well, species should be resistant to insect and disease problems.

Species compatibility is important. Some species are fast growing, while others are very slow growing. The mature height of the trees should be considered.

The aesthetic value of the windbreak can be enhanced by selecting species with a combination of colorful blooms, fruit or leaves.

With proper planning and species selection, the farmstead windbreak will give good wind control, enhance the beauty of the farm and provide good wildlife habitat.

Windbreak trees are available from the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. Trees are selling fast so be sure to order soon to insure the availability of your desired species.

Shelton On Dean's List

On Tuesday, March 7, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Friona, at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland.

Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to

schedule an appointment, call 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the X-ray, physical breast exam and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

Breast screening guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination every month; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age: age 40, one baseline mammogram; 40-49, a mammogram every 1-2 years; 50 and over, yearly mammograms.

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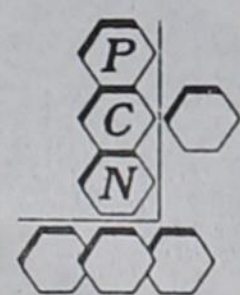

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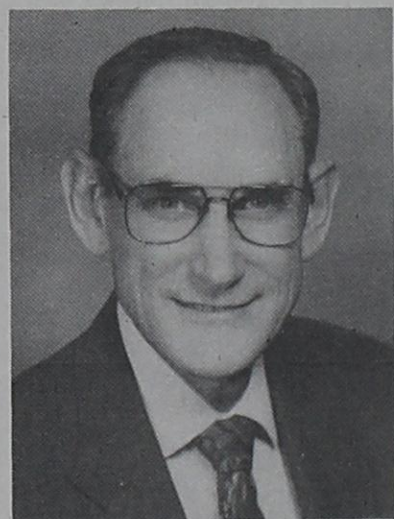

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Pet Tips

(From the Friona Animal Humane Society)

"Speak For Those Who Can't"

The solution to the problem of pet over-population, if put into action now, can save money and spare countless animal suffering. Pet owners must be convinced to spay or neuter their pets for two important reasons: so their pets can no longer reproduce and add to the surplus of unwanted animals and because their pets will live longer, healthier lives.

The old myths that neutered animals get fat and lazy, or that your dog needs to run loose because it's natural, must be shattered.

FALLACY: Letting a female pet raise at least one litter makes them more mature.

FACT: There is no medical proof to support this common belief. In fact, spaying will eliminate your pet from the possibility of developing uterine or ovarian cancer and greatly reduce her chances of breast cancer.

FALLACY: It's a good learning experience for children to watch the birth of animals.

FACT: Most dogs and cats give birth when the children are not around or during the night. Animals instinctively seek a secluded place away from the family to give birth. Each birth "experience" adds from four to ten surplus animals

that will be unwanted and abandoned to die or will die in the pound.

ANOTHER FACT: A neutered pet is a better pet. The pet has less desire to roam, tends to be more gentle and affectionate, and less aggressive. Owners are spared the periodic visits of packs of barking male dogs or yowling tomcats which constantly are fighting.

REMEMBER: Spay or neuter your pet at six months of age, or anytime if the animal is older. Many pets can be spayed after they become pregnant, please consult with your veterinarian and have the pet examined. Help us "put a lid on the pet population explosion."

Buying individual stocks and bonds of U.S.-based companies that market their goods and services in international markets allows you to invest in familiar companies while taking advantage of the higher growth rates of foreign economies. Many U.S. companies, such as McDonald's, Coca-Cola, General Electric and AT&T, are gaining market share in more parts of the world every day.

Selecting individual stocks and bonds of foreign companies can be a more challenging way to invest internationally. But it can allow you to take advantage of foreign economies that may be performing better than that of the United States.

As with any investment, you should be aware of the risks. Global investing may offer economic, political, company-specific and currency risks. YOUR EYES

How Well Does Your Child See?

Most children are not aware enough about their own physical limitations to complain: if they don't see as well as they should, they don't realize it. They think that's how they should see. Thus, it's usually up to the



parents to spot trouble signs.

One of the first signs of vision problems one might notice is the child who squints while watching television or complains that he or she can't read the print on the screen. Either might be a sign of nearsightedness. And if the child has difficulty differentiating between an 8 and a 3 or between 4s and 5s, there may be an astigmatism. Discussing these signs with the eye doctor should lead to early correction in time to facilitate good school performance.

Other possible eye problems to discuss with the optometrist include eyes that are misaligned; droopy eyelid; holding objects very close to the eyes; excessive blinking; chronic tearing; and in a young child, the inability to focus on and follow objects by three or four months.
