## BENTLEY'S HOMER WINS OWN GAME

New York Pitcher Scores His Catcher Ahead of Him, Beating Washington Senators.

WALTER JOHNSON LOSES

Famous Pitcher Loses Second Straight Attempt in World Series Game by 6-2 Score.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—The New York Giants defeated the Washington Senators 6-2 in the fifth game of the World Series at the Polo Grounds Wednesday, making the standing three games to two with the Giants leading the series. Johnson pitched for the Senators, and Bentley worked for the Giants until the 8th inning, when he gave way to McQuillan.

## COTTON PICKERS NEEDED AT ONCE

Serious Shortage Exists in All Sections Surrounding Sweetwater According Reports.

CROP MOVEMENT DELAYED

Rain Also Delays Receipts—Total to Last Saturday 1,116 Bales in This Town Reported.

Cotton poured into Sweetwater steadily all last week after the previous rains, but the receipts took a slump this week after a one and one-fourth inch soaker fell Monday. Only three bales were brought in Monday to the local cotton yards, and 15 bales Tuesday. This is compared with the 200 bales which were received at the yards Saturday, before the rain.

Last week's total, together with the first two days of this week, 494 bales. The season's total now stands at 1,416 bales.

The receipts will pick up within a few days, if the weather becomes clear and dry, in the opinion of cotton men. However, the movement will be considerably delayed by the shortage of cotton pickers which is very prominent in the Sweetwater section. Hundreds of cotton pickers are needed around Sweetwater, and farmers are experiencing great difficulty in locating enough to gather the crop. Hundreds of acres of open cotton are waiting to be gathered, cotton men declare, and the crop is hurting for lack of pickers.

A large number of pickers passed through Sweetwater recently, but practically all are headed further west or to the Plains.

The recent rains, it is thought, may tend to slightly lower the grade of cotton, but the damage will be light. The chief interference of the rain, to merchants as well as farmers, will be the halting of the cotton movement, it is stated.

The local compress is handling a great amount of cotton these days. The Farm Bureau is getting a number of bales, which are not weighed in at the cotton yard.

## BATTLE MOONSHINERS

Dry Agent Shot and Two Fatally Wounded in Kentucky Scrap.

Hiram See, 65, was killed outright, and Alex Oder, 87, and John Elliott, 32, are dying.

## LIFTS EMBARGO

Mexico Modifies Embargo Against Texas Livestock—Restricts Only Counties Where Disease.

HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 8.—Mexico today notified State authorities of the modification of livestock embargo into Mexico from Texas owing to the hoof and mouth disease.

The embargo was lifted on all except Harrison, Galveston, Brazoria and Fort Bend Counties.

The modification followed a conference of Mexican officials and State and Federal authorities and an inspection of the area in which the plague is raging.

## SHENANDOAH DUE IN TEXAS SOON

Helium Plant at Fort Worth Has Wireless Message From Big Dirigible Arrive There Tonight.

ZR3 STARTS THURSDAY

Final Test Made of Motors Today and if Weather Conditions Favorable to Start Thursday.

FORT WORTH, Texas, Oct. 8.—The Shenandoah is expected to arrive here about 8 o'clock tonight, according to a radio message received at the Fort Worth helium plant direct from the big navy dirigible shortly after noon today.

The location of the air liner at the time the message was sent was not given.

It is supposed to be traveling at the rate of 50 miles an hour. Fort Worth is the first town where a stop is scheduled, for refueling and a new supply of helium. The hour of departure from Fort Worth is uncertain.

## PLAN RAILROAD

Charter Issued For Construction Rail Line From Wellington Across South Panhandle.

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 8.—The construction of 228 miles of railroad was called for in a charter issued today to the Roswell, Lubbock and Memphis short line railway.

The company, whose principal office is Houston, Texas, has a capital stock of \$250,000.

The proposed line, if built, will run from Wellington, in Collingsworth County, to a point on the Texas-New Mexico line, across Hall, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Cochran Counties.

## SCHOOLS ARE 4TH

Texas Has Low School Rank—Yet State Per Capita Expenditure is Among Highest in U. S.

FORT WORTH, Texas, Oct. 8.—Texas ranks 44th in per capita state and local expenditures for all public purposes, including schools and state and local government. Texas ranks 37th in per capita state and local expenditures for all forms of public education, despite the fact that she ranks second in the proportion of state and local expenditures that go for public education. The per capita percentage were made on the basis of total population.

These conditions have just been made public by Dr. George A. Works, director of the Texas School Survey.

In per capita state and local expenditures for all public purposes, including all forms of public education, it is found that Texas spends \$19.42, for a rank of 44. Nevada, in first place, spends \$102.26 per capita; while Alabama, the lowest, spends \$12.13. In per capita state and local expenditures for all forms of public education, Texas spends \$8.41. Montana leads the list with a per capita expenditure of \$24.46, while Kentucky is lowest with \$4.36. In the proportion of its state and local expenditures that go for public education, the rank of Texas is second.

## CERTIFY SUIT TO SUPREME COURT

Third Court of Civil Appeals at Austin Certifies Ferguson Injunction Case in High Court.

TO HASTEN APPEAL

Counsel For Both Sides Endeavoring to Get Decision Before Election Day From Court.

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 8.—The injunction suit filed by M. A. Dickson of San Antonio to prevent the name of Mrs. M. A. Ferguson going on the election ballot in November will be certified to the State Supreme Court, it was announced by the Third Court of Civil Appeals today, where the case had been brought on appeal from the District Court.

Counsel on both sides are co-operating in a strong effort to secure a ruling from the high court prior to election day.

## COTTON SLUMPS

Government Reports Condition 53.5 Per Cent—Crop Estimate 12,499,000 Bales—Off \$3

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 8.—The condition of the cotton crop on October 1 was 53.5 of normal, forecasting a production this year of 12,499,000 bales, the Department of Agriculture Bureau of the Census announced today.

Cotton ginned from the 1924 crop up to Oct. 1 totaled 4,525,520 bales.

## RIOTS IN INDIA

## CONDITIONS GOOD

Maryneal Range in Fine Shape Hartgrave Says.

W. B. Hartgrave, postmaster at Maryneal, was in Sweetwater Wednesday and reports conditions exceptionally good in that section. A much heavier rain was received in that section than in the north end of the county the first of the week, which with moisture already received has started the grass in fine shape for fall pasturage on the big ranches. Cotton will average a bale to every five acres or better with an excellent feed crop this year, he said.

**EAT AN APPLE**

Folks deny themselves a delicious and valuable food by eating too few apples. There are fifty varieties of this fruit of commercial importance. How many do you know about and how many apples do you eat in a year?

Apples constitute a world-wide item of the diet. They are fine for youth and old age when properly prepared. Eaten in the form of old-fashioned apple sauce or baked in a sugar pan, apples are fit for the gods.

Feeding experiments conducted recently proved that the protein content is low, although of an especially fine variety. The juice of the apple is of great dietetic value. Taken freely,

are necessary to promote growth and to maintain good health.

This fruit is worthy of a more prominent place in the dietary. Usually, it is regarded as a luxury to be indulged in when convenient or when it can be afforded. As a matter of fact, the apple should be considered an essential part of the menu.

Nature has so distributed the various forms of food which make a complete ration that is necessary to include in our diet all parts of the plant—leaves, buds, roots, seeds and fruits. When this is done, we can be certain that nothing has been overlooked. You can see then that the apple is one of the plant foods which should be regularly eaten.

The apple supplies in a more palatable though less concentrated form, much the same food essentials that are found in roots. There are particularly the alkaline salts. We need a considerable amount of these to neutralize the acid wastes of our bodies.

In the commercial field, the apple is put to many uses. The dried apple is used in the manufacture of jams, jellies, apple butter and sweet meats in the form of candy and pastries.

Eat fruit every day, especially the apple.

**ONE VOTE**

In 1811, according to a prominent writer, a Rhode Island farmer dallied around to release his pig from a fence and arrived at the polls too late to vote. The Federalists lost that precinct by one vote. As a result, a representative who favored war with Great Britain was elected to the legislature. The Legislature, in turn, elected a United States Senator who favored war, by a majority of one. Then Congress, again by only a majority of one, declared the war which is generally known as the War of 1812.

One vote can and does make a great difference. Not always to the extent that it did in the above case, of course, but nevertheless, who knows what great event, problem or conflict hangs on a solitary vote. The Rhode Island

farmer probably never dreamed that his scuffle with the pig would have any connection with the War of 1812.

Kansas Judge Grants 23 In An Hour.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 8.—The divorce mill in the Independence division of the circuit court was turning rapidly when a record in the severance of marital ties was established by William H. Kinley, acting judge.

In an hour's time divorces at the rate of one in less than three minutes were granted, 23 in all.

All of the divorces were granted on default and most of the complaints were of non-support and desertion.

## RAISES STORM

Promotion Captain Robinson in U. S. Army Brings Up Teapot Dome Leasing Scandal.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 8.—Recommendation of Captain John K. Robinson of the Navy, for promotion from the rank of Captain to Rear Admiral, again places the seal of the Administration's approval on the policy under which the Naval Oil Leases to Sinclair and Doheny were negotiated by Secretaries Fall and Denby. Coming as the prospective promotion does on the heels of disclosures of Captain Robinson's part in the leases, it has served to arouse a storm of protest in Washington, which will have its climax in a fight against confirmation of the promotion by the Senate when the nomination is transmitted to that body in December, after Congress re-convenes.

While the Coolidge administration has never dared to openly defend the naval oil leasing policy which has turned over hundreds of millions of dollars worth of immensely valuable oil reserves to private interests for exploitation, by a series of acts, it has not only failed to rebuke those responsible for the leases, but has placed the seal of its approval upon the men who participated in their negotiation.

### CONVICTS ON ROADS

Oklahoma Tries Out Road Building Plans.

ARDMORE, Ok., Oct. 8.—Convict labor from the state penitentiary at McAlester has been put to work on county road construction near here. Fifty convicts have been placed in the road camp to try out the plans made by county and state officials.

The system is a pattern of the one employed in Colorado. The convicts will receive \$1 a day for their labor and upon the success of the test will depend whether they will be used regularly in road construction. The road will be inspected with a view to building other roads in the state. The stretch on which they are working is 30 miles in length.

Faver which was exhibited at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair at Wichita Falls, and for which she received first premium in the non-professional class was chosen by a committee of four artists, to be placed in a group of ten best pictures shown at the fair out of a gallery of perhaps 500 pictures.

Out of the ten pictures thus chosen, one will be selected to be bought and presented to the Wichita Junior College, which already possesses several beautiful paintings valued at several thousand dollars.

### Serve Free Coffee

By The United Press. SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 8.—Free coffee for guests, served in bed, is the program of a local hotel. Just turn a knob, and the hot java appears.

The device, which is to be patented, consists of an indicator dial on which the guest shows the time at which he desires the beverage. Outside the room, the dial figures run from 7 to 9:30. Between those hours, bell boys are to push little coffee wagons up and down the corridors, serving each guest at his appointed hour.

If by any chance a guest does not want coffee, he may set the dials so no figures appear.

# PLAN AIR ROUTE

Regular Trans-Atlantic Air Service Between England and America Expected Near Future.

By The United Press.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—A regular trans-Atlantic airship service between England and America is expected within a few years by Sir Sefton Brancker, air vice marshal. He estimates two and a half days as the regular scheduled time of the trip across the Atlantic. Airships will be the pioneers in establishing this service, but eventually airplanes may become practicable for such flights, he said.

Sir Sefton also thinks bi-weekly airship service between England and India and Australia, eleven days for the trip, and weekly service to Capetown in five and a half days, will be established before many years.

"Two and a half to three years will pass before the first two big ships are flying," he said, "and after that it may be another two years before the airship service to India in a regular steady bi-weekly basis can be established."

The British Air Ministry is now working to produce aircraft that can be operated more cheaply. Experiments are now being made with a heavy-oil engine, which if successful, will do to airplanes what the Ford did to automobiles—make an airplane within the financial reach of almost everybody.

## PLAN FAST PLANE

Would Generate Power Without Engine or Propellor.

By The United Press.

PARIS.—An airplane without engine or propellor, in the ordinary sense, is the dream of experts now making experiments for the French Air Service. The "Rocketplane," as it is called, will have its motive power generated inside the cabin of the machine itself. The apparatus will produce gas under pressure in a combustion chamber and then eject it, at the rear of the machine, by a kind of nozzle. This will set up a reaction which, it is claimed, will drive the plane at much greater speed than an ordinary motor could do. A theoretical speed of over 300 miles an hour is claimed by the use of this "jet" propulsion system. The experiments are not far enough along for actual tests.

Bob Own Hair.

Grow Watermelons.

DENTON, Texas, Oct. 8.—John P. Carter of Garza near here is the unofficial champion watermelon grower

in Texas, according to melon 'experts' here.

In 1923 Carter grew a melon which tipped the beams at 123 pounds and was rated as the largest of its kind ever produced.

Dry weather, however, intervened the past season and Carter was forced to be content with producing one melon weighing 108 pounds and two others "hefting" 106 pounds each. Ten melons out of Carter's patch totaled 1,020 pounds and twenty-four pushed the scale weight down to the 2,300 pound mark.

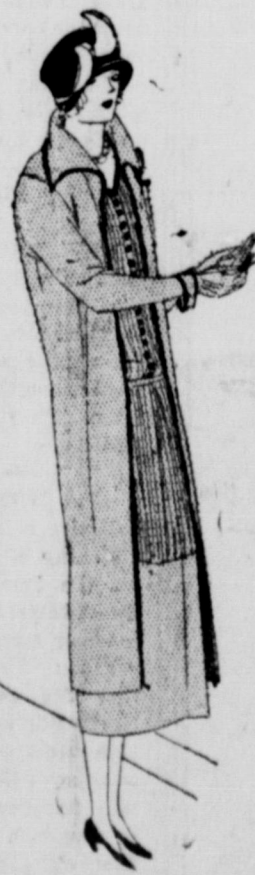

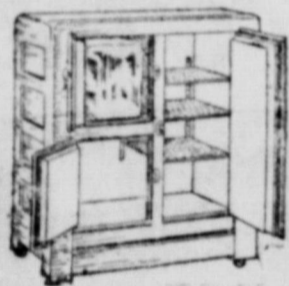

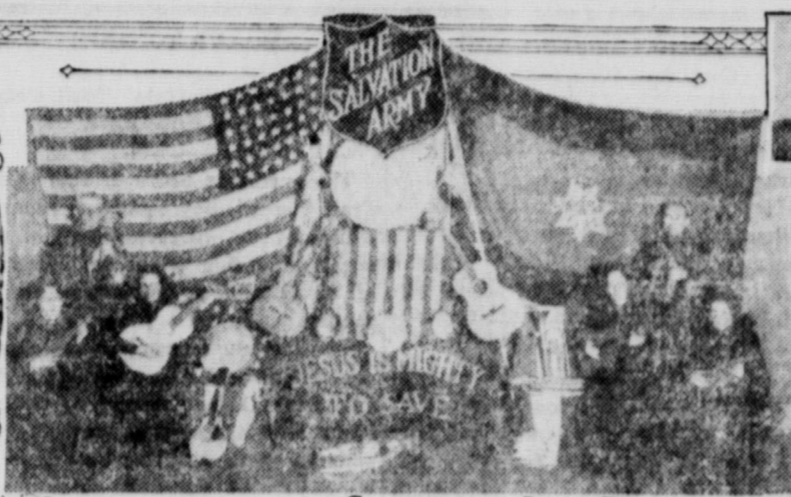

Shortage of Cotton Pickers in Dora Section Reported.

The best cotton crop in years, good feed and grain crop and a serious shortage of cotton pickers is the expression of G. F. Lewis of Dora, in Sweetwater this week.
