Body of Truett Hunter, 7, Found in Water Hole After He Had Been **Missing Several Hours.**

MOTHER FEARED DROWNING

Had Premonition of Son's Fate-Boys Had Constructed Raft in Nueces Street Excavation.

After a lengthy search by frantic parents and many volunteers, the body of Truett Hunter, 7year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Hunter, was found under 4 feet of water in a ditch on Nueces street near the Williams and Miller gin Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. L. G. Morony at the First Baptist Church Wednesday, with interment at the City Cemetery. The our of the funeral has not been set. The child was first missed at 4 o'clock and it was supposed by his parents that he was playing with the neighborhood children. He failed to return home at the supper hour, how-

ever, and a search for him was started. The mother of the boy had a premonition that he was drowned, it was stated, and she is reported as having told the searchers that he would be found in the water.

A search at the water hole revealed the child's shoes near the edge and the water was promptly dragged with a seine and the body was brought to the surface. The body had probably been under water for two or three hours, it was thought, and all efforts failed to restore life to the child. A pulmotor rushed from the fire station was used for two hours without avail. The details of the drowning are not known, but it is supposed that the child either went wading and got beyond his depth, or fell from a small raft that children had constructed for the tank.






This year there are 7,424 girls enrolled in the high schools as compared with 6,864 boys, 560 more girls. Last year there were 842 more girls enrolled than boys.




