BEALL FUNERAL HELD THURSDAY

Last Services For Well Known Sweetwater Woman Conducted by Rev. Henson at M. E. Church.

LARGE FLORAL OFFERING

Every Woman's Organization in City Send Flowers—Was Church and Civic Leader.

Funeral services for Mrs. W. W. Beall were held Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Methodist Church in the presence of a large congregation of relatives and friends.

Rev. J. R. Henson, pastor of the Methodist Church, assisted by Rev. Gaston Foote and Rev. C. E. Jamison of Snyder, conducted the service. Rev. Foote read the 15 Chapter of First Corinthians, 15th to 28th verses. Rev. Henson spoke in a few simple but impressive words of the life and character of this great social and religious leader, who was cut down in the midst of her usefulness and of the community betterment and educational affairs in which she was interested and where her influence was always shown without stint.

A bank of beautiful wreaths, baskets and floral emblems formed a solid bank of beauty the whole length of the rostrum. Every woman's organization in the city and hundreds of sympathizing friends here and from many points over the state had sent these beautiful offerings as a tribute to her memory.

The Methodist choir of which she had long been a member, rendered a number of appropriate songs, though many times during the service they sang through their tears at the thought of the second one of their number going to join their beloved leader in the great invisible choir to sing forever more.

At the grave Rev. Bryant, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Snyder, of which Mrs. Beall's parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Buchanan are members, spoke of the parents in their old age who are heart broken because of her death and spoke of Mrs. Beall's splendid record as a church worker and civic leader.

At the close of the service at the church the great throng of friends were allowed to view the body and were followed by the bereaved relatives who gazed for the last time on the face of their beloved one.

The active pall-bearers were M. C. Manroe, S. W. Browning, A. J. Wimberley, M. B. Howard, Hubert Toler and Judge Mauzey. The members of the Wesley Bible Class of which Mrs. Beall was teacher, were the honorary pall-bearers and were about twenty-four in number.

A procession over half a mile long followed the remains to the cemetery where the body was laid to rest in a snow white grave. The grave was heaped high with the lovely flowers which mutely bore their message of sympathy to the sorrowing family.

SEEK NEGRO FOR FATAL SHOOTING

Eye Witness of Killing Names Negro Who is Sought by Authorities—Five in Jail.

SHOT MERCHANT TO DEATH Argument Said to Have Been Over Change Results in Murder of Hallettsville Citizen.

By The United Press. HALLETTSVILLE, Tex., Sept. 26.—Five negroes were held in the county jail here today and a sixth, Alex Foley, was sought in connection with the murder of I. B. Matejak, 59, prosperous store owner who was shot and killed by a negro in his store late Thursday.

Although the county attorney said he did not anticipate any trouble, Sheriff Lu Gorman is taking every precaution to guard against mob violence.

According to the county attorney, one of the negroes held, an eye witness to the shooting, named Foley as the slayer. He said that the shooting followed an argument over change.

The negro fired one shot and missed, and then placing a cotton hook around the merchant's neck, held him at arm's length, fired the second shot, and fled.

The community is said to be thoroughly aroused over the killing, as Matejak was considered one of the best liked citizens.

MOSHER MARRIES

Former Cincinnati Post Editor Leaves on Honeymoon to New York With Secretary-Bride.

CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 26.—Chas. Mosher and his former secretary whom he married after a business office romance, left today for New York on their honeymoon.

Mosher is former editor of the Cincinnati Post, and in recent years has been secretary-terasurer of the Scripps-Howard newspapers. His bride was Miss Alma E. Scharberg.

TUNNEL MYSTERY Baffles Capitol

Investigators Explore Strange Maze of Subterranean Avenues in Washington.

GERMAN PAPERS FOUND

One Tunnel Leads to Old Australian Legation—Believe Passage Used by Bootleggers.

By The United Press. WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 26.—The mystery around the strange maze of tunnels accidentally discovered under Washington's residential district deepened today with the discovery that unknown persons had walled off portions of the winding avenues.

The tunnels blocked off led to ladders, and a number of stretches on the walls led to the floor level where the subterranean apartments were discovered. Expiration of leads has forced investigators to await better clues.

A strange man stood guard over the yawning hole by which the labyrinth was discovered. Curious crowds defied his authority. The stranger fled, and new unexplored areas were discovered.

One of the passages was toward the old Austrian Legation, giving further proof to the "five tunnel" theory. German papers of 1917 and 1918 were found. Evidence that the tunnels have been more recently used by bootleggers is believed by some to be increasing. This is based on the quantity of bottles found along the walls, and the action of the stranger today.

ATTEND FAIRS

Shriners Visit Abilene Friday—Sweetwater Represented at Mitchell County Fair.

A large number of Sweetwater Shriners, with their families and friends, left at 8 o'clock Friday morning for Abilene where they will take part in the Shrine Day events of the West Texas Fair. The delegation from Sweetwater was expected to arrive in Abilene in time for the 10 o'clock parade which will include Shriners from many west Texas cities and the Fort Worth Shrine Band.

Friday is also Sweetwater Day in Abilene, and several citizens from here are attend the fair today and tonight.

Indications are that a large number of Sweetwater people will attend the last day of the Mitchell County Fair Saturday, which is Sweetwater and Nolan County Day. The Sweetwater Boys' Band will leave for Colorado about noon Saturday, it is thought, and a Sweetwater parade will probably be staged by the band and Sweetwater citizens upon arrival in Colorado.

The Colorado Lions' Club and the Mitchell County Fair Association were hosts to West Texas cities at a luncheon at the Barcroft Hotel at Colorado Friday noon. Several Sweetwater citizens attended the affair, including W. W. Davis, L. C. Tatum, Abe Levy, George Sheppard, Minor Shutt, and Roy Seudday.

A large Sweetwater delegation attended the coronation of the Queen of the Mitchell County Fair at Colorado Thursday night. Most of the party stayed over for the dance given in honor of the Queen and her attendants in the American Legion hall following the coronation and pageant.

Miss Janice Dulaney, Duchess of Sweetwater wore a gorgeous costume of tomato gorettie over a cloth of silver slip, decorated with rhinestones with a train of silver cloth embroidered with cut velvet roses and carried a beautiful staff ornamented with rhinestones, harmonizing with her handsome headdress of rhinestones. Miss Thelma Pratt, her Maid of Honor, wore a striking costume of black gorettie over a ping satin slip with velvet and silver trimmings. BRITISH AIRMEN FIRE INTO TURKS

Dozen Airplanes Pour Machine Gun Bullets into 3,000 Turkish Troops Many Dead and Wounded.

HOSTILITIES REVEALED

Fighting First Made Public at League of Nations Assembly—Say Turks Raiding Border.

By The United Press. LONDON, Eng., Sept. 26.—A dozen low flying British airplanes poured machine-gun fire into the ranks of between 2,500 and 3,000 Turkish troops, routing the Moslems and killing many of them in a fight northwest of Mosul, according to details made public today.

The hostilities were first revealed at the League of Nations Assembly yesterday.

The version here is that the Turks had been raiding the Iraq border, and the British airmen drove them back. After the planes had fired into the troops, a "considerable" number of dead and wounded were on the battle field.

British Retreat.

BAGDAD, Sept. 26.—A battalion of native British soldiers under British officers is retiring at Amadia, 65 miles northwest of Mosul, in the face of a Turkish advance.

England yesterday made representation to the League of Nations Council in Geneva, claiming that Turkey is violating the Lausanne treaty by maneuvers near Mosul. The difficulty between Great Britain and Turkey centers in the question of a border line of the British dependency of Iraq.

The British want Mosul included in the territory while the Turks claim Vilayet. Mosul is a disputed oil center.

PASTOR ELOPES

With 14 Year-Old Daughter of Prominent Citizen, Oklahoma Minister Hits the Trail.

By The United Press. ALLUWE, Okla., Sept. 26.—Alluwe was agog today over the elopement and disappearance of Rev. Joseph Yates, 40, pastor of the First Methodist Church, and Dorothea Fields, 14 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Fields, prominent Alluwe citizens.

The relations between the couple were unknown, and Alluwe with its 600 citizens huddled in groups today to read the farewell message left by its pastor.

Rev. Yates made a plea to withhold the news from the newspapers. "When a preacher strays from the straight and narrow path, the publicity given him creates more feeling than the average," the farewell said. Efforts to locate the couple have been futile.

Students Round Shouldered.

ENID, Ok., Sept. 26.—Over 80 per cent of the students in high school here are round shouldered, L. R. Vance and Miss Nelle Moore, physical directors announced today. Numerous cases of "flat" feet and "pigeon toes" also were found, it was stated.

TRACES UNKNOWN HERO

Spiritualist Says Unknown Soldier Will Return.

By The United Press. OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 26.—Are the remains of America's Unknown soldier resting in Arlington National Cemetery those of Theodore Otis Owen?

Mrs. L. D. McMasters, Oklahoma City, prominent in Oklahoma spiritualistic circles asserts that she has been in communication with the doughboy honored by his country.

On the strength of her "communication from the spirit world," Mrs. McMasters plans to search government records for the enlistment record of Owens, if he really existed.

According to the spiritualist Owen's spirit told her he would return and tell Congress things about the war they had never dreamed.

Mrs. McMasters claims that if she locates in government enlistment records she will have outdone Sir Conan Doyle.

CHEKIANG ARMY IS SURROUNDED

Second Army of General Chi Moving Northward—General Lu Expected To Surrender.

MAY BE SLAUGHTER

Great Fighting Anticipated if Lu Makes Last Stand For a Finish Battle.

By The United Press. SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 26.—General Lu's Chekiang army was completely surrounded tonight. The second army of General Chi was moving northward, and General Lu may surrender immediately.

Otherwise, serious possibilities are seen if he forces a finish fight. Great slaughter is anticipated.

General Sun Sang, commanding the Chi Sukien army, is preparing to join a group of the second army at Kashing.

First C. I. A. Assembly

DENTON, Texas, Sept. 26.—Students and faculty members of the College of Industrial Arts as well as many Denton townspeople met in the first assembly of the 1924-25 college year in the C. I. A. auditorium Thursday morning at 11:15 o'clock. Dean E. V. White, acting president of the Texas State College for Women since the death of the late Dr. F. M. Bralley, presided for the first time since assuming his new duties.

SAWYER BURIED

Mrs. Harding Attends Funeral of Famous Physician—Buried Near Harding's Tomb.

By The United Press. MARION, O., Sept. 26.—Brigadier General Charles E. Sawyer was buried today in the Marion cemetery near the tomb of ex-President Harding, whom he served as a personal physician. Dr. Jesse Swank, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, presided at the funeral at the Sawyer home.

There was no funeral sermon. Mrs. Harding, widow of the late President, who has lived with the Sawyers since her husband's death, attended the services, and rode to the cemetery.

Prepare Petroleum Exposition.

TULSA, Ok., Sept. 26.—Special trains from Chicago, St. Louis, Los Angeles and many other cities will bring oil men to the International Petroleum Exposition here October 2 to 11. A "Pageant of Princesses" will open the exposition the morning of October 2.

Tenders Resignation From Assistant Secretary of Navy Office to President Coolidge.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 26.—Assistant Secretary of the Navy Theodore Roosevelt, Republican nominee for Governor of New York, today personally tendered his resignation to President Coolidge. He will submit a formal letter of resignation later.

POULTRY PRIZES FOR FAIR READY

Show and Exhibition to be One of Most Interesting and Complete at Nolan County Fair.

MANY SPECIAL PRIZES

Birds Showing Disease Will Be Barred From Show—Also to Hold Egg Exhibit at Fair.

Among the important and outstanding features of the Nolan County Fair to be held in Sweetwater Oct. 29, 30 and 31, will be the poultry show and exhibition, according to the early plans now being made by the committee in charge of that department under the chairmanship of George A. Lackey. Although the date is a bit early for poultry exhibits, a very credible showing is expected, as farmers in the county and elsewhere will have had about two months to prepare their entries by the fair dates.

The poultry show during the fair will not interfere with the annual poultry show to be held here Dec. 16, it was pointed out.

The prize list and rules and regulations governing the poultry exhibit at the fair have been completed by the committee and approved by the central fair committee.

Miss Myrtle Murray of A. & M. College has been secured for the judge of the exhibits.

Birds showing signs of disease on arrival will be excluded from the exhibits, and every bird must be leg banded, according to the rules. The exhibits will be divided into 10 classes, single entries and pen entries. The single entries include an exhibit of one bird out of the class consisting of cock, cockerel, hen, pullet. The pen entries include two groups, the old pen, and the young pen. The former will be made up of one cock and four hens of the same variety, while the young pen will be composed of one cockerel and four pullets of the same variety. Entry fees will be charged for each exhibit, and the prize awards will be made on a percentage basis, each prize winner to be awarded a per cent of the entry fee in that class.

An attractive list of special prizes will also be awarded, as follows: Best display, all varieties, \$10.00; best white bird, male or female, black bird, male or female, buff bird, male or female, parti colored, male or female, best bird in show, male or female, \$2.00 each. Best pen in show and exhibitor showing the greatest number of birds will receive \$5.00 each. The best turkey tom and the best turkey hen will receive \$3.00 each, and the award for the best trio of turkeys will be \$5.00.

In connection with the poultry show, an egg exhibit will be held with first and second prizes of \$3.00 and \$2.00 respectively for brown shell and white shell exhibits.

SOME TELEPHONE SYSTEM

In 1922, there were 18,250,000,000 telephone calls in the United States, an average of 53,300,000 local and 1,700,000 long distance calls a day. Estimating local calls at one mile average length, and toll calls at 30 miles, this meant about 10,000,000 miles of "travel" per day over the wire route. Estimates say automobile operation costs 10 cents a mile; for 100,000,000 miles cost would be \$10,000,000,000. A good walker travels three miles an hour; the telephone saves 33,000,000 hours of walking every day, and all the time besides; at 30 cents an hour this would be \$10,000,000. Practically any Bell telephone can now reach 15,000,000 subscribers.

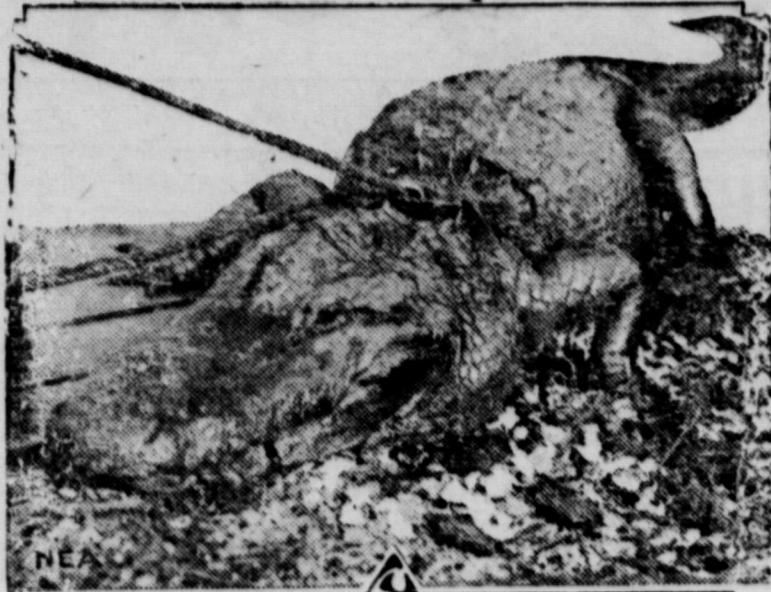

In the entire community there is not a mortgage. And every man, woman and child is the owner of a 400-acre farm, of which eight acres are irrigated and the remainder non-irrigated.

These farmers, residents of Montana, are Blackfoot Indians, wards of the United States Government.

The Blackfoot Indian reservation is situated in the northern part of Montana, just south of Alberta, Canada.

The average altitude is about five thousand feet, and because of its northern location and high altitude the climatic conditions are severe. It has been considered essentially a grazing country with little agricultural possibilities.

The Indians on the reservation are of a high type. During the settlement of the Northwest the bands of these Indians were gradually restricted until they were finally placed on the reservation. From the sale of lands and the cession of the Glacier National Park to the government, and in other ways, the Blackfeet received considerable amounts of money, and in 1917, 1918 and 1919 were prosperous.

Following 1918, drought conditions prevailed and the livestock values dropped to such an extent the Indians became almost bankrupt so far as their livestock was concerned. They hit bottom in 1920, with little personal property and no commercial credit. This condition prevailed to such an extent that during the winter and spring of 1921 almost two thousand of the three thousand membership of the tribe were receiving rations from the government.

As their funds were almost exhausted the question arose as to what was best to be done to take

care of the situation.

The Five-Year Plan.

To start a definite plan after the leading Indians of the reservation had been consulted, a 5-year program was decided upon, beginning in 1921. This decision was reached

March 1 and, on account of the short time before the plowing and planting season, the program could not undertaken extensively and efforts had to be restricted. As a result, about 25 per cent of the Indians of the reservation planted grain and probably 40 per cent planted gardens. Provisions were made for harvesting and threshing the grain and the Indians were encouraged to build root houses to take care of their garden products. With the exception of those of a few mixed-blood Indians, there were few grain fields in excess of five acres. In fact, the fields probably averaged two acres to the Indian and as a result the threshing-machine record in the autumn of 1921 showed 1,100 bushels of grain and the root-house records a creditable amount of potatoes, carrots and rutabagas placed in storage for the winter. In addition many of them had grown peas, beans, onions, lettuce, cabbage, and a few other hardy garden products for their own summer use.

To interest the Indians in this program, the superintendent of the reservation, in connection with the field matron, the superintendent of livestock and the district farmer, with an interpreter made house-to-house canvasses of the reservation, visiting the home of each Indian, talking over his plans from a standpoint of industry.

The Chapter Organization.

The work grew to such an extent by the end of the first year of the program it was impossible for the superintendent and his few assistants to retain this personal touch thru out the entire reservation. That the situation might be handled more expeditiously and the personal touch retained as far as possible, it was decided to organize a farm and livestock as-

sociation. This association covers the entire reservation area and is composed of about thirty chapters. The chapter membership averages about fifteen families as a rule associated together through relationship or marriages.

As a rule the memberships used good judgment in selecting officers. The president in almost every instance, was the leader of the community. The vice-president likewise had a substantial standing, and the secretary, in every instance, could read and write. By means of this organization, a close association and touch was kept up, and the superintendent was able to get into communication with any particular chapter or all of the chapters promptly through its officers.

The officers rendered loyal support to the program so that, in starting the second year of the program in the spring of 1922, the chapter organization took a prominent part which resulted in a successful and widespread farming—activity and the threshing machines' records showed fifteen thousand bushels of grain, as against eleven hundred the year before and forty thousand bushels for 1923, the third year. This resulted in canceling all flour contracts for the school and agency and, for the first time in the history of the Blackfeet Indians, they raised their own flour.

Community Machinery.

On account of the mountainous country and steep creek banks, it was necessary to have a threshing machine that was not too heavy and one that was simple. Each chapter organization took care of its own threshing, meeting the outfit at the boundaries of the chapter, going through the area of the chapter with it and turning it over to the next organization. In addition to the two threshing machines which are used by all the chapters in common, each chapter plans on eventually obtaining one binder, one drill, one farming mill, two disks, four mowing machines, four rakes in addition to plows and harrows that they now own to take care of next year's farming activities. This farming machinery is turned over to the president of the chapter and he is held responsible for its housing and safe keeping the various chapters all over the reservation are building community machinery sheds for this purpose.

HUMAN MUSEUM

Girl Swallows 1200 Metal Objects in 13 Years.

SAGINAW, Mich., Sept. 26.—When physicians operated on a 15-year-old Saginaw girl, they discovered she was an animated museum of metal curios.

In 13 years, the girl, who is abnormal, had swallowed 1200 metal objects, all of which were removed from her stomach and cataloged. The exhibits ranged from crucifixes to Chinese pennies.

The mass of metal weighed 62 ounces, and included coins worth \$9.74; eight sewing machine bobbins and the remains and parts of 48 others; 174 closed safety pins and 17 open ones, 66 lingerie pins, 178 common pins, 43 of them bent; 12 small screws and bolts; 11 fragments of crockery, and 18 fragments of glass; 2 roofing nails and 19 carpet tacks; five crucifixes and three religious medallions, a 15 inch gold chain, a lavalliere and chain, 11 pieces of rosaries and three watch chains, five earrings with fragmentary chains; eight shoe laces, with an aggregate length of 12 feet, and a miscellaneous mass of metal, silk ribbons, string and thread.

The name of the girl, who is an adopted child, is being withheld an account of her mental condition.

Drank Poison on Dare.

Allegation is made that because the work was not submitted to competitive bidding, it is illegal. The work is being done under the direction of the state painter who is using day labor.

WORLD'S BEEF SUPPLIES.

From Cattleman.

There have been some significant shifts in numbers of cattle in several of the larger cattle producing countries compared with the last estimates preceding the world war, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The estimated world total shows net increase of about 14,000,000 head.

The most significant of the shifts have been decreases of about 14,000,000 head in the United States, 2,000,000 in Germany, 2,000,000 in France, and 3,500,000 in Mexico, and increases of about 12,000,000 head in Argentina, 4,000,000 in Brazil, 3,000,000 in Canada, and 3,000,000 in Australia.

These increases more than offset the decreases, and in addition there are smaller increases in many countries of less importance in cattle production. The total of the latest estimates available from Europe, North and South America, Australia, and New Zealand amounts to about 355,000,000 head, compared with 326,000,000 head, the last estimates preceding the war.

The increase in Argentina is very important. It is evidence of the extent to which Argentina has gone into beef production. Argentine beef has practically replaced American beef in European markets, and some few shipments have reached the United States. The average exports from Argentina for the period 1921-23, were

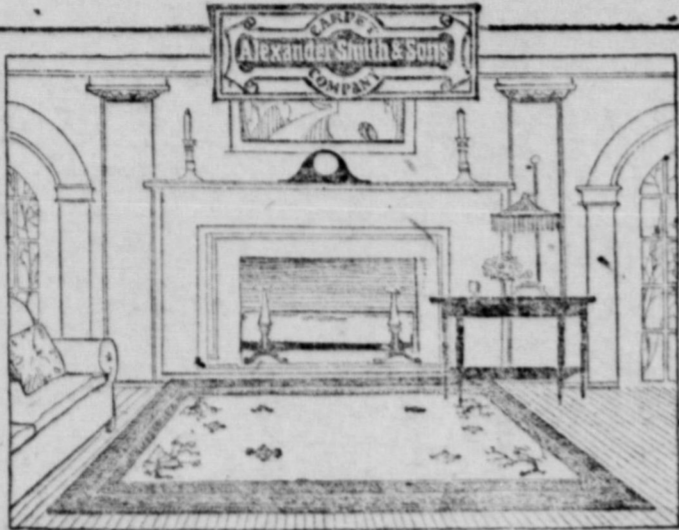
over 1,000,000,000 pounds, compared with 655,000,000 pounds in 1908-13 or an increase of 57 per cent.

In recent years exports of both cattle and beef from the United States have almost ceased. From 1900-1904, the average exports of live cattle from the United States exceeded imports by 348,000 head. This situation has now reversed itself, the United States importing in 1923 about 100,000 head of cattle, most of which was feeder stock from the Prairie Provinces of Canada.

In Argentina, the so-called cattle crisis which followed the deflation period of 1921 has been brought to an end by a process of liquidation. Prices of cattle are still low, but the business has been adjusted to the new price level, and more cattle are being produced and sold than in the years of the war when the average price nearly double the average price of 1923.

When exchange rates are considered cattle are selling somewhat lower in Buenos Aires than in 1923, although they are higher than in 1922. The average price in April of the best grade of steers for chilling, was equivalent in United States currency to about \$3.45 per hundred pounds live weight compared with \$3.19 in January. On May 1, prices quoted for this grade of steers were equivalent to a range from \$3.55 to \$3.70 per hundred pounds.

The number of cattle slaughtered in France and Germany during 1923 shows considerable reduction from 1922. There was considerable increase in their net imports of beef. Inspected slaughter in the United States and slaughterings specified establishments in Argentina both show increases over 1922, and in the case of Argentina, are double the slaughterings of 1913.

What the World Is Doing

Garage Doors That Roll Overhead Save Space and Repair Bills

Garage, factory and warehouse doors that roll up overhead are being manufactured to replace the ordinary hinged or



sliding door. They are constructed in panels, somewhat like the roll top of an office desk, and slide on flanged rollers and steel tracks. When the door is opened, it is inside where it cannot be damaged by the weather and cannot blow shut. It is counterbalanced by strong steel springs, locks automatically when closed, fits flush with the floor and is not hard to install. As it does not project beyond the building, it is convenient where the garage or other structure is erected in limited space.

Spark-Plug Cleaner

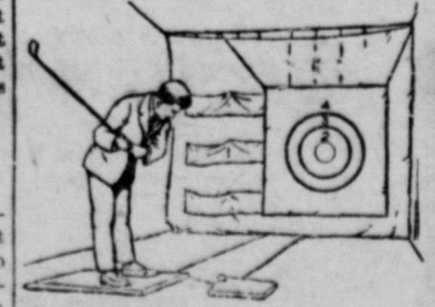
Stranded copper wire makes a spark-plug cleaner that can be used without taking the plug apart and is harmless to the porcelain. It will not clean the insulator as well as when the plug is taken apart and polished with steel wool, but will serve in an emergency. The best results are obtained when a length of lampcord is doubled over and both ends used. The insulation of the wire should not be removed for more than 1/4 in. as it stiffens the end of the wire if left out.

Paint for Cardboard Panels and Coils

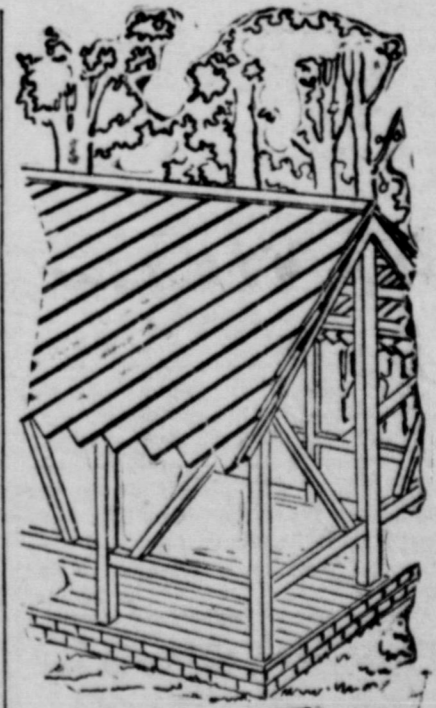
An insulating paint, which has been found serviceable for painting cardboard panels and coils in radio work, can be made by anyone at practically no cost. A pint of denatured alcohol is obtained, and an old phonograph record, which is broken up into many small pieces, is dropped into the alcohol. This can be done best in a fruit jar. The cap is screwed down tightly and the mixture allowed to stand for a few days until the pieces of record have been thoroughly dissolved. The mixture is stirred well before it is used and is applied with a brush. The work must be done fast, as the paint dries rapidly, leaving a black film on the surface. Two coats are sufficient for any material. The application stiffens the cardboard, considerably and produces a fine dull finish. One pint of the mixture will cover from 15 to 20 sq. ft., and sometimes more.

Rifle Range Target in Golf Net Improves Player's Accuracy

To teach accuracy in driving, a steel golf-practice net has been installed in a Los Angeles club. It has the bull's-eye

Novel Roof Economizes Lumber

Each board overlaps the one below it in order to shed rain, making the roof practically waterproof. Roofs made in this way have been found quite satisfactory.

Three comets are due to approach near the earth in 1924, astronomers at the naval observatory have announced. Special preparations are to be made to study them, it is said, as scientists have no means of determining what may have happened to them since they passed out of sight.
