



KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 23 .- It is becoming less "smart" in America to get drunk.

The joke about one's favorite bootlegger already is passe.

These optimistic words about America's prohibition venture, come from Mrs. Mabel Walker Willenbrandt assistant United States Attorney General, a recent visitor here. She is the first woman to hold such an office in the history of the nation.

The "good sportsmanship" of the American people is the reason for the increase in prohibition sentiment, according to Mrs. Willebrandt. She asserts that if the 18th Amendment were to be submitted today to a vote overwhelming majority.

"The prohibition law is becoming planned. to be regarded by public officials in even 'wet' communities in the same light as other laws," stated Mrs. Willebrandt. "Bootlegging is losing social prestige rapidly and slowy is crawling more and more to the underworld.
