CHILDREN DEFECTIVE

School Survey Shows Bad Teeth, Throats, Vision, Hearing.

By International News.

WICHITA, Kas., Sept. 22.-Nearly one-sixth of the children in the primary schools here are partially defective, according to a report made publie today.

Out of 13,705 children examined by the school health department, 2,326 were found to be defective. Of this number 1,414 nose and throat diseases, 340 defective vision, and 128 had defective hearing.

The dental clinic reports that 11,256 children have defective teeth.


