B C D DISCUSSES GRADE CROSSINGS

Need of Underground Crossing For Lamar Street and Closing of Bowie Crossing Pointed Out.

ENGINEER'S ESTIMATE HIGH

Fatal Accident Sunday Night, Delay by Trains at Crossing, Danger of Approach Talked.

An underground crossing for Lamar street and the closing of the Bowie Street crossing, or vice versa according to the engineering feasibility, was the principal item of discussion at the regular meeting of the Board of City Development Monday night.

It was brought out that negotiations with this end in view had been under way for some time between city and Texas-Pacific officials and that the latter organization sent an engineer to Sweetwater who investigated the proposed crossing from an engineering standpoint. The cost of the proposition from this engineer's standpoint was in the neighborhood of \$100,000. Members of the board felt that this figure was too high.

The tragedy at the Lamar street crossing Sunday night however with the continual danger of its being re-nacted with different principals most any time were stressed as well as the annoying delays resulting from switching and freight trains blocking the crossings. It developed that scarcely a man present had not had narrow escapes at one or the other of these crossings. It was pointed out also that long strings of box cars usually block the view of the main line track so that it is impossible for an approaching car to see trains until right on the tracks.

Members of the board recommended that the matter be taken up promptly with the State Railroad Commission and with the Texas-Pacific Railway officials and pressed to a conclusion that will eliminate the dangerous condition.

Funeral services for Mrs. J. L. Woodward, 69, Sweetwater woman who died a few minutes after the wagon in which she and her husband were crossing the T-P tracks at Lamar street was struck by the Sunshine Special Sunday night, were held at the First Baptist Church at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Services were conducted by Rev. Morris A. Roberts, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Oak Cliff, Texas. He was assisted by Rev. G. C. Farris.

The five children are here for the funeral, and include three sons, O. E. Woodward of Corsicana, W. A. Woodward, a Nolan County farmer, and G. W. Woodward of San Angelo. The two daughters are Miss Vesalia Woodward of Collingsworth County, and Miss Mary Pearl Woodward of this city.

Minor preparations had been made by Mr. and Mrs. Woodward some time ago for the celebration of their 50th wedding anniversary which would have been January 28, 1925.

MAIL PLANE CREW RESCUED AT SEA

Adrift Seven Hours After Engine Trouble Forces Landing, Saved by Mine Layer.

STARTING NEW SERVICE

Air Mail on First Journey From Honolulu to Island Mau, Sinks After Crew is Saved.

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Oct. 28.—Six men were brought into Honolulu aboard the mine layer Ludlow early today after having drifted at sea nearly seven hours aboard their disabled sea plane. Ten minutes after the Ludlow took them off the wrecked craft, the plane sank. The plane was inaugurating mail service between the islands of the Hawaiian group, and left Honolulu early yesterday morning for the island of Mau. Engine trouble forced a landing on the water and it was seven hours before the Ludlow sighted her.

HAS OLD PAPER

Funeral of George Washington Adams' Message to Congress Described in Ulster Gazette.

A newspaper printed nearly 145 years ago, dated January 4, 1800, carrying news of the death of George Washington and the latest dispatches from London, several weeks late, concerning the progress of the war that had involved all Europe, is the property of J. E. Pittman of Sweetwater. The paper is a copy of the Ulster County Gazette, printed in Kingston, Ulster County, New York. The paper was in its second year at the time this issue was published by Samuel Freer and Son.

The first page of the paper is taken up chiefly with a review of the proceedings in the American Congress, dated Washington, Tuesday, December 10. Much of the reply of President John Adams in answer to a message from Congress following the President's speech at the opening of the session is carried. Concerning the general policy along which the affairs of the nation were to be conducted, Adams said:

"As long as we can maintain with harmony and affection the honor of our country consistently with its peace, externally and internally, while that is attainable, or in war, when that becomes necessary,—asserts its real independence and sovereignty, and supports the constitutional energies and dignity of its government—we may be perfectly sure under the smiles of Divine Providence that we shall effectually promote and extend our national interests and happiness."

Black borders are carried around the columns of the inside pages of the paper, where the action of Congress in mourning the death of George Washington, who died December 14, 1799, is recorded, and the funeral of the great American described in detail. In this section of the paper are also dispatches from the battle of Zurich and other engagements in the European war.

On the last of the paper's four pages are carried advertisements, all given about the same space and position, and official notices from county officials. A reward of \$2 is offered for the return of a valuable gun stolen from a store. Among the articles listed for sale is a negro wench.

New locomotives, passenger and freight cars, costing nearly nine million dollars have been ordered by the Southern Railway.

SEEK TO RESTORE LOST MERIDIAN

Preparing to Take Texas-Oklahoma Boundary Case into U. S. Supreme Court For Settlement.

CLAIM BOUNDARY WRONG

Heretofore Accepted Location of 100th Meridian Erroneous, Texas Claims in Counter Suit.

By The United Press. AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 28.—Former U. S. Attorney General Thomas W. Gregory, counsel for the state in the Red River boundary suit, was in conference with Attorney General of the state today on Supreme Court action seeking to restore the 100th meridian.

This meridian is the boundary of the northern projection of Texas. When Oklahoma sued Texas for the recovery of the Red River oil lands, Texas lost a counter suit claiming the heretofore accepted location of the 100th meridian erroneous, and that Texas was entitled to a strip of what is now Oklahoma territory, a mile wide by 125 miles long.

The counter suit has never been acted on and it is now sought to bring it up in the U. S. Supreme Court.

OFFICIAL DIES

Edward Bell, Charge De Affairs in Peking, Succumbs to Apoplexy—Minister on Leave.

By The United Press. PEKIN, China, Oct. 28.—Edward Bell, Charge de Affairs of the American Legation, died here today of apoplexy. His death places the administration of the affairs of the United States in China in the hands of F. Mayer, first secretary. Jacob Gould Schurman, Minister, is in the United States on leave.

De Valera in Jail.

DUBLIN, Oct. 28.—Eamonn De Valera has succeeded in getting arrested again and locked up until after the election. The Republican leader was expelled from Ulster last Saturday and advised that interment would be the penalty for further invasion. He returned to Londonberry and was arrested.

LEAGUE AGREES

Reported Council Reaches Agreement on Dispute Over Boundary Between Turks and Britain.

By The United Press. LONDON, Eng., Oct. 28.—The League of Nations Council has reached an agreement on the dispute between Turkey and Great Britain over the Iraq boundary and the Mosul oil fields, referred for arbitration, according to an Exchange telegaph dispatch from Brussels.

RECOGNITION FOR SOVIET RUSSIA

France Recognizes Russian Government After Negotiations Since Herriot Took Office.

CZARIST DEBTS UNSETTLED

Only Question That Stood in Way to Be Settled by Representatives of Each Nation.

By The United Press. PARIS, France, Oct. 28.—France recognized Russia today. A telegram embodying official recognition was dispatched to the Soviet at noon. Negotiations looking to the recognition have been under way for some time, practically since the Herriot government went into office. The question of the Czarist debts stood in the way but it was finally agreed it should be discussed by representatives of the two nations after the French government extended recognition.

Advent Retreat Scheduled.

CHANUTE, Kan., Oct. 28. Episcopalians of Kansas will hold an "Advent retreat" in Grace church here, December 9 and 10, the Rev. C. A. G. Helligstedt, announced today. Clergymen and lawyers from the southeast Kansas deanery will participate.

GERMANS WORK

Reorganize and Financial Unity of Nations in Own Hands—Exploited Railways Returned.

By The United Press. PARIS, France, Oct. 28.—The economic and financial unity of Germany has been restored. French and Belgian financial experts informed the preliminary meeting of the Reparations Council here.

The exploited Ruhr and Rhineland railways have been handed back to the Germans, it was announced. The conference is deciding upon the program for the arrangements of the division of the profits of the Ruhr occupation and the petition on the first reparations payment under the experts' plan.

The conference was notified that all French and Belgian organizations exploiting the territory had been suppressed, and that German organizations have been established.

RECOVER BODIES

Rescuers Work 14 Hours Getting Three Miners Out of Shaft Wrecked by Explosion.

By The United Press. TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Oct. 28.—After 14 hours of strenuous effort, rescue workers today removed the third and last body from the Black Hawk Mine of the Miami Mining Company, 12 miles southeast of here, when an explosion killed three miners last night.

GOT ENOUGH

Mayor Was Sick and Tired Riding Lightning.

"I'm an old man and have had lots of experiences, but never in my life have I got so sick and tired of doing any one thing as I did riding that infernal contraption."

Win Fight For School.

MC PHERSON, Kan., Oct. 28.—Windem, a little village near here, has won its fight for a modern rural high school by voting a \$35,000 bond issue and refusing to approve the improvements last spring. The new building, it is said, will be one of the finest rural high school buildings in Kansas.

BRITISH LEADERS TO VISIT MOSCOW

Receive Invitation From Head of Communist International to Learn Facts About Letters.

TO CONDUCT INVESTIGATION

Documents Branded as Forgery by Soviet Have Thrown Political England into Turmoil.

By The United Press. LONDON, Eng., Oct. 28.—British labor leaders have been invited by M. Zinoviev, president of the executives of the Communist International, whose name was signed to the now famous documents which have thrown the political situation here into turmoil, to visit Moscow and investigate the affair at first hand.

A number of prominent leaders plan a mission to Moscow for this purpose on November 7. The investigation will be distinct from that of the Court of Arbitration purposed in the Russian note which branded the letters as an impudent forgery.

Body of Former Secretary of Agriculture to Lie in State in Des Moines Wednesday.

By The United Press. DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 28.—The body of former Secretary of Agriculture Henry C. Wallace, is expected to arrive here tonight at 6:50. The body will lie in state from 9 to 12 tomorrow morning in the capital building.

All offices will be closed by order of the State Executive Council. The funeral will be held in the Wallace home at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Services will be open to the public.

FINAL TOUCHES AT FAIR GROUND

Main Exhibit Building Undergoes Fire Hose Cleaning Preparatory to Fair Opening.

SHOW STARTS TONIGHT

Donald McGregor Shows Are in Readiness—Texas' Tallest Men are in Charge of Carnival.

The fair grounds and exhibit buildings were a scene of activity Tuesday as final preparations were being made for the grand opening of the Nolan County Fair Thursday morning. The central committee reports that everything is progressing according to schedule and that all will be in readiness when the gates swing open for the three big days.

The main exhibit building has undergone a thorough cleaning with the big fire hose from the fire department, and this building will be in fine shape to house the many exhibits. In this building will be displayed all the farm exhibits, flower show, cooking, sewing and educational exhibits, manufacturers and merchants displays, and the automobile show. Workmen were busy Tuesday erecting partitions and other essentials for the different exhibits, and in addition to this, the building throughout the exterior will be suitably and nicely decorated.

The livestock show will be on the fair grounds in a convenient location and posts and stalls are being built for taking care of the entries in this pens will take care of the pig and department. Strong and well built pens will take care of the pig and goat exhibits.

Electricians commenced work Tuesday on stringing a line to the fair grounds and wiring the building. There will be three lines of lights down through the long exhibit building which will be open at night, in addition to the well-lighted fair grounds.

Several local automobile dealers were arranging the details of their exhibits which will occupy one side of the building, and many attractive and unique features in the automobile show are promised.

The Donald McGregor shows have arrived in Sweetwater, after making county fairs throughout the State, and workmen are arranging and erecting the various equipment of the shows Tuesday. The carnival will be open Tuesday night, and will run during the remainder of the week. Donald MacGregor, owner of the show, is only 7 feet tall, while his ground manager, Tom C. Blanton, a cousin of Congressman Thomas L. Blanton, measures 6 feet 11 inches, and they are probably, as they claim, Texas' tallest men.

DIVORCE EASY

Kansas Becoming Rival of Reno With Speed and Accuracy of Divorce Mill Increasing.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 28.—The Bert Lytell Evelyn Vaughan divorce case in the circuit court at Independence last week just fifteen minutes after it was filed, is another milestone in making Missouri and Kansas serious competitors to Reno in the divorce business, according to attorneys here.

Kansas with eleven grounds for marital separation, long has been an easy state to gain freedom from marital ties, but until recently the state's rigid one year's residence provision had tended to discourage an influx of outside divorce seekers. A decision last May in the Shawnee County district court at Topeka in which the divorce action of a woman who had left here at 11 o'clock in the morning and filed her suit in Topeka that afternoon after several year's residence in the East, was permitted to stand, is now being cited to other divorce judges in the state with excellent results, according to attorneys. As a result Kansas' divorce record which in the past ten years had increased 100 per cent, will probably show even a larger increase in 1925, according to the lawyers.

COMPARATIVE COSTS

Figuring the cost of life and property in cold dollars and cents, a comparison between the cost to a railroad company of damage suits growing from accidents at grade crossings and the cost of a modern under ground or overhead crossing which would eliminate such costs, would prove interesting.

Unless the old order of things in vogue for centuries is suddenly altered, accidents are certain to occur. And unless our transportation system, both on the part of the railroad companies operating trains over tracks and citizens crossing those tracks, is changed to provide absolute safety at crossings, fatal collisions between trains and autos, trucks, wagons, and pedestrians are likely to continue to take a heavy toll in property and human life.

Grant, then, that the grade crossing is a menace. Call it a necessary evil if you will. Figure its cost to the railroad companies in dollars, to society in human life, and to the average community in hazard and worry, and try to find a reason why it should not be eliminated when at all possible.

We believe that traffic is sufficient.

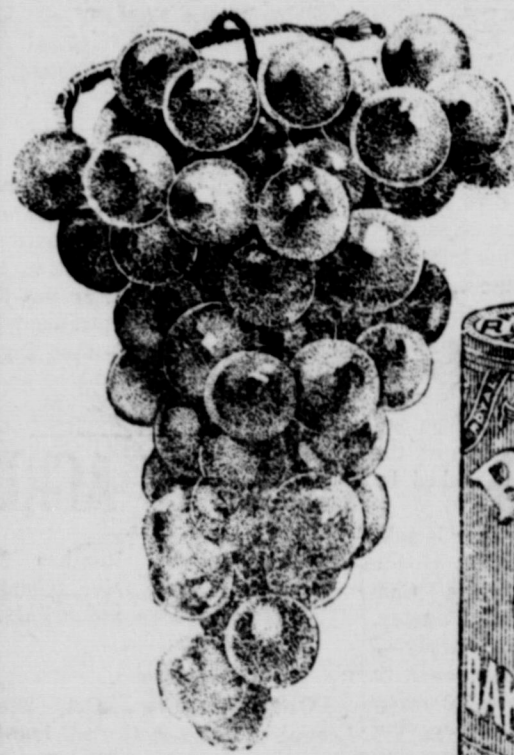

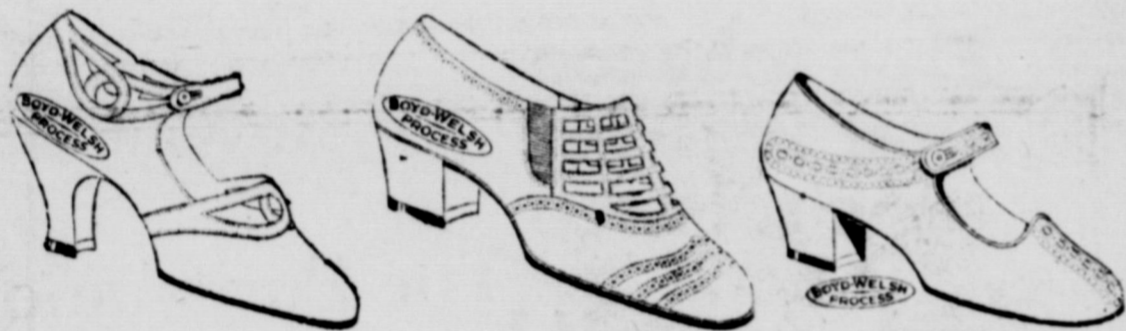

Lighting the Laundry

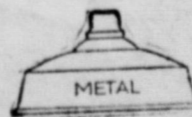
Neither washing clothes nor ironing clothes up to dry indoors. The convenience outlets for the electric appliances should be in the wall not less than 36 inches above the floor so that the cord with which we connect them will not be on the floor and get wet.

There are little spots of dirt to be washed away—sometimes we have to look twice to be sure that the clothes are quite clean; there are wrinkles and plaits to be ironed carefully. So we need light that will make it easier for us to see what we are doing; lighting that will let us see at a glance whether the clothes are clean and whether the iron has smoothed out all of the wrinkles.

Many homes have a separate room, sometimes in one corner of the basement, where the washing and ironing are done. In other homes the laundry tubs are found in the kitchen and the same room is used both for cooking and for laundry work.

Where the laundry tubs are put in the kitchen, the lighting equipment in Lesson No. 3 will be satisfactory, unless the room is a large one. In this case it may be necessary to add a bracket fixture on the wall behind the tubs, with a 50-watt white bulb or a 75-watt daylight or blue bulb. This bulb should be covered with a deep, open bottom, milk-white glass shade. The daylight or blue glass bulb will make it easier to see scorches.

When the laundry tubs are in a separate room, we need a light close up at the ceiling and over the tubs. It should have a 150-watt daylight or blue bulb or a 100-watt clear bulb with a metal reflector like this:



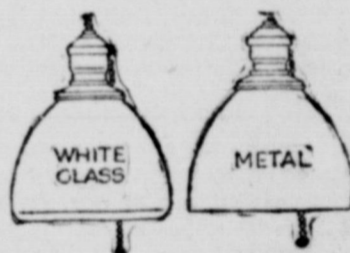
or a dense, milk-white glass shade which is open at the bottom and deep enough to completely cover the bulb, like this:



If the room is a large one, we may need two or three of these lights at the ceiling. In most laundry rooms, and one over the tubs will give good lighting. When others are used, put them over the ironing board and over the space that is used for hanging the

clothes up to dry indoors. The convenience outlets for the electric appliances should be in the wall not less than 36 inches above the floor so that the cord with which we connect them will not be on the floor and get wet.

LIGHTING THE BASEMENT
The basement of our homes usually contains the heating equipment and storage space for fuel. At least one light will be needed in front of the furnace or heater. It should have a 50-watt bulb and a metal or glass shade of this shape, long enough to cover the bulb.



A similar light is needed for the fruit closet, and perhaps for the coal bin.

The stairway to the basement must be lighted by a separate light, unless one of the other lights is very close to it. The light that is used for this purpose should be installed so that it may be turned on and off from the top of the stairs in order that we may see our way down at night.

LIGHTING THE WORKBENCH
Perhaps father or brother has a workbench in the basement where he builds radio sets or takes the smaller parts of the auto to put them in good condition.

This work bench needs two lights over it, one at each end. If only one light is used, the shadows that it will make are very annoying. If two lights are used, each one lights up the shadows made by the other one.

You know when you have a table lamp with only one bulb in it lighted, and all the other lights in the room are turned out, that if you start to make lines with a ruler, the ruler sometimes makes a shadow just where you are trying to put the line. But if you turn on the other lights in the room, this shadow fades out and you can see nicely.

That is why we need two lights at the ceiling over a workbench, and why one of them should be over the center of one end of the bench and one over the other end of the bench and about six inches in front of it.
