CROWD ATTENDS HOUSE WARMING

Two Thousand Sweetwater Citizens Visit Texas Bank and Trust Company's New Home.

INSPECT BEAUTIFUL BUILDING

Visitors Given Souvenirs—School Officials and Teachers in Receiving Line.

A crowd estimated at 2,000 people surged through the lobby of the new home of the Texas Bank and Trust Company Thursday night at the "housewarming" of the new bank building and the formal reception to the members of the faculty of Sweetwater schools.

There was a long receiving line, with presidents of the various Parent-Teacher Associations, teachers, members of the school board in line.

The Sweetwater orchestra enlivened proceedings with a well chosen and well rendered program during the hours of the reception, from 7:30 to 9:30. The spacious lobby was packed throughout the evening.

The beauty of the new building appeared to splendid advantage with the tastefully chosen lighting fixtures much in evidence. Flowers and ferns added a decorative and festive touch to the proceedings.

Souvenirs were distributed to the guests and cigars to the men.

Visitors to the reception and housewarming at the new home of the Texas Bank saw one of the most modern banking houses in West Texas. Massive stone pillars adorn the front elevation of the two story building which with fixtures cost well over the \$100,000 mark.

The main lobby is L-shaped, 72 feet long and averaging 16 2-3 feet wide and is one of the largest expanses of tile floors in the city.

On the left inside the main entrance is the directors' room, encased in art glass, which is also used on the customers' room to the rear of the lobby, and on the door leading to the lobby by the stairway leading to the second floor.

Immediately back of the director's room is the president's office with cashier's office on the right of the main entrance with tellers, bookkeepers and collection departments on to the rear.

Use Marble.

San Saba marble is used tastefully for baseboard, wainscoting and check stand while Sweetwater plaster is used above and on the ceiling with final decorative finish in old ivory tinted with gold. Twelve ornamental lights are shaded in the same color scheme in the main lobby.

Probably the most important portion from the bank's standpoint are the two large vaults in the rear; 16x24 outside measurement, of steel and concrete construction with big thick manganese steel doors. One of these vaults houses the safety deposit boxes for customers and the other is for the bank's own records. Cash is kept in a big 9-ton safe in the inside of the bank vault. It's a massive brute of a safe.

The entire building is steam heated and has numerous electric outlets for the electric adding machines, fans and other uses in the building.

Begun in 1923.

Work of construction on the new building began September 1, 1923, and it was occupied August 1, 1924. It is situated on the site of the old Masonic Temple which was abandoned by that order when their new building was completed one block north.

Officers of the Texas Bank and Trust Company include G. E. Bradford, president; T. L. Hughes and R. A. Ragland, vice presidents; J. N. Dulaney, cashier; E. B. Hull, assistant cashier.

In appreciation of the splendid music furnished by the Sweetwater Orchestra at the housewarming, the Texas Bank and Trust Company gave \$25 to the orchestra fund. The piano was furnished by the George Allen Music House.

Dr. and Mrs. H. B. Fain have become full fledged citizens of Sweetwater. Dr. Fain opened his office here several months ago, but Mrs. Fain did not move to the city until recently.

DISTURBANCES ON WEST COAST FELT

Mt. Shasta and Mt. Lassen Vie For Publicity as Land Slide and Volcano Stir California.

MUD LAKE MAY BREAK

Land Slide Roars Down Shasta, Breaks Walls of Canyon For Distance Eight Miles.

DUNSMUIR, Cal., Sept. 19.—The Great slide which roared down the side of Mt. Shasta breaking down the walls of Mud Canyon for a distance of eight miles, has formed a lake of mud which may burst the barriers and flood the lowlands at any moment.

Residents of towns around the foot of the mountain who fled their homes when the slide suddenly stopped had not returned today.

Volcano in Action.

By The United Press. REDDING, Cal., Sept. 19.—Mount Lassen, California's volcano, went into eruption during the night, veing with Mt. Shasta for public notice.

Indications were that the eruption would be larger than any of recent date. For three fourths of an hour streamers of black smoke rose over the crater. Then a heavy haze fell around the mountain.

ATTACK SWEEPS NEAR SHANGHAI

General Chi's Troops Break Through Crumbling Defense of General Lu Before City.

FOREIGNERS ARE SAFE

International Troops Patrol Barricades—Chang's Artillery Bombs Gateway City.

By The United Press. SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 19.—General Chi's victorious troops attacked the crumbling defense of General Lu before Shanghai at nightfall and an advance guard of 500 men broke through.

Re-enforcements momentarily repulsed the attack, but the battle raged into the night with increasing fury and was believed to have reached the critical stage.

All day long the heavy artillery of the Chi army kept hammering on the Lu defense. The Chekiang commander took up his headquarters in an arsenal four miles from the city.

Foreigners were safe during the day. Forces of foreigners were mobilized along the barriers today, with British cavalry and artillery. On duty along the boundaries were American, Italian, Japanese, Chinese, and Portuguese troops, each distinctly uniformed.

Chang Shells City.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 19.—Chang Tso Lin's artillery shelled the gateway city of Shang Hai Kwan in the great wall of China today, killing a banker and a clerk, and causing some little damage, according to Central News Dispatches. A delegation of 25 foreigners urged the foreign consuls to protect them on the grounds that Shang Hai Kwan is a neutral city.

FLYERS HOP OFF ON DALLAS TRIP

Leave Muskogee Shortly After Noon Friday on Jump of 225 Miles For Texas City.

NO STOP AT SWEETWATER

Air Chief Appreciates Invitation, Regards Stop Impossible—Abilene Also Makes Bid.

By The United Press. MUSKOGEE, Ok., Sept. 19.—The army world flyers hopped off from Hat Box Field here at 12:26 p. m. on their 225 mile hop to Dallas.

Unable to Stop Here.

An answer in regard to the invitations sent for the American round the world flyers to stop in Sweetwater has been received here from the office of the Chief of Air Service at Washington stating that it would be impossible for the flight to be delayed by a stop here.

The world flyers are due in Dallas Friday, according to Press reports, and it is thought that they will hop off for El Paso Saturday or Sunday. It is not known, as yet, whether their flight from Dallas to El Paso will be broken.

Guy Morris, agent for the Texas Co., here, has written to Byron Good at Love Field, Dallas, to recommend Sweetwater as a refueling place and as an ideal field to break the long hop across Texas. Good made a Dallas to El Paso flight this summer and his plane was refueled here by Morris.

Mayor Joe H. Boothe, and John McCurdy, secretary of the Board of City Development have also received letters from the Chief of the Air Service, thanking Sweetwater for the invitations to the flyers, but stating that they would be unable to stop here.

Abilene Issues Invitation. Abilene is also making efforts to have the world flyers visit that city, present plans calling for a change in their schedule to stop in Abilene one day, probably Monday, for the West Texas Fair.

Fair executives and officials of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce have wired Congressman Blanton and Secretary of War Weeks asking that the flyers visit their city. Blanton Thursday wired that he had conferred with the Secretary of War, but that no agreement to change the schedule had been made.

Plans include sending two men to Dallas to greet the aviators there and present a special invitation on behalf of the West Texas Fair to stop in Abilene during the flight.

Neff Sends Greetings.

By The United Press. AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 19.—Governor Neff wired the following greeting to the world flyers at Dallas in a telegram addressed to Commander L. T. Lowell Smith:

"In the name of the State I extend to you a mighty welcome to Texas. I gladly extend to you, the Magellans of the Air, a hearty welcome to Texas as you pass our way and complete the final arc of glory in circling the globe. Duties here deny me the pleasure of greeting in person you and your fellow navigators of the air as you drop another anchor from the skies at Dallas today. As the path finders in the earth encircling our globe you have blazed a trail of gold around the world, you have added lustre to genius, splendor to achievement, and fame to the intrepid spirit of American manhood."

George Bingham, who has made more people laugh than any other man living, it is said, will entertain Sweetwater people this evening in one of his humorous lectures at the Court House. He comes here under the auspices of the West Ward Parent-Teacher Associations and half of the door receipts will go toward their piano fund. Bingham writes "Dog Hill" and "Punkinville Paragraphs."

BAPTISTS CONTRIBUTE

Effort to Complete \$75,000,000 Campaign This Year.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 13.—Contributions of Texas Baptists to the Baptist 75-Million Campaign since its opening in 1919 total \$8,344,000 it has been announced by Dr. F. S. Groner, general secretary of the executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. This amount has been distributed among the various departments of denominational work during the last five years and is the largest amount which has been given by any state.

Efforts to complete the Baptist 75 Million Campaign this year are being made by all the departments of denominational activity in Texas and the first special observance in this connection will be the Week of Prayer from September 21 to 23.

LEAGUE CONTROL OF ENEMY PLAN

Land, Sea, and Air Forces of Ex-Enemy States Would Be Controlled by New Plan.

MAKE FIRST REPORT

Special Commission Would Control Germany, Austria-Hungary, and Bulgaria.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 19.—The preliminary plans for military, naval, and aerial control of Germany, Austria-Hungary, and Bulgaria were made public by the League of Nations today. The commission charged with formulating the plans provides for the control of land, sea, and air forces of the ex-enemy states by a special commission.

Beaumont Radio Station Ready Soon—Band Wins Praise at Fair.

Accidents Fatal to Fort Worth and Waxahachie Citizens — Cars Crash, Gun Discharged.

FORT WORTH, Texas, Sept. 19.—D. E. Strickland, 35, was instantly killed here today when three automobiles crashed at a street intersection. Two of the cars skidded from the road, and overturned. The occupants of the other cars were not injured.

WAXAHACHIE, Texas, Sept. 19.—Truman Lancaster, 20, of Venus, near here, died here in a hospital today of injuries sustained Thursday when a shotgun was accidentally discharged.

RESIDENTS WANT PAVING ON PINE

Property Owners and City Commission Discuss Ways and Means at Meeting Thursday Night.

PREFER 30 FOOT WIDTH

Unanimously in Favor of Bitulithic Paving — Approve Suggested Method of Payments.

Enthusiasm and a desire for street paving were shown by every Pine street property owner who was present Thursday evening with the Mayor and City Commission when plans, prices and types of paving for Pine street were discussed for two hours in an informal meeting at the City Hall. About 18 Pine street property owners were present.

The main discussion centered around the type of paving to be used, and the width of the street. The width of Pine street varies from 30 feet to 36, and 50 feet, and the plans were discussed for making the street uniform in width. The majority of property owners present were in favor of the 30-foot street, and it was stated that this was gradually becoming the uniform width for residence streets in all cities. The curbs and gutters on the 50 and 36 feet parts of Pine street would have to be extended on each side to bring the width down to 30 feet, it was stated, but was pointed out that there would be a saving in doing this over the difference of the price in paving 30 feet wide and 40 feet wide.

Property owners present were unanimously in favor of the Bitulithic paving with a 5-inch concrete base and 2-in top. This is the sort of paving that is to be used on the present 9 block job to be done by the West Texas Construction Co.

The property owners method of payment for their part of the paving, one-fifth down, and the balance at 1, 2, 3, and 4 years at 8 per cent interest, seemed to meet the approval of the majority of those present.

Paving and sidewalks were also discussed at a meeting of the Commission Thursday afternoon, when it was stated that notice would be given to property owners on Crane street to lay sidewalks there from 3rd street to the High School building.

The Commission also heard a complaint from a local attorney representing a Sweetwater firm in connection with tax valuation. The matter was given over to the city attorney for investigation.

A contract was also awarded for the laying of a sewer line on Bowie street, and the Commission ordered a 4-inch water line laid on Sam Houston street, to Lamar street, and Arkansas Avenue.

THAT GIN WHISTLE

In the south, September is the beginning of the business season and the gin whistle is the clarion call of prosperity's renewed activities. No national air is more inspiring than the call of the gin whistle as it sounds on the morning stillness, and it makes melody in hearts of rich and poor alike. With it comes a day of better things. To the rich it means money loaned or invested will pay dividends, and to the poor it means a respite from credit. It means a release from debts that have accumulated during the growing season of the cotton crop and doubts and fears as to the outcome of weather conditions. It means new clothes, school for the children, and maybe the longed for car, that will allow them to take a much longed for trip, and enable them to mix and mingle with their fellow men.

The gin whistle is the call of the Drum Major who heads prosperity's procession to service in the cotton fields, factories and business houses of the land and late at night it announces a day's work well done and finds a glad echo in the hearts of the laborers that the cotton season is with us again.

EXTENSIVE USE OF SILVER

Professor Irving Fisher, Yale University international economist, says that gold is no longer a stable standard of value, and that its purchasing power should be stabilized to prevent evils of inflation or deflation by larger use of silver all over the world.

The treasury has embarked upon a campaign to restore the silver dollar to general circulation. An initial step was taken when one of the coins was placed in the pay envelope of each of the 5,000 treasury employees. Similar action will be suggested to other government departments. Paper has been supplanting silver dollars, but upkeep of paper money costs the government around 3 per cent of its total face value, while maintenance of silver dollars costs practically nothing.

WILL HELP SAVE FORESTS

The Forest Service has just written to seventeen of the largest tobacco manufacturers of the United States requesting them to insert warning cards in every package of cigarettes they put out, cautioning the smokers to be careful with fire in the woods. Similar campaigns are being under-

taken by various state chambers of commerce.

The reason for this is that in studying the problem of fire prevention the Forest Service has been forcibly impressed with the hazard of forest fires caused by thoughtless smokers. Figures recently compiled covering Oregon and Washington show that 23 per cent of the fires have been caused by smokers.

The public, year by year, is becoming more and more aggressive on the subject of man-caused forest fires and should demand that whatever steps are necessary be taken to eliminate such fires entirely.

Inasmuch as matches and cigarettes are responsible for the greater part of our annual fire loss, match manufacturers could well join with tobacco manufacturers in spreading the gospel of carefulness with fire.

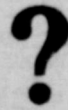

REMOVE LARGE STONES

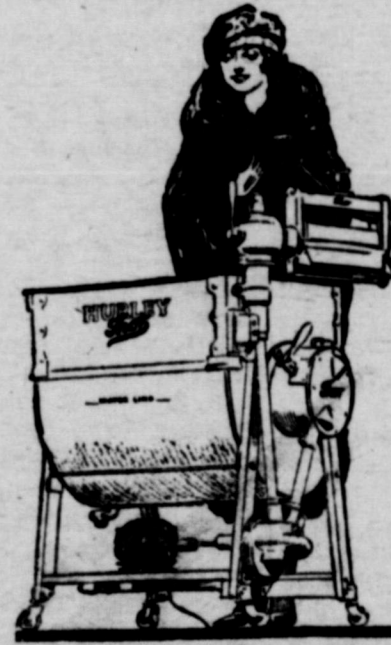

BAPTIST CHURCH TO OPEN SUNDAY

President of Simmons College Will Preach First Sermon in New \$60,000 Building.

CHURCH IS COMPLETED

Shows Completeness and Modernness in Every Detail—Best of Equipment and Fixtures.

On the same spot where 43 years ago the first Baptist services were held in Sweetwater in a small frame school building, now stands the new and completed \$60,000 brick church ready for the formal opening Sunday morning. The church will open with Sunday school at 9:45 in the morning, followed by the opening sermon at 11 o'clock by Dr. J. D. Sandefer, president of Simmons College at Abilene.

Dr. Millard A. Jenkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Abilene, will conduct the services Sunday evening at 8 o'clock. The services Monday night will be in interest of the women's work in the church and Dr. W. T. Rouse, pastor of the Baptist Church at Snyder will speak. Tuesday night, the services will be in connection with the young people's work in the church and an address will be delivered by Emmett Landers, educational director of the First Baptist Church at Abilene. The services will be preceded by a banquet in the church dining room for the regular members of the five B. Y. P. U., organizations of the church, and a few invited guests.

Ollie B. Webb, assistant to the president of the T-P railway, will speak in interest of the men's work in the church, making a special trip to Sweetwater from New Orleans for the occasion.

The public is cordially invited to each of these services, Dr. L. G. Morony, pastor, stated. Special music will be on the program each evening.

The interior of the new Baptist Church, is an ideal arrangement as will be found in any large city in the west. The church, throughout, shows wonderful workmanship, modernness and completeness.

Entering into the ground floor by concrete steps, is found a long corridor, with class rooms on each side. The ground floor is arranged according to the latest in church building, in that it is built to care for the three departments, of the church, the preaching, teaching and training, and is the last word in meeting the demands of each department.

On the ground floor are the beginners, primary and junior departments with each department having their own assembly room, own class room, piano, etc, and brings out the modern church arrangement in that it makes each department complete within itself. A corridor is between each department room, and folding doors making it possible for all the rooms to be thrown into one large room. The rooms, when thrown together, will also make the church dining room, and is capable of seating 250 guests. The equipment for the church includes complete set of dishes, china wear, silver, and cooking utensils. Tables and chairs for banquets will also be provided.

At the back of the dining room is the kitchen. This is a well-lighted and spacious room, and will be equipped with an electric range, built-in sink, drain board, cabinets and closets. The heating plant is just off the kitchen and includes a large boiler, a system of pipes running over the church, and a coal room. There will be hot and cold running water through out the church.

In the north balcony on the first floor, is the baptistry, adjoining which are men's and women's dressing rooms. The baptistry pit is entered by two sets of concrete steps from the dressing rooms. Only the front part of the baptistry is visible from the auditorium, and it is constructed as to represent a tomb. A beautiful effect is produced in this, in that the baptistry is high above the congregation, is square at the bottom and sides, with an arching top that produces the tomb effect. A special feature of its elevation is that a baptism can be seen from any part of the building without moving furniture or pulpit.

Women's rest rooms and drinking fountains are conveniently arranged in the building, and a special room is set aside for a mothers' room and nursery.

Back of the rostrum is the Sunday school secretaries' room. This office is nicely furnished, including a system of signal bells that run to every class room in the building.

The auditorium proper is a large

 and well-lighted space, touched off with harmonizing color effects, and is capable of seating 750 without the use of the adjoining first floor class rooms, which will enlarge its seating capacity to 1,000. These class rooms are on the east side of the auditorium, are 8 in number and each has a seating capacity of 40. Like the ground floor rooms, they have sliding doors and can be converted into one large room, or can be made a part of the auditorium.
 The pews are of heavy golden oak and are placed so as to be wide enough apart for comfort. They are neatly arranged in three sections, the aisles between the sections being covered with carpet. The floors throughout the building are oil-treated and finished in light oak. The golden oak pews, with the windows of stained glass, lend a pleasing mellow effect to the auditorium with the walls and ceiling of dove gray and white ceiling beams.
 From the double vestibules, which are entered from concrete steps on each side of the front of the building, are stairs leading to the balcony. The balcony will be furnished with opera chairs, as will the choir behind the pulpit. The choir chairs will be placed in two long rows directly behind the pulpit. Directly over the choir and over the baptistry, is the space arranged for the pipe organ, which will be installed. The organ will be

played from below, near the choir.
 The choir chairs are a gift to the church from C. R. Simmons of Sweetwater. Behind the balcony is the church parlor, a long, nicely furnished room that will be used often for church social activities, and will be open at all times, especially to the young people of the church. Four of the stained glass windows in the parlor are the gift of the Men's Bible Class to the church here, one is memory of Peter Turner, first pastor of the church here, one is in memory of all the former pastors and will contain their names, another is to honor the teacher of the Men's Bible Class, R. C. Crane, and the fourth is to honor the present pastor, Rev. L. G. Morony. The wording on this window reads: "To honor our pastor L. G. Morony whose leadership made this building possible."
 The pastor's office is directly off the balcony. On the other side of the balcony is a small kitchenette which will be furnished with a small range and other equipment for preparing light refreshments for parties held in the parlor.
 The exterior of the church is built in gray brick, laid in black mortar, with a red, clay tile roof, the finest roof that could be bought, it was stated. The building, finished and furnished, will cost \$60,000, and will put a valuation on that lot and corner of about \$90,000.
 The work was carried on under the direction of R. L. Garrett of Cisco, construction superintendent. The plans for the building were drawn by T. J. Galbraith of Dallas. The building was built by the Johnson Construction Co., of Cisco.
 The lighting system in the church is very complete, all the lighting fixtures being of the same pattern and design. There are 32 separate light circuits.
 Ground was broken for the Baptist building program on Jan. 1, 1923, and work commenced at once of the construction of the parsonage. Work on the church building started in June, 1923.
 The officers of the church are, Dr. L. G. Morony, pastor; L. B. Roberts, general superintendent; C. R. Simmons, general secretary; Mrs. R. W. White, pianist; and Mrs. Carl Ragland, choir director.
