Light Turnout Seen For Primary Voting

IN 1958, Ye Editor, as well as the writer of "My Turn" were students at Texas Tech. That was the year the Southwest Conference members voted their approval to invite Tech into their group—an idea that had been a dream of Tech's leaders and boosters practically since its beginning in 1925.

Tech's "Victory Bells" were tolled for hours heralding the achievement. A parade was held on Broadway. We journalists published an "EXTRA" edition of *The Toreador* (Tech's Student Newspaper), to headline the event. We recall being up all night to help produce that issue.

Longtime Texas Tech leaders said it was the greatest day in Tech's history since the college was first granted to the South Plains.

This past week, Texas Tech, along with two or three of its "bigger brothers" in the SWC, the University of Texas, Texas A&M and Baylor, announced plans to leave the conference to join the Big Eight Conference—in the name of a bigger football television stake.

So much for tradition, loyalty, sentiment, ethical values and sportsmanship.

The Cotton Bowl, and their former colleagues are being forsaken for a better TV deal!

The Big 8 Conference has a lower academic requirement for its athletes than the Southwest Conference has had, so these four SWC members will be sacrificing academic standards in making their new conference.

Besides the fact that trading institutions such as Rice University, T.C.U. and S.M.U. automatically leaves a big void in the academic realm.

One of the college officials speaking for the new alliance stated last week that he wished the news that they were spreading had to do with greater academic achievements. Amen to that!

The bad part of this deal is that in 1958, Tech's leaving the old Border Conference to join the Southwest Conference proved to be the death knell for that league.

For you newcomers, we'd point out that Tech competed in the Border along with rivals West Texas State, Texas Western (now U.T.E.P.), Hardin-Simmons University, New Mexico, New Mexico State, Arizona and Arizona State—a pretty fair "country athletic conference" in itself.

As a freshman and sophomore student at Tech, it was possible as a sports fan, to attend many of Tech's out-of-town games. We recall seeing the Raiders play West Texas at Canyon's "Box", and Eastern New Mexico at their old field house. You could go to some "away" games like we did in our old '48 Pontiac. You'd have a tougher time driving to Tech's out-of-town games today.

We've said it before, and we'll say it one more time: you lose some things by becoming "bigger."

And not all of those things, such as loyalty and tradition, should be swept under the rug, just to fatten your athletic budget.

THE NEW METHOD of renewing your vehicle license is slightly flawed, in that the new sticker goes on your windshield, above the state inspection sticker.

There is no way an officer behind a vehicle can check a tag to know if it has been renewed.

We have already heard of several citizens who have been pulled over and told "Your license has expired," when they had the new sticker on their windshield.

In the old days you got new tags every year. One year's tags were black, the next year's were white—fairly easy to spot the expired ones. It also gave our overcrowded prisons a nice "cottage industry."

This sticker idea was probably hatched up by some college graduate in a state agency who had absolutely no experience in the DPS field. (Or a prisoner with a law degree).

Our prediction: Something will change by 1995.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren said Thursday that a low turnout of Parmer County voters is likely in Tuesday's Democratic and Republican primary elections, based on the number of voters who had cast early or absentee ballots.

The election will be held Tuesday, March 8.

As of Thursday noon, only approximately 40 people had availed themselves of early voting countywide. This was less than one-third as many early ballots as were cast in 1992's general election, which, granted was a presidential vote.

Polling places were also announced for Tuesday's election. They are as follows:

Democrats: Friona, 2: Fire Station; Friona 2-1: Calvary Baptist Church; Friona 2-2: Community Center; Bovina: City Hall and Ridgelea School; Rhea: community center; Farwell: county courtroom; Oklahoma Lane: community center, and Lazbuddie: school.

Republicans: Friona (Commissioner's Precinct 1) Calvary Baptist Church; Bovina (Precinct 2) City Hall; Farwell (Precinct 3) Community Center, and Lazbuddie (Precinct 4) First Baptist Church.

There are no candidates listed either for county chairman or

precinct chairmen on either of the ballots, and it is pointed out that write-ins will be necessary. Wendol Christian, who has been serving as Democratic Chairman, says that he is not a candidate for re-election.

The reason for lack of voter interest is no contested primary elections on the local level.

Statewide races have some large fields, but none on the county level.

Two candidates are running for County offices on the Republican ballot, but will not be opposed until November.

Many voters may opt to participate in the Republican primary, where Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, who recently fought off a court battle, has six opponents in the primary. None have really come to the top, so KBH hopes to win nomination without a runoff, similar to the way she ran away with the special election in 1993.

George W. Bush, who is ready to give Ann Richards a run for the governor's race, has taken opposition from Ray Hollis in the primary.

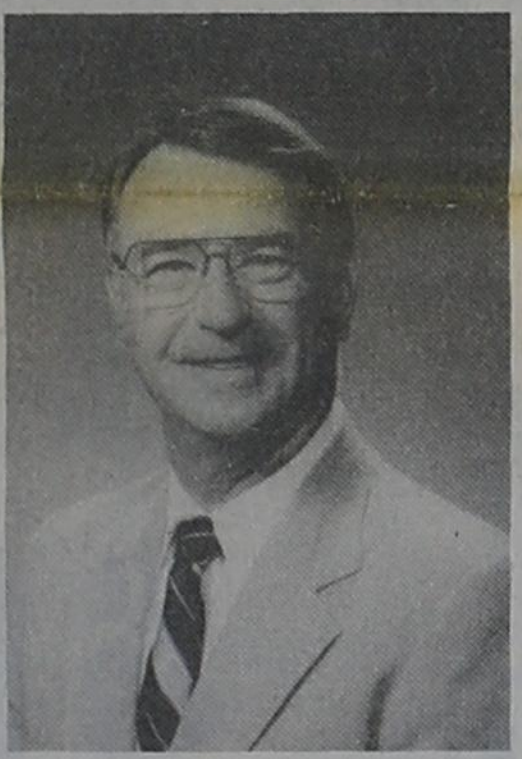

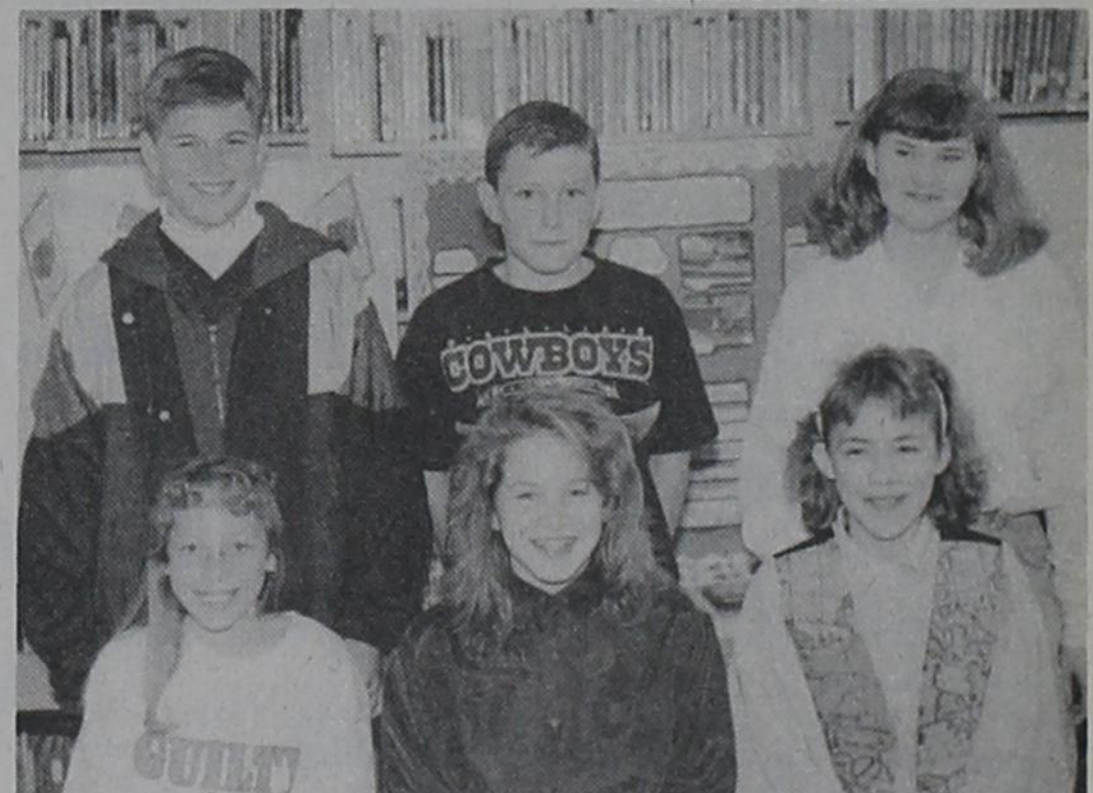

The basketball game scheduled here last Friday between the Friona Squaws and Farwell girls, was called off due to disagreeable weather. The two teams, winners in the county tournament, were playing a best two of three game series. The Squaws had won the first game, played at Farwell.

55 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 3, 1939

Business concerns will give prizes away during the annual livestock show this weekend, valued at around \$100. Persons visiting the show will need to register at some place of business, prior to 2 p.m. on Saturday. At that time, a drawing will be held to see who the winner of merchandise will be.

50 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 25, 1944

CAULIFLOWER SALAD

- 1 large head cauliflower
- 1/2 pound bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 2 medium tomatoes, diced
- 1 bunch green onions, chopped
- 1 cup diced cheese (American or Cheddar)
- 1/2 cup pimento--stuffed olives, sliced
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise or Miracle Whip

Remove outer green leaves and break cauliflower into flowerettes. Toss cauliflower with remaining

ingredients.

HOLIDAY SALAD

- 1 package lime Jello
 - 1 cup hot pineapple juice
 - 2 small packages cream cheese
 - 2 tablespoons chopped pimentos
 - 1 cup celery, chopped
 - 1/2 cup pecans
 - 1 pint whipping cream
- Dissolve Jello in hot pineapple juice and allow to partially cool. Add cheese broken in bits and beat well. When thoroughly cool, add pimentos, pecans and celery. Fold in whipped cream.

RED, WHITE & GREEN SALAD

- 1-3 ounce package lime Jello
- 1/3 cup pineapple juice
- 1 cup crushed pineapple
- 1-1/2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin
- 1-8 ounce package cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1-3 ounce package strawberry Jello
- 1-10 ounce package frozen strawberries

Dissolve lime gelatin in 1 cup boiling water. Stir in pineapple juice and pineapple. Pour into mold; chill until firm. Sprinkle unflavored gelatin over 2 tablespoons cold water to soften; dissolve over hot water. Mix cream cheese with milk; stir in unflavored gelatin. Spread over lime layer; chill. Dissolve strawberry gelatin in 1 cup boiling water. Add frozen strawberries, stir until strawberries are thawed. Cool. Pour over cream cheese layer; chill until firm.

ORANGE JELLO SALAD

- 1 large package Jello
- 4 cups hot water
- 1-8 ounce cream cheese
- 1 cup Cool Whip
- 1 cup miniature marshmallows
- 1/2 cup nuts
- 1 cup crushed pineapple

Dissolve Jello in hot water. Add cream cheese and stir until melted. Chill until thick. Beat with mixer. Fold in Cool Whip, marshmallows, nuts and pineapple. Refrigerate again to set.

PINK SALAD

- 1-12 ounce Cool Whip
 - 1 can Eagle Brand milk
 - 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 - 1 small can coconut
 - 1 cup small marshmallows
 - 1 small can crushed pineapple, drained
 - 1 can cherry pie filling
- Mix together all the ingredients. Can be frozen.

CARAMEL LAYER CHOCOLATE

- 1 bag caramels
- 2/3 cup evaporated milk
- 1 package German chocolate cake mix
- 3/4 cup oleo, melted
- 1/3 cup chopped pecans
- 1 cup chocolate chips

Melt caramel in 1/3 cup of the milk. Set aside. Combine cake mix, oleo and 1/3 cup milk. By hand, stir until dough holds together. Press 1/2 dough into 9x13 pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 6 minutes. Remove and sprinkle with chocolate chips. Spread caramel over chocolate. Spread other 1/2 dough over caramel. Bake 15-18 minutes longer. Cool and refrigerate until caramel sets.

GREBBLE (GERMAN)

- 3 eggs, beaten
 - 1 cup granulated sugar
 - 1 cup whipping cream
 - 1 cup buttermilk
 - 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 2 cups flour
 - More flour
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla (optional)
- Mix beaten eggs, sugar, unwhipped cream and buttermilk. Add salt, soda and baking powder sifted with 2 cups flour. Then work in enough more flour to make a soft dough. Knead on board until very smooth. Roll dough 1/2" thick. Cut into 2x4 inch pieces. Cut 2 slits lengthwise in each piece. Deep fry. Do not overcook. Dribble each piece with icing mixture. Icing mixture: powdered sugar, milk, vanilla mixed to a thin consistency. May refrigerate dough and use as needed.

SUGAR-PLUM DUMPLINGS

- Dough mix:**
- 2/3 cup instant potatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup boiling water
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/2 tablespoon corn oil
- 1 cup flour
- 6 pitted sweet plums
- Filling mix:**
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- Coating mix:**
- 1/2 cup crushed graham crackers
- 1/4 cup sugar

Using the first five ingredients of dough mix, prepare as with mashed potatoes. Sift in flour until it has the consistency of dough (approximately 1 cup). On a

floured board, pat out to 12 inch square. Cut into 6 equal parts. Fill plums with filling mix. Wrap each plum individually with a piece of dough. Encase the plum completely. Drop dumplings into boiling water. When the dumplings rise to the top, remove with fork or slotted spoon. Drain for 10 seconds. Roll dumplings in coating mix.

CHOCOLATE PUDDING DESSERT

- Crust:**
 - 1-1/2 sticks soft margarine
 - 1-1/2 cups flour
 - 1-1/2 cups pecans (chopped)
 - Pudding layer:**
 - 1-8 ounce package cream cheese
 - 1 cup powdered sugar
 - 1-8 ounce Cool Whip
 - 1 package vanilla instant pudding
 - 1 package chocolate instant pudding
- Mix crust ingredients and press into oblong baking dish. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Cover and cool. Mix cream cheese, powdered sugar and 1 cup Cool Whip, spread on cooled crust. Mix puddings with 3 cups milk until firm. Spread over cream cheese layer. Top with remaining Cool Whip and decorate with shaved Hershey chocolate bar. Chill.

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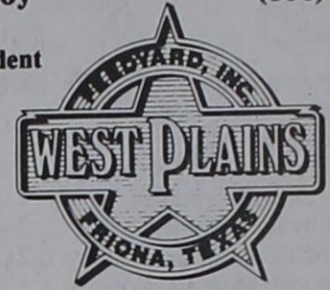

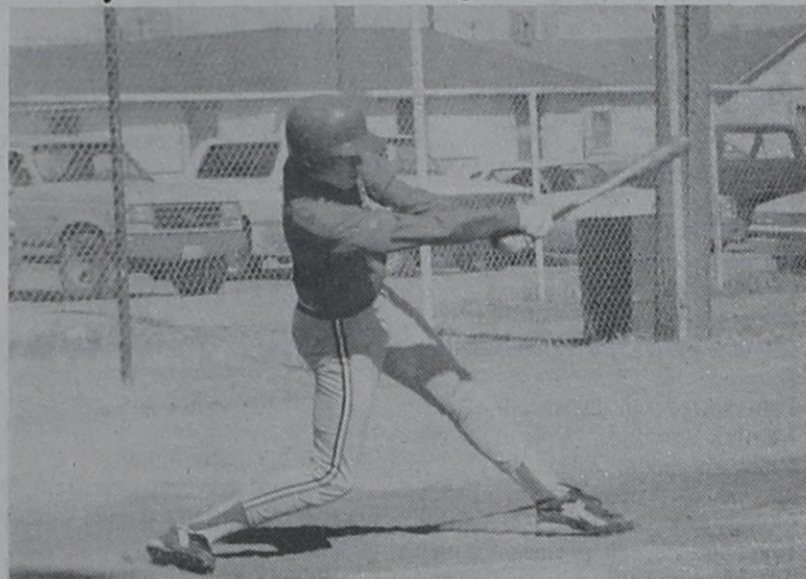

He had lived in Bovina 30 years and was a lifetime Parmer County resident.

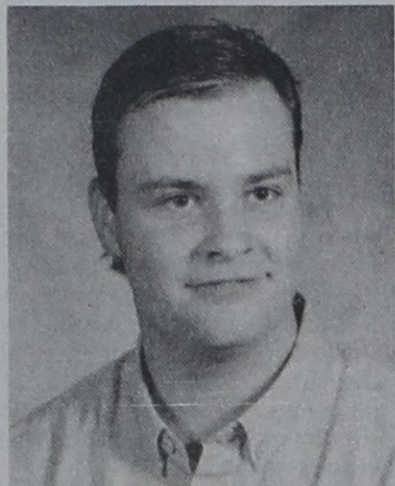

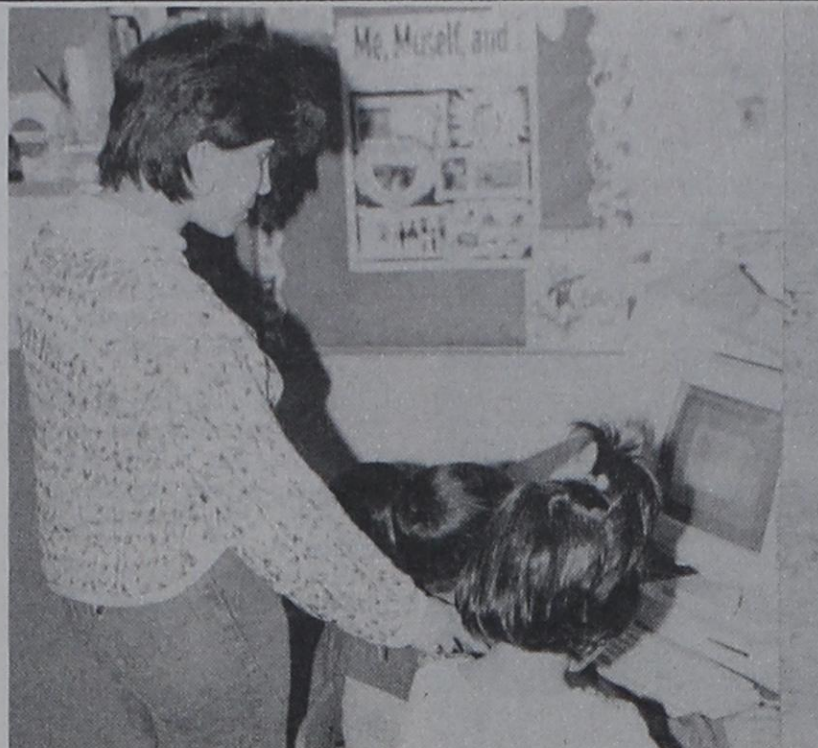

YOUR EYES

Post-Cataract Options

When the eye's natural lens becomes clouded and the cataract is removed, it must be replaced by another clearer lens to focus light onto the retina so the patient can see clearly. There are a number of options open to the patient; the doctor will usually recommend the one most appropriate for the particular individual.

- *Glasses can be worn to take over the task of the missing lens. The glasses can enlarge the image, but side vision will be restricted.
- *A contact lens can be worn in the affected eye to take over for the natural lens. Soft or extended-wear lenses are usually prescribed if they are effective for the patient's vision needs. The patient must be able to insert and remove the contact lenses.
- *An intraocular lens can be implanted directly in the eye during surgery as a permanent replacement for the lens removed. Most often eyeglasses will still be needed to provide additional correction for sharper vision, even if contacts or implants are used.

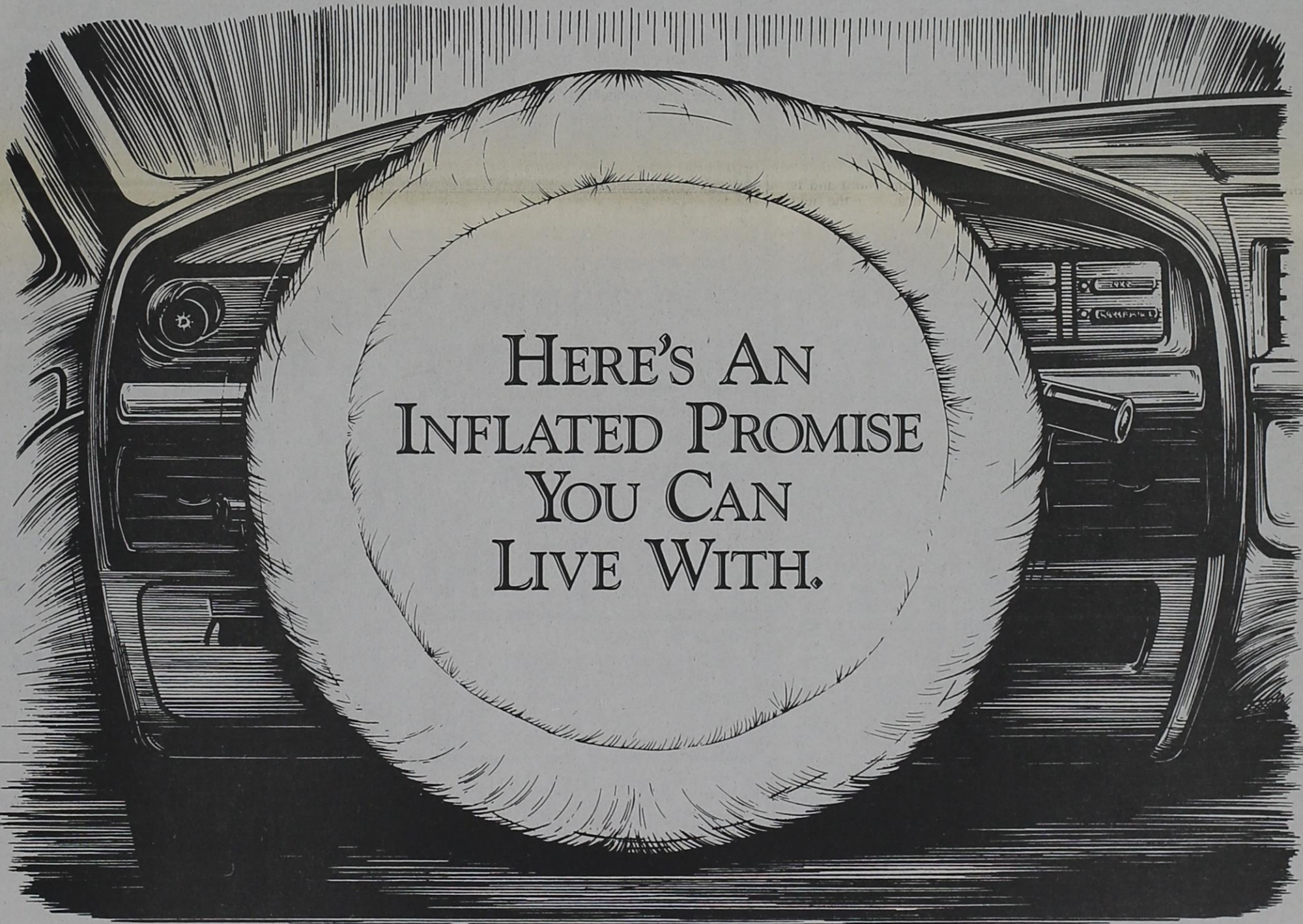

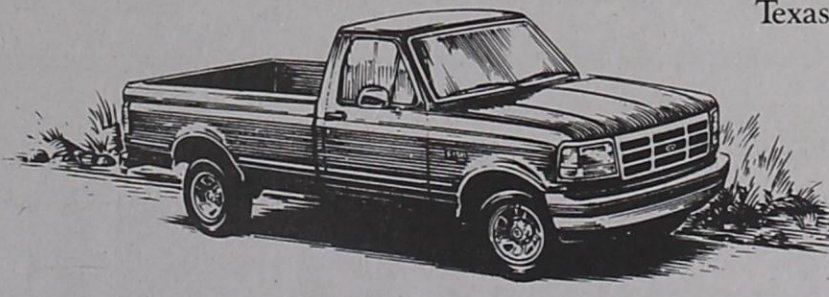

How The Federal Reserve Board Affects The Economy

The U.S. economy can be unpredictable, and economists often disagree on what makes it move. However, certain events almost always trigger predictable economic reactions.

The Federal Reserve Board, or "Fed," is the most important controlling factor in our economy. When the Fed tightens credit, it raises the discount rate, the interest it charges on loans to member banks. Banks then raise their prime rates, the interest they charge on loans to their largest borrowers. In turn, yields also increase on short-term investments such as Treasury bills, certificates of deposit and money-market funds.

When the Fed makes such a move, it is good news for investors who rely on higher interest rates from their savings. It is bad for businesses that have to borrow at higher rates to expand or continue their operations. The result is that, as interest rates rise, the economy slows down, inventories increase, hiring decreases and workers may be laid off.

When the economy posts two consecutive quarters of decline, it is officially in a recession, which means personal income declines,

consumer spending slows and income tax revenues fall. Unemployment and government entitlement programs typically increase, and the federal deficit rises.

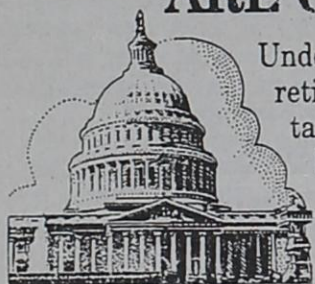
Initially, recessions generally result in a declining stock market. Because of higher interest rates, money that would have been invested in the stock market is directed instead into bonds or other fixed-income investments.

As a recession continues, however, inflation eases. The Fed usually loosens the availability of money by lowering interest rates, and investments such as real estate, collectibles and other equities that typically benefit from inflation begin to lose market value. The cycle begins to reverse.

As the Fed orchestrates the availability of money--and interest rates rise and fall--investments react differently. Higher interest offers savers more income but makes borrowing more expensive, and can be bad for real estate. Low interest rate can make stocks more attractive.

How can individuals invest successfully in a continuously changing economic environment? Seldom is the same investment a winner in all economic conditions. A balanced investment program of fixed-income and growth securities may be a healthy solution during all different economic climates.
