## DEATH TOLL NOW SIX ON TRENTON

Survivors Tell Tales of Heroism Displayed by Officers and Men in Blast on Cruiser.

**CAUSE IS UNDETERMINED**  
First Thought "Back Flare" Caused Explosion—Ensign Loses Life Rescuing Crew Members.

NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 21.—The mounting death toll caused by the explosion in the forward gun mount of the U. S. S. Trenton reached six today and four others of the scout cruiser's crew burned in the blast at target practice off Cape Henry yesterday were said at the Naval Hospital to be in a "desperate condition."

Survivors told of the great heroism displayed by officers and men of the crew. The outstanding hero was Ensign Drexler, who dashed into the blazing turret and dragged men to the decks. His clothing caught fire as he rushed the second time from the death house, and he collapsed and died on the deck.

Lieut. John Sedgwick was another hero of the disaster. The force of the explosion blew Sedgwick and three of the men of the crew through the rear door of the turret into the sea. Sedgwick was badly burned and his right arm was broken. With the use of his left arm he saved two men and had the body of Seaman William Walker of Mayo, S. C., in his grasp until a heavy wave swept the dead man from his hold. Walker's body is still missing.

The explosion occurred a few miles off Norfolk after the Trenton had taken up her position on the drill grounds. The first reports said it was caused by a "flare back" such as killed 48 men aboard the battleship Mississippi last spring, but it was later said that the gun had not been fired, and that the cause had not been determined.

The dead and injured were taken off the Trenton last night by attendants of the Naval Hospital at Norfolk, and the injured rushed to the hospital, some so seriously burned that further deaths are feared.

Naval experts believe that the fatal accident was caused by the explosion of powder inside the turret. Three men were killed out-right. The fourth drowned when the access door in the rear of the turret swung open and four men fell overboard when the swinging turret was brought back over the side of the vessel.

The fifth victim, George Robert Cholester, first class boatswain, died Tuesday morning in the Naval Hospital at Norfolk. Officials said that another badly injured seaman, Bennet Williams, was not expected to live.

## STORM PASSES

Hurricane Reported Bound For Miami Hits Atlantic Ocean—Report All Danger Past.

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 21.—All danger from the hurricane reported sweeping inland from the coast has passed, according to reports from the Miami weather bureau. The storm is believed to have passed out into the Atlantic somewhere between here and Titusville.

Fort Myers, where the storm passed last night, reported heavy property losses from wind and rain today, but no loss of life. Wire communication has been disrupted.

## Guards Watch Jail After Threats Of Removing Killers

MONTREAL, Oct. 21.—Twenty heavily armed provincial police guarded the Bordeaux jail today following the receipt of a threat that five condemned murderers sentenced to be executed Friday would be released.

Mounted police will be added to the guard tomorrow and the day of the hanging 100 guards will line the route of the death march. The men are to be hanged for the murder of a taxi driver in a hold-up last April. The Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals have denied all efforts in the interest of the condemned men.

## PATROL HERRIN

Anti-Klan Deputy Sheriff and Two Squads of Guards Make Arrest—Klansmen Out on Bond.

HERRIN, Ill., Oct. 21.—Seventy-one National Guardsmen patrolled the streets today on the alert against another outbreak of violence following a street fight in which S. Glenn Young, former Ku Klux Klan liquor raider, is said to have participated.

Young, John Compton, and Leonard Barres were arrested last night by Deputy Sheriff Thompson, leader of the Anti-Klan forces, and two squads of guards he asked to help him. The Klansmen were taken to Marion, where they filed \$5,000 bond each on a charge of assault to kill John Garavaglia, former Herrin health officer. Garavaglia said that after a fight with Barres earlier in the day, all three attacked him.

## ARREST CHINESE

Chicago Police and Detectives on Guard After Tong War Breaks With One Dead, Four Wounded.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 21.—More than fifty Chinese were jailed during the night as the nationwide Tong war flamed here, leaving one dead and four wounded, two perhaps fatally.

To the list was added the death of a Chicago Chinese in Milwaukee. Chief of Police Collins and Chief of Detectives Hughes are in personal charge of the scores of police and detectives patrolling the Chinese district here and on the hunt for the gun men.

Guards are around the Chinese district and the homes and business places of more than 100 wealthy Chinese said to be marked for death.

### Supreme Court Recess.

## NEED SILK WAGE

Railway and Steamship Employees Can Not Buy Wives Three Pairs Silk Hose Yearly.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 21.—Demand for wages high enough to enable them to buy three pairs of silk stockings for their wives each year was made in the request for increased pay on file with the United States Labor Board for consideration.

The brotherhood of railway and steamship clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees declare white collars are not so important for themselves but that the wives should have the silk raiment.

The silk stocking wage demand is a supplementary request filed by President E. H. Fitzgerald, to the salary increase asked last week.

At the present rate of pay, the clerks contend the average wife can afford new silks only "once in a hundred years."  
The wages are equivalent to the peak war time rate of pay for clerks. It is approximately a ten per cent increase over the present pay.

## SHENANDOAH IS OVER SAN DIEGO

Giant Ship Arrives There Early Tuesday Morning, Unable to Land Due to Heavy Fog.

**PROBABLY HERE THURSDAY**  
Believed at Least Two Days Will Be Required For San Diego to Fort Worth Return Trip.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 21.—The big navy dirigible arrived over this city at 4:30 o'clock this morning but did not attempt to land owing to a heavy fog. The big airship hovered over the city the weather to clear.

It is believed that a landing will be made tonight.

According to present plans the Shenandoah will start from San Diego Wednesday morning.

It is believed that at least two days will be required to make the trip from San Diego to Fort Worth, the next scheduled stop. Leaving San Diego Wednesday morning would bring the big ship over Sweetwater some time Thursday, either about noon or shortly thereafter. According to plans already announced, the dirigible will follow the same route as before which will give residents of Sweetwater another opportunity to see the monster of the skies.

## KILLS HUSBAND

Madam Dubell, Former American Girl, Confesses Shooting Royal Spouse With Shotgun.

### SIGNS ILLEGAL

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Oct. 21.—Missouri motorists who attach advertising signs and slogans like "four wheels, no brakes," "this car stops at all railroad crossings," "excuse our dust," etc., to their state automobile license tags, are violating the state law, according to O. G. Steinger, commissioner of the automobile registration division in the secretary of state's office here.

Even a city license plate on the front or rear of an automobile in Missouri is illegal, Steinger asserts.

## GRIBBLE DIES

Accident in Switch Yards Monday Fatal to Orient Employee—Funeral Held Tuesday Afternoon.

The third railroad employe to meet death here within a week, James Thomas Gribble, 24, died at the Sweetwater Sanitarium at 9:30 Monday night following his fall beneath the wheels of a freight train in the yards here early Monday morning.

The funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the City Cemetery, with Rev. J. T. McKissick conducting the service.

Mrs. Alexander of Moody, mother of the dead man, has arrived in Sweetwater for the funeral, as have his brothers, Polk and Irwin Gribble. Besides these, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. T. T. Dennis of Waco.

Although everything possible was done for the injured man, his death was momentarily expected throughout the day. One leg was crushed off close to the hip, and a foot was severed at the ankle. Physicians were unable to make the necessary operations, it is reported, because of Gribble's critical condition, made worse by the great loss of blood.

Gribble was a brakeman for the Orient at the time of his death, and has also seen service with the T-P and Santa Fe railroads.

## GIRL RUN DOWN IS NEAR DEATH

Condition of Loma Vee Graves, Struck by Negro Driver Sunday, Reported Critical.

**HER SKULL FRACTURED**  
May Take Several Days to Determine Chances For Recovery, Physicians Here State.

After receiving a fractured skull and other injuries when struck by a speeding car driven by a negro late Sunday, little Loma Vee Graves is hovering between life and death at her home north of Sweetwater.

A Sweetwater physician who is attending the girl, stated that her condition was critical, and that it would require probably 4 days to determine whether she would live.

The girl is in a partially unconscious condition, it was stated. Her skull is fractured at the base, and there is a probability that she sustained broken ribs in addition to other injuries.

## Around The Clock Around The World

MOSCOW.—"While the British bankers are purposely attacking the Russian loan they are privately expanding credit," Commissioner of Finance Sokolnikoff told the executive committee of the Union of Soviet Republicans.

LONDON.—China has sent a note to Japan warning her not to interfere in the civil war and requesting Japan to exert her nationals in the war zone to behave with respect, according to a Pekin dispatch to the Daily Press.

## ESCAPE SCHOOL

Officer Says Youthful Brides and Grooms Will Go to School or Go Jail in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 21.—Boys and girls of school age cannot escape the school law through medium of matrimony, William Bodine, superintendent of compulsory education ruled in ordering a number of youthful brides back to their classes under the pain of jail.

Where the husband is over school age, but the bride is of school age, the husband is responsible, Bodine said.

"I'm going to send these 'cradle robbers' to jail when they fail to send their wives to school," Bodine declared. "All brides under 16 must go to school. And that goes for husbands under 16."

Bodine was notified that dozens of Chicago girls of school age have been married in and around Chicago during the last year, and that nearly all of them are taking advantage of the situation to stay away from school.

The superintendent disclosed that several arrests have been made and prosecutions pending in the cases of "puppy love" marriages.

Bodine contemplated establishment of a checking system of couples granted licenses at several small Indiana and Michigan towns within a 100-mile radius of Chicago.

Three young couples are spending their honeymoons in the class rooms, Bodine disclosed.

## Fido Wags Mean Tail Light, Scares Visiting Motorist

## IN SUGAR QUERY

Coolidge May Hold Hearing on Tariff if Department Information is Insufficient.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 21.—President Coolidge may hold a hearing on the sugar tariff problem if information he has asked for from federal departments fails to clear the question, it was said at the White House today.

The President hopes, however, that this additional delay will not be necessary. A final decision on the sugar tariff reduction recommended by the commission appointed seems no nearer, with the President still waiting for data requested from various agencies and briefs expected to be filed by sugar producers.

## DISCUSS PAVING

Property Owners on Elm Street Meet Monday Night—Mayor and Paving Representative Absent.

Owing to the absence of Mayor Joe H. Boothe and representatives of paving concerns, only an informal meeting of property owners on Elm Street was held Monday evening in the City Hall.

In the discussion, it was developed that a 50-foot width was favored from Third street north to Fifth, owing to needed parking space in the neighborhood of the churches in that vicinity.

From Fifth street north, property owners favor a boulevard with a fifteen-foot strip of pavement on each side and a center strip for trees, etc.

It is planned to pave this street clear to the City Lake and the importance of paving from the city's standpoint with relation to City Lake Park as well as traffic from Fisher County into the city were pointed out by one of the property owners present.

Sweetwater Club to Stage Pep Session and Rally at Regular Meeting Thursday.

## VERDICT OF JURY IS TOLAND SANE

Reports After Being Out Only 15 Minutes—Trial Proceeds on Robbery With Firearms Charge.

**TOLAND'S CONFESSION READ**  
Statement Entered by State Gives Detail of Holding Up Santa Fe Agent and Signed by Defendant.

After being out 15 minutes, the jury in the Dick Toland insanity hearing returned a verdict that the defendant was sane, and the trial of Toland on the robbery with firearms charge will proceed.

The case was completed late Monday, after running through the day. In the afternoon, the State placed officers who had been in contact with Toland here since his arrest, on the stand, and these stated that in their opinion he was sane. Sweetwater physicians were also used by the State in proving their contentions that Toland is in his right mind.

The selection of a jury for the robbery trial occupied the morning session of District Court.

The jury for the robbery hearing was selected, after the examination and dismissal of a great number of men on the special venire, by noon Tuesday, and the trial got under way at 1 o'clock.

The first evidence introduced by the State, after Toland pleaded not guilty, was a page containing the confession of the robbery, signed by Dick Toland. District Attorney Brooks read the confession to the jury. In the statement, Toland's story of the trip from San Angelo to Blackwell and Sweetwater and on to Toland's brother in Fisher County, was similar to the stories told by George Ayers and Mrs. John Tollet, formerly Mrs. Dick Toland, from the witness stand in the Ayers trial.

The confession, related at length the journey in Ayers' car to Fisher County, back to Blackwell, from whence the three motored back to Sweetwater again, arriving here about or after midnight. The car was driven to a spot about 200 yards from the Santa Fe station, according to Toland's confession, and Toland and Ayers went to the station, went through with the hold-up as related by D. D. Dixon in the Ayers trial, returned to the car and drove rapidly to Longworth.

Near that place, they stopped in a thicket, built a fire and divided the money, Toland's confession read. The two travelers' checks in the money bag were burned, it stated.

The confession was alleged to have been signed by Toland here in August, with R. D. Cox, Mark Musgrove, and W. Futch, signed as witnesses.

The defense made objection to the admittance of the confession as evidence, but the objections were overruled after R. D. Cox took the stand and testified as to Toland's dictating and signing the statement.

D. D. Dixon was first placed on the stand by the state Tuesday afternoon, and related the robbery as he testified in the Ayers case. He identified Toland as one of the robbers, and a cross examination by the defense attorney, J. Babb, failed to shake his statements. He was followed on the stand by Mrs. Dixon who was with her husband at the station the night of the robbery.

It is expected that the case may be completed late Tuesday, and will possibly go to the jury Wednesday morning.

## ACTRESS IN BAD

Irene Dalton, Formerly in Movies, and Retired Toledo Man Held For Mann Act Violation.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 21.—Raymond Owens, wealthy retired business man, formerly of Toledo, and Irene Dalton, former motion picture actress, were at liberty today on bonds of \$7,500 and \$5,000 on an indictment charging them with violation of the Mann Act.

The indictment was returned at Toledo, and accused Owen of taking the woman there. The couple surrendered here yesterday.

**WINTER**

Tuesday brought the first fore-runner of winter to Sweetwater, one of the "Melancholy Days" which send folks scurrying home to their fire-sides as soon as the day's work is done, and make us wonder if the Indian in the north woods who predicted an unusually long and cold winter knew his wampum.

Perhaps winter's first envoy brought sadness to the heart of the poet who wrote "The melancholy days are here, the saddest of the year." To the nature lover, there may be a bit of the tragic in the death of beautiful summer and fall, and advent of King Winter.

But to Sweetwater, the first few months of this winter mark the end of a year filled with success and progress. During the brief span of time since we last prepared for the attack of the northerners, we have made rapid strides in the upbuilding of a city destined to become the greatest in West Texas.

The first messenger of winter last year did not find the new residences and buildings that he discovered this year; although he always finds hospitable and hustling citizenship in Sweetwater, for all visitors, even winter, are given the glad hand here, he found our residents pulling to gether with even greater determination when he blew in Tuesday; he found Sweetwater "on the map" in the air, on land, and by rail, and he found her citizens ready to work as hard during the coming year as they worked during the year now ending for the greatness of their city. Welcome winter! You'll be even more surprised when you come back next year.

**PAVING AND PROPERTY**

The value of your city property, which would have little value if it was outside a progressive community such as Sweetwater, depends entirely on the progress of your home town. City property in towns that do not go forward will never increase in value unless a kindly Mother Nature dumps a fortune in oil or other of her stores in your back yard.

Paving is a distinct advantage to your property. Where the paved street goes, progress goes. Good streets are as essential to a city as good roads are to a county. Strange it is that the cry against the bad country road is so much louder than the complaint against the city street this is, comparatively, as bad, or worse.

In Sweetwater's paving program, the streets over which the East and West and North and South highways are to run should be paved at once. Frankly, Sweetwater cannot stand the

comparison of her present streets with other cities, some of them smaller, along the highway routes. The impression gained from entering a city is lasting, and the visitor who glides into Sweetwater over well paved streets, will know at once that he is entering a progressive and wide-awake town.

One question might be pondered on by Sweetwater citizens who are not in favor of paving the streets in front of their property: Should they hold back on a proposition that will increase the value of their property, improve the appearance of the district in which they reside, and materially boost the prosperity and progress of the entire community?

Many property owners are making a real sacrifice in order that the streets on which they live may be paved. Why can't all of us see the proposition in this light, and get together to build Sweetwater?

Paving in Sweetwater is one of the best business investments a property owner can make. The city has agreed to pay one-fourth of the total cost of all new streets constructed. Money put into good streets stays at home and works every day for the best interest of the city we all wish to see a larger and greater community.

**YELLOW FEVER IN HOUSTON**

Houston was saved from a yellow fever epidemic because of the fact that modern sanitary science has shown the way to prevent such epidemics, according to Dr. Malone Duggan, state health officer.

"Yellow fever is transmitted only through the bite of the yellow fever mosquito," stated Dr. Duggan, "and the fact that it was confined to the one man who brought it to Houston, was due not only to the fast and thorough work done since its discovery, but also to the work done by the city in past years in exterminating mosquitoes. The progress of the city would have been set back 10 or 15 years had an epidemic occurred, and the fact that the city was saved should convince the people of the entire state that mosquito eradication is one of the most valuable and vital of all public concerns."

"As long as yellow fever is epidemic in Mexico, there is a potential danger of it getting a foothold in this country. For this reason, it will be necessary for the people of this section of the country to insist upon mosquito eradication and give more consideration to sanitary health regulations."
