To Visit Grounds Some Time Saturday For Final Day of Fair.

RECORD CROWD WHLL BE THERE Climax To Most Successful Fair To Be Staged After Two Days of Great Celebration-Prepare For Ten Thousand.

With the passing of the first and second days of the First Annual Nolan County Fair in which every detail of the program was carried out exactly as scheduled and the attendance exceeded all expectations, the third and last day of the big occasion Saturday is scheduled to be the biggest day of the entire Fair. In addition to the big program of events and exhibits for this day, it has been named Sweetwater Day at the Fair, and the day when all Sweetwater is expected to visit the fair grounds at least once and mix and mingle with their neighbors from over the County.

Naturally the biggest day of the entire occasion, Saturday will be doubly important to Sweetwater citizens, as it is their own day to make merry and join the throngs that have already swelled the attendance record in Sweetwater, the largest since Jubilee Day here several years ago. According to estimates advanced by fair officials, the attendance Saturday is likely to exceed 8,000 with posas the city residents take advantage of Sweetwater Day.
