Commissioners' Court Takes Action After Meeting With Women of County Monday Afternoon.

Value of Home Demonstration Agent to Homes in Rural Communities Discussed by Women.

'The Commissioners' Court of Nolan County voted to retain the office of Home Demonstration Agent in the County, and to provide the appropriation to carry on that work, it was announced Tuesday following a meeting at the court house Monday afternoon when protests were made against the discontinuance of the work.

resentatives of various communities "youth's degeneracy," the Bishop from over the county met with the County Commissioners in session at the court house Monday to protest the removing of the office of Home Demonstration Agent and the stopping of the appropriation of that office. Over 15 women were present as well as several prominent men of Sweetwater and Nolan County who are interested in the work

The Commissioners' Court some time ago voted to do away with the office and stop the \$1,200 annual appropriation for the same.

Short talks were made by various members of the County Federation of Women's Clubs and members of the Home Demonstration Clubs.

In the talks, strong opposition was volced to the removal of the office, promises. and good work and progress obtained through the office were pointed out. The exhibits at the Nolan County Fair were put over through the work of Home Demonstration clubs and the agent, several women declared. These clubs lined up the communities in preparation for fair exhibits, and these communities alone made the fair possible, one speaker stated.

The appeal of the club women was not a personal or individual issue, it was pointed out, but just to ask the commissioners to see to it that the work continues under the supervision of any agent.

MARTYR TO ART

Producer Who Exhibited Ultra Attractive Posters Starves in Jail With Show Crowded.
