**Case of Kansas Youth Who Murdered** Companion Has Barristers Puzzled-May Go Free.

GREAT BEND, Kas., Sept. 30 .- A serious loophole in Kansas' murder laws has been found by authorities here seeking to prosecute Harold Bowsher, the 15-year-old youth who knocked his boy comrade unconscious and threw him beneath the wheels of the train upon which they were riding.

Kansas laws provide that a person under 16 cannot be tried for murder or any other felony. Persons under 16 can only be tried in juvenile courts which are presided over by the judge of the probate court. If guilty, juvenile court judges can pronounce no definite sentence and can only send an offender to the state industrial school where authorities there determine a prisoner's sentence based on his good behavior and ability to learn a vocation. The industrial school will not accept a new prisoner over sixteen and at 21 all prisoners are released.

Bowsher was 16 years old today. Thus it is too late to send him to the industrial school and as he was under sixteen when he committed the murder with which he is charged, he cannot be tried in the district court which could send him to the penitentiary.

A movement to provide a permanent system of flag displays on holidays and festival occasions has been launched by the B. C. D., Auxiliary here, which is meeting with splendid success in the town district. The proposed plan of the Auxiliary is to have flags displayed, during the holidays and other occasions, on the curbs of the main business streets, the flags to fit into sockets in the curb 25 feet apart.

The flags are 4x6 feet and are on staffs 12 feet long. A very pretty effect is produced, it is stated, when the flags are flying all over town on the sidewalks and 25 feet apart.

Mrs. F. J. Neal and Mrs. George Parker, of the B. C. D. Auxiliary, together with A. C. Berry of the Shenandoah Flag Co., interviewed business men around the square Monday and practically all the business men agreed to have the socket placed in his sidewalk and to buy the flag. Other firms will have an opportunity to obtain this novel means of flag displays.

The flags and staffs sell for a small price, a percentage of which goes to the Auxiliary. They are permanent, and good for years to come, it is stated, and they expect to have them installed in Sweetwater by October 25, in time for the Nolan County Fair. Other towns which use this means of flag display are McKinney, Amarillo, Denver, Galveston, Mineral Wells and Weatherford.

#### Nine"y Percent of Motor Accidents Traced to Brakes




